# Reflections on 2020, Hope in 2021

"Unprecedented" is the Word for 2020

Users of the online dictionary, Dictionary.com, voted "unprecedented" as the People's Choice 2020 Word of the Year. Can anyone disagree? 2020 has certainly been an unprecedented year of problems, challenges, pivots, solutions and, perhaps, even successes. For many Americans, 2020 has been one of the most challenging years of their lifetimes. And of course, the coronavirus pandemic and the government's response has again been unprecedented.

Although we've come through this most unprecedented year perhaps better than most across our country. it has not been without many

challenges. "Stay Safe" has become as popular in our language as "Have a good day." Everyone has become more germ conscious and hand sanitizer and mask wearing has become a part of everyday life, and probably will be for a long time to come.

The business community faced many difficult challenges, enduring shutdowns, reductions in hours of operation and seating capacity, social distancing and sanitation issues; each restriction coming with a cost. According to online giant "Yelp," 61% of restaurants across the U.S. have closed and will never reopen. Here on the Emerald Coast, businesses have fared better, but not without significant challenges.

Despite a competitive environment and upheaval in the market, businesses were forced

# **Destin High School Moves Forward**

New Location Will Open in 2021-22 School Year

The much-anticipated Destin High School (DHS) is slated to open for 9th and 10th graders (and currently investigating the possibility of 11th graders) in August of 2021. The tuition-free public charter school is under contract to purchase the Grace Lutheran Church property located at 4325 Commons Dr. W., next to the Mattie Kelly Cultural Arts Village. DHS will be a model for innovation providing unique educational opportunities for both

to innovate on the fly. Many of our local businesses were creative and ingenious. "When the world sees obstacles, we see opportunity," says local business owner Bob Conrad with Eagle Vision Services. "What we have observed in our communities is a values-based mindset that demands self-leadership and a tenacity of spirit that drives our personal and local culture."

For instance, "curbside" pickup became a thing! Many upscale restaurants offered takeout or even a delivery service for the first time in order to stay in business and generate revenue.

"All of the restaurants had to make major adjustments, creating outside seating, take-out, drive through, etc.," says Destin Chamber President Shane Moody. "Also, rental companies had to make some changes due to the governor's executive orders. And any professional service (accounting, law, banking, etc.) had to adjust to teleworking and zoom calls."

Though many organizations' fundraising efforts were cut short due to cancelled events and other activities, some were still very successful through support of our community. For example, Children's Volunteer Health Network was able to exceed its goal of serving 1,000 students during the school year.

Another example is how our area's real estate market adapted; as a result of people relocat-

ing from more restrictive states to our area, the market is up over 17% year over year which also translates to more activity and growth for our local businesses, construction trades, suppliers, etc.

Other specialized businesses such as J. Leon Art Gallery actually opened its doors for the first time in June. Shantelle Dedicke, owner of local agency Francis Roy said, "Bringing art at a time when a lot of businesses and activities were shut down was challenging. But people were ready for an escape and the new pottery classes, which were small and social distanced, were seemingly therapeutic."

Amid the struggle, there are signs of hope. If you look, there's always a silver lining. This is

America after all! We can always find that ray of hope, the sun breaking through the clouds on a cold morning; alas, the sun will rise, and the chill will give way to a warm and beautiful day. Yes, you can always find a positive in any situation. For instance, remote working has become much more common. Many will never go back to an office, saving businesses millions.

college-bound and vocationally-minded students living in Destin and along Florida's Emerald Coast.

The DHS Governing Board, comprised of members Prebble Ramswell, Denise Fountain, Myra Williams, Sarah Stone, Heidi LoCicero, Jim Luttrell, Dr. Mitch Silver, Al Gardner and Drew Palmer, has been diligently working to bring the community its own high school, starting with entering into a \$4.6 million purchase contract with Grace Lutheran for the land and buildings. A closing on the property is anticipated in the early part of this year.

Mike Wind, executive director of ministries for Grace Lutheran Church, commented, "We are very excited for the Destin community as the prospect of having its own high school gets closer to becoming a reality. And, we are prayerful for them as the board works to make it happen."

Greenwich Investment Management, based in Stamford, Conn., and well-versed in educational facility investments, will handle DHS's financing of the new site.

DHS's Governing Board president, Prebble Ramswell,

commented, "The vision of opening Destin High School is about to be a reality due in large part to our donors, parents, community leaders, and our Governing Board. We are thrilled to have the assistance of RoundTable Funding whose financial advisors are highly experienced in guiding visionaries like the DHS Governing Board through the processes of securing charter school financing, retrofitting, project oversight and building additional school facilities. This community asset will make a positive economic impact while greatly enhancing the quality of life here in Des-

In addition to site acquisition

and financing, the board has also retained the services of DAG Architects. The local architectural firm which has designed schools throughout the state including Destin Middle School, is designing plans for the retrofit, and set forth a

strategic plan to accomplish the renovation in record time.

The board is also pleased to announce that DHS's first head of school has been selected following a nationwide principal search and intensive interview process. The principal will be announced in the coming weeks.

The student enrollment application period will commence this month. In addition to offering advanced and state-mandated core curriculum, DHS will utilize a place-based approach to learning that will take advantage of the local geography, industry and community. This will allow the school to offer additional curriculum opportunities through authentic, meaning-

ful and engaging personalized learning for students.

Fundraising is a critical component of opening the school. The start-up costs alone are \$400,000. Long-term, the more revenue raised toward purchase cost, the less needed to be financed, thus putting additional revenue into student programming, opportunities and options. Of course, when DHS is fully operational, as with all public educational institutions, the school will receive state and federal government funding. "We would like to thank the students, parents, citizens and donors that have supported the efforts to bring forth this highly desired and needed educational asset. We promised that the board would be working hard to move the ball across the finish line. Destin High School is happening. Now is the time for the community to step up, donate, volunteer and take part in the plan to enhance the community educational experience for our students," said Sarah. There will be a series of small group meetings and tours at the future home of DHS. More information will be forthcoming to keep the community and future students updated.

# Meet Our Hometown Hero: Sean Dietrich, An Overcomer

Longtime local and Destin Life favorite Sean Dietrich (sometimes better known as "Sean of the South") is a traveling storyteller, podcaster and Southern Living writer known for his daily column filled with stories of steel workers, church potlucks and trusty bloodhounds. His penned words seem to grant his readers a reason to believe there is good in the world—despite what they might have experienced to the contrary.

As a child he liked to write. He filled up notebooks with tales of the high-seas, shameless vixens, and steamy scenarios combining both of the aforementioned. His 5th-grade teacher found one of his notebooks and scanned through it. "She told me I wrote with too many commas," says Sean, "and encouraged me to pursue a career in construction work. That, old, woman, never, liked, me."

"Years later, I learned my teacher had left the school. She took a job at the Piggly Wiggly as a cashier. I went to visit the old girl, to show her the man I'd grown into," Sean says. "She seemed genuinely glad to see me. And I was just as glad to find her wearing that red apron for a living. After visiting for a few minutes, I realized something I'd never noticed before. Beneath her hard-shell exterior was a regular lady, working from nine to five for pennies. She was doing the best she could with her life. Just like me. Before I left, she asked me what kind of work I did. At the time, I worked in construction." Sean says.

Today, Sean is a columnist, novelist and podcast host known for his commentary on life in the American South. Pure, raw and transparent, long-time readers are well familiar with Sean's monthly column in Bay Life. His work has appeared also in Newsweek, Southern Living, Garden and Gun, The Tallahassee Democrat, Good Grit, South Magazine, Alabama Living, the Birmingham News, The Bitter Southerner, Thom Magazine, and The Mobile Press Register. He has authored 11 books and is the creator of the Sean of the South Podcast.

Recently, Sean posted "Second Chances," an eloquent blog post about his experience as a student at now Northwest Florida State College. A graduate of the Class of 2012, in 2018 he was the Against The Odds Award Recipient, a distinguished alumni winner, which is fitting for this popular and well-known writer and storyteller who has certainly beaten the odds...and overcome the words of his 5th-grade teacher. What happened one Saturday morning in his creative writing class, at then Okaloosa-Walton College, was a turning point. The teacher told Sean he was her favorite student. Until then, I'd never been anybody's favorite

The truth is, I was a sad kid in an adult's body. And these professors believed in me. My literature professor told me I was "smart." Professor Domulot said I was "going places."

My English teacher said, "I think you could be a novelist one day."

I remember the exact day she said that. I almost cried after class."

Last year, he published Will the Circle Be Unbroken?: A Memoir of Learning to Believe You're Gon-

er before pulling the trigger on

himself. He was a childhood

hero who was now reduced to a

death, Sean dropped out of 7th grade and became a dishwasher, newspaper deliverer, and then a construction worker, to help his mother and sister scrape by. As a self-described "nobody with a sad story behind him," Sean still could not deny the glimmers of life's goodness. Such goodness became even harder to deny when he met the love of his life, Jamie, at a fried chicken church potluck, and harder still when his lifelong love of storytelling led him to stages across the country, where he is now known and loved as "Sean of the South."


That 'Against The Odds

# Capt. Commish Retires from Politics


### and Heads Back to the Sea

Destin Local Capt. Kelly Windes, aka "Capt. Commish" in the political world—"Killer" in the fishing world, is no stranger to hard work or retirement. In 2017, he retired from his more than 50-year, fishing-for-hire career aboard his beloved Charter Boat SUNRISE when he sold his 53' G&S Sport Fisherman to his son, Capt. Trey Windes. He had been driving a 38' Hatteras,

Charter Boat OUTTA LINE. He wanted to devote more time to the Okaloosa County Board of County Commissioner District 5 position to which he had been elected in 2012. As his second term on the County Commission came to a close, he opted to not run again, but to retire from political life and return to being a fisherman again. This time though, he will not be

working directly with the public; instead, he will become a commercial fisherman at the age of 74.

As a charter boat captain, Capt. Kelly Windes was a consistent Captain of the Year winner at the Destin Fishing Rodeo. The crowds always knew he would show up daily at the close of the weigh-in's around 6:58 p.m. Cutting it close was





part of his charm, but his popularity was due to the size of the fish he caught. Back then, Captain of the Year was based on the number of winning fish you weighed in, and Capt. Kelly Windes brought in some whoppers, including several Rodeo and USGA world records.

The secret to his success, he will tell you, is investing back in the business. He didn't rely solely on navigation equipment and natural bottom to get a "mess" of fish. He spent tens of thousands of dollars annually to build more artificial reefs to which only he knew the readings. Making your own places to fish insures that other fisherman can't wipe out a spot before you get there. Having knowledge of what depth and areas would attract which species, he built a lot of "wrecks" that turned into good business and a great rep-

Back in the day, charter boat captains would commercial fish during the winter to make ends meet. Instead of the 12-hour or more fishing charters which are somewhat glamorous, the captains would be gone 3-5 days at a time catching fish to sell to the local fish markets. Some of the fish would be shipped outside of the area, but they were all sold locally. That's what he plans to start doing again full-time.

His last meeting as a county commissioner was November 17, and he is already chomping at the bit to get out fishing again. He has made a lot of friends at the county, and he concedes he will miss them. They will tell you that he brought his work ethic and common sense to Okaloosa County, and they will miss him, too.

So, it's back to sea he goes! Will he retire from that? Who knows! Kelly says he's still got a lot of things he wants to do. So, when you see him, you could say, "Happy Retirement," but just know that retirement is never really an end for him. It's just a transition to something new.

Sheriff, though a negative time in OCSO's history. Undaunted, he set out determined to rebuild the office's credibility and trust within the communities of Okaloosa County.



evidence. Audits are now conducted on a frequent basis and all data is available online for maximum transparency.

Some of Ashley's other goals during the past decade were to initiate a more robust physical fitness program for Sheriff's Office employees, maintain the state accreditation and consolidate communications resources. One of his main accomplishments was expanding the school resource officer program. Now, other communities use Ashley's program as a role model.

OCSO was also the first Northwest Florida agency to receive and use body cameras; the first to aggressively use social media to connect with the community; and the first to put deputies in every school.

Ashley has been successful in restoring transparency to the OCSO. He is passing the baton to newly-elected Sheriff Eric Aden to carry it forward. Aden will be overseeing the OCSO that, currently, serves and protects nearly 200,000 year-round residents as well as many more tens of thousands of visitors each week. The OCSO has approximately 325 sworn offi-

cers and 110 civilian support staff services ranging from road patrol, traffic enforcement, investigations and environmental enforcement, to school resource officers, marine and beach patrols, K-9, civil process, warrants, communications and judicial services. As Sheriff, Aden says, "I am not only honored to

serve alongside these men and women to combat crime, I feel privileged to have such a wonderful community to call home."

She discovered that Bob had not added comprehensive, collision, rental or roadside coverage on his car, which surprised her. "You requested these coverages, right, Bob?" she asked.

"Yeah, I was trying to save some money. I guess I just threw away \$13,000, didn't I?"

There's a reason to review your insurance portfolio each year. And there's an even better reason to listen to your agent's professional recommendations based on your situation and their expertise. Your insurance policies are there to protect, not just your life and property, but your bank account as well.

We know there will be things in your life that impact your insurance needs. Whether you're purchasing a home, buying a new vehicle, getting married or starting a business, take the time to get a policy review.

First, let's look at your auto policy. Bodily Injury liability steps in when you're in an accident that's your fault and someone in another vehicle or a pedestrian, is injured. This is also your asset protector. Make sure the coverage is high enough to protect your assets in the event of a lawsuit. And match your Uninsured/Underinsured to the Bodily Injury and stack it.

Should you have Comprehensive and Collision? That depends on whether you have a lien (or lease) on the car, and what the car's value is. If you own it free and clear, and if the value of the car is about the same as the cost of the deductibles, you may not want to add physical damage coverage. Otherwise, yeah, you should have it.

Next, what about your home policy? Is the dwelling coverage enough to rebuild your house in the event of a loss like this past year's fires and hurricanes? Construction prices have gone up astronomically, so ensure you are adequately covered. This holds true for rental properties and condos as well. And make sure you have Law and Ordinance coverage of at least 25%, and if the property is a rental, check to see if your DP3 policy has that coverage available, since some carriers don't offer it on Landlord/Tenant policies. Always include replacement cost for your Personal Property and have enough Loss of Use/ Loss of Rents coverage as well.

We've discussed Umbrella policies at length before. So remember, this is an excellent way to obtain additional asset protection that goes above your home or auto policy. (Visit MyDestin-Life.com, November 2020, page 12.) Most carriers offer from \$1

million up to \$10 million depending on your needs.

Then there's flood coverage. Even if you're in an X flood zone, flood policies are always recommended since here in Florida, if it can rain, it can flood. Remember Hurricane Sally a few months ago? Your home policy will not cover flooding.

Lastly, for your collections like jewelry, fine art, coins, guns or something else, verify how much coverage you have on your home policy. They come with standard sub-limits, so ask about a separate Personal Articles Floater, or see if you can schedule them on your home policy.

The bottom line is this – take time to review your policy portfolio with your agent every year and listen to what your agent recommends. Don't throw away thousands of dollars needlessly.



2020. Done. Caput! On to a new, exciting year! (And Thank Goodness for THAT!) So, let's recap the Destin and Miramar Beach residential real estate market stats for 2020 compared to 2019:

In 2020, the number of SOLD Listings was up by 22.1% over prior year. That's HUGE!

In 2020, the Median Sales Price was up by 12.7% over prior year.

In 2020, the Number of New Listings was up by 8.9% over prior year.

In 2020, March, June and August had the highest number of sales and in 2019 it was March, April and May. Remember COVID-19 hit hard in March and in April 2020

sales were down 44.5% over prior year. April closings usually go under contract in March. March and April were a bit scary in Real Estate and then it rebounded!

Average Cumulative Days on Market (length of time from listing to under contract) was 129 in 2020 compared to 135 in 2019.

Average Sold to List Price was 95% in 2020 and the same in 2019.

In 2020, we averaged 4.45 months of inventory, in 2019 we averaged 6.44 months of inventory. Note: 5 months or less is considered a sellers' market, over five months is considered a buyers' market. However, with interest rates so low, buyers can purchase more house than they ever could. So, now is a good time for Buyers AND Sellers!

The current Active Listings have been on market 245 days on average; the sold listings were on market an average of 134 days.



# Investing in the New Year



By Maurice Stouse, Financial Advisor and Branch Manager ach new year brings resolutions, new goals, new plans as

well as the review of existing plans. Short term, many of you might want to look to where you want to be in six months. But equally important is to plan for where you want to be in five years and well beyond that. Keeping that in mind, as we enter the new year, here are 10 considerations investors, savers and planners might want to plan and or review now.

Retirement plans. Have you funded your IRA (assuming you qualify for and have one) for 2020? Typically, you have until the federal income tax filing deadline. If you are self-em-

ployed or a small business, have you made the necessary contributions for 2020? Do you utilize a SEP, a 401k or a Defined Benefit Plan? What might you need to know about a Roth IRA? You might also want to review the investments you have for retirement including current allocations, any rebalancing considerations and if the portfolio is in line with your current investment objectives, risk tolerance and time frame. Lastly, did you take a Required Minimum Distribution in 2020 or did you waive that per the CARES Act? It is also a good idea to preview what your distribution might be for 2021.

Beneficiaries. The new year is also a good time to review current beneficiaries on your retirement plans and see if they are current or perhaps need to be updated. The same would be for non-retirement accounts. You can have a beneficiary buy way of "Transfer on Death" on your nonretirement accounts if you would like to.

Estate planning. Whether you have an estate plan or not, it is also a good time to review how your assets are titled and how ownership will transfer upon your passing. This would go not only for financial assets (stocks, bonds, mutual funds and the like), but also for real estate. That would mean both home ownership (your domicile) or investment or income producing real estate. It is also a time to look at your will as well as medical directives and power of attorney should have need those.

Long Term Care. Do you have a plan in place for your long-term health and physical care, should that be needed?

Trusted contacts. Many firms today offer you the option of having a trusted contact listed on your account(s) should you like to have that. Or you might want to see your options for granting authority to your accounts by power of attorney form, trading authorization (limited of full) or simple inquiry authority.

Asset allocation. Review of what you own and where you own it and why you own it.

Tax Efficiency – review of tax treatment of your investments. Are they tax deductible, tax free or tax deferred?

Charitable giving — do you have a giving plan or perhaps a donor advised fund or your own foundation? The new year is a good time to review what you have or perhaps to learn about or consider alternatives available.

College Savings Plans – There are three main categories: 529 plans, UTMAs (Uniform Transfer to Minors Act) as well as state tuition plans. The new year is opportunity to either fund or learn more about which of these might best fit your plans or objectives.

Income planning. The new year is also a time to look at your sources of income. Systematic

Withdrawal plans, dividend income only, bond interest or fixed income interest are areas that might warrant a review early in the year. Systematic withdrawal plans might mean the systematic redemption of principal in addition to any earnings. You might want to explore the components to your income plan to ensure you are not accelerating your draw down of principal in down years for variable or stock market investments (and the like).

Most investors, firms and advisors encourage investors to look at their plans regularly, on a quarterly, or at least on an annual basis. Take time early in the year to plan for now and for the years that come for you.


the group for a fun experience donated by Urban Air Indoor Trampoline Park.

# **Looking Back to Look Forward**

My father died at the young age of 62 from Pulmonary Fibrosis. He retired as a Lt. Commander in the Coast Guard and had achieved a financially comfortable life in retirement. He enjoyed the arts with friends, traveled internationally and drove a Lexus. By all measures of the world surrounding us, he had done well. But some of the

final remarks in our last few conversations told me a very different story.

My father had a financial planner. I distinctly remember this as a teenager from the coinciding of conversations my parents were having during the same season I was active in a school project where we invested in the stock market. I made some poor financial choices in college with debt and it spawned conversations with him about

proper financial management. Yet, despite having a professional advisor and his perceived success in this arena, in his final days he felt, in many ways, he had missed the entire point.

In the past I have kept his words private. What was spoken between us in those days, and words he softly spoke under his breath, that he wasn't aware I had heard, have so anchored in me that I would almost say they haunt me. I stood at the doorway

to his room in the ICU, looking at a man sitting in a chair, not eating the food in front of him, hunched over with tubes everywhere, machines humming and beeping, his skin hanging on his bones — and I wondered what had become of this man in front of me? Surely this wasn't the barrel chested, loud, picture of strength I knew as my father.

His words struggled out from him, his lungs and spirit weakened. "There's more I should have done."

It's too challenging to try to capture all that was said in that single sentence without filling in the details of an entire life. The generosity that followed in the final few days was more than I had ever seen in my life. I could see the joy and fulfillment it brought to him, but also the heartbreak that he had discovered this truth so late in life.

Money, in and of itself, is not the goal. Others will disagree. But it is where we stand. Good, even great, financial management and planning is simply not enough. It is a part of success, but only a part. And the part it plays, from our experiences and beliefs, is that it is a tool to achieve a higher understanding of success. As a Christian firm, what defines "higher" is pretty well mapped out, and it can be boiled down to this: It's not about your goals. It's about His goals for you, and the rest of His children.

The closer we get to the end of our lives, the more we begin to reflect on the decisions we've made. In 2020, we had a lot of opportunities to question the world around us. Why did we do the things we did? Why are we doing what we're doing now? It's existential, but time to reflect is important. Even God took time to rest.

The question is why. Why are you doing with money what you're doing? There is someone who knows a why that was created just for you and it will shape every decision you make, including the financial ones. Don't let money be the place where your planning and goals end. Let money be one of the tools to help you achieve the higher goals you've been called to. Then, you will join all the others in this growing movement into greater stewardship and Go Beyond Money.

# **PAWS Animals' Wishes Come True**

The Panhandle Animal Welfare Society (PAWS) received the largest cash donation in its 63-year history from a "Secret Santa," a gift that will make wishes to better serve Okaloosa County and its animals come true in this new year.

The donation from a parttime Destin resident who asked to remain anonymous, is enough to break ground and complete Phase I of the new PAWS campus.

"I have always been an animal lover, and the need for PAWS is very apparent in the community," the donor said. "As the community is growing robustly, it will need greater capacity at PAWS. I hope this will help PAWS keep up with the demand."

While certified plans for a central administrative building

were completed last year, the donation will allow architects to also begin plans for new dog kennels, cat housing, a low-cost veterinary clinic and other animal welfare needs for the campus.

To determine those needs, the PAWS board of directors will solicit ideas this month from the community, municipalities, county staff, volunteers, rescue agencies and other animal advocates. Due to COVID-19, the input will be collected via online surveys and meetings.

Based on that input, a project manager and committee will create a phased master plan, then launch a 2021 capital campaign to fund the rest of the campus. Some parts of the campus, such as the dog kennels, already have large-scale matching donors. In honor of



their late son, a local couple also has donated \$100,000 for a hydrotherapy pool to help rehabilitate injured dogs.

The new animal campus, at 745 Lovejoy Road NW, will be on a 15-acre parcel donated six years ago by local supporter Al

Qualls in memory of his beloved wife, Peggy Ann Qualls. It is just a few blocks northeast of the current dilapidated PAWS shelter.

The renderings, plans, a survey link, and other details about the campus development will soon be featured on the PAWS website, paws-shelter.org.

# No Boat? No Problem!

In our lucky little fishing village, it may be perceived that a boat is necessary to catch certain kinds of fish, or a multitude of fish. However, without access to a boat, there are still some great fishing spots anglers can take advantage of (even some who will rent rods if you don't have your own!) Grab your rods and reels as we head out to explore some active spots to fish in Destin.

Probably the most popular and first thought of fishing spot without a boat is our white sand beaches. With miles stretching across the Emerald Coast, there is no shortage of spots to fish but a few key factors could help you be more successful. When searching for a spot, look for a more secluded area where there are less swimmers. Also, check the water for color changes and wave breaks as that will signify better feeding spots for the fish. Try to find a spot where two sandbars meet and post up in the middle of them. Popular fish caught off the beach include pompano, redfish, bluefish, ladyfish, black drum and jack creval-

The Destin Jetties is another local favorite. Many anglers will walk the stretch of rocks that line the Destin Pass to claim their spot for the day. With the way the tides change daily through the east pass, the jetties create a prime feeding area and attract a variety of fish like bluefish, redfish, flounder, and Spanish mackerel, sheepshead, and a variety of baitfish. This is a spot



recommended for adults only, as the jetties were constructed with large boulders to climb over and there is no smooth walkway to reach the end.

Pier fishing is another hot spot in our local area, and we have two within driving distance -The Okaloosa Island Pier or the Navarre Beach Pier. Both piers stretch almost a quarter mile into the Gulf of Mexico and anglers of all skill levels can try their

luck. Most frequent catches from the pier include Spanish mackerel, whiting, sheepshead, ladyfish and bluefish, but some noteworthy fish have been caught there as well. Cobia, king mackerel, tuna, even Tarpon weighing over 100lbs and a few Sailfish have been pulled up from the water. Redfish and pompano are also frequent catches in this area. Both piers have a tackle shop on site that will also rent rods and reels, so even the novice angler can spend a day trying their luck.

A new spot to try is Thomas Pilcher Park, located under the 331 Bridge. There are plenty of parking, bathrooms, and a variety of spots to cast a line. There is a bait shop down the road before the bridge that you can pick up tackle, bait and anything else you'll need to get started. This is also a good spot to launch a paddleboard or kayak if you want to try fishing the shallow water along the shoreline, around the docks and grass flats.

In any of these locations, the best time of year to fish is from March-November, but fish will bite all year long if we have a warm winter. The bite is also always best when the tide is rising or falling and it's common to see fish start to school up along the beaches. Practice makes perfect my friends, and we look forward to seeing you out on the water with tight lines!

showed the top resolutions for 2021 are to exercise more, eat healthier and save money. A look back 20 years, and CNN's poll showed the top resolutions were to get out of debt, lose weight and develop a healthy habit (quit smoking). It's not surprising that the top resolutions are similar year after year, because they all have great intentions and actually go hand and hand. Let's look

at eating healthier and exercising. Eating healthy can mean cooking more at home, which saves money. Eating healthy also could cause fewer medications or doctor visits, which saves money. The same with exercising—developing a good exercise plan will make you healthier and could cause fewer medications or doctor visits saving you money. The building envelope is the physical barrier between the exterior and interior environments enclosing a structure (your home). Generally, the building envelope is comprised of a series of

components and systems such as a roof, walls, windows and a foundation. These systems protect the interior from the effects of the environment like precipitation, wind, temperature, humidity and ultraviolet radiation. One function of the building envelope is to control these effects between the interior and exterior of the building. When there is missing or compacted insulation or unsealed windows, doors and attic penetrations, your building envelope is comprised wasting energy and comfort.

If your home is older than 10 years, you most likely don't have enough insulation to meet today's guidelines. Prior insulation code for this area was R-19

(roughly 6.5" of insulation); now the new code is R-30 (roughly 10.5" of insulation). That's a 61% increase. Why the increase? Because we know that traditional insulation has trouble keeping our homes comfortable and the only solution was to add more insulation. More states are requiring the use of a reflective radiant barrier insulation installed on the attic rafters. Reflective radiant barriers reflect 97% of radiant heat in your attic, lowering the attic temperature by 40 to 50 degrees in the summer allowing your insulation and ductwork to perform better, saving you money and increasing your comfort. It's all about tightening the envelope to increase efficiency and comfort. If one of your resolutions is to save money this year, schedule an inspection to know exactly where your home could improve its envelope.



# Gulfarium C.A.R.E. Center to Rehabilitate Twelve Cold-Stunned Sea Turtles


The Gulfarium C.A.R.E. Center in Northwest Florida has taken in 12 Kemp's Ridley sea turtles that were recently stranded off the coast of New England during a recent mass cold-stun event. The sea turtles made the trip down from Massachusetts to Florida on Monday, December 14th, 2020.

The C.A.R.E. Center would like to thank Turtles Fly Too and their pilots Chuck Yanke and Julie Tromblay for transporting the sea turtles to the local area by private plane, where they were then collected and immediately taken to the C.A.R.E. Center for rehabilitation.

Cold stunning occurs when a sea turtle is exposed to cold water for an extended period of time. This exposure causes their heart rate to decrease, resulting in the turtle becoming lethargic and often unable to eat. Unfortunately, cold stunning events, where large numbers of sea turtles become stranded, are not unusual in northern areas during the months of November through February as water temperatures drop below 50 degrees.

Upon arrival at the C.A.R.E. Center, the veterinary team assessed each individual turtle, took x-rays and determined the best plan of action to care for these endangered animals. These sea turtles will stay at the C.A.R.E. Center for rehabilitation until they are deemed releasable by Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC). The recovery process can take up to a few months for cold-stunned turtles, but once their health has improved they will be released into the Gulf of Mexico.

"We are so grateful to be able to help these sea turtles from the Northeastern seaboard of the Atlantic due to a cold-stun event


they recently experienced," explains Terra Throgmmorton, Gulfarium's medical and stranding coordinator. "Kemp's Ridleys are the most endangered species of sea turtle in the world. So, anything that we can do to try to conserve this precious species is vital. We are so thankful for everyone involved who has helped us to provide the best possible veterinary care for these turtles."

This new year is bringing different things to each of us. I want to share this with you, because it's important for us to be informed and aware. There are professionals fighting for what's right and for us.

One such professional is Jay Bhattacharya, a professor of medicine at Stanford University, where he received both an M.D. and Ph.D. in economics. He is also a research associate at the National Bureau of Economics Research, a senior fellow at the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research, at the Freeman Spogli Institute for Int'l Stud-

ies and director of the Stanford Center on the Demography and Economics of health and Aging. A co-author of the Great Barrington Declaration, his research has been published in economics, statistics, legal, medical, public health and health policy

Below are excerpts from "A Sensible and Compassionate Anti-Covid Strategy," (a publication of Hillsdale College)

He states his goal is to first, present the facts about how deadly COVID-19 actually is; second, to present the facts about who is at risk from COVID; third, to present some facts about how deadly the widespread lockdowns have been; and fourth, to recommend a shift in public policy. This article can be found in its entirety at HILLSDALE.EDU. I have taken a few core thoughts from this article. My hope is that it sparks within us the courage to take control of our lives and a curiosity to search for the truth.

We need to distinguish

COVID cases from COVID infections. Today the fatality rate of COVID is known to be less than one half of one percent.

But the effects on health, beginning with the U.N., estimate that 130 million additional people will starve this year as a result of the economic damage from the lockdowns. Case fatality rate is computed by dividing the number of deaths by the total number of confirmed cases. However, to obtain an accurate COVID fatality rate, the number in the denominator should be the number of people who have been infected-rather than the number of confirmed cases.

Seroprevalence studies (82 studies worldwide) show the fatality rate is closer to 0.2 percent. In New York it was more like .5 percent and in Idaho it was 0.13

In the early days, the health care system managed COVID poorly. At risk: people who are 70 and older. Their mortality rate is about four percent. The fact is that for young children, this disease is less dangerous than the seasonal flu.

This year in the U.S., more children have died from the seasonal flu than from COVID by a factor of two or three. Herd immunity is not a strategy, it is a biological fact.

Coming from both the left and right, and around the world, we have devoted our careers to protecting people. Current lockdown policies are producing a devastating effect on short and long-term public health.

We know that vulnerability to death from COVID-19 is more than a thousand-fold higher in the old and infirm that the

When scientists have spoken up against the lockdown policy, there has been enormous pushback: "You're endangering lives." Science cannot operate in an environment like that. I don't know all the answers to COVID; no one does. Science ought to be able to clarify the answers.

But science can't do its job in an environment where anyone who challenges the status quo gets shut down or cancelled.

To date, the GREAT BAR-RINGTON DECLARATION has been signed by over 43,000 medical and public health scientists and medical practitioners. Members of the general public can also sign the Declaration. Together, I think we can get on the other side of this pandemic. But we have to fight back. We should respond to the COVID virus rationally: protect the vulnerable, treat the people who get infected compassionately, and develop a vaccine.

# FWBMC Provides Monoclonal Antibody Therapy to Treat COVID-19

Fort Walton Beach Medical Center is now offering bamlanivimab antibody infusions to non-hospitalized patients who have tested positive for COVID-19 and have other high-risk factors. The first patient received the treatment on December 22. Fort Walton

Beach Medical Center is the only hospital in the tri-county area offering this antibody infusion.

The U.S. Food & Drug Administration (FDA) granted Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) of bamlanivimab for the treatment of COVID-19

patients experiencing mild to moderate symptoms who are high risk to develop severe COVID-19. Fort Walton Beach Medical Center will provide the outpatient IV treatment for adults and adolescents age 12 and older.

High-risk conditions that

may be eligible for this treatment include:


- Obesity

- COPD



For strength gains, try traditional weight-lifting mixed with Pilates or Yoga. Or add circuit training to mix things up. Each modality has certain benefits. So, by changing those around you receive the benefits from all. Cross-training will also keep your workouts more inter-

Strength Training: Gaining strength is important at all levels of life, but definitely as we get older and more sedentary. Strength training, done properly, has amazing benefits on your balance, metabolism and quality of life. When weight training, the main thing is to keep your movements very controlled. The heavier the weight you are lifting, the slower your movements should be. When you move too quickly lifting weights, your joints will suffer. I want to see that I used those resources to give to people and causes I value. Some of the people and causes I value are my church, Caring & Sharing of South Walton and Compassion International.

Take steps to make your story real. If I'm going to look back and see that I gave generously this year, I'm going to: set up auto-giving for my top 3 valued organizations, set up a specific auto-transfer savings account designated for generous

giving, set up regular monthly volunteer hours.

Read and edit your sto**ry** as you go. Check in monthly on your story and determine if you're living into the story you want to be true at the end of the year. Be gracious with yourself, determine where you're struggling, and make edits when needed. For example: I planned to auto-give to 3 organizations but I had a financial change. and the communities we serve with the latest treatments in the fight against COVID-19 and are excited to bring this option to the tri-county area," said Dr. Bob Kiskaddon, chief medical officer for Fort Walton Beach Medical Center. "We will support all of our local hospitals in working closely with physicians and other providers across the communities we serve to provide treatment to patients who may benefit, per FDA guidelines."

The medication supply is limited and based on availability. Patients will need a physician referral and meet FDA criteria prior to scheduling. The treatment is a one-time intravenous infusion over the course of one hour followed by an hour of monitoring. Scheduling for patients who meet the criteria can be made by calling Emerald Coast Infectious Disease at 850-862-3979.

Bamlanivimab is not authorized for use for patients who:

- · Are hospitalized due to COVID-19
  - Require oxygen therapy

due to COVID-19

• Require supplemental oxygen for other conditions and require an increase in their oxygen requirement.

Meanwhile, the guy who sings from memory all eight verses of Allan Sherman's masterpiece, "Hello Mudda, Hello Fadduh," gets booed off the stage. I ask you, is this fair?

Something else unfair? The price of automotive tires. I bought new truck tires a few days ago and they cost as much as a three-bedroom rambler. I remember buying secondhand

tires when I was a younger man for \$19 apiece from "Al's Used Tire Barn." Al even threw in a complimentary emergency flare gun.

You know what else really sucks? Body pain. I had spinal surgery when I was in my mid-20s; nobody ever tells you how quickly chronic pain can ruin your life. And here's the worst part: chronic pain affects about 50 million Americans. That's roughly the population of eight U.S. states. How's that for unfair?

While we're on a roll, here's another. Last night, 390 million people went to bed hungry. Starving actually. And in your own national backyard, 11 million kids live with empty pantries.

I once knew a couple of kids in my town who grew up in "food insecure" households. One of them was in such brittle health he died from pneumonia.

Starvation, in case you're wondering, happens like this: Your body starts eating its own muscular tissue in a last-ditch effort to fuel your brain. But after a while it's no use. Without calories, your cells can't fight off viruses and bacteria, so your body gives up. Your belly bloats, your skin starts flaking away. Your teeth fall out.

Whenever you have a bad day, think about this: Yesterday, 25,000 people died from hunger. Many were kids.

And hunger is preventable. What about things like cancer? Each year this disease kills 600,000, which equates to 69 people per hour. Or what about heart disease? Or COVID? Or diabetes?

Listen, I'm not trying to make you feel bad. I promise. Quite the contrary, I'm agreeing with you. Because, yes, this world is unfair. But this life shows no prejudice with its unfairness. Almost everyone is going through their own private hell right now.

Still, there is a tiny bright side to this pandemic mess. And I have been saving this part for last

Back in the 1930s when the economy tanked and jobs were a myth, when the country fell into a Great Depression, people could have given up, moped around, and bitterly complained. But do you know what many Americans did instead?

They went dancing.

Yes. In a time when life expectancy was plummeting, and hunger was going up, and suicide was on a sharp rise, folks made their own fun. They started dancing like their pants were on fire. Towns threw big, fun bashes that would've made your prom look like a routine colonoscopy.

There were all-night dance contests in nearly every backwater, township, and major city across the nation. And when people couldn't find any local dances, they threw parties of their own, scuffing up the floors in Mama's living room.

Radio stations from Maine to California were broadcasting non-stop "musical dance hours." Parents would waltz, brothers and sisters would foxtrot, Aunt Lucille and Uncle Ray Ray would two-step like lovebirds.

Radio ownership in the Depression skyrocketed. Which almost makes no logical sense when you think about it. But that's what happened. Over 80 percent of U.S. homes owned radios by 1939. Dance music was, literally, everywhere.

This reminds me of my grandfather, who lived through the Depression. Like you, he didn't get a prom, either. He dropped out of high school when his father died. He started doing a man's work as a teenager. His brother got polio, his mother gave piano lessons to earn enough for supper.

And yet he danced. I have a picture of my baby-faced grand-father holding my brunette grandmother. The photograph was taken in some dancehall. They're both on the pinewood floor, smiling wildly like two film stars.

They were about your age in this photo. And do you know what? They don't look sad. In fact you'd never guess the world was crumbling by the looks on their faces. They appear downright hopeful.

These were two people who knew hunger. Two people who had occasionally gone barefoot. And yet they went dancing multiple times per week.

So I know this has been a tough year, and I'm on your side here. In fact, I'm just like you. Which is why I pray our mouths may never mistakenly claim that we have "nothing to look forward to."

Because you and I really oughta count our blessings.







# A Pastor's Ponderings: Have a Joy-filled New Year

My mother says I was born 40 years old, a quiet and serious child. Expressing emotions has always been difficult. So, I have to work at showing love. When I became a Christian, I considered my sober demeanor to be a godly, sort of a gift from our puritan ancestors. But as I ponder Luke 10:17-23, I am struck by the raw emotional joy Jesus demonstrates toward His Father in front of the men.

Jesus sent out 70 disciples into the surrounding villages to proclaim the kingdom of God and prepare them for His coming. In Luke 10:17 (NKJV) we pick up the story: The 70 returned with "joy" saying, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us in Your name." The disciples "joy" comes from the Greek word "chara" and means cheerfulness or calm delight. Thrilled that Christ used them to help people, they bristled with newfound confidence. There is nothing like the rush of helping people encounter God.

Christ joins the joy-party: "I saw Satan fall like lightning from heaven" (Luke 10:18, NIV). People who declare God's kingdom message defeat the devil and give joy to the King. Jesus rejoiced with them. He also reminded them that it was more important their names are written in heaven. All believers in Christ possess this basis for joy as there is no greater miracle than your salvation.

But Jesus demonstrates a better joy. As the disciples share their victories, Jesus turns toward His Father and erupts in



prayer, "full of joy through the Holy Spirit." In this instance, the word translated "joy" is derived from the Greek word "agalliao" meaning to jump for joy, exult, to be exceedingly glad. Unrestrained and unashamed, Christ leaped with exuberance. I think He rejoiced more in the success of others and He poured that joy out toward Father God.

Most people are skeptical of emotional religion. They view it as unseemly to exhibit such private feelings publicly. Yet, Jesus lets us see His inner humanness with a natural display of His feelings. He is perfectly at home in His skin and secure in His masculinity. These are the kinds of feelings that wives long for from their husbands and that children need to see from their parents—emotions expressed openly in a healthy way.

When I was in Bible College, I had a dream of a little boy about age five running in a tranquil place. It was beautiful and serene with a clear blue sky. As the boy ran faster and faster, the wind seemed to blow through his hair, and I perceived that he was well-groomed, as if he had just come from the barbershop. The boy was so happy running

unrestrained, feeling clean, free of worry, and playful as little boys should be. Then I realized the boy was me. It was apparent I was running toward an immense billowy cloud and as I approached it I leaped with abandon into the mist. I felt utterly surrounded and embraced by God's presence. Liquid love and pure acceptance overwhelmed me. The Lord received me and gave me laugh-out-loud joy.

God the Father joins with Jesus in revealing His delight in His children. You are His child and His joy. I pray that you leap with the joy of the Lord in 2021. Happy-joy-filled New Year.

I learned a very valuable lesson about integrity and fulfilling my commitments.

We live in a different world now than the one I grew up in. I see a big difference in how people view commitments today. Very few people stay committed to their marriage anymore. There are some marriages that need to end for the protection of those involved, but so many more end just because one or both don't feel their needs are being met or that they no longer love each other.

Few people work in the same company for more than a couple of years. I remember a time when people would stay with a company their whole lives. Companies don't commit to their employees anymore either. Today companies down size, right size, terminate people and hire people with more concern regarding the bottom line of the company than the well-being of the employee.

People hop from relationship to relationship, from church to church, from job to job, from cause to cause from activity to activity. Commitments today, seem to be linked more to emotions or desires, than to convictions and integrity. It is important to take time to think and understand what a commitment requires before making it. It is also important not to over commit knowing that you can't possibly fulfill all of your commitments. Since making a commitment is to give your word, then not fulfilling that commitment affects your integrity. I've often heard it said that it takes a long time to develop a reputation of integrity but only one action to destroy it.

We may not think breaking a commitment really matters, but people are watching. We rarely do anything in life that only affects us. Realize that integrity and character take a lifetime to build but only a moment to lose.

Understand that commitment has nothing to do with what you would rather do or how you are feeling at the moment but with what you have said you will or will not do.

### **Be Intentional:**

Make every effort to fulfill any commitment you make. There are always extenuating circumstances, but those should be the exception, not the rule.

Make sure your convictions and your commitments match up.

Teach your children what it means to fulfill their commitments. Lead by example.

Don't over commit, because when you do, you are less likely to fulfill all of your commitments.

Thrives Through an "Unprecedented" Year

Most of us know the Destin Library has many useful services available to patrons through its websites and free mobile applications. Now, the library also has a video series to help you learn how to get the most out of these services: Answers with Amy! Twice a month, tune in to the Destin Library's Facebook page or their website (www.cityofdestin.com/ library) for new short, informative videos on how to do everything from place a book on hold to registering for a challenge on the Beanstack app.

That's just one of the many ways the Destin Library has been innovative this past year. The Destin Library strives to be a vital cornerstone of the Destin community. 2020 at the Library started with a new face and some new services. Laura Harris joined the team as the Youth Services Librarian and has created a new early reader collection. Also new this year is free

notary services provided by Kitti Capps, circulation supervisor. The Library added a fax line for faxing services and wireless printing. Two new scanners were purchased for the media lab. These scanners are very popular with genealogy patrons who wish to scan old family memorabilia. The book scanner can scan old maps, bibles and other larger items that cannot be copied on a traditional copier.

In December, the Library held its annual Food for fines drive to benefit Harvest House. The staff collected \$312 in nonperishable food items and cash donations.

Spring of 2020 brought in many challenges with the COVID-19 pandemic. The Library closed to the public in March of 2020 to help curb the spread of the virus, reopened with limited services, and then closed again at the beginning of July. Library staff has learned to be flexible and creative to serve our community and follow the CDC guidelines to prevent the spread of COVID-19. The Library offers curbside pickup service along with an online form for patrons to request "grab bags" for a variety of materials. The staff has created digital story times and other programs of interest on its webpage or Facebook page. A daily cleaning and sanitizing regiment



was implemented for frequently touched surfaces along with wearing masks. Quarantining of library materials and cleaning of book covers was implemented to help reduce the risk of viruses that may have been on items returned from patrons.

The Library's annual Summer

Reading Program was moved to a digital platform called Beanstack. Beanstack allowed participants to keep track of their summer reading progress by downloading the Beanstack app to a smartphone and entering their reading minutes into the app. Children earned prizes and badges for reading and completing their reading challenges. The Rotary Club of Destin sponsored the program again this year where 237 children and adults were registered for the

Summer Program, and 138,719 minutes of reading were logged into the Beanstack app. A total of 247 people tuned into digital performances during the summer.
