

Turning a Vision into a Reality

Will a Destin High School Finally Open Its Doors?

Did you know that more than 700 students ride a bus from Destin to their high schools? But, in the future, it's likely that Destin's high school students will have a school to call their own.

Destin Lifers have been discussing the desire for a Destin High School for nearly a decade. However, this past October, Destin High School was officially established as a Florida not-for profit Corporation. Upon approval of the charter application, the new high school could open as early as August 2020.

Destin's City Council voted in June of 2016 to create a Destin High School Advisory Committee to develop a strategic plan for presentation to the Okaloosa School District. School Financial Services recommended that the committee, comprised of volunteer community leaders, move forward with pursuing

ernment institutions. The primary goal of the Leadership program is to challenge 9-12 grade students in both their academic and personal lives along with teaching them the importance of giving back to the community. Roughly 300 students generate as much as \$30,000 each year overall to plug back into the community.

While FWBHS Leader-

mas Connection project. This county wide public service provides more than 85 families and 200 children with a comprehensive Christmas. "We provide full meals up to 14 days including breakfast, lunch and dinner, as well as decorations, gifts valued at \$100 for each child, and when needed, support for the families with lodging, utility bills, and additional

tempting the kindness of shoppers for money donations," says Ryanne, "but it brings in about \$2,000 each year to help these families we've taken under our wings."

Then the fun happens in December. "We begin to meet and get to know the families in our care," says Ryanne. "These families are people just like me and you, and just as deserving of a comprehensive Christmas." Through the "meet-and-greets" with the families, students become acquainted and gain information on the children's toy/ clothes preferences, and the needs of the parents. They then plan how to ensure the family is

lifted of many of their worries by Dec. 25th. Groups of five to six students help one to four families at a time. Overall, the most needed item is food. Over the past two months, Leadership has been collecting bags upon bags of canned goods and will purchase, with the donation dollars, milk, eggs, butter and hams and turkeys for the families' Christ-

mas dinner and the weeks ahead.

Then comes the shop 'till they drop day, where they buy hundreds of dollars' worth of gifts and toys for their assigned family's children. Toys are brought to FWBHS and wrapped by students and assembled and made ready to be delivered on the 20th. This day can last until 1 a.m!

Tears of joy pour from both

the eyes of the giver and of the receiver throughout the experience. These Leadership students truly make an impact on the lives of the children and of the parents. But could it be, that the very lives they're impacting have the reverse effect? "I believe," says Ryanne, "that my life will never be the same."

a charter school—a lofty goal. But momentum grew and during the past couple of years, extensive research, statistics gathering, and the consideration of potential locations and curriculums have been rewarding.

Collaborative Educational Network (CEN), the consultant chosen to write a charter and obtain approvals, will submit the charter application in February 2019. Upon approval by the Okaloosa County School Board, the school can open August 2020! "While the high school's charter application is being written, we are one step closer to accomplishing our goal," says Myra Williams, one of the governing board members and VP of Marketing for Howard Group.

"Timing is always critical, and a school can help to foster more community interaction and bring it together," says Williams. "Further, the time has come, with the growth of Destin and the influx of more families moving into the area, to establish a school of excellence for Destin's parents and students. We've discussed it long enough and now we're hopeful for our children and grandchildren to reap the benefits of what we're establishing now," she says. Governing Board members' desires are that the new Destin High School will become a model for innovation, providing unique educational opportunities for both college-bound and vocationally-minded students living along Florida's Emerald Coast.

"The mission of Destin High School is to prepare students academically, physically and Marine Science, Environmental Science, Cybersecurity, Hospitality and Tourism, and Construction (e.g., Carpentry; Electrical; HVAC; Masonry; Plumbing;



mentally to become responsible, productive, empowered citizens," says Denise Fountain, one of the governing members and Broker Associate with Beachy Beach Destin Real Estate. "Embracing the area's history as a tourist destination, military hub, and 'world's luckiest fishing village,' and supported by strong public/private partnerships, our diverse and specialized programs will provide the foundation each student needs to secure a solid future."

A recent presentation to Destin City Council states that Destin High School will strive to meet the diverse needs of the local community by providing specialized programs and career academies in areas such as $Construction\ Technology).$

Williams said donations and more committee members are needed to help make it all happen still. "Until the school opens and receives money from the state, it must fundraise to cover expenses, as well as seek grants," she says.

Phase 1 Goal: \$85,000 is for consultant fees to write the charter and provide ongoing expertise until the school opens. It will also cover attorney fees for legal documents and the establishment of Destin High School, Inc., as a not-for-profit entity.

Phase 2 Goal: \$500,000 is for facility development, plans, faculty search, operational and startup expenses.

There are ample ways to get involved by serving on one of the committees below:

Facilities - This committee is working to identify a facility, research funding sources, work with the architect and the design build firm to plan the facility.

Fundraising - This committee will cultivate relationships in the community and identify potential sources of funding for the school.

Media/Public Relations

- This committee will develop press releases and forge contacts within the community to spread the word on the school.

Grant Writing - This committee will research, identify and write grants to support the school.

Web Design/Branding

- Initially, this committee will identify companies who can design and maintain the school's website until a Principal is hired. This committee will also establish guidelines for the branding of the school. (colors, etc).

Finance - This committee will work with School Financial Services and review monthly budgets, cash flow statements, grant proceeds, etc.

Other committees include Curriculum, Nominating, Faculty/ Administration, Operations and Logistics committees.

Currently, three undisclosed

limits are being considered. Financial consultants can obtain bonds for the purchase of the property, build the high school, and lease it to the school. Then there would be a future buyout setup once the school is up and running.

The school's first fundraising event will be hosted at the office of Dr. and Mrs. Bawa on Feb. 7, 2019, for Valentine's Day. Details on events, updates on funds raised and serving opportunities are available at Facebook/DestinHighSchool.

Path of Grace: Helping Women Recover Through Faith

In November, close to 100 people gathered to celebrate the grand opening of the most recent Path of Grace facility in Santa Rosa Beach. Founded in 2009, Path of Grace is a women's residential recovery home dedicated to helping those struggling with addiction find "recovery through faith." In the audience were a diverse group from the community including pastors, public officials, representatives from the county jail, current residents and past graduates of the program—all testifying to the effectiveness of the 12 to 24-month program.

"This program was a lifesaver and a life-changer for me," said recent graduate and current house manager Emily Cunningham, who, after graduating from the program, has transitioned into full-time employment with Path of Grace. Emily is now

"house mom," and mentor to the residents. She acts as a guide as well as day-to-day supervisor of the home. "This program has restored my family, my relationship with my daughter, and it gave me a chance for a fresh, new start. Before I came to the program, I didn't know who I was. My identity was wrapped up in all that I had done and the mistakes that I made. Because of Path of Grace, I have found my identity in Christ and that has made all the difference. Now I know how to love and be loved in real relationships," she said.

Andy Watkins, the inmate welfare programs manager for the Walton County Jail, was on hand to lend his support and celebrate the program as well. "I really believe in this program; to see them being able to increase their capacity to be able to touch more people and take



more women in and help make a difference in their lives—it's just fabulous." Every week, Path of Grace women visit the jail to share testimonies and spur conversation about recovery. At the jail, they talk and work with a different group of women, hoping to give them encouragement and hope. "The difference that I see, even them coming in during the week and providing an opportunity for some of these young ladies to open up and to share what they're going through, and the young ladies here being able to relate to them, I think it's great," Watkins said. "They do an awesome job."

Path of Grace operates three residential homes, one in Miramar Beach and two in Santa Rosa Beach With the most recent addition, the program now has space for 35 women. The total cost for the resident is \$800 for the entire 9 to 24-month program. The balance is paid through monetary donations and the operating profit from two Path of Grace thrift stores located on Hwy. 98 in Miramar Beach. "I see every day the difference this program is making in the lives of our residents and families," said managing director Eddie Mansfield. "When you see someone that's broken and

in despair and their lives seem hopeless because of addiction...I love to see them get the help they need through God and then, to see the spark in their eyes and you know it came from God, to watch people change from hopelessness to filled with joy. That's a life worth living."

Tips from the Trainer: How Social is Your Dog?

I realize this is a bit of a loaded question. Some readers might say their dog is fantastic all of the time and never meets a stranger. Others would continue that their dog loves to greet everybody and every dog they meet. In fact, their dog pulls them towards everyone and every dog just to say hello. Still, others might say they keep their dog away from strangers because they show themselves unfriendly - or they might even just jump up on people because of over excitement. Then there is the dog that is often considered unfriendly, because it shows very little excitement for a strange person or dog. It is easy to visualize each scenario. Each of them can paint a picture of some interesting things to us.

Let's start with the over excited dogs that just have to see everyone. That is the equivalent of an unruly child running around grabbing people, making a scene just to be seen. Humans like to believe Rover is just showing himself friendly, but all the

while he is showing himself less than polite, even to dog people. Sniffing all around, kissing, licking can be signs of a dog showing



submission, and for new friends that might be considered a bit unstable. The other dog might find it offensive to have another dog in its bubble, and getting so up close and personal at first meeting.

Now, that dog that jumps all over people isn't being polite at all. It is in the human's bubble and is truly a nuisance. People sometimes excuse this behavior, but nobody really likes muddy paws on their clothes. Imagine having on a nice silk blouse and

a dog's nails ripping it to shreds because he is so friendly he just has to jump all over you. This is a behavior that should be replaced with a sit, in order to properly greet people.

Finally, we have that standoff-

ish dog, showing restraint, even remaining aloof. This is a good dog for many reasons. If it is not interested in other dogs or people it can stay focused on the owner, and what the owner expects from him. I like to see dogs with this level of confidence in the face of other dogs and people. Think in terms of trust. A good relationship starts with good communication. That communication leads to trust. Out of trust is born an ability for you to have influence over your dog and its behavior.

A perfectly social dog does not have to 'socialize' with every person or dog it meets. Being social is about behaving with distractions. When we deal with very young children we ask them to, "Stand here quietly while I talk to Mr. Smith." This is because jumping all over Mr. Smith would be inappropriate. The same applies to Mr. Smith's children. Play time is not all the time. It is very difficult to keep Rover focused if he believes everyone must say hello to him. Socialize your dog with friends, when it is appropriate. Perhaps we should interact with our own dogs more, becoming their primary social network, not leaving it to strangers to influence our dogs.

Protecting Your Most Treasured Possessions

Stephen pulled the leftovers from the refrigerator where his wife Julie had stored them after their meal with her parents a few nights ago. As he sat down at the table, he began leafing through the small pile of mail that had accumulated over the last few days.

Sandwiched between two pieces of junk mail was his homeowners insurance renewal information. As he opened the envelope his mind began to wander. His in-laws had asked him just the other day if Julie's engagement and wedding rings were insured. He said, of course they were! Which made him wonder if they actually were. He had spent a tidy sum on them.

His new Declarations Page was showing he had plenty of contents coverage, so he figured he was good. Just to be on the safe side, though, Stephen made a mental note to contact his agent in the morning and ask. He found out some interesting things about contents coverage and collections.

On most homeowners policies there are what's called 'special limits of liability' for certain items of personal property. For example, the typical limit for loss by theft of jewelry, guns, furs, money, precious and semi-precious stones, is \$1,000. That's not for each piece – that's in total. So, if your home gets broken into,

and the thieves make off with your Rolex and your wife's entire jewelry collection of necklaces and rings and bracelets, you'll get some sad news from the insurance adjuster. A solution for some is a broadened endorsement you can add to your homeowners' policy which increases these limits to \$2,500 or even \$5,000.

However, for customers with larger collections of jewelry, fine art or guns, for example, there is the option of scheduling. Some advantages of scheduling your collection on a separate Personal Articles Floater (PAF), is that you'll have worldwide coverage, coverage for mysterious disappearance, coverage for property in transit, and for some carriers, when it's on display. Another good benefit is that it doesn't deplete the personal property coverage of covered perils on your homeowners policy. Scheduled items with value over a certain

limit, for example, \$5,000, will need either an appraisal or a paid receipt if it's a recent purchase, along with a complete description and photo of each item in the collection, such as each piece of jewelry or art, firearms, stamps, or musical instruments.


A third option is a blanket policy that is just like it sounds. You purchase a set amount, such as \$100,000, that covers every item in a specific collection like jewelry, for example, with usually a limit for any one item at \$10,000. You also have the option of a combination of scheduled and blanket items on the same PAF, depending on the carrier.

Stephen, after discussing the value of Julie's rings with his agent, took out a PAF for not just her rings, but his watch, and several pieces of original artwork. Now he could tell his in-laws that Julie's rings were protected, and it would be a true statement.

The holidays — twinkling lights, fun events, parties with friends, gifts, family gatherings, and yes, a lot of shopping.

Usually, at this time of year, I'm not pleasure shopping, I'm a woman on a mission.

But then, I found out that shopping burns calories; and lots of 'em! Is that possible? Yes, it is, I found out. Actually, everything we do burns calories - breathing, sleeping, standing and all of the active pursuits we enjoy (and some we don't).

That means I can offset a little of my holiday party "tastetesting" and Christmas Day food fests with some heavy-duty shopping — kill two birds with one stone, so to speak. That means I can have a bite of those cute little pecan pie treats, a small handful of puppy chow (a favorite tradition at our house), a little apple cider or a glass of red wine. After all, no one wants to miss out on enjoying the holidays. And, by thinking of this "shopping" thing a little differently, I figure I can shop the calories off and, hopefully, offset any added pounds.

Through research I found out

According to Nutrition ATC a three-hour shopping spree.

steps each time they head out to actively shop, almost three quarters the 10,000 daily number recommended

by the National Health Service (NHS) of England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. Add to that the weight of bags full of bargains and you have a work- out worthy of the gym.

Therefore, I've calculated that my shopping burns approximately 160-165 calories per hour. And, my leg muscles benefit most (from all the walking) and arms also get a good workout from carrying shopping bags.

Here's some perspective for comparison if you're counting calories:. If I shop for three hours, I can burn off approximately 495 calories. If I hit the

shops for six hours, I can burn off some of the "day of" meals. That means I can enjoy some of the following holiday favorites!

8 ounce cup of Eggnog – 340 calories; spiked with 2 ounce rum

1 cup (a few handfuls) Puppy Chow, a homemade holiday treat made with Chex cereals, melted chocolate, butter, peanut butter and powdered sugar.

Pecan Pie (1/8 inch of 9-inch diameter = 456)

Apple Cider (1 cup = 120calories)

Turkey (6 ounce serving = 240calories)

Dressing (1 cup = 400 calo-

ries) Ham (3 ounces = 210 calories)2 by 4 by 1/2-inch slice fruit-

cake = 450 caloriesSweet Potato Casserole (1 cup = 239 calories)

Green Bean Casserole (1 cup = 142 calories

Perhaps this year a little "shop 'til you drop" mentality is in order—not, WHAT shopping I must do, but what shopping can DO for me.

Yum!

I found this recipe for Quick Healthier Holiday Nog and wanted to pass along — Four bananas, 1-1/2 cups skim milk or soymilk, 1-1/2 cups plain nonfat yogurt, 1/4 teaspoon rum extract, and ground nutmeg. Blend all ingredients except nutmeg. Puree until smooth. Top with nutmeg.

Shopping Off the Calories

a 150-pound person can burn roughly 100 calories in 38 minutes of shopping, or approximately 160 per hour, according to sparkspeople.com! Though the amount of calories you burn while shopping depends on your body weight, the average person can burn almost 400 calories and cover almost three miles on a shopping trip in 2.5 hours of browsing in stores, according to a study commissioned by Debenhams, a British multinational retailer. That's the equivalent of a piece of carrot cake or two large glasses of red wine! Just two hours could work off the 283 calories in a typical latte coffee, based on an average body weight of 175 pounds, walking at an average speed of 3 mph.

(nutritionatc.hawaii.edu), an easygoing shopper can accrue about three miles of walking during a three-hour period. Add standing and looking at merchandise or standing in line to make purchases to the equation, and it can add up to roughly 400 calories for a 100-pound person, 750 calories for a 200-pound person, and 1,100 calories for a 300-pound person. And those stats are conservative. A more aggressive shopper might be able to walk as many as five miles in And if he or she is doing a lot of fidgeting, reaching for merchandise, and waving at friends, a 100pound person on average can burn 500 calories and a 200- to 300pound shopper up to 1,000 calories or more. Women take an average 7,305

 $\mathbf{Q}_{f z}$ I am turning 65 in February. Do I have to enroll in Medicare? I have no plans to retire right now. - James T

A. If your employer has less than 20 employees, you should sign up for Parts A and B upon eligibility as Medicare will become the primary payer for your health coverage.

However, if your employer has more than 20 employees, you should contact your benefits manager to see if you have group health plan coverage that would enable you to keep your current coverage and delay signing up for Part B. If your coverage is a high deductible health plan and you have a Health Savings Account, you will no longer be allowed to make contributions to your HSA if you enroll in any part of Medicare.

Please note that there could be lifetime penalty payments due if you do not sign up during your initial eligibility period. Feel free to reach out to us for a personal consultation. We will analyze your specific circumstance and help simplify the Medicare maze.

It is the manager. He is accompanied by a young black boy. They are jogging after the couple.

"This kid wants to thank you," the manager explains.

"Thank me?"

Then boy starts to cry. "My mama sent me to the store for bread and milk, and I lost the money she give me.

"I thought we was gonna hafta skip dinner again, and I was gonna be in trouble. I looked everywhere for that five bucks."

The boy wipes his eyes with his sleeve, then shoots his hand outward. "Thank you, sir," the boy tells the man. "And merry Christmas."

They embrace. They part ways. The couple leaves the supermarket. Before they crawl into their car, the man looks into the night sky.

He could've kept that money. But he didn't. He wonders why this is. What made him do it?

Maybe there is something up there in that sky. Something big, just beyond the stars. Maybe it's in the trees, the ground, the air, and on aisle twelve.

Maybe it's in everything. Inside young couples, little boys, grumpy clerks in Santa hats, and store managers. Perhaps it's bigger than the Milky Way, but so small you might miss it.



Market Update: A Look into Recent Volatility

Many investors have experienced significant ups and downs lately and are trying to understand what is going on and how to make or adjust their strategies accordingly. Many just want to know, why the increase in volatility? There are several aggravating factors and some mitigating factors to look at and we will explore those here.

Start with interest rates. The Federal Reserve began raising rates last year and the federal funds (or overnight rate) is now approximately 2-2.25%. Concurrent with that is the rise of the benchmark 10-year Treasury note yield which is now over 3%. Investors could be shifting assets from stocks to bonds or to other more conservative investments. The Federal Reserve has also reduced the size of its balance sheet by approximately 8%, which takes money out of the system. Hence there are fewer dollars out there and possibly fewer dollars to go in to risk based assets like stocks (and commodities and real estate). Some of the impact of these is a continued or even stronger U.S. dollar. A stronger dollar makes U.S. exports more expensive and could hinder profits, or earnings.

Wages have started to move up for the first time in almost a decade as well as some upward movement in the overall inflation rate. Many people consider that the economy continues its expansion at a healthy rate and see that unemployment is at a 50-year low at 3.7%. It is also important to consider that firms that are hiring might be seeing an increase in competition for labor. Hence, cost of labor and cost of materials (and the effects of tariffs remain to be seen) are higher

and these could lead to lower productivity and lower profits over time. To be clear, a majority of companies reported strong earnings for the third quarter, however many consider the stock market to be a forward looking indicator and current volatility is evidence of that.

Are stock valuations high (selling at higher multiples than they have over time) or ahead of historical performance? Depending upon the time frame you are looking at (using March 2009 to present as an example) investors might have reached that conclusion. There are a variety of research tools available on line or from your advisor that can give investors these types of figures. On the other hand, looking at performance over time (as many see time in the market as more important than timing the market) is a guide that investors can use. According to the Stocks, Bonds, Bills and Inflation Yearbook, by Roger G Ibbotson and Rex Singuefield, from 1926 to 2017, returns have been as follows: Small stocks 12.1%, large stocks 10.1%, government bonds 5.5%, Treasury bills 3.4% and inflation, 2.9%. Source: Morningstar and Raymond James. These returns have never been linear however which is why investors should assess and plan accordingly.

The Ships Chandler: Focus on the Fisherman

As the oldest fishing tackle shop in Destin, The Ships Chandler goes hand in hand with Destin's fishing history. Like most in our area, the Wright family relocated to Destin in 1970 on a military assignment to Eglin Airforce Base. Destin was a small fishing village during this time, and after graduating from high school in 1976, Peter Wright decided fishing was his future. He took the time to travel around, from the Keys to the Virgin Islands, Bahamas to the Caribbean, where his fishing knowledge grew. In 1979, he returned to Destin and instead of fishing to make a living, he and his father opened The Ships Chandler.

Originally established as a tackle shop only, The Ships Chandler geared towards the commercial fisherman specifically. The name, The Ships Chandler, made sense since a ship's chandler in the old days





was a person who provided supplies, provisions, cargo and crew to the boats.

At the time, there was only one other tackle shop in town that subsequently closed; thus The Ships Chandler is the oldest fishing tackle shop in Destin. It has occupied four different locations, and occupied the most recent one on the southside of Hwy. 98 in Destin in 1992. This was

when they first built docks out back; however, Hurricane Opal in 1995 had different plans and wiped those clean away. They rebuilt a second set of docks that were larger and could house a variety of boats.

When asked what it was like back then, Peter Wright Jr. shared one story that came to mind. "{My grandparents, Bill and Mary Wright,} were the seventh house built on Holiday Isle, a two story house," Wright said. "My grandmother could sit on the top deck of their two-story home and watch my grandfather go by boat from the back and through the Harbor, out of the pass, and into the Gulf. With hardly any houses built, she could watch him the entire way." Almost unheard of these days!

They added their first fishing charter boat in 1990, and by 1999 had expanded their shop into the boat sales and maintenance arena as well. The Ships Chandler has had a goal in mind since day one: to help fishermen become better in their craft, instead of just selling them anything and everything. Peter Wright gained a wealth of knowledge during his travels after high school, and he had a vision of shar-

ing that with our local fishing industry here.

For that reason, they carried a lot of custom and specialty tackle in the beginning, and now their little shop has expanded into anything boat and fishing related, from coolers to sunglasses, and more. In addition, they also sup-

ply performance fishing boats and outboard motors and the services to the support them: service and maintenance, customizations, fishing tackle, and boat



Volunteers Finish 1,400-foot Reef at Post'l Point

The Eglin Natural Resources Branch, known as Jackson Guard, won Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance's (CBA) first ever reef-building competition at Eglin AFB's Post'l Point recreation area by building 175 linear feet of reef in four hours. The reef breakwater stretches 1,400 linear feet in all, made of over 140 tons of limestone rock pieces. Jackson Guard won the grand prize: a brewery tour at Grayton Beer Company.

In all, six teams from throughout Eglin and

Hurlburt competed to see who could build the fastest reef sections, including staff from Corvias, the Rapid Engineer Heavy Operational Repair Squadron Engineers, the Hurlburt Honor Guard, Jackson Guard, the Bioenvironmental Engineering Flight, 73rd Special Operations Squadron, the 11th Special Operations Intelligence Squadron, and the 1st Special Operations Aircraft Maintenance Squadron. Corvias donated the most volunteer hours to build 18 reef



sections (450 linear feet), in addition to an \$8,000 grant to fund the reef project as part of their Giving Back program.

"Our Giving Back projects are part of who we are and what we do here at Corvias," explains Katie Fuentes, Construction Service Administrator at Corvias, "This year's partnership with CBA was a great experience allowing our whole team to participate for a memorable team building project. We're thankful to have organizations in Northwest Florida like CBA who are dedicated to the health of our

waterways.'

"Reef breakwaters and living shorelines protect cultural and natural resources on Eglin Air Force Base," explains Alison McDowell, Director of the Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance, "In addition to reducing erosion, the breakwaters provide habitat for fish, oysters, and other native species."

"We could not have finished this project in two months without the help from Eglin's Outdoor Recreation's staff at the Post'l Point Marina," Rachel Gwin, CBA Restoration Coordi-

"They offered the use of their boat and an ATV so we could move the limestone material from the staging area to the reef itself. Huge thank you to them!" She continues: "It was a monumental task to move that much material by hand to finish the reefs in two short months, but the volunteers were amazing to work with and made this project one of my favorites to complete."

CBA is a non-profit organization striving to enhance swimmable, fishable waterways through monitoring, education, restoration, and research. For over 20 years, the Alliance has promoted water stewardship within the Choctawhatchee watershed, growing the network of supporters who join in CBA's mission to provide a future for these precious, natural resources.

The Boys & Girls Club of the Emerald Coast came in second place with their groovy tree that celebrates 50 years of peace and love. Established in 1968, the Boys & Girls Club of the Emerald Coast strives to enable all young people to reach their full potential as productive, caring, and responsible citizens. Currently, the organization serves over 3,000 kids in eight clubs across Escambia, Okaloosa, and Walton counties.

Located in Defuniak Springs, H.E.A.R.T Animal Rescue took home not only third place, but also the People's Choice Award



for the third consecutive year. H.E.A.R.T Animal Rescue exists to care for homeless pets in our communities through adoption services, community awareness, and fostering and caring for animals. In addition to their

work, they also believe in philanthropy and continuously give back to other organizations throughout the community.

Rounding out this year's circle of winners is The Sonder Project who came in fourth place. The Sonder Project was founded through a

partnership with three Walton County based businesses, 360 Blue, YOLO Board, and The 30A Company, who all shared a desire to strengthen communities across the world through food security, clean water, and education. Currently, The Sonder Project is working diligently to help those affected by Hurricane Michael as depicted in their display in the Festival of Trees.

Other organizations featured in this year's Festival of Trees include Fisher House of the Emerald Coast, Children in Crisis, Shelter House, Emerald Coast Theatre Company, The ARC of Walton County, Emerald Coast Children's Advocacy Center, The ARC of the Emerald Coast, and Emerald Coast Hospice.

American Foundation for Suicide Prevention is Bringing Change to our Community

Local Nonprofit Working to Support Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Efforts along Emerald Coast

Suicide is the tenth leading cause of death in the United States, yet suicide is preventable. The American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP) leads the fight against suicide. They are dedicated to saving lives and bringing hope to those affected by suicide. There are chapters in all 50 states, with six just in the state of Florida, including the Florida Panhandle Chapter.

"My sister and I started the Emerald Coast Walk five years ago and since then, we've built a thriving local chapter of AFSP working from Pensacola to Tallahassee, raised nearly \$300,000 to support local initiatives and training to support suicide prevention efforts, and we are keeping the conversation going around suicide and loss," says Donna Williamson, Chapter Chair.

In the past five years, this volunteer-based organization has held fundraising events across the Panhandle, provided Mental Health First Aid training to the community, worked with local law enforcement to provide mental health education and training, advocated at the state and national level for policies that reduce suicide rates and improve mental health services, along with offering a beacon of hope to those who have experienced the loss of a loved one, or struggled themselves.

"Our events provide a safe space for those who have lost someone to suicide to come together and not feel so alone. We are working to break the stigma surrounding suicide and mental health issues because the more we talk about it, the more we can do to stop it," adds Williamson.

Everyone has a role to play in preventing suicide, and AFSP wants to help locals learn the suicide risks and warning signs, and encourage those who struggle to seek help.

"Suicide has touched so many lives that I can't think of a time someone didn't have a story or experience to share when I talk to them about our work," says Jessica Roberts, Board Member. "I lost a friend five years ago to suicide and AFSP helped me grieve and find a way to help others. I've grown up with a family





member who struggles as well.





Recipes Sure to Please this Holiday Season

My father has made sausage balls for Christmas morning as long as I can remember. I often wonder why he did not get recipe credit for this amazing comfort food as he has been making them for 40 + years! Sausage balls are wonderful for tailgating and a delicious cocktail appetizer, but most of all as a breakfast snack on Christmas morning. We like to serve Strata as well (recipe in search on 30AEats.com), but I usually stuff myself silly on the sausage balls and have no room left! The ingredients are simple and the prep and cleanup are easy. If selecting sage sausage, then add about 1/4 tsp of cayenne pepper. I prefer to grate my own cheese rather than buying pre-shredded, as I do not like the caking ingredients used in packaging. I also prefer not to use low-fat cheddar as it does not melt well and the sausage balls will be dry. This recipe has been handed down through the generations and creates great memories. You will be surprised at how quickly they disappear!

Poppy's Sausage Balls

- 1 pound ground hot sausage, add sage spice
- 3 cups cheddar cheese, shredded
- 2 cups Bisquick baking mix
- 3 tablespoons water



Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

Preparation: In a large bowl, combine sausage, cheese, and baking mix using hands to mix well.

Gradually add water until it gets to the consistency where you can roll into 1 inch balls.

Roll into balls about 1 1/4 inches in size and place on an ungreased baking sheet.

Bake 10-12 minutes, Remove and cool on rack or parchment paper. Quickly move to sealed container or ziplock storage bags. These keep for up to 2 weeks in the refrigerator and freeze very well.

Festive Champagne Mojitos

This cocktail is the perfect way to celebrate dinner with family and friends and toast the holiday season.

1/2-cup sugar 1/2-cup water

1 1/2 cups packed mint leaves, plus 12 mint sprigs, for garnish

6 limes cut into wedges 2 cups light rum Cracked ice

3 cups Champagne or sparkling wine

In a small saucepan, combine the sugar and water and cook over high heat just until the sugar has dissolved. Let cool to room temperature.

In a large pitcher, combine the sugar syrup with the mint leaves and lime wedges and muddle well with a wooden spoon. Add the rum and stir well. Strain the drink into another pitcher.

Fill tall glasses with cracked ice and pour in the drink, filling them about two-thirds full. Top with Champagne, garnish with the mint sprigs and serve.

Note: The mojitos can be prepared through Step 2. Refrigerate the mojitos in the pitcher overnight.



You can choose from over 10,000 original copyrighted designs ranging from animals, landscapes, abstracts, characters, cityscapes, florals, etc. Traditionally, you would paint on a bare 16" x 20" canvas, but the studio offers other canvas sizes and surface types. Barbara and David say though they love what they do, there is also a broader purpose through the company's Painting with a Purpose program. In keeping with the founders' fundraising roots, Barbara and David plug themselves into the local community by donating a percentage of proceeds from Painting with a Purpose events to charities; more than \$2 million has already been given. "The philanthropic efforts and the opportunity to make art feel accessible are the most exciting aspects of running the business," says Barbara.


