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Hometown Heroes: Brian and Kathy Haugen Have Turned Pain into Benefit for Local Athletes for 10 Years

If you or your child has been the recipient of a Haugen Foundation scholarship, he or she is part of the Haugen family.

August marked 10 years since the death of Niceville High School student, Taylor Haugen, that rocked the Niceville community and entire Emerald Coast. Friends, family and those impacted by the Foundation are brought back to August 30, 2008:

It was a new school year and with that, football season was kicking off in Niceville, Florida. Spirits were high and the Eagles were headed to play cross-town rivals, Fort Walton Beach Vikings. Taylor "T" Haugen was gearing up to hit the gridiron while his father, Brian Haugen, was deployed with the National Guard and while mom, Kathy Haugen, rallied friends and grabbed a bleacher on the sidelines. She was dressed in maroon and white ready to cheer on her son, a 15-year-old sophomore wide receiver at Niceville High. The game kicked off and within a matter of seconds, Taylor suffered a severe abdominal injury. This injury caused internal bleeding that ultimately led to Taylor's death. The entire community was stunned, heartbroken and left asking questions. How could this happen? Wasn't he wearing pads? Was this a freak accident or does this happen to other kids? Parents in the community were asking, "Could this happen to my child?" The tragedy is one that no parent should ever have to go through, but nonetheless the Haugen's took their pain and gave it a purpose.

With that, the Taylor Haugen Foundation was born with a mission to provide awareness, education and abdominal injury protection to secondary aged schools and leagues in contact sports through its YESS Program (Youth Equipment for Sports Safety) and recognition of outstanding student athletes by giving awards and five scholarships each year for local students in Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton counties.

Ten years later, the Taylor Haugen Foundation is making tremendous strides as an advocate for the sports injury awareness and prevention not only in Northwest Florida, but throughout the entire nation. The YESS Program is the only nonprofit in the country solely focused on abdominal injuries. The YESS program provides each player on a team with their own personal

piece of state-of-the-art abdominal protection equipment. The gear individually form-fits to each player to ensure they are protected at the same level as players in the NFL.

The YESS program has grown nationally to 13 states and has provided proper abdominal injury protection to more than 4,500 student athletes and more than \$317,000 has been raised to provide safety equip-

ment. The program also provides awareness to parents, coaches and players of how prevalent these injuries are and informs them of the availability and affordability of better equipment that can protect them from abdominal injury. The Foundation's mission and the YESS program have been featured in major national media outlets including ESPN, Fox News, USA TODAY, CBS This Morning, NBC Nightly News and more.

Each year the scholarship is awarded to five student-athletes in three local counties who demonstrate Taylor's characteristic traits which are also the

Foundation's pillars: a balance of academics, athleticism, leadership, community service and Christian faith and a perseverance to improve themselves in all aspects of their life while enjoying God's gifts to the fullest. In 10 years, the Foundation has provided 44 scholarships, for a total of \$61,000. Aside from the scholarships, the Taylor Haugen Foundation also awards a trophy to a local student that fulfills the "Don't Quit - Never Give Up" spirit by persevering in the face of adversity and continuing to excel in their studies and athletics at the annual All Sports Association FCA breakfast. The trophy is presented each year by hometown legend, Heisman Trophy winner and former NFL quarterback, Danny Wuerffel.

Although his 15 years were cut short, Taylor continues to impact his community through his parents, Brian and Kathy. 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DCWAF Donates a Record-Breaking \$2.7 Million 15 Children's Charities in Northwest Florida Benefit

Our area's own Destin Charity Wine Auction Foundation (DCWAF), recognized as the third largest charity wine auction in the country by Wine Spectator magazine for the second consecutive vear, donated \$2.7 million to 15 local charities serving children in need in Northwest Florida. For the first time in the Foundation's history, DCWAF broke from tradition and raised an additional \$48,000 to donate to the fire victim relief initiatives in Napa and Sonoma Counties.

DCWAF has donated \$18 million to non-profit organizations since its inception in 2005. "We are grateful to the many supporters of DCWAF that have made this day possible. What cannot be overlooked is the effort that each of our supported organizations has expended to help us raise the \$2.7 million that was donated," said DCWAF President John Russell.

The 2018 recipients of the Destin Charity Wine Auction Foundation include:

AMIkids Emerald Coast received \$145,000 to fund a va-

riety of behavioral modification programs, academic supplies, employee development, and student transportation.

Boys & Girls Clubs of the Emerald Coast received \$200,000 to allow 200 students from low income households to attend programming for one year, designed to provide unique opportunities to learn, grow and to recognize their achievements.

Children in Crisis received \$200,000 to fund the facilitation of housing for abused, neglected and abandoned children. On-site housing provides stability, shelter, house parents, food, clothing and necessary items to help 100 children live a healthy lifestyle over the next year.

Children's Volunteer Health Network (CVHN) received \$250,000 to fund and serve underinsured and uninsured children in need of dental care. These funds will allow for two hygienists on the Mobile Dental Clinic, and one full-time dentist and support staff at the CVHN Dental Clinic to assist with children in need of dental and medical care, purchase



new dental supplies and cover the maintenance and repair of equipment.

Emerald Coast Autism Center received \$200,000 to fund scholarships for approximately 25 families unable to afford services at the new NWFL State College campus facility. The new facility has allowed Emerald Coast Autism Center to increase its capacity levels, serving up to 130 students.

Emerald Coast Children's Advocacy Center (ECCAC) received \$280,000 to support mental health therapy, medical programs, and a case advocacy program that facilitates a child-friendly atmosphere offering counseling, family services, and coordination of investigations for child abuse and neglect. In the non-profit's 17year history, approximately 12,000 children have received more than 44.000 services at no cost to include mental health therapy, crisis intervention, referrals to other community providers, interviews and medicals.

Food for Thought Outreach

which provides nutritious meals for school-aged children that are dependent upon free or reduced school meals in an effort to bridge the gap between school meals during weekends and holiday breaks.

Habitat for Humanity of Walton County received \$192,000 to fully fund the building of two new homes for families with children in North Walton County as well as the purchase of two lots in Sana Rosa Beach.

Mental Health Association of Okaloosa and Walton Counties is DCWAF's newest beneficiary and received \$100,000 to fund "The Brain Health Initiative" geared toward early identification, assessment and treatment for students ages 12 to 21 who experience mental health or substance abuse issues.

Opportunity Place received \$100,000 for immediate housing for homeless children and their families to ensure they are safe and secure.

Pathways for Change received \$190,000 for comprehensive addiction treatment programs including men's residential treatment and operations for the family center. DCWAF's funding will also expand to include services for children of female veterans who live at the Clinton Cox Residence.

Sacred Heart Hospital on the Emerald Coast received \$200,000 to fund a 10-bed, Level II Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

Shelter House of Northwest Florida received \$200.000 to fund support groups, counseling, and advocacy for youth touched by domestic violence. Funding will also support their Youth Prevention Program, therapists for children, supplies such as school snacks and diapers, tutoring materials, community outings, and the Youth Community Action Team.

The Arc of the Emerald Coast received \$145,000 to support Early Intervention and Family Education Program at the Early Intervention Center for children living with disabilities.

Youth Village received \$100,000 to fund afterschool programming for low-income children along the Emerald Coast as well as their new capital campaign.

Looking at the ROTH IRA for Your Retirement

Planning and saving for retirement. The time value of money. Keeping more of what you earn. Time in the market vs timing the market. Starting early is a key to growing your retirement savings, with tax advantaged investing and tax free withdrawals. These are sayings that we have all heard and read over the years. What about an investment account that can help do all of these things? For individuals who qualify, there is the Roth IRA. What then is a Roth IRA?

A Roth IRA is a retirement account that Americans can use to help build their retirement savings. It is a registration, and the investor can use it to buy stocks, bonds, mutual funds, even CDs and money markets. The Roth IRA was created as a result of the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 and was named for its sponsoring senator, William Roth, of Delaware. What makes the Roth IRA unique is that it is a retirement account that grows tax free and if certain conditions are met, with-drawals are not taxed*. Unlike most IRAs, there is no required distribution (at age 70 $^{1}/_{2}$) and the owner can pass it to the beneficiary who will also avoid paying taxes on withdrawals in most situations.

Many see the Roth IRA as an attractive choice for those who qualify. Generally speaking a couple that earns less than \$189,000 per year or an individual that earns less than \$120,000 can contribute to a Roth. At income levels above that, the contribution is phased out. Individual contributions are a maximum of \$5500 per year before age 50 and can go up to \$6500 per year thereafter. An additional qualifier is that the investor has to have earned income in order to contribute. Unfortunately, contributions to a Roth IRA are never tax deductible.

Young people entering the workforce can take full advantage of maximizing time in the market and avoiding taxes on any growth. Not to worry, the IRS has already taxed any income that is used to go into a Roth, so it is an after tax contribution. Many retirement plans allow for pretax contributions which will eventually be taxed along with the growth. Once again, that is not the case for a Roth.

New, Not So New – Functional Fitness

Fitness styles seem to change as we learn more about what works and doesn't work. In last month's article, I mentioned that the American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM) added a new category to the exercise guidelines, Neuromotor Exercise, aka: Functional Fitness Training (FFT), recommending 2+ days/ wk. Functional fitness training focuses on improving and maintaining motor skills such as balance, coordination, gait and agility. Neuromotor exercise can be especially beneficial for older

people to improve balance and muscle strength, reducing the risk of falls and other injuryinjury, important safety measure as we age.

Participating in functional resistance movements involving multiple muscle groups plus a significant degree of balance through multifaceted activities such as Tai Chi, Pilates or Yoga lends the stability needed for daily activities, which makes this training "Functional." A recent study shows that people over age 50 should focus on agility training specifically. This can be somewhat uneasy training for some, as they are working on movements and with props that are unstable. Therefore, special care needs to go towards safety.

FFT is also of great benefit to athletes and sports players competing at any level, as improved agility, balance, proprioception and other motor skills can significantly help performance.

Interval training is a great solution for maximizing time and increasing results and helps combat boredom. It involves alternating bursts of intense movements followed by "active rest" that's usually a lesser intensity of the same movement. In basic or traditional interval training, intervals can be based according to the needs of the participant and times and styles can vary. Interval training can be used to fulfill all categories of training (Cardio, Resistance, Neuromotor, even Flexibility).

Since interval training can be configured any way we choose, this is a great way to fit all the training disciplines into a 60-minute workout. I like to mix things up by alternating balance (core) training and cardio training within timed intervals.

Example #1: (2:1 ratio) 30 seconds on/15 seconds off (agility, cardio, core) — Round 1: "puddle jumpers" (side to side jumps). *Tip:* Use a flat yoga mat as a visual to jump over sideways pushing off hard to get good lateral training of the leg and glute. Round 2: "Russian twists" sit with bent knees, lean back, round your back, clasp your hands together or hold a ball and twist your upper body side to side, rotating at the torso, reaching your hands or ball as far as possible to each side. Tip: Your chest should turn following your hands. Alternate these two movements each 30 sec. interval with 15 second break for 8 rounds. Note: You should do 4 of each movement.

Example #2: 20 sec on/10 sec off (cardio, core) - Round

1: Jumping Jacks (low impact modifications avail) Round 2: one leg balance on disc note: use balance disc/balance trainer; an unstable surface to challenge your balance. Alternate through 8-10 rounds with 10 secs to rest and transition

Final thoughts: One of the most impressive evidencebased statements in the new ACSM Position Stand paper is that leadership from well-trained professionals will meaningfully enhance the exercise experience with adults, especially the novice exercisers. The fact that a position statement with over 400 cited references highlights the importance of skilled exercise professionals is a true measure of how much the profession of fitness training has grown in the last decade.

It was the spring of 1963. He was eight years old. His father, a career Air Force man, had been assigned to Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines and had gone ahead of the family to find a place for them to live before they made the trip. The eight-year-old and his mom made the trip from Gulfport, Mississippi to Trenton, New Jersey to spend time with family until everything was in order. They stayed with Aunt Marge and Uncle John who were the closest thing to grandparents he would ever know. It was a trying and unsure time for him. But Uncle John took the small boy under his wing - small being the operative word, for Uncle John was six-foot-four. Over the six week time period before the move took them to the Philippines, Uncle John and the little

boy became very close. A couple of times a week they could be seen taking an evening walk to the corner store at the end of the block. Uncle John's long arm reached down to hold the hand of his new friend whose arm would be stretched up as far as it could be stretched in order to hold the hand of six-foot-four Uncle John, who had to lean to one side in order to make contact with the little guy. They would each get an ice cream cone and return to the front stoop of Uncle John's house and eat ice cream together. It probably would have made for a great Norman Rockwell picture. What went on there, however, was deeper than a neat glimpse of Americana. In a trying time in the life of a little boy, the presence, attention and love of big Uncle John brought a sense of security and wellbeing to the eight year old who had found himself in a strange place and circumstance. The big man's hand always reached down to touch, hold, and offer security, reassurance, love and an occasional ice cream cone.

Another man named Peter followed a man named Jesus who

was bigger than life itself. He tagged along with the little band of followers, always opening his mouth and taking action before he thought through what he said. Jesus was walking on the water toward the disciples during a storm on the Sea of Galilee and called Peter to come and walk with him. Peter steps out of the boat into a strange place and circumstance. When he took his eyes off Jesus he sank into the abyss. He called out to Jesus and though we are not told specifically, probably reached his hand up as far as he could reach toward Jesus. 



The Historic Destin Fishing Rodeo

Destin's Oldest and Most Prominent Event Celebrates 70 Years in October: Part 1

With the 70th anniversary of the Destin Fishing Rodeo rapidly approaching, captains and anglers alike are preparing for what appears to be a

monumental year in rodeo history. In the first of our two-part series, you'll learn more Rodeo details, how to participate, what you can win and some upcoming Rodeo events. In part two, we'll highlight the changes coming in 2018 for the 70th year and show you some of the most memorable catches over the 70-year history.

Rodeo History

The Destin Fishing Rodeo was started in 1948 as a way to repay the loan given for the then new community center. What began as just a few anglers and charter boats has now expanded into one of the largest fishing tournaments along the Emerald Coast. The rodeo is a month-long event spanning October 1 through 31st, and approximately 30,000 anglers compete each year.

Anglers catch and then weigh in. The weigh-ins happen on the docks behind AJs Seafood and

Oyster bar located on the Destin Harbor. They are free to the public and are open daily from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. To participate, charter boats and private boats must be registered at least 24 hours prior to weighing in a fish. There is no fee for an angler fishing on a registered vessel (private or charter) and shore fisherman can participate by simply bringing their catch to the scales. Fish by kayak, paddle board, pier, bridge, jetty, shoreline and surf - whichever you prefer. Another fun note: every child who enters a fish in the Destin Rodeo that weighs 1 lb. or more will receive a rod and reel, along with a participation certificate.

Rodeo Events

A few notable Rodeo events include Shark Saturdays, where the largest shark brought in every Saturday is awarded a cash prize. Fall Fest for the Kids is happening Oct. 9 from 12 p.m. to 2 p.m. on the docks behind AJs, with activities such as face painting, arts and crafts and pumpkin decorating. The Rodeo culminates with Halloween on the Harbor, happening October 31st where captains, anglers, judges, Miss Destin and volunteers will dress the part. The public is encouraged to wear their costumes and come down for the Halloween bash, followed by a fireworks finale.

If you're planning to make a trip down to the docks, expect to see a broad spectrum of fish being weighed in. From Sharks to Amberjacks, Grouper to King Mackerel, Tunas to Marlin, the Rodeo has it all. According to the Destin Rodeo website, "virtually every gamefish is recognized with awards during the Rodeo." Rodeo anglers are competing for more than \$100,000 in cash and prizes, awarded for both daily and overall catches.

Even if you're not a fisherman, the energy level and excitement that comes from being at the docks for weigh ins is like nothing else. Boats back into the scales, pull the fish from their boat while the announcer hypes up the crowd. Fish are strung up on the scale while the crowds cheer and applaud the boat and their team. For the best seat in the house, get there early, grab a few beers or drinks and snag a seat on the bleachers by the leaderboard or above on AJs upper deck.



Open houses are needed to sell homes.

I often get calls from people asking about properties that have been off the market more than a year, but Zillow says it's active. A local website like www.Destin-PropertyExpert.com will provide you with information that is not only relevant to our local real estate market but is also current. The search function has been created specifically for this area

and the website is updated every 15 minutes.

You need 20% down to avoid PMI

Very often people that we are working with are concerned about paying PMI (Personal Mortgage Insurance). Most people know that if they save for a big enough down payment (20%), they will not have to pay the PMI when they get their loan. In reality, there are often many creative loans and ways to avoid PMI. One of the best is getting a USDA loan. With this particular loan, you can get 100% financing with no PMI. Of course, there are restrictions like income, which is earning less than \$99,850 per year or less depending on children in the home. There are other options like lender paid mortgage insurance which some local banks offer. The bottom line is there are ways to avoid PMI without putting 20% down.

The Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance Expands Fishing Line Recycling Program

Walk onto a fishing pier in Okaloosa and Walton Counties this summer and you may see a gorgeously decorated monofilament recycling bin painted with images of fish, mermaids, birds, or other real and imagined marine life. The fishing line recycling program, an initiative of the Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance (CBA), combines artistry and function to eliminate the accidental distribution of fishing line on nearby beaches and shorelines, while calling attention to the negative impact of fishing line entanglement on local wildlife. CBA is working with local artist Joan Vienot and Walton Outdoor publisher Lori Ceier to expand this unique recycling program and install new recycling receptacles in Thomas Pilcher and Cessna Parks.

Ceier frequently visits Pilcher Park, and noted the need to properly recycle fishing line. She approached CBA, offering to bring Vienot on board to decorate the bins.

"My favorite part was the design, I think we both enjoyed that.

The birds we chose are native to the area. There are a cormorant, great blue heron, and osprey," explains Ceier.

The Cessna and Pilcher Park bins were placed in partnership with the Walton County TDC, and are equipped with an opening for monofilament disposal which is collected by CBA staff and volunteers - and an educational sign about monofilament fishing line recycling. When accidentally thrown into our coastal areas, the plastic strands not only entangle marine mammals and aquatic species, but can also be harmful to humans. Unfortunately, fishing line is created from slow degrading plastic that takes over 600 years to break down.

The monofilament recycling project makes an important impact on the environment and the community. Frequent beach goers know that marine debris is one of the biggest challenges facing the Gulf of Mexico and oceans. Plastic bags, fishing line, and hooks are nearly always present on both piers and along nearby coastlines. By empowering anglers to recycle while they are fishing, the decorated receptacles act as a selfteaching mechanism that allows families, fishermen, and visitors to become active participants in conservation.

The monofilament recy-

cling program has grown since its founding by the 2014 Destin Forward class. CBA now has 19 fishing line recycling receptacles throughout the Choctawhatchee Bay area. Working with the Destin Fisherman's Co-op to host the recycling line drop-off point for all of CBA's receptacles, the program strives to reduce the amount of the flexible plastic commonly found near the shoreline and educate the public on the harmful effects this type of marine debris.

"The decorated recycling bins are an attractive solution to throwing away fishing line," says Alison McDowell, CBA Director, "They beautify the fishing piers and allow easy recycling of monofilament." These monofilament recyclers have become an emblem for beach restoration projects and counter the spread of plastics in the ocean.

Pompano Joe's



Farming Our Local Waters: Trey Nick of Nick's Seafood

As a food writer and blogger living by the water's edge of the Emerald Coast, one of the first questions locals or people ask when they visit our area is how they can be certain that they are buying or being served fresh seafood. It would appear that answer would be a simple, but many restaurants do not serve fresh fish and shellfish.

According to Oceana, the largest international advocacy organization focused solely on ocean conservation that was founded in 2001, over 59 percent of the tuna sold in the United States was mislabeled. Tilapia lovers might want to take notice that their dinner could be farm raised on pig feces that then traveled from Vietnam or Thailand. Today, more than 90 percent of the seafood consumed in the U.S. is imported, and less than 1 percent of that is inspected by the government for fraud.

Frank III, aka Trey Nick, was born into his grandparents' fish camp and restaurant business that was built in the early 1900's but changed to their family's hands in 1956. Tucked between the Choctawhatchee Bay and Basin Bayou in Freeport, Frank and Hattie Nick sold bait, beer and rented fishing boats for a dollar a day.

In 1963, Frank's Italian passion to cook for others took over and a new building was erected. Nick's slowly honed its reputation for serving only the freshest homegrown seafood, and became the popular place to enjoy raw oysters tonged from their own state leased beds, plump shrimp and mullet plucked from the Gulf and bay before being dredged and fried in their secret batter, in addition to hamburgers and icecold beer sold for a fair price.

In 1979 Nick's Seafood Res-If seeking fresh, never frozen, taurant was passed on to Trey nie, and by 1998 he became the third generation to take over the

"We have always kept the tradition of a family atmosphere. My daughter might be bussing tables like last night, while my son is on oyster washing duty. Millionaires to fisherman are our continual customers. People have their favorite days to come to the restaurant and we treat customers like family too. Those that grew up eating here are now bringing their own kids. This is more than just a restaurant, it's a way of life," said Nick.

Living right off the local waters, along with the day-to-day operations of the restaurant, Trey Nick also runs three commercial inshore fishing boats and is the largest blue crab commercial harvester in the Choctawhatchee Bay with his son pulling traps by his side. Nick says, "We do our own fishing and crabbing. I sell blue crab, mullet, speckled trout, shrimp, and flounder for the most part. We will not buy anything overseas when you can get the best right here. It's about putting the freshest product on the plate.'

Seafood traceability, or tracking fish from boat to plate, signifi-

cantly reduces seafood fraud, while providing consumers with more information about the seafood they are purchasing.

Harbor Docks, Sexton's, Camille's and Destin Ice & Seafood in

Destin, along with Willingham Seafood Company in Valparaiso, Bayou Bill's Crab House in Santa Rosa Beach and Johnny's Shrimp Shack in Defuniak Springs are just a few of the businesses that buy and support Trey Nick's sustainable seafood. "With quotas, the seasons, whether or not the fish are biting, along with other varying factors, fresh local seafood isn't going to be cheap, but you will know what you are eating, and it will taste terrific!" said Nick.

Keto Chicken Nuggets

Ready to be the talk of the tailgate? These Keto Chicken Nuggets are perfect for a quick party appetizer, tailgating recipe or a fun dinner. Folks won't know they're keto unless you tell them! Local resident (and daughter-in-law), Sarah Smith, made them for us one night for dinner and I couldn't quit eating them! Just knowing they were healthy added more appeal. They're made with chunks of chicken breasts coated with buffalo sauce, almond flour and parmesan cheese, then baked until golden. It's an easy and healthy homemade chicken recipe for young and young at heart. Serve them with your favorite dip; but they're scrumptious with no dip at all.

Ingredients:

- 1 lb. boneless, skinless chicken breast or tenders
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 cup of Franks Buffalo Sauce
- 1-1/4 cup almond flour
- l teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne
- 2 tablespoons parmesan cheese
- 1 tablespoon and 1/2 tablespoon of Ranch seasoning

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Cut chicken into strips or nuggets. Pat chicken dry and season with salt and pepper.

In a medium bowl, whisk almond flour, parmesan, garlic powder, onion powder, paprika, and tablespoon of Ranch seasoning and cayenne until combined.



Dip sliced chicken into the buffalo sauce, then cover in almond flour mixture. Repeat until all chicken is coated.

Place coated chicken on non-stick baking pan.

Bake for 15-20 minutes or until outside starts to brown.

If desired, in a saucepan, heat butter until melted. Whisk in 1/2 cup buffalo sauce and bring to a simmer.

Add in chicken and toss until coated.

Radiant barriers have been used in the student housing at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), Princeton, and Frank Sinatra's residence in Palm Springs, California. Radiant barrier was even inducted into the Space Technology Hall of Fame in 1996.

What is radiant barrier? When radiant solar energy strikes a roof, heating the roofing material (shingles, tiles or roofing sheets) and roof sheathing, it causes the underside of the roof surface and the roof framing to radiate heat downward through the roof space (attic / ceiling cavity) toward the attic floor (upper ceiling surface). When a radiant barrier is installed on the rafters in the attic, much

Why is that important? Many of our attics will reach into the 150° to 160° degree F range during summer; heating up insulation, ductwork and many times our stored belongings. Anyone who has stored candles in the attic knows what I mean. This extreme heat makes our current insulation and air conditioners work harder to keep our homes cool, costing us money and comfort. Properly installed radiant barrier on the roof rafters will reflect 97% of the radiant heat reducing the attic tem-

perature during this extreme heat by 40° to 50° degrees F, allowing

of the heat radiated from the hot roof is reflected back toward the roof and the low emissivity of the underside of the radiant barrier means that very little radiant heat is emitted downwards.

your insulation and ductwork to perform better, saving you money and increasing your comfort.

One common misconception regarding radiant barrier is that the heat reflecting off the radi-



ant barrier back to the roof has the potential to increase the roof temperature and possibly damage the roofing material voiding my warranty. Performance testing by Florida Solar Energy Center showed that the increase in temperature at the hottest part of the day was no more than 2° to 5° degrees F. RIMA International wrote a technical paper on the subject which included statements collected from large roofing manufacturers, and none said that radiant barrier would in any way affect the warranty.

To improve on this technology, we perforated our radiant bar-

rier allowing your attic to breath (this is critical in a vented attic system) and sandwiched a piece of high density insulation between two pieces of radiant barrier allowing our radiant barrier to help fight against not only radiant heat, but conduction and convection heat as well. 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
