10 Years and Counting!

In a recent interview, we were asked if reaching our ten-year milestone felt like "We did it. Mission Accomplished!" Our response was that it feels more like "Mission ongoing, mission good start, mission we've so much more to do." As we look back on the very beginning of our little newborn baby theatre company, the feelings of gratitude overwhelm us. ECTC shares a birthday with our youngest daughter, as they both made their appearance in January of 2013, with quite a few months of planning prior. It was in those early days that we experienced the joy and excitement of something new, and the fulfillment of a dream long hoped for—both with our new little baby and our new little company.

We started with 10 students in an afterschool class offered in partnership with the Mattie Kelly Arts Foundation. Nathanael was working as a part





time adjunct theatre professor at University of West Florida in Pensacola and Gulf Coast State College in Panama City,

as well as other part time local jobs. I was working behind the scenes and caring for our six-year old twins and newborn baby girl. He would teach the after school classes on those days he was in town and we continued to work

together, dreaming and planning our little company's first wobbly steps.

Fast forward four years

and we are growing, continuing to offer more and more classes and a small season of professional theatre. All of our classes and shows are offered through the kindness of local schools and retail merchants who give us the use of their empty stores. For every show and every class, we load our family car with set, props, costumes, speakers, scripts and whatever else can be crammed in, and we arrive early to set everything up. Our garage, our living room, our kitchen table is always covered with things like feather boas, a golden lamp, a tinman's costume and maybe a basket of fake apples. We overtake Anna's Dad's shed across the street as our stock grows, and our neighbor next door is always kind to turn a blind eye when we paint sets in our carport and turn the side yard grass blue until the next mowing.

Asher's Hope is Leaving a Legacy

In 2018, Kristyn Szala's youngest son, Asher, was given a life-limiting diagnosis. Kristyn was only halfway through her pregnancy. "We were told that he would either pass away before birth or shortly thereafter,' she said. "You imagine you're going to have a lifetime with your child and to have that taken away is absolutely crushing."

Once Kristyn, an area local, reoriented her thoughts and let a few close friends and family know, they initiated a fundraiser to purchase a CuddleCot for the family. A Cud-

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Throughout this period, Grand Boulevard was especially generous to us. If they had an empty space, we were welcome to it. We produced professional shows and children's shows in the place where Williams Sonoma is now. They hired us to produce an outdoor Summer Shakespeare in the park series which continues to this day. I would be remiss if I didn't mention our board of directors, the people who work behind the scenes without a lot of recognition. They were always there championing us and finding new and creative ways to produce theatre without a building. And then one day...

Stacey Brady, Director of Marketing at Grand Boulevard and long-time board member, called us one morning. "Can you meet me at the 560 building on property?" We thought with excitement that this may be another temporary empty

space, another opportunity to run rehearsals and classes at the place that had been so supportive of us already. What we didn't think was that she had secured a dream space for us. She brought us up to the absolutely empty concrete rectangle that is now Emerald Coast Theatre Company and with a twinkle in her eye said, "Well, do you think you can work with this?" After catching our collective breath, through smiles and tears, we responded with a resounding yes, and immediately got to work with more dreaming.

What Grand Boulevard has provided has catapulted us to where we are today. We have grown from the two of us volunteering and investing our time the first few years to a full-time incredible staff of eight including ourselves, Rebeca Lake-resident designer, Phillip Padgett-production and stage manager, Tara Padgett-costume and wardrobe assistant and teaching artist, and our three newest staff members Trenton

Bainbridge-managing director, Emily Bainbridge-patron relations and teaching artist, and Drake Miller-technical director.

As we celebrate Season 10 this year, we celebrate all of the hands and hearts that got us here. We recognize that the heart of ECTC is you! dleCot is a small cooling unit fitted inside a bassinet. In situations like these, there is a short



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window of time for a family to create memories, say hello and goodbye to their child. Cooling the baby is absolutely essential. The CuddleCot cools to an ideal temperature for preserving the baby without being too cold for the parents.

This marvel of technology allows families the choice to spend more time with their baby. "A CuddleCot allows grieving parents to bond with their babies and make memories that they wouldn't otherwise have been able to do – an essential step to the grieving process for hurting parents," she said.

Asher was stillborn Aug. 3, 2018, at Ascension Sacred Heart Pensacola at 36 weeks. "During our stay in the hospital, we were blessed with two and half days with Asher when we would likely have only had a few hours," said Kristyn.

In reality, no amount of time is ever going to be enough. But their precious gift of time was extended because of the availability of their CuddleCot. Kristyn had the option to hold her baby, to bathe him, to dress him in an outfit of her choosing and just "be" with him for those moments, which she truly needed. She says one of the most peaceful times was having him at her bedside at night.


After the emotional experi-

ence, Kristyn realized the importance of having that Cuddle-Cot. Before they left Ascension Sacred Heart in Pensacola, they made a decision to donate Asher's CuddleCot to help future parents in need. "At the time, ours was the only CuddleCot in the area," said Kristyn. But, in May 2021, she was able to donate a second CuddleCot to Ascension Sacred Heart Emerald Coast Family Birth Place through additional community fundraising. "Since then, we have raised a third for Eglin Air Force Base hospital, a fourth for HCA Destin Fort Walton Beach, and a fifth for North Okaloosa Medical Center in Crestview," she said. "I'm very proud of our community effort.'

Kristyn is in the process of getting the sixth Cuddle Cot into the Nellis Air Force Base hospital in Las Vegas. "After that, we will have 50 percent of the Air Force hospitals with an L&D unit covered," she said. "My goal through this effort is to continue Asher's legacy by making sure our local hospitals are equipped with a CuddleCot; if parents are faced with the unimaginable, they can have the choice of more time. It really helps them in dealing with their loss and I feel like it's really an

\$2,800. She accepts donations through her Go Fund Me page and various community events. She is also in the planning stages of an Asher's Hope benefit concert involving the Principal Harp-



All the yum and fun began in 1978 when the Destin Charter Boat Ladies Auxiliary decided to establish a festival to celebrate local fishermen. 

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Niceville Children's Advocacy Center Damaged

It was a good news, bad news scenario when a fire occurred at the Emerald Coast Children's Advocacy Center's (ECCAC) 23-year-old location in Niceville that provides healing and protection to area children experiencing abuse and neglect.

ECCAC's CEO, Julie Porterfield commented, "We are just incredibly sad and devastated that our Niceville Center suffered significant damage Saturday, July 16th. Although there was much water damage from the fire sprinkler system, it prevented what could have been a devastating fire. As heartbroken as I feel and fighting back the tears, I am thanking God for His saving grace - it could have been so much worse. We may be down, but will rise above the water. We know the days ahead will be long. We will need the community's help to restore the joy, the cheeriness, the hope the

Center once held."

Recently, ECCAC announced an upcoming expansion to the Niceville Center. Now they are looking at achieving that, as well as a complete renovation of the existing building that was so severely damaged. The building may be temporarily closed, but ECCAC operations are not, the kids will still be served. The Center doesn't house children, but is set up with a multidisciplinary team

of child protection personnel, prosecutors, law enforcement, DCF, therapists, as well as ECCAC staff and volunteers to provide services to the children in a child-friendly environment.

The community support to date has been substantial. As an example, Mike Kay, owner of Ocean Views, has already been to the Center to save the fish located in an aquarium in the lobby. He will temporarily house the fish. Architect Allen McGinnis, who has provided all architectural services for EC-CAC both in Niceville and DeFuniak Springs,

and now the new addition, has also offered to provide plans for the restoration of the existing Niceville building. The City of Niceville has stepped to the plate to help, as well as Cross Point Methodist Church in Niceville that has offered office space to ECCAC's therapists so they can continue offering their counseling to area children in need.

Solange Arnett, ECCAC's Director of Operations, added, "We would also like to give great thanks to the Niceville and Valparaiso Fire Departments. They were on scene quickly and went above and beyond by securing electrical equipment with tarps they cut and provided. They also retrieved planners and precious keepsakes from offices that were reachable, They even went into windows on the first floor to secure valuable equipment used in the forensics done by the Child Protection Team. The damage to our electrical equipment could have been so much worse if not for their quick actions."

ECCAC is also asking that people not make any physical donations of clothing, toys, etc. as they are unable to accommodate these items until the restoration is complete. Monetary donations would be greatly appreciated.

With the concept of no child left behind, Porterfield and her dedicated staff have launched a 3-phase campaign. Phase One, Heads Above Water, has a goal

of raising \$100,000 to face their mounting expenses that will navigate the costs of water remediation, relocation of staff and replacing all the items that made the Center so special and child-friendly.

Being unsure of what the insurance claim will reimburse at this time, Phase Two, Silver Lining, prepares ECCAC to be able to fund 100% of the restoration in advance. The community's generosity is the children's silver lining.

Phase Three, Over the Horizon, has a goal of raising \$1.5 million to focus on what's ahead for the Niceville Center. This will cover the already planned expansion project, as well as the finishing touches on the main building's restoration.

ECCAC's mission is to prevent child abuse and neglect, protect children in Okaloosa and Walton Counties, and restore the lives and futures of these impacted children. In ECCAC's 23-year history, over 15,000 children have received more than 170,000 services at no cost.

Meet Our Hometown Hero Stephanie Wedel

One Woman's Mission to Destroy Our Area's Drug and Alcohol Problems

Freedom Life Compass serves as a bridge between active rehabilitation like you see when someone decides to get clean from drugs or alcohol—and when they are able to live fully independent lives. The organization's leadership hopes to open its Freedom House—a transitional halfway house on

County Line Road just inside Walton County soon – the plan is to help recovering addicts – all women – make the transition from recovering drug user to empowered community members.

Stephanie's Story

Stephanie Wedel wasn't always the woman she is now. Her father was a drug dealer. Her brother was in and out of jail. He battled IV drug use for 17 years. Now, she takes her child-hood pain and channels it into something beautiful: recovery for people who grew up like her. "Every time I talk about this – about women who are homeless or who are struggling with addiction – I feel like everybody brushes it off," Stephanie said, "a lot of times; it's not our





choices, it's our circumstances that end up making those choices. And once given the opportunity to choose the next right step, a lot of us will take it. But the stigma and the culture is that 'oh, they got themselves in that boat.' I didn't ask to be raised in a home with a drug dealer for a father. A lot of these women are in situations like that."

Stephanie serves as the recovery pastor at Crosspoint Church. She helps people get out of the cycle of drug and alcohol addiction. She also serves as the leader of Freedom Life Compass. Freedom Life Compass exists as a non-profit centered around moving people from recovery to independent living after breaking from their drug use.

The ministry serves as a transitional phase from rehab to reintegration with the rest of the world. As an example – think of a drug user as someone who tears a ligament playing a sport. They undergo surgery for the tear, that's a rehab program. But they also need to engage in physical therapy to strengthen the muscles around the tendon to their former strength. That's the portion of recovery Freedom Life Compass serves.

Freedom Life Compass is a non-profit organization dedicated to ensuring secure transitional housing for recovering drug users and alcoholics.

Empowering Women to Change Their Lives by Setting Them Up for Success

Stephanie says the need for a program like this is huge in this area, because it permanently severs the cycle of drug use by eliminating the return to a bad environment for people in recovery. "One of the saddest stories and ways to put this into perspective is a girl that graduated from a rehab facility in Baker," Stephanie remembers. "Not two weeks after she went home, she was back on the street, using again. Because she went back to the same situation she came out of, nothing changed, except, she was held accountable for a vear. If she were able to come here and work on getting a solid career plan set up and getting her into her own place, instead of going back to her mother's house - we're not solving the problem."

Stephanie's own struggle with alcohol, as well as her family's issues with illegal drugs, motivated her to start Freedom Life Compass. The group plans to open the freedom house on County Line Road to provide a stepping stone that lasts between six to 18 months for women who want to leave behind drugs, crime and other vices – to make a go at a better future.

The house will require women to have at least six months of sobriety, which they can achieve in their rehab programs before they can move in.

The program teaches job skills and allows employment, so women have alternatives to the life they left behind.

They'll pay rent, which will go toward the \$4,000 per month expenses to run the center. While they are there, some of their earnings will go toward a savings account which will be turned over to them when they graduate from the program. That money can then be used to make them independent of their past by allowing them to rent a place to call their home and start their careers.

In the near term, the freedom house will exist out of the small building already on the campus. The goal of a fundraiser coming

The Real Estate Roller Coaster

Wheeeee! It's been a crazy real estate ride!

For some time now we've had a low inventory of available residential properties for sale and a whole lotta buyers wanting to purchase. Many properties were selling in one day, some sight unseen, with multiple offers and then selling above the asking price! As a real estate agent representing a buyer, you had to make sure your buyer had all his ducks in a row and were quick to respond and even then, buyers were losing out to other offers. In quite a few cases, you were writing many more offers on many more properties before securing a contract for your buyer. If you were representing a seller, you had to help him sift through those multiple offers, sometimes more than dozen, in order to assist and educate him about the pros and cons of each so he could determine which was the best offer that would meet his real estate goals. Yep, it has been a wild ride!

Now, things are shifting. Last year available residential property inventory hovered around +/- 1,100 in our entire Multiple Listing Service (which is pretty much everything in between Panama City Beach and Pensacola). Compare that to three years ago when we averaged anywhere +/-5,000 available listings for sale. Today, the numbers are creeping up. This morning (July 19) available inventory was up to 3,306 and four days ago it was under 3,000. Now, that's still a fairly low number, however, it's about three times more than what was available in 2021.

Stuff to think about:

Overall, prices are still rising, but not at the rate they have been over the last few years...

...And nationally, prices of one in seven homes listed are reduced. Price reductions are happening here in our market as well.

Interest rates have been steadily rising. If financing, buyers have to adjust how high a sales price and monthly payment they can afford; meanwhile sellers are losing those buyers to lesser priced housing.

The number of days a property is on the market actively for sale before going under contract is ticking up a bit as well.

The good news for sellers is that now is still a really good time to sell and capitalize on your investment.

The good news for buyers is that you have more inventory to choose from and although interest rates have ticked up, they are still low and once you lock in your rate, you're good to go – can't say the same about paying rent! Note: According to HUD, Florida rent increases top the national average and the cost to rent here in Okaloosa County is more expensive than 83 percent

market for sale, you may not want to wait much longer because the market is shifting.


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Blue Angels Names First Female Pilot




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Eight True Sports Cars That Make Great Daily Drivers

Whichever Boxster or Cayman you choose, you're bound to love the perfect mix of balance, precision and daily driving fun that the mid-engine layout, sports suspension and Porsche quality bring to your commutes, grocery store runs, and weekend getaways. Air Plant – These plants don't even need soil, just dunk them in water for a few hours every 10 days. Perfect for the bookshelf or in a bathroom.

Aloe – Give them indirect light and a soak every week or two. They're perfect for your bedside table or the kitchen (and great for a sunburn).

Phalaenopsis Orchid — Another low-light plant that loves the humidity and can be watered with an ice cube or two once a week. They come in a variety of colors and make a great addition to your foyer, bedroom or dining table.

Make Memories on the Seas



Explore endlessly in your own back yard or travel around the world. Fuel up for adventure and make family memories last forever. Travel back in time through captivating history while visiting countries in a day on a river cruise. It's your heart that takes you places. So, listen to your heart. Now is the time. Don't put it off because you never know when it will be too late. Our experiences and memories are the only things we have that are our own. But when we can share them with our loved ones and our friends, and (anyone who will listen really), they become so much more memorable. Stories are told and retold. Here is one of my many stories.

Twenty years ago, I took a large group of friends and family on a once-in-a-lifetime cruise on the SS Norway. She was formerly known as the SS France, put into service in 1962 by a French ocean liner company, and was very reminiscent of the grand ocean liners of her era complete with the autographed photos of the classic movie stars who sailed on her. She was the longest passenger ship in the world until the construction of the Queen Mary 2, 40 years later. Royal Caribbean's 227,000-gross ton Harmony of the Seas is only 81 feet longer than the 66,300-gross ton SS France was.

The SS France's last sailing was out of Hong Kong in 1974, and soon she was no longer needed as times changed in the world of jet travel. In 1979, she had sat dormant for several years until she was purchased by Knut Kloster, president and co-founder of Norwegian Cruise Line, previously known as Norwegian Caribbean Line. She received an \$80 million overhaul and was rechristened Norway. This was the first time a purpose-built cruise liner was turned into a cruise ship. This meant pools would be built on open decks. A cruise liner or ocean liner is a passenger ship built for transatlantic service with a much deeper hull. Because of the deeper hull she had trouble docking at many of the Caribbean ports like her sister ships, so she carried her own two tender boats known as Little



Norway 1 and Little Norway II.

Only guests were allowed to use the elevators; crew had to use the stairs. Another memory, the pool on the main deck had windows in it so you could see people's legs in it. Her luxurious amenities and décor revolutionized cruising.

Five years after we sailed on the Norway, in May of 2007, while anchored in the port of Miami, there was a boiler room explosion, killing nine and injuring 19 crew. She had just returned from a Caribbean cruise and had 2,135 passengers and 911 crew still onboard. All were safely evacuated. She was scrapped in 2008.

Even though cruise ships are now bigger and better than ever, our memories of sailing on the magnificent Norway are some of our favorites. With her luxurious amenities and décor, she revolutionized cruising. It's very special to personally experience the evolution of cruising from the SS Norway to the modern ships of today. I love cruise history and especially reading stories of passengers who sailed on her from the time she was the SS France. She was the first cruise liner recommissioned to sail shorter cruises in the Caribbean. She was in a class all her own. I am so glad we had this amazing experience on the SS Norway. 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



The Legend of **Bruce Cheves**Fishing Rodeo Weighmaster


Destin Fishing Rodeo's Weighmaster extraordinaire. A seemingly simple man with a complex, tangled past. A man who, to some, has become syn-

One that dates back through the centuries, a legacy intertwined with the history of our nation, our town and our docks. One that brought him to our humble fishing town and, some may say,

the Bermuda Triangle. The ship was caught in a mighty storm. It was a brave and mighty crew who had seen many days at sea and they were weary when first

they caught sight of the massive tentacle arms of an unknown creature from the depths. The tentacles quickly wrapped around the giant ship and crushed it like it was a tin can. The great beast devoured most of the crew and when it had its

onymous with the very Rodeo itself has lived a far more tangled past. His fascination with fish has been lifelong, as has his chronic sea sickness. This ironic twist is just the tip of the iceberg that is Bruce's origin story.

fill, it headed west and made its way into the Gulf of Mexico. There weren't many survivors to talk about that, but there was Leonard. He was able to make his way to shore floating on a handmade raft of scrap wood. He became quite the fisherman set up camp right in front of Crab Island. His last name was, of course, Destin.

Meanwhile in Germany, The Kaiser had had enough. In August 1914, World War I broke out in Europe. Fishing and shipping channels were threatened. Around that same time, well exactly that same month, the Panama Canal opened. Not coinci-

dentally, a certain sea monster, we'll call the Destin Kraken, made its way to the Pacific, and there it feasted. It fed on everything – quid, whales, great white sharks, and mediocre minnows up and down the west coast.

In 1951 a man was born who would change the fishing world forever. Coming from the little town of Monterey, California,









Bruce grew up by the sea, on the northwest coast where fishing is very popular, and where there are plentiful fish the Destin Kraken is sure to follow. It was here that the two met up. Bruce was reeling in a halibut and as it got closer, he noticed something was wrapped around his fish – it was a giant orange tentacle.

As he reached down to pull the tentacle from his flippy floppy halibut, the tentacle stung him instantly and made his stomach turn at the thought of being on a boat. The beast did this because it realized that he would be the creature's greatest foe. Three things happened that day as 10-year-old Bruce wrestled the stinging tentacles off the approximately 438.38-lb. halibut. He was seasick any time he was on a boat from that day forward; next he suddenly could guesstimate the weight of almost all fish within ounces, and finally, the Destin Kraken had

met his match.

The mighty Kraken sensed something special in that young boy it had stung. The two had a special connection. So much so that when Bruce took a job in Destin in 1977, the beast followed him. Back through Panama Canal, it went, back to the Gulf's emerald green waters. Bruce's illustrious career along the docks put him close to the waters where this orange monster awaited their next encounter. There were several close

calls and near misses until the fall of 1990.

It was late August and not a slow year for hurricanes. Destin Fishing Rodeo Officials were looking for someone to set a new benchmark, to be the voice of the fishing community, and someone to weigh all the fish at the Rodeo. But they would have to wait another year.

As one might imagine, by October Bruce was becoming quite the weighmaster. His time on the Destin docks was exposing him to an exponential number of species and aquatic creatures of every color, shape, and size imaginable. It was about that same time when the young movie director Louis Leterrier was on a fishing trip with some L.A. friends in some lower Alabama or was it Florida town. known for fishing. He couldn't remember. Louis met Bruce after a pretty dismal weekend of fishing,. It was maybe a Monday. The two men bonded over the poor conditions. Louis joked about making a movie about Bruce's life. He was so desperate to bring fish home to L.A., that he might have said something like "Bring me a fish, and I'll make you famous!" Bruce laughed, but then a little seasick feeling hit him in his gut.


Bruce was named the official weighmaster for the Destin Fishing Rodeo in 1991. But we are still in 1990. Lured in by all the

fish from the tournament, the great beast had come into the harbor. That very night, after he and Louis had joked, Bruce was the last guy on the Docks. The last guy save for a stray bum, who passed out a little too close to the edge. It was after the last cooler was cleaned, that a

loud slurping sound came from just behind him. By then the bum was dinner. Bruce swung around and saw his old friend the Destin Kraken. The beast tore down half the old docks in the battle that ensued. The damage was so massive that the whole place had to be remodeled and, in 2007, they opened the Emerald Grande on top of what had been the greatest battle the Town of Destin had ever seen. The next day Bruce brought his new friend a chunk of the beast he had killed.

Louis made good on his promise. Though it took a few

years, the Kraken played himself. They replaced Bruce with Perseus in the final cut of the movie and, in 2010, The Clash of the Titans was released. That same year the City of Destin declared October 16th "Bruce Cheves Day," and, I mean, can you blame them?

Everyone wants a strong and sexy back, but all too many times your back — especially the spine — takes the brunt of weakness and improper lifting. The back has different muscle groups that work together to allow movement. Some have mul-

tiple responsibilities to move the head, shoulders, arms, hips, legs and spine itself

There are 40 muscles in the back. These muscles are combined into five main groups: (from top to bottom) Trapezius, Rhomboids, Latissimus Dorsi, Quadratus Lumborum... and Erector Spinae (runs vertically along each side of the spine). You want each side to mirror each other in strength, coordination and flexibility to create balance and stability.

If you have a job or sport that uses one side dominantly over the other, you should work on keeping your muscles balanced through some type of strength

training, pilates or yoga. This balanced strength is what will help protect your spine from degeneration and injury. Note: Your back is your second largest muscle group in your body; therefore think strong, but work up to it. Also, your back has assistance. Biceps and shoulders get a lot of work from performing back exercises and your back gets that help. Think team instead of single player; there's power in numbers! Look at two functional and essential exercises for the back.

Seated Back Row: Works lats, rhomboids, traps, erectors (all the major and minor back muscles are involved). Sit with your legs loosely straight, feet preferably against a foot plat-

form to counterbalance the pull (you should have to reach to get the handles). To keep your spine safe, when you reach, hinge from your hips with spine elongated, head lifted. Pull the handles to you, aiming for your ribs, depress and pinch back your shoulders squeezing your shoulder blades together, then control resistance, taking the handles back to "home" or start position. Rowing can be done with cable pulleys, resistance bands, dumbbells or bar. Each has positional variations, but the principles are the same.

Next is LAT PULLDOWNS: Focus is on the Latissimus Dorsi, but you also use the lower traps, rear deltoids, and biceps, depending how narrow your grip

is. Generally seated, reach up for a bar attached to the high pulley. Basic grip is overhanded and just outside shoulder width. Look up at the pulley, lean back just slightly, depress your shoulders and pull the bar into the top of your chest under your chin. Keep abdominals engaged to protect your back. Your back should stay somewhat neutral. Slowly resist the bar back to "home." Note: Lat pulldowns are the machine version of a pull-up which allows you to work the lats at varying strengths and a great way for someone who hasn't mastered pull-ups to strengthen and shape their lats. Also, lats are wing shaped. When they are developed and toned they can make your waist

Don't forget Back Extensions: Focus is erector spinae and considered a "core" exercise. Erectors support your spine and keep you upright (when strong). Easiest way to work is on a mat is face down, hands clasped behind the lower back. Keeping your feet anchored, lift the upper body off the floor about an inch or so for about 20 reps. There are hyper-extension machines where you can graduate to using weights. Questions? BeActive850@gmail.com.

Can be performed seated or standing, with both hands or single handed.

Weight Loss and Thyroid

In this column, we've discussed thetThyroid before. However, it's such an important subject, because even mild thyroid dysfunction can cause weight gain over months and years. And this weight gain is nearly impossible to lose and keep off without getting the thyroid optimized.

The thyroid regulates every metabolic process in our body. This includes growing hair and fingernails, moisturizing your skin for less dryness and a better appearance. It also means keeping our toes warm, and our brains focused and working.

The thyroid determines how many calories we burn for each process. With age, thyroid function often decreases causing weight gain. So, how does this cause weight gain?

Imagine you are in your 30s. Your thyroid is functioning perfectly and your weight has been the same for years. Your calorie intake matches your calorie output. If you are eating 1500 calories a day then you must be burning 1500 calories a day. Now fast forward 10 years. You haven't changed a thing, but your body has decided that adding color to your hair is no longer a priority,

and also, that your hair and fingernails do not need to be made as fast or as well. Your hair gets some gray, and becomes more coarse, dry or brittle. You don't need to trim your nails nearly as often and they seem brittle and thin, too. You are getting tired and unfocused in the afternoon and either nap, drink caffeine or just push yourself through the day. And you notice your weight is creeping up!

Now diet and exercise are a start. But, it's always a struggle and seems less and less successful. What is going on? It's your thyroid! Even though you haven't changed anything in your life, your body has decided to burn less calories. You're still eating 1500 calories a day and have exactly the same activity level, but your body is slacking on the job. Maybe your body is just burning 50 calories less



a day. That's five pounds of weight gain every year! And as you decrease your calorie intake or increase your exercise, your body continues to burn fewer and fewer calories each year. So, your diet and exercise just become more difficult.

What's the solution? Get your thyroid functioning! When you turn the thermostat up, you burn more fuel. Hair, nails, skin, energy, focus improves and weight loss can happen without effort.

But my doctor says my thyroid labs are normal. We hear this a lot and, unfortunately, traditional medicine only orders a TSH and stops. At The Hormone Restoration Center, we order numerous thyroid labs and understand that normal and opti-

Collagen is the most abundant protein in the body. It has an adhesive quality that is only matched by its ability to provide connection, structure and strength. About 30 percent of our body's proteins are one type of collagen or another and it is also top dog in the animal king-

Saying collagen is found throughout our bodies is kind of an understatement. It's a structural element of bones, muscles, tendons and ligaments. nea of your eye, teeth, cartilage, discs between your vertebrae and the digestive tract.

Age is the main enemy, with the sun coming in a close second in regards to production. Collagen production starts to decline in our 20s or 30s. The structure is somewhat complex and there are 16 different types that exist in our body, each having different structures and functions.

I also discovered three things:

1. Sugar and refined carbohydrates can hamper collagen's repairing capabilities. This is just another reason to limit these in our diet.

2. It's a large molecule which cannot be absorbed by skin so don't waste money on creams, lotions or potions that tout collagen for your skin.

3. There can never be a vegan collagen; it doesn't exist.

Type I (90 percent of our collagen) is the strongest and a component of bones, skin, tendons, cartilage, teeth and other connective tissue and it can stretch a lot without breaking. Our muscles, organs, and arteries rely on Type III.

If you're considering adding collagen to your diet, remember that it requires consistent consumption on a daily basis. The role it plays goes far beyond what I've covered here. High quality is a must. I've seen some amazing before and after photos as well as several surprising health improvements. These individuals consumed a high quality collagen daily for a minimum of three months. Remember, it takes time for the body to do what it does so well, repair and heal itself. Well, now you have! Also

known as collagen induction therapy (CIT) and percutaneous collagen induction (PCI), microneedling is a cost-effective,

minimally-invasive treatment for a number of skin conditions. In the past few years, it has increased in popularity due to its ability to improve skin texture and firmness, and diminish scars, pore size and stretch marks. One of the greatest benefits of microneedling is that it can be used anywhere on the body to improve texture, reduce scarring and diminish the look of discoloration. Even areas such as the delicate skin around the eyes can be treated (carefully!) as well as on sunken areas of the skin such as acne lines, wrinkles and scars. Because the epidermis remains intact, the procedure can be repeated safely and is also suited to skin areas where laser treatments and deep chemical peels are not typically performed, such as around the eves and mouth, hands and chest. These controlled injuries trigger the skin's natural repair processes, stimulating collagen and elastin production.

The technique involves a series of small needles passed over selected treatment areas, creating tiny "micropunctures." This minor "injury" to the skin generates



a healing response producing collagen and other skin building blocks that can improve color and texture.


The pores created by the microneedles can make more effective other topical therapies such as antioxidants and lightening creams. Because it keeps the skin's protective barrier essentially intact, treatment with micro-needling has less risk of adverse effects than other skin resurfacing procedures and is safer to use in patients with naturally darker skin types.

Treatments are quick, with only mild discomfort. Recovery time is minimal; return to school or work next-day with only mild redness. As with most in-office procedures, microneedling will increase your skin's sensitivity to the sun.

I use a pen with a new head for each client and recommend a series of three sessions at time when sun exposure will be minimal. You'll see gradual improvement after each session.

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Life with ADHD Part 2: In the Words of Mom and Dad

Last month, our son, Will, age 10, shared his experience living with ADHD. This month we are sharing our parent lessons navigating ADHD in our home. Neither of us are diagnosed with ADHD.

What are the positives of navigating ADHD in your home?

Our son sees the world through a different lens than we do. We can both be singularly focused and can miss the world happening around us. Will has more going on in his mind than we are able to fully recognize until he paints a picture, creates a flipbook, or builds a creation using discarded items. His creativity is inspiring and challenges us to see the world in new ways.

What are the challenges of navigating ADHD in your home?

Often people can't see past Will's challenges to stay on task. What appears to be lack of focus or engagement is actually him being hyper focused and engaged with everything around him. He makes connections and recognizes patterns that others miss. His struggle to focus, sit still or manage his impulses gets labeled by us and others as disrespect when that is rarely his intent.

What has not been helpful in navigating ADHD as a parent?

Expecting Will to feel, behave and move through the world like we do is not helpful. He is uniquely created and he doesn't need to be more like us to be a better version of himself. Assuming challenging behavior is coming from a place of disrespect creates unnecessary

conflict. Kids' behavior is most often about trying to meet an internal need or achieve an internal goal and is not designed to get under parents' skin (despite how it may feel sometimes). A lack of patience and frustration on our part is the quickest way to prolong follow through on Will's part. When he feels judged, misunderstood, and labeled as disrespectful, trust is broken and his brain moves into fight or flight. His focus shifts from the task at hand to the emotional battle at hand.

What has been helpful in navigating ADHD as a parent?

In our relationship, Will is the most vulnerable person with the least developed brain. It is not his



job to change to make parenting easier for us. It is our responsibility to seek understanding about his experience, find ways to get on the same team, and help him overcome challenges and develop confidence. Will lives with ADHD in a world that is built on systems that expect him to behave as though he doesn't have ADHD. This dynamic is frustrating for him and offering compassion over judgment makes a big difference. Rather than taking an adversarial approach, we learn to seek first to understand by asking questions, then offering to help him develop strategies that work for him. Some strategies include adjusting diet, task checklists, calming

skills and a reward point system for task completion. More recently, medication has played a helpful role in unlocking confidence in focus, follow through, and impulse control.

What have you learned from navigating ADHD in parenting?

We are all created and wired differently. We cause unnecessary problems expecting kids or other people to see and process the world like we do. Our way is not the right or only way to be. Slowing down, listening, seeing and appreciating Will's unique personhood is a beautiful gift to him and to us. We want to manage ourselves well so we are affirming his giftedness rather than stubbornly insisting he be like us to be lovable and acceptable in the world. We want him to know he is wonderfully Will and in the world with an important purpose that will be accomplished because of his brain wiring not in spite of it.

ADHD is one way people experience feeling different. You are surrounded in life by different personalities, brain wiring, emotional processing and ways of seeing the world. Try remembering your way of being is not the only right way to be. Imagine the growth you might have within yourself and your relationships if you begin seeking to understand others' ways of seeing the world. net searches. Sometimes this advice can get confusing or contradicting, and we decide to do nothing. Let's face it, saving energy has an important impact which we all have a role in. So here are five popular energy saving myths

Myth #1: Leaking tubs and faucets are not that big of a deal.

Surprising, one faucet leaking two drops of water per second will waste 200 gallons of water in a month. Two faucets will waste 400 gallons of water. What if the leak came from the hot water side? Leaking faucets on the hot water side puts a continual strain on your water heater and costs you money and energy. In most cases, fixing leaky faucets will only cost a few cents to replace the washer. I recently called the manufacturer of my faucet and they sent replacement parts for free.

Pro Tip: To check if your faucet leaks, put a dry cup under the faucet at night. Check the cup in the morning, no water, no leak.

Myth #2: Leaving ceiling fans on, cools down the room when you're not there.

This is a common practice but don't be fooled. Fans don't cool the room; they only circulate air. We experience a cooling sensation from moisture evaporating from our skin. Leaving fans on all the time wastes energy and money.

Pro Tip: The ceiling fan direction in summer should be counterclockwise to help create a downdraft, which creates that direct, cooling breeze. Your fan direction in winter needs to be clockwise to create an updraft and circulate warm air around the room.

Myth #3: Closing off HVAC vents in rooms you aren't using improves your HVAC system's output and efficiency.

Your HVAC system is sized for your entire home or a zone within your house. Closing off vents in certain rooms could actually lower the system's efficiency. Plus, with forced air systems, closing off vents could create a buildup of pressure in ducts which could cause cracks and gaps in ducts leaking conditioned air into your attic.

Pro Tip: Don't forget to replace your HVAC filters regularly. Dirt and debris in your filter can obstruct air flow, increasing the workload of your cooling system. By replacing the filter regularly, you can reduce wear and tear on your air conditioner while allowing the free movement of air for improved

indoor comfort.

Myth #4: Setting the thermostat lower in the summer cools down a home faster and likewise in the winter.

HVAC systems are designed to operate at maximum power when they are first turned on. They won't produce cooler air just because the setting is set extremely low or hotter air when set high. They will run longer wasting energy and money attempting to achieve arctic temperatures.

Pro Tip: Installing a smart thermostat allows you to control settings remotely using an app from your mobile device saving you energy and increasing comfort.

Myth #5: Appliances like TV's, monitors, computers, and charges, when not in use or turned off, don't use energy. It is not necessary to unplug them.

Anything with a digital display, remote control or turns on instantly are constantly drawing energy. Charges for cell phones, cameras, tablets, are known as "energy vampires" for a reason. Even if they are not attached to their device they continue to draw power from the outlet.

Pro Tip: Pull the plug or flip the switch on your power strip and start saving energy.

Saving energy and becoming more efficient does not have to be difficult or costly. Anything we can do to save energy today has an impact on tomorrow.

Have You Heard of High Temperature Drying?

In the water damage restoration industry, anything over 90 degrees ambient conditions is considered high-temperature drying.

Most companies do not invest into high temperature dehumidifiers. High temperature dehumidifiers mean that they work in temperatures up to 120 degrees, compared to standard refrigerant dehumidification, which becomes very inefficient above 85 degrees.

Why is high temperature drying important? Every 18 to 20 degrees that we can increase the temperature of the materials that we are drying, we are able to double the rate of evaporation. In other words, we can dry twice as fast with high temperature drying. This also comes with years of experience,

trained employees and investing in the right equipment.

The added benefits of hightemp drying is the fact we can dry deeper into materials. Let me explain... hot moves to cold, which increases the vapor pressure in materials as the temperature increases. It is a must to use dehumidifiers that work in higher temperatures, when doubling the materials vapor pressure. If standard dehumidifiers are used then the temperature of the material must remain low, (less than 85 degrees) slowing the entire evaporation process and most likely demolition will be required to remove the wet materials.

High Velocity Air Movers

Air movers come in varied sizes and shapes. The three most popular are the Axial, Centrifugal and the Radial air movers.

The air movers' job is to help evaporate moisture into the air for the dehumidifiers to remove and to reheat the material from the evaporative cooling.

During testing at our IICRC Training facility, we discovered that at 3000 CFM and at over 1400 FPM, the Phoenix Focus delivers the fastest air and evaporation of all the air movers. This is our air mover of choice!

Radial Air Movers Are Slower Drying

Many of the new air movers are the radial, which are cheaper to purchase and easier for the restoration company to haul and set up. The tradeoff is a dramatic loss in air flow, which results in longer drying times, higher risk of mold growth and larger rental bills for the customer.

The U.S. dollar has strongly performed year to date having risen over 10% as of this writing. That has positive and negative impacts on the U.S. and its economy. Former Secretary of State James Baker noted some time ago that the U.S. remains an economic powerhouse, and we think that still holds true today. It was Baker who as then Secretary of the Treasury, led the effort to weaken the dollar in the mid-80s in collaboration with several central banks around the world. If the dollar is too strong, that can hurt U.S. companies as it makes their goods and services more expensive in overseas markets. If the dollar declines that obviously aids international business. Add that as international investments accelerate any positive returns are in part, and perhaps signifi-

cantly, due to the impact on exchange rates. Many investment houses have for some time suggested investors look into emerging markets funds and we think that a diversified portfolio should include that. We remain cautious however because we feel that any enthusiasm for returns from those markets has a weaker dollar as a key element for those returns. There is no way to be certain as to the direction of the dollar however we would expect the U.S. to work to ease its value soon. This might prove helpful as the economy continues to slow or perhaps if we are in a recession, as we believe we are now.

We see the economy continuing to slow due to quantitative (or monetary) tightening but also, as Fidelity Investments pointed out in their Quarterly Market Review last week, fiscal tightening. The U.S. deficit, as a percent of GDP, has gone down to 4% vs 12% a year ago.

We remain optimistic on muni bonds.

As yields have risen so has investor interest in municipal



bonds. Munis continue to offer higher long term yields vs U.S. Treasuries which you would typically expect in all bonds. U.S. Treasuries at this point have relatively the same yield over the entire stretch of the yield curve. One interesting development on the muni market is the impact of the American Recovery Act (ARP) signed last year. That 1.9 trillion spending bill sends over \$350 billion to states and localities. We also take note that many states are running a surplus and will have this to add to their coffers. This is another reason we see munis growing in attractiveness. Most munis are held by individual investors (vs institutions) but many of those tend to invest in short to intermediate term munis vs longer term. We take note that Lord Abbett (a mutual fund company) has pointed out that longer term munis have outperformed short and intermediate munis over time.

We remain optimistic on the health care, biotech and consumer staples stocks/sectors.

We take note from history that these sectors tended to perform stronger in past downturns or recessions and think investors should give them consideration. Note that biotech would be considered more speculative, so we suggest investors govern their actions accordingly. Major U.S. pharmaceutical companies as well as medical equipment, facilities and health insurance would comprise the health care sector. Consumer staples, from groceries to food staples and household items have also tended to perform strongly in past downturns. We also note that the U.S. banking sector continues to report that it is in strong financial shape at this time and that investors should take that into consideration as well. We do see inflation slowing as key drivers of shelter, transportation and materials have all come down in prices throughout the month of July. We will see by mid-August what the Labor department will report but remain optimistic that inflation will slow.

We are cautious on housing, materials, crypto and world energy markets.

We take note that prices for houses (while pending home sales have continued to drop) have continued to increase. Here is the interesting part of that: The price appreciation and pending sales are mainly for homes above 500k while prices for homes on the lower end of the scale are eroding. We are seeing the same trend by the way on electric vehicles: Demand and prices are higher for more affluent Americans. Major U.S. car makers are in the meantime forging ahead with making medium and lower cost EVs available for mass production and at considerably lower costs than current EV manufacturers. The legacy U.S. automakers might be worth some consideration if investors agree with that.

The world energy picture continues to demonstrate concern for Europe (which could be headed for severe recession) but there is hope that the Middle East producers might be able to close the gap from European countries moving away from Russian supply. Still, years of underinvestment in fossil fuels and nuclear energy are proving to be challenging for Europe over the short run. Most of Europe would be considered Developed Markets (DM, vs Emerging Markets or EM). Much of the emerging world is ramping up investment in nuclear plants with upwards of 300 planned over the next decade. The U.S. currently has 95 nuclear plants in operation with perhaps two coming online this year. Nuclear is gaining more and more attention because despite the risks most people fear, it may not be as lethal as believed. Bjorn Lomborg of the Copenhagen Consensus Center notes that mortality rates are vastly higher from fossil fuel emissions

than from accidents or operations of nuclear facilities.

As always, we encourage investors to make decisions over time vs overnight and to take historical patterns into consideration when making their investment decisions.

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Understanding Your Homeowners Insurance Policy

Words like "endorsements," "conditions" and "exclusions" don't have to be confusing. Your home insurance policy isn't exactly easy reading, as it is filled with insurance jargon, legalese and acronyms. But before you toss it in a drawer with all the others, you should at least take a glance. The policy language could be the difference between being completely covered for a peril or having to pay thousands of dollars to repair your home and possessions.

If you own a home or investment property, you are aware that having the right homeowners or rental insurance policy in place is of utmost importance. Without proper coverage, you could be responsible for expensive damage in the event of a weather-related incident. In fact, as this year's hurricane season kicks off, now is a really good time to review your homeowner's insurance policy and make sure you are satisfied with your level of coverage.

Start with a review of the Declarations page, which is customized to your home and spells out such details as property address, coverage amounts, premiums and credits that have been applied. Examine this declaration carefully to make sure everything looks adequate and if it does not, contact your agent to obtain clarification and make necessary corrections.

Adequate Dwelling Limit coverage to rebuild your home in the event of a loss is also important. Local and national data indicates that nearly two out of three homes and structures are underinsured. The cost of lumber and other common building materials has soared in the past year as a result of supply chain disruptions and shortages, and now the impact of inflation. These are main reasons new home and all construction costs

have grown more expensive in recent months. As such, the homeowner's policy that was once sufficient for your property may now fall short.

Another important area to look for on the declarations page is Deductibles. This is the amount that you would be responsible for in the event of a claim. And in Florida and other coastal areas, our declaration page will list more than one deductible, depending on the type of claim. A separate and usually much higher deductible would apply to hurricane and other wind-related events. Hurricane or windstorm deductibles often are based on a percentage of your dwelling coverage. The deductible applied to all other perils such as fire, lightning and most water losses other than flood is a flat amount.

The declarations page will also spell out how much coverage you have, but often it will not clarify what is not covered. For info relative to Exclusions, you need to look for sections of the policy with headings like "exclusions" or "losses not insured." Here you will find a list of scenarios that the insurance company won't cover, like flood and earthquake. Since we are definitely at risk to flood disasters, we encourage everyone to purchase flood insurance from the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), or a reputable, private flood insurance facility, which may be a better flood insurance alternative to the NFIP for your home, investment or commercial property.

Another common way to address gaps in coverage is through an Endorsement, which changes or enhances the coverages to your policy. Endorsements are typically listed separately from the main policy text and often found at the end.

Review your policy and be aware of areas of Special Limits or Sublimits. A good example of these common provisions relates to your own personal belongings such as a pricy piece of jewelry or art collection. Most likely there will not be full coverage under a standard homeowners policy and the limit may be as low as \$1,000. If you have items that are worth more than the sublimits, talk with your agent to see how these may be insured more appropriately.

The last area of your review should focus on the Conditions section of the policy, as they spell out how to get the coverage you are entitled to. Read these parts so you understand what you need to do when filing a claim. If you do not meet the conditions, then your claim could be denied.

The insurance marketplace has rapidly changed with premiums increasing, guidelines and appetites tightening and some carriers losing the ability to offer a renewal or write new policies. This seems to be especially true for those with older properties that are close to the water. Citizens Property Insurance Corporation, our state's insurer of last resort, is again becoming a popular and vital player in Florida.

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Website? Who Needs It?

The question that we are going to answer in this piece is "What is a Website and Why Do You Need One?" There are several common misconceptions made by small business owners around what a website entails, what it does, and what it actually provides for you. So, first of all, what is a website?

Through a well-designed website, you can show your customers what you do and how you do it, help them understand how your business works, how your service or your product works, and how that's going to benefit them.

A website also helps you to establish customer expectations.

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
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Sean of the South: The Old Ballgame

And well. That's baseball for





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

The young man hated mucking out the stinking pig stalls. But he snuck some slop for himself occasionally to avoid starvation and prolong his miserable life. Hunger gnawed at him, his constant companion. Squandering his wealth on wine and women reduced him to caring for pigs.

Life could not be worse for the young man. His shoes gave out, leaving him barefoot as sores on his feet oozed. With clothes tattered, and hair fall-

ing out in clumps, even the lice didn't want him anymore.

He had once been the life of the party. All the girls wanted his attention, as his prodigal money caused the wine to flow freely. Now, he was skimming pig slop. He yearned for the days of his youth eating at his father's table, overflowing with sumptuous food. Tormented by memories of better days, he came to himself.

The thought drifted into his foggy mind, "I could go to Father for help." Then he remembered the hurt look in his father's eyes when he demanded his inheritance years before.

"No, but perhaps he would cut me some slack and hire me as one of his field hands. Anything would be better than this." So, with some anticipation of rejection, he turned toward home. Filthy, famished and broken, he shuffled toward the very place he had turned his back on. Then, he saw the strangest sight. In the distance, an older man ran awkwardly toward him. Holding his long, beautiful robes up around his knees, he clopped along in his sandals. As the familiar man approached, he heard him shouting and calling his name. "My son! My son!" Father cried, embracing the young man, sobbing with joy and relief.

"Father, don't touch me. I stink of my sin. I have failed you, wasting your money and my life. Just hire me as a servant, and I will be happy."

Passing over his son's confession, the father ordered the servants, "Bring my son clean clothes, put new sandals on his feet and place my ring on his finger. Let's eat and have a party to celebrate my son's return." The servants responded quickly, incredulous of the prodigal love the father lavished upon his son.

This is Christ's classic parable told in my words. The story hinges on the scriptural word, prodigal, which usually means wasteful, extravagant, or lavish. In the son's case, he wasted his inheritance on selfish pleasures. But the father shows us something altogether different as he lavishes his love upon his child. His father saw him and was filled with compassion for him. Luke 15:20.

We have traditionally associated prodigal with the son's wild lifestyle because we immediately identify with his sinfulness. It is just as true to say that the father's love was prodigal in the sense of lavishing joy and forgiveness upon the son. Too often, the shame of our sin dominates our thoughts and prevents us from embracing God's great love.

Prodigal sin collides with prodigal love and crumbles because grace always wins. Sin melts in the presence of the white-hot heat of unconditional love. "How great is the love the Father has lavished on us that we should be called children of God!" I John 3:1. Can you feel Father God's loving embrace wrapping around you as He weeps with joy at your return?

This story moves me because Jesus took on all of my prodigal sin and lavished his prodigal love on me instead. I am the prodigal son in His story. How many times have I run after my own desires? I gave myself to terrible habits that ran my soul dry. Why did it always take me so long to run back to the Father?

But here He comes running toward me, the Father of all creation. Weeping, he yearns for me and calls my name. He removes my filthy clothes and dresses me with the white robe of Christ's righteousness. God puts the ring of His authority on my finger. Then, He calls me "son."

We go about our lives chasing lesser gods while God waits for

Orchestra Conductor Todd Craven Promises Fantastic Season

The Northwest Florida Symphony Orchestra (NFSO) is about to launch its 2022-23 season, offering a full slate of great concerts.

Todd Craven begins his second season as Music Director of the NFSO. He brings a lengthy and impressive background to his position, as well as a love of the Emerald Coast. The Michigan native had previously worked in Sarasota and Buffalo.

"I have been a musician all of my life, developing a love for the trumpet at age 10," Todd said. "I was fortunate to have great teachers and mentors in my hometown in Michigan and went on to pursue music at the University of Michigan, where I studied with the renowned former Principal Trumpet of the Boston Symphony and Boston Pops, Armando Ghitalla."

After he completed his master's degree at Indiana University, Todd won an audition for Principal Trumpet of the Sarasota Orchestra, where he and his wife Laurie, an accomplished trombonist, played for several years. Todd's trumpet-playing career ended in 2008 when he developed a non-life-threatening neurological condition. It was then that he developed an

interest – and eventually a love – for conducting.

That required going back to school. He went back to his alma mater to study orchestral conducting and was later accepted into the prestigious class of Marin Alsop at the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore.

After the year in Baltimore, which he describes as "quite the culture shock moving from Sarasota," he won auditions for two assistant conductor positions: Edmonton Symphony in Canada and the Buffalo Philharmonic.

"I knew that JoAnn Falletta and the Buffalo Philharmonic would be a great training ground, so I accepted that position," he said. During the covid pandemic, he took a one-year teaching position at the University of Illinois, and auditioned for the Northwest Florida Symphony that year as a finalist. "I was so thrilled that I was awarded the position and my wife and I and our small cat moved immediately to Niceville to settle in before the start of the season," he said. "We love being back in Florida and have enjoyed this area so much. We were thrilled to find that the area parks and beaches are even better, in our opinion, than South Florida! I



certainly do not miss snow and driving in blizzard conditions! Our families are all based in Michigan still, so we visit the old stomping grounds over holidays and in the summer."

Todd and his wife have settled into the small-town atmosphere of Niceville, he said, and have enjoyed football games and Niceville High School band concerts. "We have also made new friends with our wonderful Northwest Florida Symphony Guild members and others in

the community," said Todd.

"Also, I try to attend the local Niceville Chamber of Commerce breakfasts and am a member of the Mid-Bay Rotary Club."

The NFSO was founded by John Leatherwood in 1987, which started as a community/student orchestra and then eventually evolved into a fully professional

ensemble. "We draw from outstanding musicians as far away as Birmingham, Alabama, but most of our players come from this area of Northwest Florida," Todd said. "They are all auditioned musicians, who have multiple degrees and are experts on their instruments."

Todd is chomping at the bit for the 2022-23 NFSO season. "As Music Director, I am responsible for planning all of the music for the season, and it is something I very much love

to do," he said. "I like to work around themes for each concert and think of each one as an event. Our season opener, for instance, is entitled "Ravish and Mayhem" and features internationally acclaimed cellist, Amit Peled.

The first half of the kickoff concert, Todd said, features two beautiful contemporary works by living composers, Stephanie Berg and Anna Clyne. Each work has a connection to sounds of the ancient Middle East. Clyne's "Dance for Cello and Orchestra" is a piece inspired by the poems of the ancient Sufi poet Rumi. The ever popular "Scheherazade" is the featured work on the second half, by 19th-century Russian composer Rimsky-Korsakov and is based on the famous tale from 1001 Arabian nights.

"It is my sincere hope that everyone enjoys our concerts this season and further understands what a wonderful cultural jewel that we have in the Mattie Kelly Arts Center! We have a state-of-the-art hall, an amazing art gallery and an exceptional orchestra that will knock your socks off," said Todd. "Even if you are new to classical or orchestral music, there is something for everyone at the Northwest Florida Symphony Orchestra!"
