2022 Marks the 74th Annual Destin Fishing Rodeo!

For us locals, it's time to begin getting ready for this year's Fishing Rodeo season—a Destin tradition since 1948! And each year it gets better and better with several new events in the upcoming

New for 2022: The Extended Voyage Division will get an expansion, adding five extra species of fish for a total of ten eligible fish. The previous leaderboard included grouper, amberjack, scamp, yellowfin tuna and big eye tuna. Being added for this year are dolphin, wahoo, Almaco Jack, snowy grouper and yellowedge grouper.

Alongside the expansion comes another award addition: The Captain's Award for the Extended Voyage Division. The board of Directors hopes this expansion will allow more Captains to compete in the tournament.

And yet another addition to the Rodeo in 2022 is a Ladies, Seniors and Junior



Divisions for wahoo – alongside king mackerel, grouper, amberjack and blackfin tuna. The weigh station saw a fair amount of wahoo last year, a real crowd pleaser.

The weigh-ins happen on the docks behind AJs Seafood and Oyster bar, located on the Destin Harbor. They are free to the public and open daily from 10 a.m.-7 p.m. For boats to participate, charter and private boats must be registered at least 24 hours prior to weighing in a fish. There is no

fee for anglers fishing on a registered vessel (private or charter) and shore fisherman can participate by simply bringing their catch to the scales. You

Child Fostering: Could It Be Right for You?

Foster parenting helps kids and enriches families. A common misunderstanding about fostering is that foster families are gatekeepers between children and biological parents. April Hight, the Foster Home Recruitment Specialist with FamiliesFirst Network for Okaloosa and Walton County, wants

to clarify that a foster parent is more in the position of being a bridge between a child and their parent(s), with the ultimate goal being reunification. A foster family is part of their healing process.

It's important to make these distinctions, because as our community looks at the aftermath of Covid and lockdown, foster family recruiters like April are finding that a critical area that has been directly affected is the available beds for displaced children. The hope is that local families will consider becoming part of the fostering community, so the losses from 2020 are recovered. Not having beds for this vulnerable group creates additional hardship in an already difficult situation. "In our area,



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we have about 460 kiddos, give or take, in need of foster care every day," said April. "Across our county, we have about 360 available beds. That's approximately 100 children who don't have a local bed each day.

When families are in need, our agency is going to call every licensed home to make sure there is a place here where we can put these children, but oftentimes, they will be sent out of our circuit which includes Okaloosa, Walton, Santa Rosa, and Escambia counties. If we don't have a bed in these areas, they may be sent to a different part of the state and sadly, that is pretty common. Due to the lack of beds, it's very unlikely that they're going to stay in their community once they are removed from the home. This means they're not going to stay in the same school, be near the things that they know, or be anywhere that is familiar. They have to go where there's an available bed.

What is sad is that a lot of our kids bounce. A foster home may be full, but will take a child for a few days to give us time to find a permanent spot. At the end of those few days, just as they're getting comfortable, they have to go to a whole new home. These



kids have to say goodbye again, go to another strange place, and it's just more loss and grief every time they have to move."

There are multiple reasons children are removed from their homes. But, the top two are substance abuse and neglect. When a child is moved into a home where even the community isn't familiar, it leads to more trauma.

April and her counterpart in Escambia and Santa Rosa county, Thomas Williams, provide education and support to potential foster families as they on-board into the foster licensing process. There are five levels of licensure in which a family can qualify: Level one is a family member, level two is the largest group with traditional foster care, and levels three to five are more specialized in physical and therapeutic needs. "To receive a license as a level two home, they need to have adequate space in their home to accommodate the children and every child must have their own bed," said April.

Sleeping arrangements can vary based on the age and gender of the child, but some children also come with the specific stipulation that they need their own room. If a higher level is applied for, it may require that the home has a medical bed. "The initial step in getting a license is to talk to a foster home recruiter like myself."

The profile of a foster family can vary. In addition to traditional families of all sizes, April has also seen great success with single parents and those who are old enough to be grandparents.

"The ideal foster parents are those who can have empathy for biological families," said April. "They are willing to learn about trauma and have a flexible parenting style."

April also stresses the importance of internal work before an individual, a couple or a family considers opening their home. "Have conversations with those who are closest to you, whether that's your extended family, your church, people you work with or your friend group. Make sure you have adequate support, because you're going to need a support system," she said. "Couples have to be on the same page and both have to be fully vested. Include the children in the conversation, because they sacrifice space and time while sharing their home."

Once you become a foster family, there is ongoing support. In addition to a small stipend to help with the cost of the additional child(ren) in your home, a care coordination arm of FamiliesFirst Network helps navigate challenging situations while offering practical solutions. Online support, Facebook page support and Zoom calls are available for even easier access. "The best support is other foster parents and it's a great community ready to help," said April.






Our Hometown Hero and Local Gulf War Veteran Honors Grandfather's Legacy in New Book

Like his grandfather, Colonel Gregory S. Valloch served in the military and is a U.S. Army veteran who honorably served during the Gulf War. Local resident Col. Gregory S. Valloch was commissioned a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army and as an armor officer upon grad-



uating from Norwich University as a Distinguished Military Graduate. He served in the Tiger Brigade (1st Brigade, Second Armored Division) during Desert Shield Desert Storm. He left active duty and joined the U.S. Army Reserve where he served as an operations officer



and plans officer, and then spent a year deployed to Al Udeid Airbase in Qatar as the plans division chief in the 2nd Battlefield Coordination Detachment.

He was selected for Battalion Command and commanded the 1st Battalion 411th Regiment Logistics Support Battalion (LSB). He was selected for colonel and served until his retirement in 2013 as the deputy commander of the USAR Consequence Management Unit located in Abingdon, Maryland.

In 2016, he opened a Ben & Jerry's shop in Miramar Beach, which has been named the "Best Dessert" by the readers of VIP Destin Magazine in 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2022. Originally from Vermont, the birthplace of the original Ben & Jerry's, Gregory persevered in becoming a Ben & Jerry's franchise owner, it taking 14 years due to non-expansion of their franchises.

He feels the most important thing you can do as a local business owner is give back to the community, and he does just that. He's an avid supporter of the Boys & Girls Club, Path of Grace and PAWS, an organization that helps train and place service dogs with veterans.

Now, Gregory has added "author" to his title. His new book, "The Great War Through a Doughboy's Eyes," was released this past March and chronicles the service of Corporal Howard P. Claypoole, told through Gregory's eyes, his grandson.

Corporal Howard P. Claypoole served in the U.S. Army during WWI and was awarded

The Purple Heart posthumously. Gregory credits his grandfather's bravery and conviction as the source of his motivation to earn a commission in the Army. When Gregory came across his grandfather's wartime diaries, correspondence and artifacts, he saw that it was only fitting he share his grandfather's legacy with the world.

In "The Great War Through

a Doughboy's Eyes," Gregory offers a unique account of his grandfather's service during WWI, illustrating the hardships of soldiers at war. Utilizing his grandfather's diary entries, postcards, letters, wound order, newspaper clippings, military history and discharge papers, Gregory tells the story of a man with an unwavering allegiance to his country and a will to survive. Corporal Claypoole's journey is brought to life through photographs of wartime memorabilia, including playing cards, pictures, dice, dog tags, medals, bayonets, coins, his rifle sling covered with unit crests, his Purple Heart, and his WWI Victory Medal and campaign clasps.

"This is the story of one man who fought in the Great War, came home, got married, and had a successful life," Gregory said. "But he also found friend-ship and life lessons forged in battle that stayed with him until the very end. And that is what I want to relate."

I've thought about our military a lot since moving to the Emerald Coast and I've worked with military buyers and sellers. Before we continue, allow me to thank you who have served or have had family serve in the military — I appreciate and am humbled by your service to our great country.

So, what's a VA Loan? A VA Loan is a mortgage option available to eligible members of the regular military, reservists, veterans, National Guard and spouses of military members who died while on active duty or as a result of a service-connected disability. If you are one of these folks and have not purchased a home, continue reading. And if you already own a home and are one of these folks, you should read this too!

Many who are eligible are not taking advantage of this benefit. In fact, of the 21 million-plus service members and veterans in this country, only about 6 percent have used a VA Loan to purchase a home in the last five years! Some eligible candidates don't know about the program, some may think it's a long, drawn out process and some lenders may not even think to offer it as an option to borrowers who are applying for a mortgage loan. There are many reasons to use this benefit and here's a few:

1. VA loan rates are typically about 25 percent lower than conventional loans — since the government backs the loan it is considered low risk; they also have some of the lowest foreclosure rates. Just about any lender can do a VA loan. It is not issued

by the government; it is backed by the government. Many banks, credit unions and mortgage lenders can do VA loans.

- 2. They have more forgiving guidelines for lower credit scores, past foreclosures and/or bankruptcies. Do you think your financial history is too bad to buy or refinance your home? These issues don't necessarily disqualify you from eligibility. Each lender will have their own guidelines on these issues, so shop around!
- 3. Zero money down! This is big when you consider conventional loans can ask for 10, 20 even 30 percent down! Twenty percent down on a \$300,000 house plus all the closing costs, inspection costs, etc. can add up fast. This is particularly attractive if you're buying your first home and have no equity built up from a house sale to put into a new home.
- 4. No Mortgage Insurance! Private mortgage insurance can be hundreds of dollars per month! Another cost savings!
- 5. You can use your VA home loan benefit over and over again! How cool is that? Sell and pay off one home, then use the benefit again for your next home, and the next one and the next one! Once you've been deemed eligible for the benefit, it never goes away.
- 6. You can use the benefit to refinance your existing mortgage whether it is a VA loan or not.
- 7. You can use the benefit to tap into your home's equity. The VA cash-out loan amount can be up to 100 percent of your home's value in many cases. Use it for home improvements, a new boat, a car, college tuition.
- 8. Disabled veterans and veterans who are eligible for disability compensation but are getting active duty pay or retirement pay instead, are exempt from funding fees this fee is usually between .5 and 3.3 percent of the loan amount.

9. Home ownership – it's way better to pay yourself than to pay rent, so, if you are eligible for a VA Loan and haven't used it, what the heck are you waiting for?

American Legion Post 392 in Panama City met and voted on all submissions each quarter, selecting one veteran in need and one first responder in need to be awarded the units.

In 2015, the giveaway began taking the form of a quarterly appreciation lunch at Harley-Davidson of Panama City Beach. Local musician Neal James opened the lunches with the National Anthem and play background music while Texas Roadhouse catered. The first event hosted around 40 guests and several local businesses co-sponsored. The next lunch brought in a few more guests and sponsors, and the Vet Center and other veteran-related organizations joined in. As the word-of-mouth continued, the guest list grew. By Fall 2017, the event moved to Texas Roadhouse; today this appreciation lunch still takes place, now maxing out the restaurant at 380+

But Jimy still wanted to reach and help more veterans and first

responders. In November 2019, Pastor Dave of Faith Assem-

bly Church in Miramar Beach (affectionately known as "The Rock & Roll Church"), invited Jimy to launch a quarterly appreciation lunch there, thus reaching vets and first responders in the Walton/Okaloosa area. The appreciation lunch has taken place there ever since, slowly growing in attendance and giving away one HVAC unit per quarter, for a total of

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Timing is Everything: 'Tis the Season to Renovate

Whew! We made it through the summer madness. The kids are back in school and our overnight company and guest bookings have begun to dwindle. Dreaming of a renovation project? Now is a great time to start.

Once you've made the decision to remodel, you'll need to select an interior designer and a contractor to get the ball rolling.



The best advice I can give you is to check their credentials. Make sure their license is current and insurance is valid.

One of my favorite sayings is "plan your work and work your plan." Every project requires the following steps be completed to ensure the project is delivered on time and on budget, without crucial mishaps:

Pre-Planning: This will answer some of the all important questions such as "What will it look like?," "How much will it cost?," and "How long will it take?" This process should consist of drawings, preliminary shopping for finish materials (cabinets, counter tops, etc.), accurate pricing, and a timeline of the project. This initial phase may take six-eight weeks.

Design Development: This phase sets you up for suc-

cess with your timeline and budget. By knowing all the details, you can accurately schedule the project, determine an appropriate start time, pre-order materials and secure the subcontractor labor needed for the job to complete on time. This will take about two weeks.

Permitting: This phase includes the time from initial application submission to the time the permits are received, which typically takes about two months. Every town is different and time may vary.

Construction: Once permitting is completed, construction can begin. The time frame will vary, based on the scope-of-work. Your specific timeline will be based on the plan your contractor provides you at the



beginning of the project. Once permits have been received and items are ordered, demo and construction will begin.

Below are suggested time frames based on remodeling major areas within your home.

Whole House: The duration of a whole house remodel depends on the scope of work and generally takes four-six months. If you elect to live on property while the work is being done, additional time may be required to complete the project.

Full Kitchen Remodel: Generally, when the kitchen is gutted and everything is replaced without adding square footage it will take approximately eight weeks. With most kitchen remodels, the scope of work extends to additional areas such as the dining room, family room, removing a wall to open up the space, etc. and can add an additional two-four weeks.

Bathroom: Similar to the kitchen, when everything is being replaced, it can take sixeight weeks.

Interior Painting: Depending on the size of your home and the scope of work (walls, baseboards, crown moulding, doors, patch and prep, etc.), it can take anywhere from a few days to two-plus weeks.

Window Coverings: Depending on what you select

(drapes, plantation shutters, bamboo shades, etc.) it can range anywhere from three-eight weeks.

Furniture & Artwork: If you're lucky enough to love a piece that's available in the store it could likely be delivered within a few days. These days, when ordering upholstered furniture, it can take up to six months and maybe even longer. Sigh.

In today's climate, there are many things that can cause project delays such as weather, product availability and labor. Indecision also plays a huge factor in delays. Hire your interior designer in the beginning stages so they can work with your contractor, guiding you to make the perfect decisions.

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How to Trade Your Car for a Fair Price

When it comes to purchasing a vehicle, many of us find ourselves also needing to make disposition of a current one at or near the same time. This is one part of the auto purchase game that tends to be overshadowed by the importance of the price the new vehicle can be obtained at. Though in reality, what you get for your current driver is just as important as the price you pay for the next one. Remember, your car, truck or SUV iseven if it is paid for-just like real money when it comes to negotiating the out-the-door deal on your next one.

How you choose to best move your current vehicle has a lot to do with the vehicle you are looking to buy. In other words, if you are buying from a dealer, you likely have the option of trading in your current vehicle. However, if you are purchasing your next car from a private owner, you most likely will need to sell your current vehicle on your own.

Trading to a Dealer: Trading your vehicle to a dealer is usually the fastest and least troublesome way to get out of your current car and into a new one. However, as with most things in life, the fastest and easiest way isn't always the best one when it comes to the monetary side of the equation. This is especially the case since dealers have to allow room to also make a profit on the vehicle you trade in. For all practical purposes, any trade to a dealer is technically a sell, where the purchase price to you simply comes off your purchase price of their vehicle.

Because of the fact that a dealer hopes to turn a profit on your trade in, it makes sense they will put less than a retail price into your trade. That's completely fair, but you at least need to be aware of what that price really is, and how they came about determining it. There are a few ways to do this. The first is to make sure you're aware of the approximate "trade in" value of your vehicle before going to any dealership. One of the easiest ways to do this is to utilize the free valuation service provided by NADA.com. This is the official site for the National Auto Dealers Association, and in my experience of having owned over 40 cars, trucks and SUVs and a stint as a territory rep for Cox Communications' dealers only AutoMart magazine, I have found the NADA values to be the truest available, when compared to valuation sites like KBB (Kelley Blue Book), Carvana, CarMax and various other "we'll buy your vehicle" type

When determining your valuation on the NADA or any website, you are at best only going to get the "clean trade" price. You can't expect a dealer to pay "clean retail" for a car they are going to then have to run through their shop, and po-

tentially spend some money on. (Trust me, EVERY SINGLE VEHICLE needs something 85% of the time, even if you as the owner are unaware of it. The truth is, a lot of every day driver cars, trucks and SUVseven the overall good condition ones-don't legitimately fit into the "clean trade in" category, and fall more in the "average trade in" range. Find that, being careful to correctly input your vehicle's mileage and features, and you'll be armed with a pretty good picture of what you should get for your trade in when you are also buying a car from that dealer. Note: This is not the only valuation dealers use to determine what they can or can't put into your trade at any given time. Dealers may also check other sales criteria available to them online, such as what same year, similar mileage vehicles as yours are currently bringing at auto auctions within their region, and how many other cars or trucks like yours are currently for sale at lots within a 100 to 300-mile radius of them, and for what price. In other

words, availability, competitor pricing and demand all have a legit baring on what your vehicle is worth to any given dealer at a certain time.

Another very important aspect of selling to trading to a dealer: Make sure the numbers are the real numbers. You shouldn't have to worry about this, but the truth is you do. Most dealers are above board and will show and explain anything and everything you ask. But just like with anyone selling anything, from magazine, TV, radio or web advertising to real estate to restaurants serving you food, it never hurts to ask questions so you are sure that what you are paying for (or in this case, also being paid for your trade) is exactly what you think it is. 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





can fish by kayak, paddle board, pier, bridge, jetty, shoreline and surf – whichever you prefer.

If you're planning to make a trip down to the docks, expect to see a broad spectrum of fish being weighed in. From Sharks to Amberjacks, Grouper to King Mackerel, Tunas to Marlin, the rodeo has it all. Anglers are competing for more than \$100,000 in cash and prizes, awarded for both daily and overall catches.

Even if you're not a fisherman, the energy level and ex-



citement that comes from being at the docks for weigh ins is like nothing else you've ever experienced. Boats back into the scales, pull the fish from their boat while the announcer hypes up the crowd. Fish are strung up on the scale while the crowds cheer and applaud the boat and their team. For the best seat in the house, get there early, grab a few beers and snag a seat on the bleachers by the leaderboard or above on AJ's upper deck.

Halloween on the Harbor will signify the end of weigh-ins on Wednesday. Oct. 31, when the captains, anglers, volunteers and even Miss Destin will be dressed in their favorite costume. Everyone is invited to partake in the


all of the safety precautions for Covid (including masking everywhere!), it was a wonderful week serving the Lord!

In its 5th year, volunteers have removed more than 2,000 lbs. of garbage and over 1,000 cigarette butts during the most recent event. Marine debris is a detriment to our local ecosystem and causes problems for seabirds and coastal marine life.





Second Bus to Provide Restorative Dental Services To Children In Need

Children's Volunteer Health Network, an organization that provides free access to dental and mental health services to children in need in Northwest Florida, has announced the arrival of their second mobile dental clinic. The first bus, gifted to CVHN from the Dugas Family Foundation, is an operatory clinic on wheels. The dental unit meets children where they are and provides preventative dental services on the bus, which is often parked outside of local schools. I've dealt with sleep issues over the years. What I've discovered is that getting quality sleep means developing a routine and sticking with it. I have also found a couple nutritionals that have

A Focus on Sleep

helped me sleep better. As our lives ebb and flow, so does our sleep. However, sleep is critical for our health and ignoring it, hoping it will get better, is not a healthy choice to make. Mine is a work in progress with stress be-

ing the main interrupter. So, let's dive in and learn a little more about sleep.

What is sleep? It's restful if we sleep well. It's not an idle mode. Our body and brain are working. It activates a process that helps

us rest, repair and recharge.

There are 4 stages in the sleep cycle:

Between wakefulness and sleep – Everything slows down and muscles soften, heart and breathing rates decrease and brain patterns begin to change.

Light sleep – The process continues and body temperature drops.

Deepest state – It's hard to be awakened. Our heart and breathing are at their lowest point, muscles extremely relaxed. It's integral to quality sleep. If this stage is cut short we don't wake up feeling rested.

REM – Rapid eye movement sleep. In many ways it's the opposite of the other three stages. It's the dreaming stage; heart rate increases, breathing rate can quicken and become irregular, eyes move rapidly behind eyelids and brain activity livens. As a protective measure the body can experience temporary paralysis of limbs preventing the body from acting out movement about which we dream.


All 4 stages run through in succession until we wake up. Without both NREM and REM sleep our memory consolidation is harmed.

And when you decide to go to Smallmart with your list of essentials only to find that the most important item is not even sold at that location, hormones will help.



Things that can interrupt our sleep:

Caffeine, alcohol, diet (sugar intake) or eating too close to bedtime. Physical activity, stress level or emotional state, bright lights or blue light.

Things we can do:

- Put away electronics at least 30 minutes prior to going to bed. Consider removing electronics from the bedroom as the electromagnetic waves can interfere with sleep.
- Develop a consistent bedtime as this will develop a rhythm of our internal clock
- Relax by doing some light stretching
 - Dim lights
 - Play soft music, etc.
- Use blackout curtains (Light is the signal that turns on and off our sleep hormones.).
- Instead of tossing and turning, consider getting up, take a slow walk around the house, have a sip of warm water, read for a few minutes or stretch us-

ing slow movements to relax the body. Then return to bed and focus on your breathing.

Sleep is important for a healthy immune system. Here are a few things that happen when we sleep:

Ingesting – added to food or drink, get professional advice before utilizing this method

What is This Time For?

There was a season of life where I reached the end of the day feeling I had been a slave to my to-do list. I was busy running from one task to the next. And, even when the days were as productive as they were busy, I often felt unfulfilled at the end of the day. Though things were getting done, there was no time to appreciate my accomplishments and tasks that were being accomplished were sometimes at the expense of being present with the people that matter most to me. I was overwhelmed, tired and frustrated.

Time is one of our most precious gifts. Time is finite, we can't "make time," (even though we often use the phrase) we can only spend it. Additionally, we don't get "do overs" with our time. So, we have developed and utilize tools to help us maximize our time including watches, calendars, alarm clocks, time management apps on our phones, to-do lists and many others. Ironically, we can allow ourselves to be controlled by these tools, which are supposed to help us stay in control, at the expense of the very moments the tools were intended to help us maximize. So how do we break out of this cycle? Here are three strategies that have been helpful for me and my clients:

Consider the different aspects of time. In our culture, we tend to think of time in a narrow and limited way. I often introduce my clients to the words the Greeks used to differentiate two ways they thought of time. The two words are chronos and kairos.

The Greek word chronos is the easiest for us to understand because it aligns with the most common way we refer to time. Chronos refers to the quantity of time. When we say, "It arrived at 3:07," or "I am getting married in 18 days," or "The cupcakes will be ready in 20 minutes," we are talking about chronos time. Most of the tools we have for time management are built around maximizing time in a quantitative sense.

The Greek word Kairos,



however, refers to time in a qualitative sense. We tend to think about time in this way far less. However, when we say, "It showed up at just the right time" or "We knew it was time to get married" or "These cupcakes are taking forever" we are referring to kairos time. Our hectic schedules can challenge our efforts to maximize time in a qualitative sense.

Of course, both understandings of time are important. A chronos understanding helps us recognize the limits of our time and the need to act so we can move our stories forward. And a kairos understanding helps us think beyond those limits so we move our stories forward with intentionality and meaning.

Slow down to speed up. With a Kairos understanding of time, we can begin to see that sometimes the most efficient thing we can do is slow down and take a breath before rushing to the next thing. When we do this, we let go of anxious men-

tal energy in favor of focused mental energy. This also gives us space to exercise a third strategy.

Ask, "What is this time for?" When we are thinking about time with a chronos understanding, we will tend to ask questions like, "What do I have to do?", "Where am I supposed to be?", or "How long is this going to take?" In this sense, time is being spent and we can find ourselves looking towards what's next. But, when we are thinking about time with a karios understanding, we might ask a question like, "What is this time for?" Asking this question can help us relax into the moment and consider taking in all the benefits the present moment has to offer. Asking, "What is this time for?" may save me from rushing to accomplish more tasks on my to-do list (quantitative) in favor of taking time to be fully present with my child who is asking for help with a school project or waiting to be tucked in at night (qualitative).



Insights for Investors

Inflation, interest rates and the current state of things

Inflation has had more impact over the past than at any time in almost the past 40 years. After peaking at 9.1 percent in July, inflation came in a little lower in August at 8.5 percent. Producer and import prices remained high and the supply change problems persisted. The chip shortage affected just about everything (would you believe more than 300 chips go into a car²)

Going back in history, inflation in 1981 was above 10 percent and by 1982 the unem-

ployment rate was over 10 percent and interest rates were well above that. The USA and the world experienced two recessions in the early '80s and those followed a very difficult period of the 1970s where the markets underperformed and the economy struggled. The Dow Jones Industrials Average was higher in 1972 than it was in 1982. And then, things began to change. It started with changes in tax legislation, private and public investment and believe it or not, the decline of the US dollar. The economy grew, interest rates came down, unemployment came down, and inflation made its way down to less than 2 percent over the past two decades. Prosperity was more that norm than the exception. Fast forward to today and the Dow is over 33,000 at this writing, which is up from 742 in August of 1982.

Today, a lasting labor shortage

Investors are right to wonder just how we ended up here. There is no one answer – it is a combination of things. First is the tremendous monetary and fiscal stimulus throughout the

pandemic. That unleashed a lot of capital which many still have saved, invested or can borrow and at still historically low rates. Next, many left their jobs (38 million in 2021) and either went to other jobs or, at a significant pace, started their own businesses. Third, the combined impact of stock market and real estate markets over the past few years had many people feeling more confident of retiring early. What do these things add up to? Wage pressures, which keep inflation elevated. Investors should take note to consider those investments that have historically outpaced inflation.

Real Rates of Return or more important now

The real rate of return is what is left after inflation (and don't forget taxes). As inflation has risen many investments (cash, CDs, many bonds) have had a low to negative real return. That is not always easy to realize so investors and savers are encouraged to take a step back and consider the real return. Most people want to keep pace with inflation at the very least and to outpace it at the very best. Stocks and real estate still command the lead for returns vs inflation and other asset classes. Of course those asset classes come with higher degrees of risk and volatility.

Vanguard says bonds are back

In its recent paper "Active Fixed Income Perspectives Q3 2022: Bonds are back," Vanguard points out several key things for investors to consider. Most important of these is that bonds have had the worst performance in history over the first six months of 2022. They point out however that real returns, or positive returns, now exist. They argue "with bond yields higher than expected inflation over the next five years and beyond." We agree with their sentiment that bonds once again offer diversification and less risk for investors' portfolios after not having done so in the recent past. We also look at the returns on municipals (for those in higher tax brackets), and according to Raymond James, some of the best values may exist with maturities in the 8-20 maturity range. Raymond James also makes available to in-



vestors the important statistic of duration, which is a measure of risk for a given bond which considers its maturity and call dates.

Europe continues to adapt

to the crisis and is bringing

some coal-fired plants back and Norway recently vowed to outproduce Russia in natural gas supply as long as the crisis lasts. Natural gas prices at this writing are at their highest levels in the past 14 years. The implication for investors in our opinion is to continue to overweight holdings in the energy sector relative to its current weighting (in the S&P 500) which is 4.4 percent. That is significantly lower than it was just 10 years ago. Another way we see it is that despite the pandemic, and the crisis in Europe, the world continues to grow and more and more people in emerging and developing countries are increasing their standards of living. The demand for electricity might continue to grow significantly in the US. In a recent editorial, the Los Angeles Times pointed out that California alone could see energy consumption grow as much as 68 percent by 2045. They argue that in line with the electrification of cars, that would be a key driver. The world will need more energy from whatever form it may come. We also think investors should pay attention to the reemergence of nuclear power. States and countries are hard at work solving for waste storage and there is also the long-term promise of small modular reactors which create a fraction of the waste. While a lot of companies are working on that technology it is not near being scalable.

Interest rates and savings rates

Investors can finally enjoy more competitive returns on

their most conservative investments. Many brokerage firms and financial institutions are now offering CDs over 3 percent for one year and many money market fund yields have increased as short-term rates have increased. Many are left wondering how long rates will continue to climb. We are not convinced that it will become a long-term trend. We agree with a lot of the sentiment we hear and read that short term rates are likely to peak at 3.5 percent. We will have to see what the future brings.

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Your Customized Auto Policy Just Got More Expensive

In July, we learned that Florida has the highest homeowner premiums in the country. And today it's official, we now have the highest auto rates too! The average annual premium in 2022 is \$2,560, compared to the national average of \$1,682.

In Florida and most states, auto insurance is required to register and legally operate a vehicle. Like most lines of insurance in Florida, rates have been on a rise for the past few years. It may be tempting to only purchase enough coverage to meet our state's minimum requirements. Don't do it! These low limits are not enough to protect

you and your family if the worst circumstances happen.

Your car insurance policy is an important financial tool. If your car or you are involved in a wreck, theft or natural disaster (hurricane, flood or fire), the impact on your financial viability can be substantial. Your car insurance should be tailored to protect you, other people and assets from most of the associated expenses and costs in the event you are involved in an accident. Your lender, who legally owns the car, may have their own requirements and will want to be financially protected if there is a collision or other damage.

There are six basic types of coverages for your auto, motor home, motorcycle and LSV's that are registered with the state.

Liability — Coverage that offers protection against claims alleging that a driver's negligence resulted in bodily injury or property damage to another party. This can include the driver and passengers of the other vehicle or vehicles involved, injured pedestrians and owners of the property where the accident occurred.

The more assets you need to protect, the higher the limits should be. For those with significant assets, an Umbrella policy is recommended for increased protection. In most cases the Umbrella will require minimum underlying Liability limits of \$250,000/\$500,000.

Medical Expenses – Coverage for medical expenses because of bodily injury sustained by an insured caused by an accident. This covers your medical bills (not lost wages), regardless of who is at fault in a crash. Usual limits offered \$1,000, \$5,000 and \$10,000.

Uninsured/Underinsured Motorist Coverage –

This coverage pays for your and your passengers' medical bills and property damage if the driver at fault in an accident doesn't have insurance, has insufficient coverage, or the incident is a hit-and-run. It is recommended to carry limits equal to the liability limits on a Stacked (broader) Basis rather than Non-Stacked.

PIP/Personal Injury Protection - Mandated by Florida, provides medical, disability, and death benefits to you and any passengers in your vehicle. Basic PIP covers up to 80 percent of your medical expenses and 60 percent of your lost wages.

Collision - Physical dam-

age coverage for your vehicle if it is impacted by another vehicle or damaged in an accident. This coverage is usually required by a lienholder on a leased or financed vehicle.

Comprehensive – Covers damage to your vehicle caused by an event other than a collision, such as fire, theft, vandalism, hail and flood damage. Like collision, this coverage is usually required by a lienholder on a leased or financed vehicle.

Other Recommended Coverages – There are many other coverages that should be considered when reviewing your Personal Insurance Program. Included are Loss of Use or Rental Reimbursement, Roadside Assistance, Accident Forgiveness, Gap, New Car Replacement, Diminishing Deductible, Pay-Per Mile Coverage, Customized Equipment and Original Equipment Coverage.

With the popularity of Uber and Lyft, one can now obtain Rideshare Insurance. This is supplemental coverage for drivers of the ride-hauling services, which is typically inexpensive. It provides valuable coverage for situations that are not covered by a driver's personal car insurance policy. If you are a rideshare driver, please discuss options with your insurance agent.

Many of our neighbors and customers have golf carts, or LSVs (low speed vehicles). As long as they're not rented, they can be written as a separate policy, or added to your auto policy if they are licensed for road use. The rental exposure can sometimes be written under a commercial liability policy, but the coverage is not as broad as an auto policy.

Many of our neighbors and customers have teenagers who are approaching the driving age and wonder how best to insure these exposures. If you have a new driver in the household, all insurance companies recognize the increase in risk with a new driver. Some insurance carriers will not insure new drivers while others will charge higher premiums to make up for the increased exposure. There are some measures you can take to lower your insurance rate, like taking a driving course. This will help your new driver become more familiar with the rules of the road and educate him on ways to avoid accidents. When you are a new driver, it is worth taking it slow, stick to the roads you are familiar with, and avoid getting into stressful traffic situations.





to Jericho, when he fell into the hands of robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came to where the man was: and when he saw him, he took pity on him. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, took him to an inn and took care of him. The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'

"Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?"

The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him."

Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise." Luke 10:25-37

How can we know we are truly a Christian? Are you going to heaven? You cannot "be a good person" and earn your way into heaven. Nor is church membership enough. Jesus shows us a better way.

A young religious lawyer approaches Jesus, asking, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Great question.

Jesus asks the lawyer about what he believes, and the man shares remarkable insight as he says, "Love God" and "Love others." These two great commandments are not only a summary of the entire Old Testament, but are the guiding principles of successful living. Great answer.

The lawyer, seeking to justify himself, questions Jesus further. "Who is my neighbor?" The translation here sounds like his motive is to prove himself good enough. I submit he is actually seeking assurance, as if he were saying, "How do I know the kind of love and faith God requires?" Christ answers with a story aimed at challenging the man while assuring him of salvation.

The parable begins with a man robbed, beaten, and left for dead. The priest walking by is unwilling to defile himself with this messy situation, so he avoids the man in need. Touching a bleeding person would have disqualified the priest from serving in the Temple. Ironically, he was en route to the Temple to serve people in need while a man lies suffering right in front of him. A Levite also passes by, but in a hurry to fulfill his religious duties, he leaves the poor man by the side of the road.

But along comes a despised, irreligious Samaritan who has compassion for the man and generously attends to his needs. Christ concludes the parable with a question for the lawyer: "So, who was the good neighbor?"

The lawyer answers, "The one who had mercy on him."

Christ's conclusion and message to us, "Go and do likewise."

It is easy to love God and love others in theory. The difficulty comes in actually doing it in ways that matter. The Lord shows us how. Through the priest, Christ shows you can find needy people in non-religious settings.

The Levite reveals hurting people sometimes surface at the

most inconvenient times. It is in the random and unpredictable places that people and circumstances challenge us to show mercy.

Who is our neighbor? It is the needy person set in our path or the difficult situation that people lay on our doorstep. Often, our neighbor is a stranger.

We could shirk responsibility and ask ourselves, "Why is this person my problem?" We can go down the guilt path and assign blame. "What did they do to get themselves into this situation?" Or we can take the mercy road and help the hurting per-

When I was 17 and a new Christian, my mother went out drinking. Late that night, she came home with a male friend who had drunk way too much. Because I had two twin beds in my room, the stranger slept in the empty bed. I remember his smell to this day. Internally, I fumed with anger. But I also sensed that this man needed to know Christ as his savior.

I explained the good news of Jesus Christ to this inebriated person, and he prayed the prayer of faith. I went to sleep, doubtful he would remember anything. In the morning, I drove him home, and as I was dropping him off, he paused and said, "I remember what we did last night. I'm a Christian now." Despite my lack of compassion, God's grace powerfully affected this new brother.

I know simple faith in the Lord Jesus Christ saves us from sin. But I also know we need to act on that faith by loving our neighbors. Walking down the road of life, you will encounter struggling, hurting people. In my experience, these tests occur in the most inconvenient times and are costly in time and money. Are you ready to meet your neighbor and pass the mercy test?



Emerald Coast Theatre Company's Centerline of Love

In high school, my drama teacher showed me how to draw a ground plan to design a set. He taught me that every set designer starts their ground plan by drawing a centerline. This is a vertical dotted line down the center of the page, ending with the letters CL, usually drawn with the top of the L inside the C and the horizontal part below. In my youth and exuberance of learning all about theater, that image always stuck with me... the centerline.

Fast forward a few decades (or more) to a spring day last year... I was taking a walk out in the open air, enjoying nature and making a valiant effort to relax. I enjoy listening to music when I walk - sometimes worship music, sometimes indie folk or sometimes laid back jazz like Jamie Cullum. On this particular day, I was allowing Spotify to present some new songs alongside my usual favorites. Rebeca Lake, ECTC's Set and Lighting Designer, had recently introduced the wonders of Spotify to me (showing my age here) as a great way to learn about other artists and songs that are similar to what I'm already listening to.

This particular day I was deep in thought, meditating and contemplating through a particular work puzzle that needed solving. As I'm walking along this beautiful trail, deep in reverie and listening to this new music, a song came on that provided an astounding moment of clarity. I had an astounding moment of clarity.

Here are the captivating words to this song that brought such an incredible feeling in that moment:

Everyday

That love

We go to war again

We assume we know so much more than them

Before we hear what they have to say

Headline breaks
We start to hate again
Calling them names again
We give our peace away
I hope they see it
Cause I wanna see it
I hope we believe it
I wanna see
I wanna see
H wanna see the love
All around you
Il wanna know
I wanna know

Is all around you
It's all around you

My mind's eye went to seeing all the children and teens who come to ECTC on a weekly basis. I want to see the love all around them. I thought of the volunteers and other patrons that come and find community at ECTC...I want to see the love all around them, too. The families who come for shows or to support siblings...I want them to see the love there too. My beautiful staff who pour their heart and soul into ECTC everyday...I want to see the love all around them too!

I had to find out who wrote these soul piercing words. The song is See the Love by The Brilliance. As the song continued it was like I was having a divine moment with the Creator, and my thoughts went back to high school and what my drama teacher had taught me.

The image of the centerline materialized in my mind as I listened intently. I pondered the centerline of that early set design draft, and then thought of the carpenter's plumbline and cornerstone. As these images were going through my head the thought very clearly came to me that the centerline of ECTC is love! If whatever we do operates out of love, then we are on the right track.

Fast forward several years, and as we are planning our 10th-season, Godspell comes up in discussion. Godspell is based on the teachings of Jesus which, as presented in Godspell, challenge us to love and build community. The entire premise of the show is based on this foundational commandement, "Thou shalt love the Lord, your God, with all your heart and all your soul. This is the greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. All the rest of the law, and all the prophets have written, is based on these first two."

The connection between Godspell and the building of ECTC over the last nine years is undeniably the building of community and the loving of others, the centerline of love. As we build the set, enact the Godspell story, and sing the songs, our whole focus has been just that – a centerline of love. Our mission through Godspell and ECTC is to create a community of love. When Rebeca drew that CL for the Godspell ground plan and when she does it for every other

set that our professional actors and our students perform on, every show that our patrons and families come see, all of it starts with the centerline of love.
