And Sinfonia Gulf Coast is Just Getting Started

What's in a name?

Well, in Latin, "Sinfonia" means a group of musicians, which local founder, Artistic and Music Director Demetrius Fuller says is how Sinfonia Gulf Coast got its clever moniker. "I wanted Sinfonia to represent any group of musicians, not just a full orchestra, so we can remain versatile in what we present."

Our locals love a local story.

Demetrius grew up in the area and attended Fort Walton Beach High School, where the strong history of music programs and his very supportive parents inspired him at a young age to make music his career. He went on to study at the University of Cincinnati's prestigious College Conservatory of Music, where he received his Bachelor and Master of Music degrees and then went on to post graduate work in Geneva, Switzerland



with additional training in Italy, France and Estonia. From 2005-2007, he was visiting professor and guest conductor at the Festival of Music in Poços de Caldas, Brazil, and was selected to conduct the Unity Academy Orchestra in Erbil, Northern Iraq.

He could've settled anywhere with this extensive background. But Demetrius had a passion to bring the musical arts back to his hometown and our local region and knew he could do it in a way that nobody else had done before. "I wanted to create

Sinfonia so that our community would have its own professional, stand-alone organization dedicated to all genres of music and could provide access to music education for

Coach Green Brings College, Pro Background to DHS Football Program

Ernest Green III's life has been football. The Fort Walton Beach native was a star wide receiver on the gridiron with Fort Walton Beach High School, where he led the Vikings to an undefeated season and a No. 2 national ranking by USA Today en route to the Florida AAAA state football championship in 1991. After high school, he played football for Florida State, finishing his college career as the Seminoles' all-

the region's school districts," said Demetrius.

From Sinfonia Gulf Coast's inception in 2005, the organization has provided countless unforgettable concerts that Northwest Floridians may have otherwise never had the opportunity to attend. Among several industry A-listers that have performed with Sinfonia, some very recognizable names include Vanessa Williams, Kristin Chenoweth, Matthew Morrison, Patti LuPone, Roberta Flack, Mary Wilson and Jane Lynch. With Demetrius' go-big or go-home mentality, it's no surprise that he chose to bring the talented Bernadette Peters into town for Sinfonia's first major event back in 2006. That was the hook; that's what turned



heads and accelerated Sinfonia's reputation as a fully professional orchestra and entertainment organization in our area.

Making a mark has never been an issue for Demetrius as he lives and breathes his craft. His drive to foster a love of music in the next generation is why Sinfonia took over the management of the region's only youth

orchestra in 2013, when then director Liz Aylor determined it needed a larger support base.



Since then, the youth orchestra program, along with its many branches, has grown exponentially. Now under the direction of Conductor Aaron King Vaughn, the Sinfonia Youth Orchestra is thriving with opportunities to perform alongside professional musicians regularly.



Just this year, a first of its kind after-school violin program was born by Aaron at Destin Elementary school. It has been a success, which has fueled his goal to expand into more schools across the districts. "The

time leader in receiving touchdowns with 29. His 182 total points, still stands at 13th on the all-time scoring list at Florida State.

A third-round NFL draft choice, Coach Green made 54 catches for 665 vards and two touchdowns. And now, he faces a new challenge – head coach of the fledgling Destin High School football team. He relishes the opportunity. "We're going to have tough, hard-nosed, disciplined kids," Coach Green said. "We have a lot of skill and talent, just not a lot of big guys." So far, the team, which opens play Sept. 2, has 35 players, but 'we still have some kids in the building who've played before," Coach Green said.

Coach Green is no stranger to coaching, having done so at Tampa Freedom High School, American Heritage High School in Plantation, and IMG Academy, Bradenton, where he was assistant head coach. This



will be his first time in charge of the entire operation.

One advantage he'll have is he doesn't have to live up to the reputation of a predecessor. "When you're coming in cold, it's a mad rush," Coach Green said. "You really get only one chance. It's like a painting. They might know of me, but they don't know me."

He said he tends to be offense-minded. "I like to throw the football," he said. "Ideally, on both sides of the ball, we'll be fast, physical and (ticked) off."

With Coach Green, the apple

didn't fall far from the tree. His father, Ernest Green Jr., a math teacher and coach with Fort Walton Beach High School, coached defensive backs and receivers to win the 1991 Florida State 4A Football Championship.

A high school coach ideally is not a taskmaster, a philosophy embraced by Coach Green. "I told the kids we're teachers first. We're not here to cuss the kids. I enjoy teaching the game. I love the game. It's been very good to me. You can get paid a king's ransom to play a child's game."

Currently, Coach Green and his wife, Michelle, live in Pensacola. He's looking for a closer home, but said he doesn't mind the drive each day. They have two grown children, Isaac and Will, and Dominic, age 12.

Coach Green's background has gone a long way to prepare him to run the Destin High School football program. But it's been a dream of his for quite a while. "This is exactly when I was 5 I saw myself doing," Coach Green, 46, said.





Annual Parking, Henderson Beach and Joe's Bayou Boat Launch Passes Available to Destin Residents

Residents who reside full-time within the incorporated area of Destin are eligible to receive up to two free Resident Annual parking passes (per household) for use in paid parking areas along Scenic Hwy. 98 in Crystal Beach, Gulf Shore Drive in Holiday Isle and the Harbor District. YOWZA! 2021. What a Year in Real Estate!

2021. Done. Caput! On to a new, exciting year! So, let's recap the Destin and Miramar Beach residential real estate market stats for 2021 compared to 2020:

In 2021 the **number of SOLD Listings was up by 23.9%** over prior year.

In 2021 the **Median Sales Price was up by 23.4%** over prior year.

In 2021 the **Number of New Listings was up by 10.6%** over prior year.

In 2021 March, April and

May had the highest number of sales.

The **Median Sales Price** was **\$549,000** in 2021 and in 2020 it was **\$448,250**. WOW!

Average Cumulative Days on Market (length of time from listing to under contract) was 63 in 2021 compared to 129 in 2020.

Average Sold to List Price was 97% in 2021 and 95% in 2020.

In 2021 **we averaged 1.94 months of inventory,** in 2020 we averaged 4.48 months of inventory. (Five months or less is considered a sellers' market; we just may be transitioning to a buyers' market.)

One Year In, Sheriff Aden's Vision is Well Under Way

Eric Aden's love affair with law enforcement goes back a long way, from his invitation to a dance by the sheriff's daughter when he was just 13 to his study of criminology at Florida State University to his current role leading Okaloosa County's Sheriff's Office.

"I was going to work for the feds," he said, "but I got a call from the sheriff (Larry Gilbert) who asked me to join the local force." That led to the Choctawhatchee High School graduate's service as a deputy from 1995 to 2003, first as a patrol deputy, then as a school resource officer and finally as a part-time deputy.

He then spent 10 years working for his brother's mortgage company, where he learned finance, which, it turned out, gave him experience in finance. That, he said, has helped him with the administrative end of his job.

But law enforcement was never far from Sheriff Aden's mind. He eventually joined the Walton County Sheriff's Office as a sergeant and later a lieutenant. He stayed there two years, but, he said, "My true desire was to come back home" to Okaloosa County. That came to fruition when he got a call from Okaloosa County Sheriff Larry Ashley, who had his eye on Aden as his successor, in 2010. He worked as a captain and a major, then as a major in a different sphere of activity so he could learn administration. "Those were all the things I wanted to know, but didn't have in my tool chest," he said.

In the spring of 2019, he finally got a taste of federal law enforcement at the 10-week FBI academy course. Then Aden was elected sheriff unopposed in 2020, succeeding the retiring Ashley. He recently completed his first year in office. "It was hard to improve" the sheriff's

office, he said, because Ashley had done an exemplary job. One thing Aden did was treat his subordinates as important members of the Sheriff's Office family.

"I take a lot of input from my employees," he said. "That helps the troops buy in." Recently, for example, he surveyed the deputies regarding their choices for a new paint scheme on their cruisers. "I'm not the one driving them," he said. "They are."

The degree of success Aden has had in applying his vision surprised him. "I had set goals for myself," he said. "The agency was able to implement all of them. I was shocked." Among his goals was boosting the ICAC – Internet Crimes Against Children – task force. Deputies arrested 22 people in a sting. "If those people see that, it scares them into their corner," Aden said.

In 2021, the Sheriff's Office solved five cold cases, one for sexual battery and four for homicides, bringing justice to the victim and the loved ones.

Recruitment is a constant need for the generally understaffed Sheriff's Office. To that end, Aden instituted a cadet program -10 weeks of paid training, followed by hiring. He tells of one potential recruit who said he would love to join the administration but couldn't afford it. Aden asked how much the man made and he said \$32,000 a year. "I said, 'I'll pay you \$38,000 a year and pay your tuition."" The sheriff is hoping to recruit more minority deputies as well.

Aden has stepped up training with a program using a huge flat screen and scenarios in which a deputy may have to come to an immediate decision. A tabletop program features four high-energy scenarios: a condominium collapse; a George Floyd situation; a bomb and a river rescue. Aden hopes to recruit some other agencies to take part in the near future.

As part of the Sheriff's Office's community outreach, Aden set up a citizen advisory board, composed of members from a wide variety of neighborhoods, occupations and lifestyles. "They tell us how we're doing and tell us when they have a problem," he said.

And the Sheriff's Office recently obtained a bloodhound puppy. It has other dogs, but Aden said they have eclectic responsibilities and, therefore, are jacks of all trades and masters of none. A bloodhound, though, has one main job and concentrates fully on it. The new puppy was a gift from the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office, whose own bloodhound had a litter. Currently, the employees are being surveyed for a name for the new addition.

One year in, Aden's administration has been a rousing success, but he's quick to pass the credit to others. "All I did was put out my vision," he said. "It was our people who made it happen. We are a family here." And he has not been without support from a variety of areas. "I just continue to thank the public and the leaders in the county for their support. We're only as good as our community."

Meet Our Hometown Hero Julie Porterfield Wants To End Child Abuse

Julie Porterfield loves children. Because of that, when she was offered the chance to be Chief Executive Officer of the planned Children's Advocacy Center 23 years ago, she jumped at the opportunity.

"I worked at the state attorney's office," she said. "I started as a receptionist and went to night school to get my bachelor's and master's degrees," studying legal administration and public administration.

It was there that she got the chance to build the CAC.

"It came out of the state attorney's office," she said. The impetus was a severe child abuse case.

The goal was to put all services helping abused children under one roof.

"I started researching grants and organizing," Julie said. "After a year, I was asked to be executive director. It seemed like a good fit. I absolutely love kids."

The CAC officially opened in

October 2000 with Julie at the helm. "We started with three employees," she said. "Now we have 23." In addition, the center has a regular roster of volunteers. But the children it serves could use more. "The center is always in need of volunteers," Julie said. "There are lots of opportunities."

A second facility, called the Pierce Family Children's Advocacy Center, opened in DeFuniak Springs in spring 2017.

The CAC has a budget of about \$2 million, Julie said, up from its original budget of about \$180,000. The money comes from grants, state funding and 60 percent from the community. "We live in a very kind, generous community," she said.

The need is great. Each year, the CAC helps between 700 and 800 children. But, Julie said,



that's probably just the tip of the iceberg. "We only see reported cases of abuse," she said. "I think there's about two thirds more out there."

In 2017, Julie said, the CAC added prevention efforts to its repertoire. A program called Child Safety Matters was begun in local schools, educating about 10,000 youngsters in 2021 from kindergarten through 12th grade. This has led to more disclosures from children about their circumstances. "They didn't know who to tell," Julie said.

"We focus on the more egregious cases," Julie said, such as sexual abuse and physical abuse. "There are a lot of online predators," she said. "With social media, it's just rampant." And the incidence of crimes

against children rose during the pandemic, as schools were no longer open. Some cases stand out due to their gruesome nature.

"Probably the worst was a girl with 90 percent of her body battered, burned and abused," Julie said. "There was a lot of evil in that case. There was no rational reason." The perpetrators, two women who were not the girl's caretakers, received 20 and 15 years in prison, respectively, sentences Julie believes were too lenient. But the good news is, the girl was adopted and is a successful adult today.

"For me, I'm doing God's work," Julie said. "What has kept me here is you see a lot of good. If something bad is going to happen to kids, we're here."

But, she adds, "It would be great to hang a 'Closed for Business' sign. Our mission is to end child abuse."

What Does it Mean to "Age-In" to Medicare?

As many times as I have said the term "age-in" to folks when discussing Medicare, it has never failed to elicit a visceral response like, "What do you mean with this age-in thing?!" or "I don't feel aged-in!."

The fact of the matter is, aging-in, meaning you are turning 65 soon, is a good thing. There are many we all know that didn't make it to that milestone. Yes, we are in the middle of the Open Enrollment Period which runs from January 1 – March 31 of every year pre-dominantly for Advantage Plan members (You can re-read my article from last month for more information about the ins and outs of that.), that does not change the fact many people have birthdays all year long and are actually aging-in during this time as well.

What generally happens is, folks get confused between what they see on TV with all the pitches about "time running out" and, what they can actually do during the aging-in period. So, let me attempt to de-mystify it a little here.

There is a period of time when a person ages-in and becomes eligible for Medicare. Typically, this period of time is three months before the month in which they turn 65 and three months after the month in which they turn 65. Do the math and you will see this is a 7-month period of time around your birthday. There are a few other exceptions to this eligibility period but, those will have to be saved for another article.

The first order of business is to obtain your Part A and B (if desired or needed) through Social Security. Without adding a litany of boring details as to qualifications for each, suffice it to say Part A is typically \$0 premium for most folks and Part B for 2022 will typically cost \$170.10 per month. The Part B premium is means tested can get a little complicated...certainly more complicated than can be described in this article. Again, suffice it to say, some could pay much more or much less, depending on your income.

If you wish to avoid LIFE-LONG penalties, you will have to have Part B and Part D (prescription coverage) in place at the time of first becoming eligible. As a reminder, eligibilities are one of those things unique to each person's circumstances. So, it is important to know how these things apply to you.

If you choose to obtain a Supplement, commonly called a "Medi-Gap" policy, you will need to also obtain a separate Part D prescription plan as the Supplements DO NOT IN-CLUDE such. If you choose to obtain an Advantage plan, the Part D prescription coverage is typically INCLUDED.

As you can see, this can and usually is a very confusing time for most folks used to have traditional insurance for their whole lives. Suddenly, you are thrust into this new system and everybody and their cousin is calling and/or mailing you every single day with their "better option." Your best option is the one that suits you best. Maybe it is a great price. Maybe it is a great network of providers. Maybe it is just the peace of mind in knowing you have someone you can rely upon for information when you need it.

If there is only one take away you can have from this article, it would be to work with someone that can help you navigate the local landscape and help you completely understand this otherwise very confusing time in life.

Body part insurance is a big deal. Famous people, actors and singers often purchase body part or body insurance.


Your insurance score can significantly influence your insurance costs. All companies today utilize 'credit-based insurance scores' that will influence the premiums quoted.

CBA and Community Preserving Waterways through Fishing Line Recycling

The Emerald Coast is home to some of the most diverse and dynamic ecosystems in the world, so abundant with marine life that it is no surprise that it attracts anglers from all over. Our waters, stretching from rivers to the Gulf, host some of the best fishing on the planet. However, this area and many other coastal towns are experiencing a common trend, tangles of forgotten fishing line harming local wildlife and humans. You can help prevent this by recycling your fishing line with Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance's (CBA), monofilament recycling program.


Monofilament — or simply fishing line — is made of a single plastic strand, designed to hold tension and stay strong in harsh saltwater conditions. First introduced in the 1950's, this type of tackle is the most common and effective line for catching fish from bluegill to blue marlin. Monofilament is designed to be strong, invisible,



and not break down in saltwater. Unfortunately, monofilament's strength and durability becomes dangerous when the line is improperly discarded.

When line is lost or littered into the water, it can become an invisible, free-floating entanglement hazard that can last upwards of 600 years. Just think of it—600 years ago, Leonardo DaVinci painted the Mona Lisa! These bunches of littered fishing line are dangerous and deadly to marine life such as turtles, dolphins, fish, birds, sharks, manatees and even scuba divers and beachgoers. When an animal becomes entangled in this strong and virtually invisible hazardous plastic, it becomes trapped and unable to move, hunt, or even breathe in many instances.

Fishing is part of our culture and history here in the Florida Panhandle; historically, the area has been one the largest Red



Harbor or the Okaloosa Island Pier. CBA will be hosting new sites on the Choctawhatchee River, as well as new shore-fishing recycle bins on the Gulf. CBA takes this plastic line from the monofilament recycling program stations, cleans and collects it, and sends it to be recycled into fishing tackle. Anyone in the community can be a part of this "responsible fishing movement." Simply by recycling undesired fishing lines, you can make a lasting impact on our waterways and greatly reduce the number of entanglements of humans and wildlife. also easily communicate with your travel companions on your cell phone and even access your stateroom. I know many are lamenting the end of the selfserve buffet and 24-hr. soft serve ice cream, but I think they will return. The good news is if you hated the buffet, you got your wish. The buffet is still there, just without the self-service. Cruise lines have always been concerned about the health of their passengers with all their "washy washy" routines, but now they have superior sanitation procedures and air ventilation.







HOF Braves Pitcher Tom Glavine to Speak at 2022 ASA Banquet!

Each February, many of the area's top high school, collegiate, amateur, professional, Special Olympics athletes, and individuals who have fostered youth activities are honored during the annual All Sports Association's (ASA) Awards Banquet. The ASA is a Northwest Florida non-profit organization whose primary mission is to help raise money for local youth-oriented non-profit organizations with an emphasis on sports programs. The annual awards banquet is used to identify, then recognize and honor some of the finest athletes from Northwest Florida who are contributing to their sports and their community.

The recognized individuals not only excel in their sports, but also are at the top in academics and community involvement.

Synonymous for attracting the likes of NFL and MLB MVPs, Hall of Fame coaches, Super Bowl quarterbacks, award-winning journalists and LPGA major champions, this year is no exception. With 164 victories during the 1990s, Glavine earned the second-highest number of wins as a pitcher in the National League, second only to teammate Greg Maddux's 176. He was a five-time 20game winner and two-time Cy Young Award winner, and one of only 24 pitchers (and just 6 left-handers) in major league history to earn 300 career wins. He was the MVP of the 1995 World Series as the Braves beat the Cleveland Indians. On January 8, 2014, he was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility, receiving 91.9% of the votes cast.

This year, the banquet returns to its roots and will be held at the Emerald Coast Convention Center on Feb. 25 from 6-9 p.m. Other events include the 2022 Buck Smith FCA Breakfast with guest speaker Willie Spears on Feb. 25 at Northwest Florida State College Arena from 7-9:15, a golf outing and fish fry.

Tugboat To Become Newest Artificial Reef

Earlier this month, Morgan Marine in Freeport was putting the finishing touches on prepping its tugboat to become the next artificial reef offshore Destin-Fort Walton Beach. The 75 ft. vessel was built back in the 1940s, and was used most recently to do a lot of Marine salvage, pulling a bunch of those derelict vessels that may be around the area. The vessel also helped sink other artificial reefs offshore. "This vessel actually belonged to Morgan Marine," said Alex Fogg, Coastal Resource Manager for Okaloosa County. "They were going through the recertification process with the Coast Guard and some of their new rules made this vessel require a lot of retrofits to bring it back into code."

According to Alex, due to the cost of those retrofits, Morgan Marine decided to donate the vessel to the county to be deployed as an artificial reef. The county is paying for the cleaning and the deployment cost, but the price of the vessel was free.

This vessel has about 40 feet of relief, and is going to be put in an area called "The Boat Yard." If that name sounds familiar, it's because two other deployments have already happened there.


The Dylan, which was deployed back in September 2020, and the Brannon, which was deployed just this past summer. "This taller vessel provides a little bit of relief to the location so that folks can do a dive maybe on the bottom, which is about 119 feet and come up to the top, which will be at about 79-80 feet," explained Alex. "It makes it a lot easier to dive and allows you to spend a little more time down there." He added that the extra relief will also provide a great location for people to go fishing. "You'll have your amberjack swimming around in the column, you'll have your snappers and your groupers on the bottom," said Alex. "It really is going to be a good site."

Because this vessel was actually constructed back in the 40s, it had to go through more screening to make sure that it was okay to go into the environment. Alex said that before the 1980s, there were PCBs and a lot of lead that was used in the paint and the wiring. "We had to test the paint to make sure that it was okay," said Alex. "We got the results back and everything is good to go. We also had to make sure that there were plenty of holes cut into the floor so that if marine life were to find their way into the vessel, they could find their way out. The holes also allow the vessel to sink at a more even rate."

Until about a year-and-ahalf ago, the Coastal Resource Team had not had very many vessel deployments. This tugboat will actually be the fourth vessel deployment that Alex and his team have done the last year-and-a-half. "We still have a few more on the books," he said. "Being able to deploy these large wrecks, it creates a unique habitat. It's not your normal concrete modules that have been deployed for many years now, and provides a great location for people to go diving and fishing too."

The Dylan:

The tourism department of Okaloosa County, in collaboration with U.S. Customs and Border Protection, sank a 61foot steel-hulled vessel named the S/V DYLAN in Sept. 2020.



In late 2019, U.S. Customs and Border Protection seized the M/V Dylan that had over 400 pounds of cocaine inside with a street value of \$7.5 million. Following seizure, the vessel was forfeited to the U.S. Government and transferred to Okaloosa County to be deployed as an artificial reef. "The U.S. Customs and Border Protection Miami Field Office is happy to continue collaborating with our state partners in transferring seized and ultimately forfeited vessels to be converted into artificial reefs. These vessels were used in attempted efforts to smuggle hard narcotics into the U.S. We recognize the significant long-term benefits of partnering on the artificial reefing projects - benefits beyond the immediate consequences of seizures for the criminal organizations, to include the positive impact on the ecosystem as well as the economy for the State of Florida and the Federal Government," said Amelia Castelli, Deputy Fines, Penalties and Forfeitures Officer, U.S. Customs and Border Protection. This was the first vessel deployed as an artificial reef since the M/V MONICA LEE was intentionally sunk in 2011. This reef site not only provides a habitat for commercial and recreationally important species of fish that are commonly targeted by local and visiting anglers, but also offers an interesting site for SCU-BA divers.

The S/V DYLAN was cleaned and modified to be environmentally friendly. Due to its relatively small size, additional similar-sized vessels will be deployed nearby, adding to the reef site's complexity and creating an underwater "boatyard."

"It is exciting to see a vessel deployment off our coast. This was the first of many vessels that are in line to be sunk in the coming years and will complement the hundreds of artificial reefs that have been deployed over the last couple of years," said Alex.

The Brannon:

In 2020, Okaloosa County was contacted by the Brannon Family out of Freeport who wanted to donate a 65 ft. experimental military "fast response" catamaran for use as an artificial reef.

The catamaran was originally purchased in Maine and transported by trailer to Freeport where it sat for more than 20 years.

According to Alex, the origi-

nal plan was to retrofit the vessel and use it as a house boat or other semi-permanent living quarters. However, the vessel retrofit was never started and the vessel was never placed in the water or ran. Because the vessel was never named, it was eventually given the working name of the BRANNON in honor of Mr. Ronnie Brannon, who passed away in 2021.

The BRANNON was deployed approximately 16.43 nm SE of Destin Pass in the Okaloosa County Large Area Artificial Reef Site A (LAARS A). This is the exact location where The DYLAN was deployed.

According to Alex, due to the relatively small size of the BRANNON (65 ft.), it was secured to the DYLAN for "increased stability and to provide additional complexity to the site.'

"We had a pretty stagnant artificial reef program until a few years ago," said Alex. "When we deployed the DYLAN, the project got a lot of attention and an increased interest in what we are doing. Since then, people have been lining up to donate vessels to the county. It is always exciting to see a vessel deployment off our coast."

Okaloosa County's artificial reef program provides excellent sites for fishing, diving, exploring and snorkeling activities that are easily accessible. Our area's artificial reefs consist of anything from concrete piles to specifically designed modules to these mentioned in this article. With Destin-Fort Walton Beach being home to the nation's largest charter fishing fleet, it's no wonder we have one of the most active artificial reef programs in the nation. Off the Hook: Black Drum Fishing

If you've wandered around any dock inside the Destin Harbor, you might have looked down to see some very large fish swimming below and wondering what kind they were. Often referred to as the "Big Ugly" by fishermen around the area, these monster fish are Black Drum.

Black Drum are a cousin to

the Red Drum and are a popular fish among anglers, because they will eat both live and dead bait. They typically feast on oysters, crabs, shrimp and small bait fish and are often circling docks to eat the crustaceans off the sides of the pilings. Another name for these fish is the "lazy fish," for their tendency to feed on dead bait more frequently than Red Drum will.

When the weather is warm,



you'll often find them on top of the water, making it easy to sight the fish, or throw a fly at them if you're a fly fisherman.

Black Drum can surpass the 50 lb. range, and while they are edible, their flesh becomes coarser and less desirable once they surpass lengths of 30 inches. Slot size for a keeper is 14-24" and you are able to keep five per day. When they are too large and pass the slot size, they have an old prehistoric look to them and can be full of worms, so not ideal for the dinner plate.

In terms of a fight, Black Drum are strong and solid, but not as determined as other fish. Often, they will run towards the dock and, if you're not careful, you might break the line when it hits the pilings. While you may not want to eat the large ones, catching one is still a great fight and should be on your bucket list while visiting Destin. a dock or call up one of our local Charter Captains to take you out and get it done.

You Made a Resolution, Now Stick With It!

Consider these suggestions to get the best out of your workouts and keep you interested.

Structure your workouts to fit your goals: A gymnast doesn't train like a football player, and a tennis player doesn't train like a basketball player. Why? Because in order to perform better at each sport, it takes specific movements and strengths, in specific areas, to make one stronger for each sport. How does this equate to you? You are unique. From your bone structure, genetics, chemical make-up (hormones/immunity) and body type. It's great to get ideas from others, but make sure it will benefit you personally. When I train my small groups of two to six people, even if they do somewhat the same order of exercises, not all lift the same weight or perform the same reps. Some people want a more muscular build; some want long lean smoother muscles; some need to focus on fat burning. Figure out your goals at the beginning of your quest and it will give you direction and keep you more motivated.

Mix it up: In order to customize your workout journey, tailor it to fit your goals and make it enjoyable. Your body needs to be challenged to change. Do something called "Phase Training." Briefly, a phase training plan manipulates exercise volumes and intensities over the course of weeks, months and years. Change your range of repetitions, how many sets, as well as the exercises themselves. It's suggested, though, that in order for a muscle to get stronger or more toned, it needs time to adapt and change. Therefore, we need to have some time repeating a movement for this muscle adaptation to occur. A good example is the push-up. When you first begin doing pushups, you might

be lucky to do five good ones. But if you do push-ups more often, you will increase the number of push-ups you can do. This is most important when looking for strength gains, but also for coordination. So, a simplified example of Phase Training for overall fitness would be:

Weeks 1-4: Endurance Phase/high repetitions 13-20/2-3 sets 3-4 days/week focusing on mobility, stability and form

Weeks 5-8: Strength Phase/ moderate repetitions 8-12/2-6 sets 3-4 days/week focusing on lean muscle mass and gaining strong muscles (not bulky). Strong is GOOD!

Cycle through these phases all year.

Other additions to keep it interesting are Circuit Training, HIIT (High Intensity Interval Training) or other types of interval training. Again, depends on your goals.

Slow down: For strength and safety purposes, perform your repetitions SLOWLY. The slower you go, the more muscle fibers you recruit, thus maximizing strength gains and less joint or ligament damage. There are times that you want to move faster like in Circuits or Interval Training. But the key to "faster" is stay in control and in good form. It's best to sometimes work as fast as you can, but while performing full range of motion (ROM) with full control. If you can't perform full ROM with full control, then you are too fast or too heavy. That makes speed relative to controlled performance. When lifting weights there is a positive and negative motion. When performing a bicep curl, you start with your arm relatively straight; but when you raise or curl the weight, flexing the elbow, it is the positive part of the lift. The lowering of the weight or extension of the elbow, is the negative. You always want to control and go slowly on the negative: this is where "resistance" training gets its name. It's the control of resisting the weight that challenges the muscle and makes the greatest difference

Be Active – choose what you like! Any and all movement is good. Don't overthink it. Dance if it makes you happy! Guess what? You will be working out! Weight Loss and Thyroid

In this column, we've discussed the thyroid before. However, it's such an important subject, because even mild thyroid dysfunction can cause weight gain over months and years. And this weight gain is nearly impossible to lose and keep off without getting the thyroid optimized.

The thyroid regulates every metabolic process in our body. This includes growing hair and fingernails, moisturizing your skin for less dryness and a better appearance. It also means keeping our toes warm, and our brains focused and working.



educational program mirroring the original, multi-week events which took place in DeFuniak Springs between 1885 and 1927. "With the help of Destin city park and rec staff, local

volunteers and Thomas Hicks nursery, this event was a huge success," said Bobby.

Recently, in Destin, Trees on the Coast also planted \$3,000 worth of trees-17 live oaks (7-8 ft.)-at Kell-Aire Nature Walk park (community of Airport Road) and at the Destin Dog Park on Commons Drive.

In addition to its tree-planting mission, Trees on the Coast has taken on a project to certify Okaloosa County as a Community Wildlife HabitatTM. What does R-value mean? R-value measures insulation's resistance to heat flow. It can also be referred to as "thermal resistance." The higher the R-value, the greater the insulating power. All materials having the same R-value, regardless of type, thickness or weight are equal in insulating power. Don't forget that R-values are determined by material type, thickness and installed weight per square foot, not by thickness alone. Insulation helps keep your home cool during the summer months and warm during the winter months.

How much will I save by adding insulation to the walls, ceilings and floors of my home? Insulation saves money, increases your home's comfort and protects the environment by reducing energy use. According to the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), typically 44% of a homeowner's utility bill goes for heating and cooling costs. DOE also states that homeowners may be able to reduce their energy bills from 10% to 50% by taking certain steps. One of the major steps is increasing the amount of thermal insulation in their existing homes or purchasing additional insulation when buying new homes. Unless your home was constructed with special attention to energy efficiency, adding

insulation will reduce your utility bills. The amount of energy you conserve will depend on several factors: climate, size, shape and construction of your house, your living habits, the type and efficiency of the heating and cooling systems and the fuel you use. Energy conserved is money saved and the annual savings increase when utility rates go up, which many of us are experiencing. Insulation upgrades also instantly adds value to your home and is a great investment.

How much insulation should I have? "Insulation," says Bob Vila, host of the nationally syndicated TV program that bears his name, is the most efficient energy-saving expenditure. Vila says homeowners should check attics to determine the amount of insulation already installed. Most homes built before 1980 have inadequate insulation, noting that if insulation between the joists of the attic floor comes only to the top of the joist, it probably makes sense to install more insulation. The U.S. Department of Energy recommends home insulation for our area to be R-30, which is 11.5 inches of blow in fiberglass insulation

What words should I watch out for in contracts or job estimates? Once you have chosen an insulation contractor, make sure the contract includes the

job specification, cost and warranty information. The contract should list the type of insulation to be used and where it will be used. Make sure that each type of insulation is listed by R-value. Beware of any contract or verbal offering that quotes the job in terms of thickness only (e.g. "14 inches of insulation"). Remember, it is the R-value, not the thickness that tells how well a material insulates. Avoid contracts with vague language such as R-values with the terms "plus or minus"; "+ or -"; "average"; or "nominal."

Is there anything other than insulation to increase comfort and efficiency? There are several innovated materials in the market which are not widely used by most insulation contractors. ERG window film is a smart tint material which can be applied to glass and is virtually clear. This film blocks 94% of radiant heat and 99.9% of UV rays protecting floors, furniture, you and pets from the damaging sun's UV. Some common applications would be any room with direct sunlight; sunrooms, offices are great areas to add ERG film. Another great product is Radiant Barrier which is a reflective material installed in attic spaces which blocks 97% of radiant heat reducing your overall attic temperature by 40 to 50 degrees

in the summer. By reducing your attic's heat signature, you increase your comfort and your insulation and HVAC systems work less, saving you money and extending the life of HVAC systems. Radiant Barrier systems should be installed on rafters, just under your roof line and should not be installed lying on top of your insulation.

There are many ways to save energy and become more energy efficient. We all are spending more time at home which is a

great time to learn how to increase comfort and lower those energy bills.

Five Themes for Investors to Explore in 2022

As we are now into a whole new year, the more things change, the more they stay the same: The Covid virus is still with us, the money supply is still at historically high levels, rates remain low, housing remains strong. Unemployment is now at pre-Covid levels. Some things are not the same: Inflation is at its strongest in two generations, there are more jobs than job seekers, the employment rate (percent of eligible Americans working) is at an all-time low. Savings rates are higher, U.S. household net worth (as reported by Josh Brown and CNBC) is at an all-time high of \$130 trillion. In generations past, that net worth was mainly

comprised of home value and pensions. Today over a third of that is in stock holdings, pensions are no longer a significant source, and housing maintains its influence on people's overall net worth. Something to ponder when fretting about national debt levels: household net worth is more than four times the national debt. And overall national wealth (the value that all governments hold) is around 10 times greater than the national debt. That is not to say that the current elevated levels of debt are not challenging to economic growth and sustainability - considering debt to GDP is at over 100%, the highest since 1946 but still worth noting that overall wealth far exceeds overall debt.

Here are some themes for investors to ponder and explore for 2022. We provide five in this edition of Research and Commentary from The First Wealth Management. As the world evolves and changes, investors can take note of innovations and disruptions and explore potential opportunities for their future investments.

Electrical Vehicle (EV) **Batteries** – It is interesting to note that there will need to be

considerable increase in the supply of EV batteries to come anywhere near the projections for new EV sales by 2030. Note that in 2022 in the U.S., EV sales might reach 5% of vehicles sold, a relatively small percentage. Still, ABC News reports there were 15mm cars sold in the U.S. in 2021 and if EV sales are to make up 5% in 2022, that means 750k batteries are needed. The supply of batteries is dependent upon the mining and development of lithium and cobalt and rare earth minerals and somewhat in the recycling of existing phones and laptops. Although the U.S. is a leader in the natural resources needed, it is a laggard when it comes to mining and production. It could take years for supply to meet the demand. The takeaway for investors is to look at those stocks and funds that concentrate on exploration, mining and producing minerals such as cobalt, lithium, copper, nickel, manganese and zinc and rare earth minerals. Investors might want to consider some of the emerging (some of them or still private) companies that recycle batteries and sell them to

electric vehicle manufacturers. Infrastructure. With billions being set aside for everything from roads and bridges to the electric grid and recharge stations, materials and materials producers, as well as industrial construction firms, could stand to gain significant new business opportunities. Copper might very well be one basic metal whose demand could grow at an increasing rate. There are numerous firms and funds that investors could consider in order to participate in these areas.

Quantum Computing. Simply put, quantum computing execution means that computers could run and produce at rates exponential to today's rates. It is important to note that major technology firms are investing a lot in this technology, but it is too early to experience any revenues. Ari Zoldan, the CEO of Quantum Media Group, wrote recently that the quantum computing market is "valued at \$0.5 billion and is expected to grow to \$65 billion by 2030, indicating a compound annual growth rate (CAGR) of 56%.

Carbon Sequestration. There may be economic and investment opportunities to consider here. The U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) defines carbon sequestration as the process of capturing and storing atmospheric carbon dioxide. It is done naturally (biologically) by plants, trees and oceans. Plants need CO2 as part of the photosynthesis process. When areas of the world are "deforested" (to grow other crops or clear for development), we are in a sense decreasing the number of carbon sinks in the world. It is also done by Geologic carbon sequestration, which is the process of storing carbon dioxide (CO2) in underground geologic formations. Some of this is done in oil and gas extraction. The oil is forced out of the reservoir through the injection of CO2 (which takes the place of the removed oil and remains there forever). Some firms are also developing technology that removes carbon from the atmosphere and then injects it below the earth's surface and charges storage fees. Many major oil and gas firms, in addition to green tech companies, are rapidly pursuing this. Carbon capture and sequestration (CCS) is also part of coal burning energy producers.

PBS suggested that three keys would be 1) Increasing plants and forests, as plants and trees use carbon dioxide as part of the photosynthesis process. Forests act as lungs (as do oceans) and sequester the carbon emissions that are produced. The problem is that while deforestation is finally declining, reforestation is declining too. 2) Construction of carbon sequestration plants. These are facilities that capture carbon in the air and pump it underground. 3) Food consumption. PBS points out that if people threw away less food, which could significantly reduce carbon emissions as well.

The takeaways for investors: Consider opportunities to invest in forestry companies. Most new trees planted each year are by forestry companies. While the rate of deforestation is slowly declining, there is yet to be a commensurate increase in reforestation. Regarding CCS, there are firms pouring billions into new technology to capture and often sell the carbon. According to CNBC, Arizona State University has reported that its

research shows that automated CCS can be thousands of times more efficient in removing carbon from the atmosphere. It is early with this technology, but some major oil and gas firms are putting billions into technology that could produce significant carbon capture each year as early as 2030 and to double that by 2040.

Energy & Energy tran**sition.** We think this is still an area that investors should continue to consider. There are ETFs that invest in wind, solar, nuclear, clean and, of course, traditional energy firms, such as oil and gas. The aforementioned PBS story pointed out that the demand and consumption of fossil fuels should be addressed, but also acknowledged that it continues to grow. As demand is growing however, a report from Rystad Energy says, "the oil and gas industry will deliver its worst exploration year since 1946... production budgets are not returning to pre-Covid levels and probably never will." A classic case where supply cannot meet the demand.

We last reported that the European Union was set on reducing carbon emissions to net zero sooner than later and with strict targets as early as 2030. This has had an added impact on natural gas supplies, which is already constrained. The New York Times reported that now there is a proposal before the European Union, by the European Commission, to make certain natural gas and nuclear electricity plants be considered either green or transition to green energy producers. That could have a significant impact, according to The Times, on new investment into these types of facilities. Despite the huge gains being made by wind and solar, in that order, the investment and production in those technologies would not be able to meet the ever-growing demand. Many traditional energy producers are making significant investments in wind and solar but also natural gas as well. As for nuclear, we take note that nuclear plants (which produce electricity) produce zero carbon emissions. The EC proposal points out its support for nuclear is only for those facilities that

l. to tear; mangle; rip. Example: "Hey dude, that poem you wrote really freakin' lacerated." My wife saved all my crummy poems in a shoebox, and today they reside in a storage closet.

Anyway, when we first married, we lived in an apartment that smelled like dead squirrels. I am not being figurative. I mean our apartment actually had a nest of decomposing squirrels in the attic above our master bedroom.

The place was tiny, and about as ugly as homemade soap. The tenant before us had painted the walls black and greenish-gray. Sherwin Williams officially titled this color "Seasick Granite®."

When we moved in, we made the place our own. We painted the walls brown and khaki. We bought a used coffee table and some scented candles.

My friend, Chubbs, found an old console television on the side of the road. I was lucky enough to claim the TV before the garbage man came.

The thing was heavier than a dead preacher, but we got it up the stairs. Chubbs, however, would suffer from severe disc degenerative problems for the rest of his life.

Our building sat across the street from a Waffle House, a Chick-fil-A, and an ice cream shop. And this is why we gained nearly fifty pounds within our first year of marriage.

We never went to the movies because we didn't have the money. We ate Hamburger Helper without hamburger sometimes. We saved our cash for a new



window unit AC—our air conditioner was on the fritz. The thing would only work on days of the week beginning with "R."

On weekends, every weekend, we ate donuts. It was our simple ritual, and I loved it. Krispy Kreme was only a stone's throw from us, and when the hot-and-ready light would glow, by God, we were there.

Over donuts, we would talk for hours about nothing. Heavy doses of sugar can do things to the human mind. It can make a person honest.

She told me all her stories. I told her mine. You can do a lot of soul-searching over crullers.

My professional life was non-existent, I took whatever jobs I could get. I spent days crawling rooflines, swinging a hammer, or operating a commercial lawn mower. She worked as a preschool teacher at church, or in a kitchen. For extra income, I played piano at a Baptist church on Sundays, Sunday nights, Wednesday nights, Thursday night choir practices, and Saturday night prayer meetings.

We learned things about each other. We learned important things.

We learned how to argue in the middle of a Winn-Dixie, and how to attend two Thanksgivings in one day. How to share a sunset, seated on the hood of a truck. How to read in bed with a flimsy battery-powered book light.

We learned how to travel together with paper maps. And after years of practice, we finally learned how to make a bed together without me getting murdered.

We learned how to hold each other when loved ones die. We learned how to sit together—me reading a magazine, her playing a crossword puzzle.

We learned how to wring our hands in hospital waiting rooms. We learned how bury dogs with a shovel and a burial sheet.

We learned how to make a life together.

A lot has changed since those days, but I still wake early in the mornings to write. I don't use a legal pad anymore, I use a laptop.

This morning, however, I did not write. Instead, I sifted through our storage closet. I found things. An old coffee-tin sewing kit, some scented candles, love poems, and the picture of a young man and his new wife in their first apartment.

In the picture, the place had ugly gray walls, but that's the only ugly thing about this photo.

He's holding her. She's holding him. They are young. Their skin is smooth. I wish I could tell you how much I love these two people in the picture.

I wish you could see their faces, and their punch-drunk smiles. You can tell they belong together by looking at them. You simply know that their names should never be said apart.

It's as though nothing bad in this life can ever touch them. As though the two of them, in thought, and deed, and breath, and heart, shall never be lacerated apart.

I suppose that word is growing on me.

Jessica came screaming and bawling into this world and irrevocably altered my life the moment she was born. The responsibility of this fragile human being weighed on me. I was so afraid I would drop her and she would break.

In that raucous, birthing moment, the Lord breathed into my heart, "That's what I mean by being born again, moving from

one form of existence to another, out of the womb and into the world." This experience revealed new facets of the Lord.

I learned how to bottle feed my baby girl and the evil of "burping" her. Patting her back rhythmically would produce the rudest sound, followed by this odious curdled smell. Yet, she was so cute as she bobbed her head with glazed, unfocused eyes. This curious creature was human, but I couldn't imagine what was going on inside her little head.

I took the early morning feedings to give my wife some sleep. Changing and feeding this eating, pooping, peeing machine was challenging, but wonderfully bonding. After her bottle, I would rock her back to sleep and pat her back gently out of sheer reflex. When she was about five months old, IT happened. I was utterly exhausted working two jobs and a senior in college. As I sat rocking her to sleep, her tiny hand began to lovingly pat my back. The hurts of my childhood began to melt away by the love of my child.

How does a non-communicative, miniature human learn to respond with loving touch? You could say, "She was imitating," and I would respond, "That is how we learn profound emotion." The innate ability to love is the mark of God upon our psyche, the touch of God upon our soul.

There are seven billion people on this planet, each equipped with a unique fingerprint. Each one also has their own distinctive capacity for affection. Giving and receiving love is what we were born to do. The early events of my life handicapped my ability to love as God intended, but God is on a mission to restore that ability.

As a young Christian, I remember the old-timers lingering at the altar singing a curious song, "Just a touch from His nail-scarred hands, just a touch from His nail-scarred hands, just one touch from His nail scarred hand." What were those old fogies talking about? Those elders in the faith knew something that I didn't—it is the gentle touch of the Master that brings healing to the broken heart. God restores the love stolen from us in our brokenness. The peace of God quietly descends upon our hearts with an unseen, yet unmistakably tender pat on our backs.

When Jesus walked the earth, people brought their babies to

Gifted Musicians Greatly Impact Our Community's Children, Seniors and Disabled

"Music provides a very natural and universal means of building bridges between people" mused Alon Goldstein, an Israeli born classical pianist who performs all over the world. Alon's passion to "bring Carnegie Hall free of charge" to those who may not have access to such inspired him to form Emerald Coast Music Alliance, a not-for-profit organization that hosts week-long music festivals each January, bringing in world renowned musicians from all over the country to perform in Northwest Florida schools, senior centers, organizations for the developmentally or intellectually disabled, churches and more.

Emerald Coast Music Alliance (ECMA) held its sixth Music Festival recently, scheduling 50 live performances on January 6-14, with a total of six musicians and two dancers. Joining Alon were pianists: Regina Tanujaya, Crystal Jiang, Valerie Wellington and Junyi Nie. Boyan Bonev on cello returned for his second appearance as a guest musician, and the ECMA welcomed Jonathan Holden on clarinet. New to this year is the element of dance, featuring dancers Taylor Harrison and Kaitlyn Christiansen Sacco, who performed with the musicians.

A FREE concert open to the general public is held each year. This year, the concert was live on January 15 at Tyler Recital Hall, Northwest Florida State College, featuring the dancers and all musicians.

Alon calls these festivals a "win on all levels," because of the incredible impact it makes on both the audience and the performers. Guest musicians sense a "greater purpose as a musician" as they witness the power of music in how children, seniors and persons with disabilities respond to the beauty of classical music. Some of the unforgettable moments are moving and inspirational:

A woman in a senior center who had not spoken for six months began to speak to her husband after hearing a live piano performance. Another woman declared aloud that "she felt alive again."

Apprehensive residents of a developmentally disabled facility began to slowly filter into the room where a trio of cellists played – from a beginning audience of 5 to 120 residents who had been hiding, but listening – within 15 minutes. The director of the facility said that never before had this many residents sat in one room together.

Children in a Santa Rosa Elementary school got up and spontaneously began to sway their arms and interpret the music in movement.

High school students began opening up after a performance, asking questions to the musicians specifically about their instru-



ments and how they developed their career in music.

Crystal Jiang, in her second year as one of our guest pianists, began to sing a Chinese folk song in her native language during her performance that enraptured her young audience. She asked them to visualize as she played; think of a story the music is telling, to dance or to sing. Crystal says she learns, too, from their comments and the description of emotions they feel as she plays. She invited them to sit on her lap to touch the piano keys, the personal contact that she says gives them a sense of collaboration; of performing with her. One child who was unruly became quiet and one of the most quizzically interactive after listening to a 300-year-old Bach piece. Crystal seeks to learn from her audience's responses which help her to discern if their reactions and emotions are those she is trying to convey through her music. One child told her she would be famous and asked for her autograph on his shoe in Chinese. Soon, all the children wanted her autograph!

Alon has a vision for the future of Emerald Coast Music Alliance; to expand its current role to include teaching seminars that connect young musicians in our schools with our gifted guest musicians and inspire them to pursue music.



In our Destinites locals Facebook group this past month, a big topic was the increase in our power bills. In most cases, bills have doubled. Apparently, this rate increase is in place for the next 3-4 years with a then planned lower rate adjustment. Meanwhile, it's time to start being diligent over things you can do to help lower your bill. Below are some ideas for you to consider.

Solar Panels: The number

one thing you should do when starting your research is contact your homeowner's insurance agent to ask how it will affect your coverage, because it certainly does. If you still wish to proceed, start by talking with other homeowners who already have solar panels. These two things will give the initial insight you need before contacting solar companies. Do your homework!

Here are some ideas of which everyone can take advantage: If you really are diligent about all

these things, it will make a difv ference.

1. Turn off the light when you leave a room.

2. Unplug items when you are not using them. Yes, it's a little trouble but worth it. Be mindful of unplugging items especially when you are going to be gone from your home any length of time.


