The Luckiest: Fishing for Destin History

Waves gently crashing, a pair of twin diesel engines roaring and a salty mist in the air — this is where I fell in love with deep sea fishing. Only a handful of miles from the sandy white shores of Destin, a place I've called home for nearly two decades, I just recently discovered why this piece of paradise even exists — or at least got its start.

Aboard the largest private charter fishing boat in the region, I set out with a camera man and a videographer in tow, to document a day in the life of Relentless Captain Brant Kelly, a descendant of one of the founding families of our beachside village. My team was prepped and already had an idea on what to expect.

Well, at least that is what we thought...

While we loaded our gear aboard this massive fishing vessel, I spent time interviewing a few of the dockside 'fishheads' – a term of endearment for those who make their love of the sea and its abundant catch their live-



lihoods. Clearly not a job for the faint of heart, the physical demand and mental conditioning required to succeed in this career field is not found in all. Although I understand that their chosen craft affords a unique lifestyle of adventure and Destin is known worldwide as "The World's Luckiest Fishing Village", I didn't fully grasp the importance of fishing and why this intimate region was so acclaimed.

After a few routine checks and a couple of stops in the harbor to retrieve bait from preset traps, the Relentless veered south as we left the home of the largest fleet of fishing vessels in Florida and set out for our adventure in the Gulf of Mexico. The first piece of prominence I

encountered underscoring Destin's notorious slogan was a little geography lesson provided by a friendly local mate. He explained that Destin is home to a 100-fathom curve located in close proximity to our shores (clearly viewable on Google EarthTM) just southwest of Destin. He also went into great detail as to why that is important. In other charter sport fishing destinations, reaching deep waters that host the big fish can take up to a day.

We arrived at the critical deep water fishing coordinates shortly after the mate concluded his lesson. The tackle was dispatched, and we cast our first lines. It didn't take long, the angler next to me saw his line go tight. He reeled quickly and pulled in our first catch. Keep in mind this was my first experience with private charter fishing. I had been on a party boat many years ago, but this was my initial interaction with what I personally now believe as the only way to fish. I was

Meet Laurie Hood:

A Visionary Extraordinaire and Hometown Hero

Local Laurie Hood, founder of Alaqua Animal Refuge, is the epitome of an extraordinary animal advocate and an exceptional leader in the animal welfare community. She is a visionary and change maker who has brought more awareness to the plight of abused, neglected and homeless animals in Northwest Florida than any other individual or organization.

A passionate animal lover since she was a child, Laurie founded Alaqua in 2007 upon discovering that countless animals were being euthanized in five nearby counties, including her own, due to the lack of a no-kill shelter or adoption organization in the area. Laurie never intended to start an animal rescue. However, this situation was not acceptable for any animal. It certainly wasn't acceptable for Laurie, and Alaqua Animal Refuge was established practically overnight.

Initially providing shelter to 38

animals, Alaqua has helped find homes and provided sanctuary for tens of thousands of animals, and has grown to become the Southeast's premier no-kill 501(c)3 refuge and sanctuary, as well as a recognized leader in animal welfare and cruelty prevention in our region, the state and around the U.S. The shelter has expanded into a refuge that provides respite for over 350 animals at any given time. Since its founding year, Alaqua staff and volunteers have helped find homes for more than 15,000 animals, with up to 100 adoptions completed each month.

With Laurie at the helm, Alaqua is currently undertaking a bold endeavor to build a one-of-kind facility and sanctuary on 100 acres of donated land in Walton County. The new Alaqua home will be the first of its kind in the U.S., will be a model for animal sanctuaries



around the world and a destination for animal welfare advocates as a place that will inspire, educate and empower others to make change.

Alaqua's new location will increase their sheer land space tenfold where they will have the ability to serve more animals, conduct safe educational tours, host larger community educational programs, and provide an educational and training center where people from all over the country, and world, can come to visit and learn.

During the practice of healing thousands of abandoned and abused animals, Laurie realized that people could also be helped through the powerful effects that interactions with animals have on the human spirit and body. The new sanctuary will allow Alaqua to continue the important work that is done

now, expand their scope of animal welfare services and programs, and be an inspiration for creating a kinder, more empathetic, and healthier society by healing animals and people. Keeping in alignment with its overall vision, Alaqua will continue its commitment to these focus areas: Rescue, Rehabilitation, Adoption, Education and Training.

Driven by faith and perse-

verance, Laurie sees a living soul in every animal and feels compelled to be its voice. Her boundless enthusiasm, loving heart, and extraordinary courage keep Alaqua's staff, volunteers, and board of directors moving forward in support of Alaqua's mission—ensuring that every abused, neglected and homeless animal deserves a second chance—at life, hope, happiness, and most of all, love.

"Laurie makes extraordinary things happen for animals," said Wayne Pacelle, former CEO of the Humane Society of the United States and New York Times Best Selling Author. "She's a turnaround artist, taking animals from the darkest of places to the promise of peacefulness."

The work of Alaqua couldn't be done without Laurie leading the way. From rescue to intake to rehabilitation, and everything in between, she is there for it all. She is truly the heart and soul of the organization and it has become her life's work.

Alaqua is located in Walton County, but serves surrounding counties including Okaloosa, Bay, Holmes, Washington, Franklin and Santa Rosa. Also serving the greater Southeastern U.S. when there's a need, Alaqua has rescued animals from Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, and across the country. Alaqua the leader in our area in the coordination of animal relief efforts in the Panhandle, and works with national organizations to help provide assistance when necessary. Across the country, investigating car burglaries takes up a huge amount of law enforcement time and resources. Okaloosa County is no different.

In the first six months of this year, the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office (OCSO) received 333 reports of car burglaries. 307 of those vehicles were unlocked. Yes - the vast majority of breakins are the result of someone simply opening a door and rifling through the inside of the vehicle to see what can be found! Sometimes they find nothing – other times they score wallets, credit cards, cash, electronics and even loaded firearms.


During the 333 car burglaries reported to the OCSO from January through June, 42 guns were taken. When these guns end up in the wrong hands, it's potentially a major public safety threat.

Car burglaries are usually crimes of opportunity. They can involve a group of teens roaming a neighborhood to simply see what they can find – or an organized group from out of state targeting specific areas of interest in ongoing crime sprees. Stolen weapons typically end up on the streets, being used to commit more crimes, or being sold to gain cash for narcotics.

Other spin-off crimes from car burglaries involve identity theft and fraud. If your wallet or purse is taken along with your identification and credit cards or checks, chances are good the thieves are going to try to quickly take advantage of any opportunity to cash in on their find using your easily obtained name and financial information. Dealing with that aftermath can be a huge, stressful hassle.

We always advise everyone to lock your doors, take your keys and take or hide your valuables. Certainly, make sure any firearm is secure!

We emphasize taking or hiding your valuables, because even when someone does lock his or her car door, we do have the less frequent rash of what are called "Smash and Grab" car burglaries. The thieves will smash a window to get inside, typically because they can see an item



in plain view that they want – whether a laptop, a handbag or anything else of value.

On Aug. 19 of this year, five individuals committed a rash of smash and grab car burglaries from Destin and its adjacent unincorporated areas across Fort Walton Beach. Breaking into approximately 60 vehicles, they obtained more than \$700 in cash and netted five firearms. During the course of the investigation, the OCSO received vital information that led to the development of a possible suspect vehicle. An address for the registered owner of that vehicle came back to a location in Navarre in Santa Rosa County. The Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office found the suspect vehicle at that address. Deputies and officers from that agency, the OCSO and the Ft. Walton

Beach Police Department responded, ultimately taking all five individuals into custody on felony charges connected to the crime spree.

Citizen assistance, law enforcement cooperation, and law enforcement persistence can have a massive, positive impact on crime in a community. One of the best things about living in Okaloosa County and Northwest Florida is we have that level of cooperative commitment to a crime-fighting partnership.

We appreciate all our citizens and visitors alike do to stay vigilant and report suspicious activity. It is a crucial part of maintaining our quality of life.

Please remember to lock your doors to your home and vehicles, don't leave your keys in your car, and take or hide your valuables from inside your vehi-



cle as well. Those simple steps: Lock, Take, & Hide can leave thieves empty-handed, preventing you from becoming a victim.

Hurricane Preparedness: What we learned from Bay County PIO's Due to Hurricane Michael

Hurricane Season is once again upon us. As we work diligently to inform the citizens we serve on hurricane preparedness the question you need to ask is "Are we communicating the same message that our local strategic partners are communicating before, during and after a storm?" All too often we get caught up with the internal pre-hurricane check lists, such as employee rosters, staff response post storm, etc. Although that is extremely important, how well are we communicating with our counterparts?









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In a recent meeting with the Sheriff's Office, Fire Department and County Emergency Management personnel, we discussed the "strategic plan" in the event a hurricane is headed in our direction. An important part of the discussion was how to provide the citizens and visitors we serve the most accurate, timely and consistent information amongst all the strategic partners.

As a public information officer (PIO), I am mainly responsible for creating and disseminating communication in a timely manner between our organization, the public and the news media. Prior to a hurricane having the potential to impact your area, have you been in communication with your fellow PIO's? Is there a new PIO that you have not met? Do you know what their organization's messaging will be before, during and after a hurricane? How will you contact them if the power is out and all lines of communication are down and you need to share information? Have you developed other ways to communicate such as a private Facebook group? Can you share the same technology to streamline information on a consistent basis from the lead agency in charge?

In June, my fellow Okaloosa County PIO's from public safety, county and municipal governments, met with our counterparts from Bay County to discuss – Hurricane Michael. Learning from their valuable

experiences, what I personally took away was the following:

Prior to a hurricane, inform citizens precisely where they need to go to obtain official statements, storm updates, and other critical information. Strategic partners should pre-designate and format information releases to facilitate consistency among the partners. Community leaders should strive for consistency so that varied entities are speaking with "one voice." This helps ensure the public receives the same information from its various elected officials and governments.

Have contingency plans in place for catastrophic utility service failures, such as internet, cellular phone and land line phone "service failures." Be creative, such as private and public radio stations, HAM radio operators, and even banner planes flying with emergency information

Monitor and maintain social media channels continuously and establish a citizen hotline. Depending on the level of utility service failures, you may want to turn off social media platform instant messaging connected to the internet. This may help prevent curious overseas people from contacting you that have no critical need of information. If not monitored 24/7, some may consider this a means of communication and reporting for an emergency that goes unnoticed or unread for a period of time.

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CBA Utilizes Gulf Power's AMPLIFY Grant to Improve Shoreline Resilience

In a one-time, capacity building grant process, Gulf Power donated nearly \$1 million to community organizations across the Florida Panhandle. As recipients of a \$35,000 grant, the Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance (CBA) utilized the funds to build living shorelines across homeowner sites in the Choctawhatchee Bay.

Living shorelines are a form of green infrastructure, using reef breakwaters in the shallows to increase oyster habitat while reducing the wave energy hitting the shore. Just behind the breakwaters, newly planted smooth cordgrass and other vegetation holds the sediment in place, allowing the shore to build back out again. Unlike rip rap and seawalls, the living shorelines create new homes for a range of native critters, including fish, crustaceans, and birds.

"What happens along the shoreline affects water quality here in the bay," explains Alison McDowell, Director of CBA, "Erosion from public and private land leads to loss of wildlife habitat and increased sediment in our waterways."

"The key to our AMPLIFY grants model is that they help the organization maximize its operations and make improvements," said Jennifer McFarren in Gulf Power News, deputy manager for the Gulf Power Foundation. "Where some grants may pay for new technology or strategic planning, the AMPLIFY grants are geared toward improving the organization so that it can be more effective and efficient in its efforts."

CBA permitted the living shorelines, then teamed up with

volunteers and the AmeriCorps NWF Environmental Stewards to build the limestone rock breakwaters and plant smooth cordgrass. The limestone breakwaters are constructed in short half-moon shapes with five feet of water between each structure, allowing continuous flow between the shoreline and the Choctawhatchee Bay. "We can usually see a difference right away," says McDowell, "The sand begins to accumulate and the grasses we plant take root."

CBA has been building living shorelines for nearly 10 years, and homeowner sites across the Choctawhatchee Bay have successfully fended off storm surges and hurricane-wave conditions. While a living shoreline is not right in every location, CBA hopes the initial successes will inspire more homeowners to choose green infrastructure options.

With the \$35,000 Gulf Power grant, CBA has built 600 linear feet of living shoreline at three different sites, with a goal of reaching 1000 linear feet at five locations. In the future, they hope to receive additional grants to continue their work at more locations around the watershed.





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"Don't Put That Down the Drain!"

Have you ever heard those words before? Maybe you heard it at a relative's house that was on a septic tank or they had old plumbing; possibly you heard it while traveling to another country; or you may have seen it on a

sign in a public restroom. There is good reason for the warning because not all waste should be thrown down the drain.

In recent years, Destin Water Users has talked about FOG, Fats Oils and Grease, and how pouring that down the drain



can contribute to sewer backups. When FOG is washed down the sink, it cools and sticks to the inside lining of sewer pipes. The accumulation of this grease can cause clogs in the sewer pipes, which may lead to Sanitary Sewer Overflows (SSOs). We've seen FOG accumulate on equipment

We urge you to put your sewer lines on a fat-free diet and be careful when disposing of fats, oils, and grease (FOG) after cooking by never pouring FOG down the sink or toilet. To keep FOG out of sewers, scrape all food scraps from pots, pans, cooking utensils and dishes into the trash before washing or rinsing the dishes and we reinforced this message with posts to our

in our lift stations and it has

caused upsets at the plant, dis-

rupting the treatment process.

We want to reinforce this message because we are still seeing lots of FOG in our system. This is disconcerting because, we have implemented a grease trap inspection program for commercial food establishments and as they are complying, we are seeing concentrations of FOG

coming from our single-family and multi-family residential areas; therefore, we need your help to eliminate our FOG problem.

Dairy products contain milk fat that is considered FOG. Salad dressings usually contain some oil content. What do you do with the greasy liquid left over after broiling a chicken breast, pork chop, fish or steak? These items along with many prepared foods contain FOG that can contribute to a grease backup in the sewer line.

Other things that should never be put down the drain are non-dispersible or non-flushable items such as feminine hygiene products, personal hygiene wipes, single-use floor mop pads, dental floss, single use toilet cleaning pads, protective undergarments, anti-bacterial surface cleaning wipes, paper towels and other similar products.

They don't break down when they are flushed down the drain. Unlike toilet paper which is designed to breakdown and disperse in the waste stream, these items are not readily degradable. To make it even more

confusing, many of these items are labeled as flushable because they pass through the domestic toilet and drainage-line system and they can be transported by the wastewater conveying system; however, they are not truly compatible with the wastewater treatment system.

What happens with these fibrous products is they get twisted and torn into long, knotted ropelike systems that look like rags or your traditional rope mop. These rags get caught on the impellors of pumps in our lift stations and at the plant decreasing the efficiency of the operation of the pumps. Typically, the rags gradually build up on the impellors of a pump until the pump stops working. The majority of all pump failures in our system is directly caused by non-dispersible and non-flushable items.

Now this problem is not unique to DWU; it is universally experienced wherever these products are sold. The wastewater industry in trying to work with manufacturers of these products to address this problem,

Q. I got a letter that states that I am being automatically enrolled into a prescription drug plan by Medicare. I don't want to lose my retirement health plan, what should I do?

- Cindy

A. Very good question. The letter you received means that you have qualified for Low Income Subsidy (LIS). Once you qualify for LIS, Medicare will automatically assign you to a prescription drug plan. In most cases, qualification for LIS means that you will not have to pay a premium for your drug plan and most of the copays will be paid. This should not affect your health plan, as the drug plan only covers your prescriptions. However, it is always best to visit with your retirement plan administrator to verify. The most important thing for you to do right now is to check the plan formulary to ensure that all of your prescriptions are covered. When you are automatically enrolled, this step isn't always done thoroughly by Medicare. If the prescriptions you are taking are not on the plan formulary, then they will not be covered by the plan. This means that you would have to pay for them yourself, out-of-pocket. Feel free to reach out to us for a personal consultation. 

Because You're Worth It

If you are like most people when your electric bill arrives every month, you place it in the "to pay" folder and open it later. When we do get around to opening the electric bill, we look at the amount owed; some sigh, some grunt, some grin, mainly in November and we get out our checkbooks or log into our accounts and pay the amount without fail. Don't get me wrong, I love having electricity. I'm currently writing this article in a very comfortable air-conditioned office while it is 92° with a "feels like" 101° outside. I gladly pay the electric company and am thankful for all the hardworking employees who keep me in comfort.

There are ways to lower our electric bills. We can turn our thermostats to 85°, we can draw the blinds preventing natural sun light to illuminate our homes, we can use the fire drill exercise by running out the front door and closing it quickly behind us so our bought air does not escape or we can take measure to become more energy efficient. It's not rocket science, its building science. A well-insulated and properly sealed home, uses less energy while maintaining the same comfort.

So, how do we make our homes more energy efficient? Outlets and switches on exterior walls can waste 1% of energy. Adding insulating cover plates can reduce the amount of conditioned air leaking into the outside. 12% of energy loss occurs from drafts around doors and fireplaces. Seals around doors can and will fail over time and should be checked and replace as needed. Thermal imaging can detect these leaks or simply look for daylight or use a flashlight at night; if you see light, adjust or replace the seals. Windows can

contribute 14% of energy loss. Replacing windows can be expensive. If there are cracks or fog like film between the panes on windows, these will most likely need to be replaced. If the window is clear, but you feel heat when the sun shines through or have single pane, there are spectrally select films which can be applied to the window which dramatically increase efficiency, almost eliminating UV destruction at a fraction of the cost of replacement windows. An area which we focus on for energy loss is the attic. 33% of energy loss occurs through our attics and roofs. Recently, Florida has required new construction homes built by 2017 and newer to undergo a blower door test. A blower door is a powerful fan that mounts into the frame of an exterior door. The fan pulls air out of the house, lowering the air pressure inside. The higher outside air pressure then flows in through all unsealed cracks and openings. This test determines the air infiltration rate of

a building. Prior to 2017, these tests were not required and rarely used. The importance is that now builders seal electrical and plumbing penetrations with a fire block expandable foam making your home more energy efficient. Prior to the requirement of blower door testing, many builders did not seal these penetrations allowing for energy loss. Sealing these penetrations increases comfort, increases air quality and saves energy. Attic insulation is also extremely important. If your home is 15 years or older and has no added insulation in your attic, you most likely have 61% less insulation than what is required today for new construction. If you see joists and wood beams where the insulation should be, adding insulation will increase your comfort and increase energy efficiency saving you money.

There are many ways to increase comfort while lowering

but we need some help from you our customers. Therefore, we ask that you: Don't put that down the drain!

Helpful Hints for FOG:


- Never pour FOG down the drain, sink or garbage disposal.
- Pour FOG into jars, cans, and plastic tubs. Let contents cool and solidify. When the container is full, throw it away with your trash.
- Mix cooking oil with an absorbent material such as cat litter or coffee grounds, place in a container (lid securely fastened) for disposal with your trash.
- For greasy pans, pour off the grease into a container, and use a paper towel to wipe out the remaining

grease in the pan prior to washing.

• Store the container in the freezer, which will keep the grease solid, and pull it out whenever you have fats, oils and grease to dispose of. When it gets full, dump the whole container into the trash.



I grew up in Nuw Churssee (that's New Jersey for the uninitiated). For those who've never visited, it's a unique place. And if you don't know New Jersey, you probably won't get New Jersey. But that's the point - if you're not from somewhere, you can never really know what it's like to live there. That's why you have to ask the locals when you travel where to get the best food, the out-of-the-way places to go that only they know about, and what the communities are like if you're looking to move - I mean there's only so much the internet and a travel agent can do!

Filing an insurance claim is very similar. In order to get what you're looking for (your damaged property repaired or replaced), you need to know what the locals know. And by locals, I mean it's the people who deal with and repair properties on a day-to-day basis, day in, day out, week after week, year after year.

Every claim is different, and every loss is not the same, although they might share a lot of things in common. In the U.S., there are seven different climate zones, with those zones broken down into smaller sub sections creating an array of varying climate conditions which are then governed by local building ordinances describing to builders what types of materials they can use, how a property is to be built,

etc. So, when you take all these factors: climate, materials used, and type of damage and then stick them in blender, do the hockey pokey and shake it all about, you can get very different results when loss occurs.

Humans have always been on the lookout for how to live in a world with climatic struggles to deal with no matter where we've lived. You wanna live in Iceland? Guess what - the Iceberg "Okjökull" just became "extinct." You wanna live in the Philippines? You have to deal with monsoons. Japan maybe? Typhoons. Turkey? Earthquakes. Florida? Hurricanes, tornados and sink holes...oh my!

And because climate plays such a huge role in evaluating the risk of property exposure and claim payouts (damage to a property in Texas is not the same as damage to a property in Florida or in New Jersey). If you were to evaluate the effects of a storm damage to properties spread across the country, you'll find the climate of the region directly impacts how much is needed to pay out valid claims, because payments made to repair damage need to reflect what it actually costs to repair the property in the region it was built. For example, homes built on the California coastline are not the same as homes built on the coastline of Florida. In fact, homes in Florida have some of the most stringent building codes in the nation due to the severity of climatic events. And because building codes and ordinances vary region to region (even in Florida), the structures will be comprised of many materials, some the same or similar, and others totally unique to the environment. And those differclaim settlements.

Imagine yourself living in your home being slammed by a Category 5 hurricane. As it tears through your house leaving you in the wake of disaster, your insurance company sends out field adjusters from all over the country to handle the in-

ences make a huge difference in fair crease of claims as quickly as they can. Your field adjuster shows up, tells you they're handling over 100 claims and will head back to Iowa, Texas or wherever they are from after all the dust settles.

> Now, take a moment and ask yourself: How is a person from Iowa, Texas or somewhere else

going to write a loss accurately for 100 claims if they don't know the proper way to repair the materials used in the local construction area? And more importantly, how are you to expect anything different from the insurance company if you don't know the rules of construction either?





Bloody Mary Gazpacho

Note: This recipe can be easily doubled or tripled as needed. Serves 8.

Ingredients:

- 1 quart low salt, no MSG tomato juice
- 5 whole Roma tomatoes, stemmed and seeded, diced
- 2 large celery stalks, finely diced
- 1 hothouse cucumber, seeds removed, finely diced
- 1 whole zucchini diced
- 1/4 cup Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- 1/4 cup white wine vinegar
- 1 red bell pepper, stemmed and seeded, finely diced
- 1/2 medium red onion, finely diced
- 1 jalapeno pepper, stemmed and seeded, minced
- 2 large garlic cloves, minced
- Juice of 1 lemon
- Juice of 1 lime
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce, or to taste
- 2 teaspoons kosher salt
- 6 dashes of Tabasco sauce, to taste
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1/2 cup cilantro, chopped, held out for serving Optional garnishes:
- Favorite Vodka
- 2 ripe Avocado peeled, pitted and cubed

In the bowl of a food processor or in a blender, combine the minced garlic and jalepeno with half the red onion, half the bell pepper, half the cucumber, half the tomato, half the zucchini, half the celery, half the tomato juice, olive oil, white wine vinegar, Tabasco, and a dash of salt.

Pulse until all ingredients are blended well; mixture will have a nice speckled, colorful texture


Pour into a large bowl and combine all of the other ingredients except the optional garnishes. Stir together, adding salt and pepper to taste. Cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours, as it needs to be served cold.

Remove soup from fridge, and stir in cilantro. Check seasonings to taste one last time. If serving as a soup, ladle into bowls and drizzle with a little olive oil, garnishing with avocado.

To serve with vodka, mix 1 cup gazpacho with 1 ounce of vodka. Pour into a glass or plastic cup and serve cold with fresh lime wedges and cucumber slices as a garnish.

If someone tailgating nearby is having a shrimp boil, hand them a Bloody Mary and ask for shrimp in return! Place one shrimp on the side of the cup, and it will add to the wonderful flavors of this meal to-go.

Plastic spoons are optional.

continued from page 1 eager to catch a fish of my own, and as I sat there taking in the sites and sounds of the open waters, my pole bent down nearly in half, and a fish was one the line. Unlike party boat fishing, on a private charter the mates bait your pole and walk you through everything, so when it came time to reel in the catch I was ready to go. Bringing in a big fish isn't easy, but the rush is truly exhilarating.

Our day at sea continued on and every moment was as exciting as the first catch. The addition of each new fish only heightened my newfound affection of deep sea fishing. Much of our "work" at hand was nearly completed as my photographer and videographer had most of the content needed for our Local Time feature. So, I headed up to the tower to sit and chat with the Captain as he set course for the docks.


At the time I didn't know it, but my conversation with Brant Kelly as he navigated the Gulf initially planted the seed for this article. Brant isn't the first fisherman in his family. I learned that Coleman Kelly, Brant's father, captained the Martha-Gene, Destin's first deep sea fishing sport charter boat. Its inaugural voyage took place in August 1939, and since then many boats and fisherman have come and gone.


However, Brant and his family are not the only descendants of this spectacular town that was once simply known as East Pass.



My experience aboard the Relentless stuck with me. Not only did my deep sea fishing trip awaken my inner fisherman, it also heightened my passion for history. Traces of Destin's roots as a fishing camp started to appear vividly. I began to take notice of historic photos scattered around

town. I listened intently at stories told along the Destin Harbor and at the docks in Sandestin and found them intriguing. Although the visceral experience of fishing still lingered for me, I decided to first cultivate my intrigue of local history in other venues. My initial attempt at a historical article started with a coastal community located right next to Destin. I was fortunate enough to sit with Linda Hodges, a descendant of the Nitsos

family, founders of the prestigious community of Frangista Beach. Still residing in the community of her ancestors, Linda took the time to discuss a range of topics - including development, the past, and the present. I left my meeting with the details of Frangista Beach's history that I sought, but also began to appreciate the intricacies and relationships of true Destin locals. Destin is not what it was when fishing Captain Leonard Destin ventured down from New London, Connecticut back in 1845. It's not even what it was just a few years ago, but as I continued my personal journey through this region's heritage, I realized the remnants of fishing and the initial settlers are woven in the fabric of this now world fa-

mous vacation destination.

Still keeping the importance of Destin's history of fishing on the back burner, I continued moving forward, though the past. On my quest I was fortunate enough to bump into the Allen Family of Dune Allen Beach. They shared many stories and happy childhood memories with me as they provided access to their personal photo album. Their family's story is centered in South Walton, just minutes to the east of Destin, and their fondest memories were of Oyster Lake, a rare example of a coastal dune lake found here and only two other places in the world. Developing the area was at the forefront, but as I flipped through their family memories, images of fishing down on the

docks in Destin seemed to fairly jump from the pages.

Then, in the fall of last year, we found out our magazine had been selected to be the first ever official program of the Destin Seafood Festival, an event created by the wives of charter and commercial fisherman 35 years ago. Now it was my job to learn about this history of fishing in Destin. We went to work and created our first onset to our magazine. The back of our fall issue hosted the twelve-page program in reverse. You flipped the program over and also had the current issue of our magazine. We were ecstatic, but unfortunately due to adverse weather, the 2013 Seafood Festival never took place.

In the underutilized Destin




A HISTORY TOLD

Seafood Festival program, we only briefly touched on the history of this piece of paradise. Many of the questions that had formed since my time in the Gulf, what now seemed long ago, still went unanswered. Little pieces had filled in the some of the cracks, but I still wanted to know what transpired and laid the foundation for what we have today. So as the need for knowledge was growing, I decided to go to AJs.

As odd as it may seem, in my search for answers, I had to stop by AJs Seafood & Oyster Bar located right on the Destin Harbor, and home to the weigh-ins during the Annual Destin Fishing Rodeo. As luck would have it, we were featuring them in this issue in our Local Time segment. I did have a meeting right after at the nearby Destin History and Fishing Museum, but AJs was my first stop of the day. As I toured the massive operation with their Marketing Director, we spoke of history and fishing. We discussed seafood and the other endeavors undertaken on-site. Many fishermen sat in their harbor side bar, and boats came and went

along the docks - which were alive with activity. On my way out, we stopped by the hostess' stand and took a look at a few of the many historic photos decorating their walls. The question was brought up, "Do you know how Destin became known as the World's Luckiest Fishing Village?" Seems like something I should know, but I only knew part of the answer. My AJs guide took time to explain. In 1965, during the 8th Annual Destin Fishing Rodeo, Governor Brunson was passing through town. With his political team in tow, he stopped for a photo op with Captain Reddin. Although reluctant, Governor Brunson and his wife boarded Reddin's fishing boat. He convinced them that they had time, no matter how brief his appearance was, to catch a fish. Tearing out into the Gulf, the group returned only 15 minutes later with a fifteen-pound Mackerel! When the governor returned to Tallahassee, he was interviewed on TV about his caravan along the coast. When asked if it was unusual to catch a fish of that size in that short amount of time, Governor Brunson replied, "Not if you fish in Destin, those people live with the fish! It has to be The World's Luckiest Fishing Village!"

My last stop on my personal pursuit of knowledge was at the Destin History and Fishing

Museum. Although many may realize this would be the most logical destination for history seekers, it was my journey here that helped me fully understand the impact of our fishing founders. I was greeted by a friendly volunteer and escorted to the office of Kathy Marler-Blue, the Associate Director of the museum. The premise of our meeting was to craft an article dedicated solely to the history of Destin charter fishing. At the time, that was still my focus, but I had a gut feeling that there may be another more valuable and intriguing angle. Kathy took time to give me a personal tour of their intimate museum. In addition to an abundance of Destin history, she included a little of her personal history. As you may have deduced, she is a direct descendant of

the Marler family and married into the Blue family, two the Destin's founding families. 'Uncle Billy' Marler moved to "East Pass" in 1879 to fish alongside Captain Destin. He quickly became one of the best local fishermen and constructed over 100 boats in his lifetime. Among other accomplishments, later in life he became the first postmaster and honored his former employer by naming "East Past" Destin.

As we journeyed through the halls of history, the volunteer's shift ended and Kathy had to man the front door and the phones. I took this time to explore the photos and remnants from the years passed. At the same time, I eavesdropped on her interaction with museum patrons. She lit up as she shared pertinent details with both young and

old. Each guest of the museum was treated as family. The stories she shared were of passion, love, and hardship. Lost in thought, I continued my personal tour. I noticed many familiar family names and locales. Details on the people and places I personally came in contact with and experienced were all housed here. My full understanding of the history of fishing in my hometown came together. I now had everything I needed for my article.

As I reviewed my notes and recalled my present day journey, I realized something. While Destin is now the glamorous and strikingly beautiful playground of many, the rugged lifestyle and dedication to fishing is still present. Even off the many boats and away from the docks, fishing is the most

valuable thread in the fabric of our community. Traces of the founding families can be found everywhere. Even the Destin family - the town's namesake owns the much-loved Dewey Destin Restaurants. They still call this quaint coastal retreat their home. Although the present population of this town swells tremendously when the weather is warm, the core population of locals is rather small. Nearly every local you encounter has their own personal connection to the history of our town and many have their own tales of their exploration of the

So as I sat down to write about the History of Fishing in Destin, I came to a realization. Our story has been told before and will be told forever going forward. It's a rich story, but it is better realized through your own personal experiences.









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Tips for Better Workouts

Structure your workouts to fit your goals: A gymnast doesn't train like a football player, and a tennis player doesn't train like a basketball player. Why? Because in order to perform better at each sport, it takes specific movements and strengths, in specific areas, to make one stronger for each sport. How does this equate to you? You are unique. From your bone structure, genetics, chemical make-up (hormones/immunity) and body type. It's great to get ideas from others, but make sure it will benefit you personally. When I train

my small groups of two to six people, even if they do somewhat the same order of exercises, not all lift the same weight or perform the same reps. Some people want a more muscular build; some want long lean smoother muscles; some need to focus on fat burning. Figure out your goals at the beginning of your quest and it will give you direction and keep you more motivated.

Mix it up: In order to customize your workout journey, tailor it to fit your goals and make it enjoyable. Your body needs to be challenged to change. Do something called "Phase Training." Briefly, a phase training plan manipulates exercise volumes and intensities over the course of weeks, months and years. Change your range of repetitions, how many sets, as well as the exercises themselves. It's suggested, though, that in order for a muscle to get stronger or more toned, it needs time to adapt and change. Therefore, we need to have some time repeating a movement for this muscle adaptation to occur. A good example is the push-up. When you first begin doing pushups, you might be

lucky to do five good ones. But if you do push-ups more often, you will increase the number of push-ups you can do. This is most important when looking for strength gains, but also for coordination. So, a simplified example of Phase Training for overall fitness would be:

Weeks 1-4: Endurance Phase/ high repetitions 13-20/2-3 sets 3-4 days/week focusing on mobility, stability and form

Weeks 5-8: Strength Phase/moderate repetitions 8-12/2-6 sets 3-4 days/week focusing on lean muscle mass and gaining strong muscles (not bulky). Strong is GOOD!

Cycle through these phases all year.

Other additions to keep it interesting are Circuit Training, HIIT (High Intensity Interval Training) or other types of interval training. Again, depends on your goals.

Slow down: For strength and safety purposes, perform your repetitions SLOWLY. The slower you go, the more muscle fibers you recruit, thus maximizing strength gains and less joint or ligament damage. There are times that you want to move faster like in Circuits or Interval Training. But the key to "faster" is stay in control and in good form. It's best to sometimes work as fast as you can, but WHILE PER-FORMING FULL RANGE OF MOTION (ROM) WITH FULL CONTROL. If you can't perform full ROM with full control, then you are too fast or too heavy. That makes speed relative to controlled performance. When lifting weights there is a positive and negative motion. When performing a bicep curl, you start with your arm relatively straight; but when you raise or curl the weight, flexing the elbow, it is the positive part of the lift. The lowering of the weight or extension of the elbow, is the negative. You always want to control and go slowly on the negative: this is where "resistance" training gets its name. It's the control of resisting the weight that challenges the muscle and makes the greatest difference.

Be Active – choose what you like! Any and all movement is good. Don't overthink it. Dance if it makes you happy! Guess what? You will be working out!

Long Days at School Can Lead to Long Nights at Home

The back to school rush has begun. Millions of children have returned to their daily routine of early wakeups, multiple hours of academic rigor and then a plethora of after school activities. Often over the summer, the schedule becomes more relaxed. Bedtimes become more flexible, organized activities get put on hold and there is little demand to sit and focus. This return to routine and structure in the Fall can be a difficult transition for many kids, leading to meltdowns at home.

As parents, we always hope that our children do their best and behave appropriately when out of our sights. It is not unusual for a child to get rave reviews about his behavior from teachers at school, yet the parent spends the afterschool hours battling with defiance and cranky behavior. Some parents wonder if the teacher could possibly be talking about their child or be confused about someone else! This is especially common in the first few

weeks of returning to the school year schedule.

Although this home behavior can be frustrating, if we put ourselves in our children's shoes, we can at least empathize with why it is happening. A traditional public school day in America lasts between six and a half to seven hours. Many children are getting on buses as early as 6 a.m., requiring wake ups before the sun even rises. Children are then expected to sit at their desks, eves on teachers and ears open for classroom activities. They must also navigate the social complexities while at school. As we can all remember, that seems to get more difficult with every grade of school completed. With the amount of focus and self-control expected from a child after the long, lazy days of summer, it's no wonder why Suzy is on the floor in a tantrum when you ask her how her day went! What's a parent to do when they are only getting the worst from their child during the back to school transi-

The first step is to remember this is normal and you are not alone (misery does love company right?)! The next step is to implement some preventative measures to minimize emotional upheaval for your kids. This starts with regular bedtime routines. Sleep is essential for everyone, but especially our people with still developing brains. Implement a calming, structured routine that is followed every night for little ones. For the older kids who have access to technology, be sure to establish



a cut-off time for electronics to ensure they are not up all night with the glow of a screen on their faces. Establish preventative measures for wake-up time too. If you know Johnny is terrible to get out of bed and you often end up sending him on the bus after a frantic morning of yelling and hunting down back packs, plan ahead. Have Johnny set out all school items by the door the night before. Wake Johnny (or set his alarm) an extra 15 minutes early if you know he is going to struggle with waking up.

When it comes to after school exhaustion, respond with empathy rather than frustration. This can be difficult as we welcome kids home only to receive an attitude. But take a deep breath and remember all that was expected of your child that day. Rather than grill your child on their day, provide a favorite healthy snack and sit back to determine

what he would like to share in that moment. Just be a good listener. For younger children a snack and a physical outlet is often needed. When emotionally dysregulated, grounding our bodies through movement can be helpful. Encourage your child to run around outside with a neighbor or the family dog before sitting down to tackle homework. Allow for unstructured time where your child can decompress. When it comes to extra-curricular activities, start back slowly if possible. Speak up to coaches when planning the Fall schedule and explain that Suzy will be adjusting to school the first week and will be at soccer practice the second week of school

rather than the first. Hold off on enrolling Johnny in trumpet lessons until after he has gotten the school routine down a bit. Some coaches or instructors might balk, but your child's mental and emotional health comes before extracurriculars

Think of your child's personality to determine what he or she might need after school to decompress. For some, it will be running around to release energy and socialize and for other children they will need quiet and solitude to return to their regulated state of mind after school. More than likely, your child's after school grumpiness will ease after a few weeks of returning to the

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Digestion by Design (Part 7)

Just when you think it couldn't get any more exciting, it's time for our jugglers! These two multi-tasking geniuses are designed to keep all the balls in the air making lightning fast responses and micro adjustments as needed to protect us. Please meet the gallbladder, valuable, yet potentially underappreciated, and your almighty liver, undoubtedly the hardest working and most adaptive of our organs of digestion

I am beginning to wonder if we need to put the gallbladder on

the endangered species list! While we can live without it, it certainly has an important role in efficient digestion and nutrient absorption. Primarily, the gallbladder is designed to store and concentrate bile, which is manufactured in the liver and used to transport waste products. Bile is triggered to be released from the gallbladder into the small intestine when we eat fatty foods. There, in addition to taking out the trash, it helps pancreatic lipase break down fats and aids in the absorption of our fat-soluble vitamins. And, finally, bile salts act as bactericides, protecting us by destroying potentially harmful microbes in our food. What an awesome multi-tasker!

More than any other organ, however, it is the liver that most compensates for our daily dietary choices. I like to picture the liver like a sentinel standing guard between the intestines and general circulation. Though it does about 500 different jobs, we'll just focus on a few relevant ones. As a filter, the liver processes virtually EVERYTHING we take in and either lets it pass, breaks it

down, changes it into something new, stores or eliminates it. This includes all nutrients and, just as important, all anti-nutrients including alcohol, drugs, toxic food additives, toxins from our external environment and those created internally by improperly digested foods.

Now, here is where the conversation between the liver and the pancreas takes place... Remember, at the top end of digestion the pancreas creates enzymes to release nutrients. At this stage of digestion, the pancreas releases hormones that effectively tell those nutrients where to go and what to do. These hormones are insulin and glucagon.

When we eat foods that break down into glucose, the liver notifies the pancreas and insulin is released to escort the glucose into the cells to use as energy. However, not all of our cells are insulin dependent. So, when we take in more sugar than we need, this limited audience begins to hang out the NO VACANCY sign. We call that insulin resistance, which is the precursor to type II

diabetes (America's newest health epidemic). When insulin can't find a cell to take the glucose, it is returned to the liver for short-term storage or the liver instructs insulin to send the glucose into a storage unit.

Our storage units are called Triglycerides and we find them in our blood stream and in our adipose tissue, which is why insulin is also called a "fat storage hormone." High triglyceride levels can be associated with diabetes, kidney disease, and the use of some medications. Highly elevated triglyceride levels might also cause fatty liver disease and pancreatitis. Normal triglyceride levels in the blood are less than 150 mg per deciliter (mg/dL), although ideal levels are under 100.

In addition to our triglyceride levels, understanding glucose levels, cholesterol ratios and markers of internal inflammation is important, because these internal numbers can more accurately reflect the state of our health. We have a tendency to obsess over our weight, but our weight is not the single defining element of

over-all health. Even people who maintain a healthy weight put themselves at risk for preventable diseases if they are not eating correctly! So, we will discuss these internal numbers as we continue with almighty liver next month. Stay tuned!





The A.C.E.S. of Real Estate Investing (Part 2)

In last month's article we talked about why real estate is a great investment: the A.C.E.S – **A**ppreciation, **C**ash flow, **E**quity, **S**helter your taxes and the **P**lus...Leverage. (Please see August '19 Destin Life.)

Now, if you are thinking, "Real estate is a great investment," let's talk about some action steps toward building your wealth and generating passive income along with maximizing your taxes through real estate investing. Consider the following points:

- 1. **Research** the property you're interested in carefully, including asking the following questions: What are the comparable prices? Are there any liens on the property? What kind of income will it generate? Are there existing tenants and tenant leases? Is it an "up and coming" neighborhood or on the decline? What are the 'best' properties for you? Houses, condos, multi-family? Always keep in mind that investing is a risk...but so is driving! However, if it's calculated and mapped out, you can reduce the risk fairly well.
- 2. Get your feet wet by **starting small** with a duplex or small condominium, and if you're not in Florida, maybe a home for you with a basement apartment. You

have to look at your options carefully. Your advisors like your real estate smart CPA's and a great realtor (me!) will be great guides in your decision to pay cash or get a loan. Talk to your team!

5. As you become a "seasoned" landlord and more comfortable in handling your first investment property, then consider **expanding your portfolio.** It will get easier and you'll see a greater return on your investments.

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Time To Consider Investing in Silver?

Some investors, for the first time in several years, are beginning to take note of precious metals, silver in particular. The reasons are many, but most notable are the world economic climate and the price of silver to gold. Silver bullion, coins, silver mining companies, mutual funds and exchange traded funds (ETFs) have generally seen an increase in investing and prices.

The world economic climate has become much less certain over the past couple of years. Interest rates and unemployment rates are at record lows, yet economic uncertainty abounds. The biggest concern is that demand for goods and services has not grown commensurate with output. A decade of low-cost borrowing and fundamental changes in the demand for certain natural resources has brought about sizable gains in output. Technological advances have also resulted in sizable output gains as well.

The demand for these gains has not kept pace however and world governments and banks have taken steps to lower rates even further to encourage expansion, stimulate growth and consumption. This has not resulted in enough demand to keep pace with the output. This is most notable when you look at inflation, which is not only the pace of increase in the costs of goods and services, but a sign of the growth of the economy. Gross Domestic Product or GDP is another measure for economic growth. Both have continued to move at a rate of approximately 2% a year. Economic growth is considered healthy at 3% for these measures.

So, why the recent increase in investor interest in silver? Often

precious metals price increases are a result of inflation, stemming from a weaker currency. This is not currently the case. What has been the case is that the value of silver, relative to gold, is lower than its historical ratio. Silver has most consistently had a ratio of 1:50 versus gold. In other words, gold prices have typically been 50 times greater than silver prices. Currently the ratio is closer to 1:88 or gold is selling at 88 times silver. Many investors might consider that a value gap or that silver has become undervalued, cheaper, oversold and hence an investment (albeit is speculative) opportunity. Year to date silver is up in price approximately 12.05% and up almost 20% over the past three months. Gold is up 17.50% year to date and 19% over the past three months.

Economic uncertainty with trade wars in the news as well as sluggish world growth and growing budget deficits (and debts) are also being noted by investors as reasons for seeking these types of hedges or investment opportunities. Silver has also been seen as a store of value, something that historically retains purchasing power into the future.

To learn more, call or visit an advisor or do your own research on ways to understand the silver market. Exchange traded funds, mutual funds and individual stocks are available through brokerage firms. The United States Mint and of course coin dealers give investors alternatives as well. 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

A panhandle native who grew up in Pensacola and Gulf Breeze, Randy relocated to Destin in 2012 and opened Seaside Premium Cabinets in 2016. His background had always been in construction and home building, and as a licensed builder it was a natural fit to move into the cabinet business. And not just any cabinet business, Randy explains, "What we do is assemble and install kitchen and

bathroom cabinets from 12 different high quality manufacturers, offering a good price point that results in a reasonable price for the customer." He goes on to say that this has almost become the norm in the industry due to a lack of workforce in the custom cabinet woodworking arena and they are able to offer a very good product at a competitive price. There are occasional limitations that arise, but Randy says most customers are flexible and he can add molding and fillers to achieve the correct sizing for a space. This allows for a custom built look without the custom price tag.

About half of his business is new construction, and the other half is from home and condo remodels. Randy says, "It's been my experience that people appreciate honesty and communication; so if we say we're going to do something, we'll do our very best to do it." In a land of lack of responsiveness from contractors and some inventory delays, this is a welcome



respite. Randy works hard to ensure the inventory arrives ahead of schedule, checks the schedules with the contractors, and then ultimately communicates with customers, following up with repairs, bids, and designs.


