

27th Annual MKAF Festival of the Arts Celebrates Art, Music, Food and Fun

How do you frame up a festive, fall weekend on the Emerald Coast? Come take part in Mattie Kelly Arts Foundation's 27th annual Festival of the Arts.

With dozens of artists taking part, this year's free event, set for Saturday, Oct. 29 and Sunday, Oct. 30 at the scenic MKAF Cultural Arts Village in Destin, again promises to be a true celebration of art, music, food and fun.

One of the Southeast's premier art festivals, the twoday signature event features exhibits of more than 100 artists venturing from 17 states showcasing a diverse palette of artistic styles in a range of different art mediums from oil, watercolor and glass art paintings to clay pottery, ceramics, metal sculpture, mixed media, jewelry art and much more.

Art lovers of all ages can watch artists demonstrating their techniques in their tented booths, browse art from



dozens of emerging new and student artists, and get handson in the interactive Creative Kids station and more.

This year's poster art features Seascape, a lushly layered coastal-inspired acrylic work of award-winning 30A artist Justin Gaffrey, South Walton 2005 artist of the year. As a professional, selftaught, artist since 2001, Gaffrey draws inspiration from

nature, human nature and life experiences.

Beyond the visual arts, the Festival will feature two days of continual live music and a sampling of the local culinary arts scene. Entertaining street performers, art-themed photo opportunities, lively art drawings and the sale of colorful keepsake souvenirs - all create a family-friendly festival feel.





Esteemed judges will award \$10,000 in artist prizes in the juried and collaborative art categories. On Saturday, Festivalgoers are invited to vote for the "People's Choice" Artist Award by casting a ballot located at the Main Festival Entrance.

during major events in U.S. military history. Topics featured many first-hand accounts from people involved in training for the Doolittle Raid on Tokyo, Operation Desert Storm, the Iran Hostage Rescue Mission, Osama bin Laden Raid, Vietnam War, Korean War, Operation Enduring Freedom Afghanistan and more.

The celebration included several special guests, including SEAC Ramón "CZ" Colón-López, the senior enlisted adviser to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Retired Capt. Dale Dy, a decorated Vietnam War Marine. Dye is the founder and head of Warriors, Inc., a technical advisory company specializing in portraying realistic military action in Hollywood films. He has offered his expertise to television shows such as the HBO miniseries "Band of Brothers" and "The Pacific."

Ted Corcoran, president and CEO of the Greater FWB Chamber, stated, "It's just amazing that our neighbors and friends were involved in these crucial military operations throughout the world." Corcoran pointed out that the Air Force, and the military as a whole, are loved in Okaloosa County.

The state established the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame in 2013 to recognize and honor military veterans who have made a significant contribution to Florida through their years of service. Nine Okaloosa County veterans have been inducted since 2016.

Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs representative Bob Asztalos spoke about the importance of the Veteran's Hall of Fame. The chamber presented two plaques to Okaloosa County Commissioner Trey Goodwin to display in the county's two courthouses.

"This is not to recognize the veteran for their military service, it's their post-military service. It's for what they did when they came back," said Asztalos. "It's incredible to me how veterans will go off to war, will serve this county, will do all of that, and then come back and continue to

Corcoran concluded by saying, "The quiet professionals that we have here in the Air Force don't pat themselves on the back very often, and it's our job to do that."

Field of Valor Honors Fallen Service Members

More than 300 flags are on display at the Mullet Festival Fairgrounds, honoring those who gave their lives in the service of their country.

The ninth annual Field of Valor, set up by the Niceville Exchange Club, recognizes those service members from the state of Florida who have fallen in combat since September 11, 2001. Some 396 flags are posted on the Niceville field, each with a tag bearing the name, photo and information about a Floridian who served in Iraq or Afghanistan who lost his or her life in action.

One local Gold Star mother, Karla Lacey, attended the Field of Valor this year, as she has in years past, to honor her son Sgt. First Class William Lacey of Laurel Hill. She works at Fort Walton Machining, which was one of the event sponsors this

year, as it has in years past.

"He was brave beyond brave," his father, John Lacey told Military Times just after his son's death in Afghanistan. "He was out there in the middle of nowhere, in hell, and he kept doing it over and over and over ... I'm just so proud of him."

Visiting the Field of Valor hasn't always been easy for the Lacey family. Karla has been attending for several years, because it has been a healing experience for her. She also volunteered to spend time as a docent at the field this year, as she has in previous years.

Tammy Summers, a Gold Star wife, also attended this year's opening ceremonies. She took photos for her Facebook page of her husband, Sgt. First Class Severin W. Summers III, who died August 2, 2009 in Operation Enduring Freedom.

On the memorial page she has created to honor his memory, she posted: "I am honored and humbled to participate in putting out flags for our fallen military in my hometown of Niceville, FL. I placed Sev's flag out and attached his biography. Remembering him today and always!"

Don "Pockets" Pardue was the chair for this year's event. The former Marine admitted that honoring the military is a particular passion of his, especially honoring those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

Pardue served as the emcee for the opening ceremony, which included dignitaries including the mayors of Niceville and Valparaiso, as well as several military guests.

Emerald Coast Fisher House President Jim Yurack was a guest speaker Saturday. The local Fisher House receives funds from the annual fundraiser and works with the Niceville Exchange Club in fielding volunteers for the weeklong remembrance of fallen servicemembers.

Brig. Gen. Jeffrey T. Geraghty is the Commander, 96th Test Wing, Air Force Materiel Command, Eglin Air Force Base, made remarks about the importance of remembering the events of September 11, 2001, as well as the sacrifice of servicemembers in defeating the enemies who emerged from those events.



"Continue to use today, and days beyond just today as an opportunity to pay homage to those who died serving our nation and to acknowledge the immense debt we owe them," Brig. General Geraghty said.

Lt. Col. Mike Loconsolo, commander of the 1st Battalion, 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne) at Camp "Bull" Simons, Eglin Air Force Base, FL. A native of Brooklyn, NY, the remembrance of 9-11 has special significance for Lt. Col. Loconsolo, who was a cadet at West Point on that day, and whose father worked in the north tower of the Twin Towers in NYC. His father survived the attack, but the memory was life changing for his entire family, he told his audience, and he hopes Americans never forget that day.

Col. Ed Hubbard, former Vietnam-era prisoner of war and motivational speaker, talked about the importance of helping others in order to overcome adversity, an important message that aligns with the Exchange Club mission to make the community a better place to live.

Other members of the community helped make the event a touching memorial to the fallen.

Local Patriot Guard Riders arrived early at the field to pay their respects, accompanied by a Niceville Police Department escort.

Niceville firefighters brought a firetruck and displayed a large flag at the field.

Albert Sousa performed the National Anthem. Sousa, the principal broker/president of Apex Mortgage, is the son of Albert and Melinda Sousa. His father is the manager of the Walker Ace Hardware in NIceville.

Niceville High School JROTC students volunteered at the field on Saturday, and their honor guard posted the colors

Destin Woman's Club Celebrates 46 Years of Service

This great Woman's Club was formed in 1976 by a small group of women who saw a "need" in Destin that required help. Formerly named the Lakeshore Woman's Club but as its membership grew, these women realized they needed to be better identified within the Destin Community and changed their name to Destin Woman's Club.

In 1976, their monthly lunch meetings were held in a mem-

ber's home with everyone participating in a potluck lunch. However, as numbers grew it soon became obvious they needed to meet either at a golf clubhouse or a local restaurant.

The primary aim of the "pioneers" of the Destin Woman's Club was to enjoy each other's company while finding a way to help the local community in its needs. These ladies realized that to help their local community, they would have to raise money, which could then be passed on to the "needy" within the community. Hence the need to become a 501(c)3 non-profit organization.

As the club evolved, a huge fundraiser, called The Mistletoe Ball, became a "go-to event" at Christmastime. Following the Mistletoe Balls, the DWC diversified itself into doing two "Tour of Homes" in Regatta Bay, followed by fashion shows. The club also conducted yard sales.

Proceeds from all these events benefited local charities and the club's own Family Assistance Fund. This fund was set up in the name of Mary Kirkpatrick, a past president, but it soon became apparent that the club needed to rename it for it to be understood by the community and possible sponsors. Now this fund is named "DWC Family Assistance Fund," instead of thinking the Mary KirkPatrick Fund was set up to help the DWC members.

Through its fundraising efforts, the club has donated approximately \$250,000 to local charities, supported local families in their times of need with donations and helped them fill their children's Christmas Stockings for several years from the Family Assistance Fund. The club is also very involved with

Fisher House on the Emerald Coast. It began raising money for Fisher House when ground was broken and provided dinner once a month for the visitors there. In 2016 Fisher House was made the club's local charity. The club still helps with the monthly dinners, but due to COVID it is donating \$100 a month for the purchase of gift certificates from a local Shalimar restaurant that guests at Fisher House can use.

The Destin Woman's Club created an Endowment Fund at Northwest Florida State College in 1993 of \$36,133.34 to assist local women wishing to further their education. It has been named the Carol and Bob Winsett Fund, in recognition of Carol Winsett who chaired the DWC committee overseeing it. The college manages the fund and currently a recipient receives approximately \$1,200 per semester. Since the initial donation, the fund has doubled, thanks to the watchful eye of the college.

Due to Covid 19 the club suspended its "Glitz & Glamour" fashion show since 2019. It will return Nov. 4 at Louisiana Lagniappe - doors open at 10.45. Tickets can be obtained at www. destinwomansclub.org.

Benefits of a Customized Business Insurance Program

Cyber Liability coverage for computer attacks and damage to electronic data and computer systems.

Employee Practices Liability Insurance (EPLI) to protect against employee lawsuits.

Professional Liability insurance (E&O) to protect against lawsuits for negligent acts, errors and omissions that result in financial losses during business activities.

Inland Marine coverage to protect property, goods or equipment in transit and over water or land.

Umbrella coverage to obtain higher limits over underlying

policies you have in place.

Workers' Compensation to protect employees against accidents and diseases at your workplace.

Sinfonia is what I call one-stop symphony we have the gala, which is a pinnacle event, the full orchestra, Pops, chamber orchestra, chamber music, education programs, non-orchestra events, like the Cabaret and Crescendo! and wine events. So, the Gala Event really is just part of the puzzle piece that is sort of the angel on the Christmas tree, so to speak.

ZW: On October 22, the full orchestra will accompany the full film showing of the 1931 horror film based on Mary Shelley's book, The Bride of Frankenstein. This is a different experience than a typical concert.

DF: The Bride of Frankenstein has one of the most amazing orchestral scores in film history. It's full orchestra, so we'll have 65 to 70 musicians on stage

in the Mattie Kelly Arts Foundation's Cultural Arts Village al fresco just before Halloween. It's about 90 minutes. It will be fun.

ZW: December 9 we have a popular offering that is always changing. Holiday Pops is a tradition, but you always put a twist on it.

DF: Yes, this year, we "doowopify" our Holiday Pops with the Doo Wop Project. This is a group of guys who were originals in the Jersey Boys off Broadway. Doo Wop is just a great art form. It is as much an American musical staple as jazz, and rock and roll. These guys take a piece of music and make it their own. They will perform everybody's favorite holiday tunes but will also take pop songs and a handful of popular tunes and "doowopify" them. They will perform a wide gamut of songs that people from all age groups are going to know. Plus, the full orchestra will play favorites like Stille Nacht and more,

is also a factor when deciding to paint or wallpaper. If you're changing paint finishes or going from a dark color to a lighter color you will likely need to prime your walls. When wallpapering, your walls need a clean smooth surface (mudding your walls may be necessary), nail holes filled and walls primed before you can begin hanging your wallpaper.

Paint and wallpaper vary on the price spectrum. Paint on average is cheaper and requires fewer supplies. Just about anyone can paint, but you need to ensure you can access all areas, leave no holidays (unpainted areas) and clean-up can be costly if the area isn't prepped correctly or an accident occurs. A professional will cost approximately \$4-\$7 per square foot, plus supplies. Wallpaper is typically more expensive to purchase per roll, requires more supplies than paint and it can be very challenging to align correctly. Prices to install wallpaper vary based on your

design and type of wallpaper you've selected. The average labor cost to hang wallpaper can range from \$4.50-\$10.50 per square foot. Some installers charge by the hour, but I strongly recommend you don't pay by time.

Another key factor to consider is updating your walls in the future. If you're tired of your paint color vou can sim-

ply apply a new coat or two of paint, but if you've elected to use a textured paint it can be hard to remove. If you've used wallpaper, the newer brands are easy to remove, but the older versions of wallpaper are nearly impossible to take down and can damage your drywall.

Whether you choose paint or wallpaper, either will give your space character that suits you. If you're like me, I love the idea of creating an accent wall using wallpaper and painting the remaining walls in a coordinating color. The options are endless and that's why interior design is so exciting!

New Alert System Developed to Find Missing and Endangered Boaters

A new "Aqua Alert" system has been developed after a kayaker disappeared last year in the Gulf. It will notify Emergency Responders and Okaloosa County residents of missing or endangered boaters or kayakers and aid in the search.

It was launched as the result of a collaborative effort between the City of Destin, the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office and the Okaloosa County Board of County Commissioners. The Aqua Alert idea was conceived by Minnesota resident and Destin snowbird Judy Schink after her husband, 61year old Dave Schink, disappeared while kayaking in the Gulf of Mexico February 13th, 2021. During a search and rescue operation, Dave's kayak was discovered 20 miles offshore of Destin, but tragically he was never located.

Legacy Fisherman Mayor Gary Jarvis said, "Judy has been a lighthouse in her own family's storm. I admire her strength in sharing her husband's story and I have been blessed to help facilitate making her family's concept come to fruition. It is our hope that Aqua Alert will prevent future tragedies and become a successful, lifesaving tool on the water."

Here's how it works: When a boater is reported missing, a preliminary investigation will be done to determine if the disappearance poses a credible threat to the person's welfare and safety. If it is determined by the OCSO Shift Supervisor the boater is missing and endangered, and a sufficient description of the missing person and/or vessel with a travel plan is known, the Shift Supervisor



will approve an Aqua Alert. The OCSO Special Operations Unit will be notified along with the Coast Guard and Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission. If safe conditions exist, a search and rescue will be launched. The Aqua Alert information will also be distributed to the public through the OCSO' Sheriff's App mobile phone notification system, as well as social media. The information is then available to those who want to voluntarily help keep an eye out for any sighting.

"Okaloosa County is home to some of the most popular boating areas in the U.S.," said Sheriff Eric Aden. "Having a rapid way to get out detailed information when a life is in danger will mean potentially thousands of additional eyes on the water to help."

"The safety of our community is paramount," said Okaloosa Board of County Commissioners Chairman Mel Ponder. "A rapid response to water-based emergencies can save lives, therefore increased awareness can improve the chances of a successful water rescue."

More Deployments Add to Our Artificial Reefs

In Okaloosa County, an artificial reef is a fun and satisfying site for fishing, diving and snorkeling that is easily accessible for us all. Our area's artificial reefs consist of anything from concrete piles to specifically designed modules and even large shipwrecks. Our area has one of the most active artificial reef programs in the nation. Each year, more artificial reefs are deployed off our coast.



MISS NELLIE and CORDONAZO Deployed

Over the past few weeks, the Coastal Resource team successfully lead another two reef deployments — the MISS NEL-LIE and CORDONAZO. On August 23, the MISS NELLIE

was deployed about 21 nautical miles southeast of the Destin East Pass. You can find the donated tugboat sitting on the bottom of the Gulf of Mexico about 112-feet down. This 62.5-foot vessel will provide habitat for marine life, as well as an excellent dive and fishing spot. And on September 7, 2022, the CORDONAZO was deployed approximately 14.8 nautical miles south of Destin's East Pass. The 67-foot sailboat caught fire and was donated to Okaloosa County to become a part of the artificial reef program.

1,000 tons of concrete was donated by Destin Water Users, Eglin Airforce Base and local stakeholders to be deployed as a large pile.

• The 100-foot supply vessels ATLANTIS and CYCLOPS will be inspected with a possible deployment soon.

• The 190-foot MANTA and DOLPHIN research vessels are currently being prepared for a late September deployment.

• AJ's Seafood & Oyster Bar donated a 70-foot sailboat that was previously used for sunset and dolphin cruises. The boat should be deployed before the end of the year and will be the start of "Boatyard West."

Okaloosa County Divers Place in Statewide Lionfish Challenge

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) recently named the winners of the summer-long, statewide, lionfish tournament which ended Sept. 6 and two Okaloosa County residents placed first and second in the 7th Annual Lionfish Challenge. Congratulations to Isaac Jones who won first place in the recreational division with 1,018 lionfish; and local Alex Fogg, coastal resource manager for Okaloosa County, who won second place in the commercial division with 1,090 pounds of lionfish, just 2 lbs. shy of the division winner.

In just three months, nearly 200 divers searched and removed thousands of lionfish from our waters – bringing in a whopping 25,299 lionfish, the most since 2018. Further, this year's tournament broke the record for the most participants in the program's history with 707 registered divers.

The Lionfish Challenge, an FWC program, is sponsored by FloGrown, and open to competitors throughout Florida. It challenges divers to kill lionfish, an invasive species that threatens to crowd out native fish. Since they're covered in venomous spines that can inflict painful stings, harvesting them usually requires a spear or slingshot, although nets are also allowed. The goal is for participants to remove as many lionfish as they can in just 3.5 months. It's free to enter and participants can compete for the title of the Lionfish King/Queen or Commercial Champion anywhere in Florida.

Lionfish can be found yearround off our coast, though no one really knows how they arrived. Native to the Red Sea and the Indo-Pacific, there's a theory that aquarium owners have been releasing them from home aquariums for about 25 years. (Source: National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration)

According to the FWC, lionfish are known to prey on more than 70 marine fish and invertebrate species. They also compete for food with native predatory fish such as grouper and snapper, which are vital to the commercial fishing business.

It's Destin Fishing Rodeo season, and here's great news about the health benefits of our local Gulf of Mexico fish! We've all read or heard that fish is healthy for you. But cold-water fish, such as salmon, usually make the healthy headlines. It's

primarily because of their scientifically known Omega-3 fatty acid profile. However, we can't stop there! There's good news for us Gulf Coast residents-warm water Gulf of Mexico fish has high Omega-3s also.

Omega-3 and Omega-6 fatty acids are essential to good health. Essential means that our bodies don't produce it. Therefore, we must obtain it through our diet. They are essential for normal growth and development of every aspect of human health. These fatty acids are similar in structure, but their functions are very different.

Americans typically consume up to 20 times more Omega-6

Fit from Fish then they do Omega-3. This causes an imbalance in our bodies which are linked to a long list

of diseases including atherosclerosis, rheumatoid arthritis, asthma, colitis, Crohn's disease, type-2 diabetes, heart disease, various cancers, Alzheimer's, Lupus, allergies and multiple sclerosis. Medical research has found that a diet must include no more than four times as much Omega-6 as Omega-3 for optimal health.

Eating Gulf fish will help raise your intake of Omega-3 fatty acids to help with the balance between not only Omega-6, but also total fats in the body consumed by the average American. This is why it's important to eat foods high in Omega-3.

Dr. Julia S. Lytle, Ph.D & Dr. Thomas F. Lytle, Professors Emeritus, Department of Coastal Sciences, states in a brochure: Marine fish oils are the primary

source of Omega-3 fatty acids while the plant oils corn, soy, peanut, cotton, sunflower and safflower are the major sources of Omega-6. All marine fish, whether caught in warm water or cold water, contain Omega-3 fatty acids. Fatty fish such as salmon, sardines, mackerel and young tunas are rich in Omega-3s, but they are also higher in total fats than leaner fish such as flounder, redfish, snapper and tilefish. Recent research indicates that most Gulf fish contain less than 5% total fat, and their fat is enriched in Omega-3s. Dr. Julia says, "Since warm water fish are lean, you can eat larger portions to increase your intake of Omega-3 and still keep total fat calories moderated." I'd like to note, though, be careful in its preparation if you are watching total fat calories. Fat is nine calories per gram, while protein and

carbohydrates BOTH are four calories per gram. If you add creamy (fatty) rich sauces, extra oil or breading while cooking, you could double the amount of calories for that portion of fish.

Achieving the right balance of Omega-3 and Omega-6 helps with the following: Fighting inflammation, reducing the risks of heart attacks and strokes, boosting your immune system, reducing cancer risk, slowing aging, reducing risk of macular degeneration, and lowering triglycerides.

Make healthy changes by eating MORE Gulf fish at least twice weekly and add dark green leafy vegetables, and flaxseeds and walnuts to salads. Eat LESS processed foods and avoid deepfried foods. Reduce total fats. Use olive and canola oils for salads and cooking.

This information came from a study done by the professors above through The University of Southern Mississippi, Dept. of Coastal Sciences. The basis for their conclusion was through analysis of almost 50 species of Gulf fishes. Regardless of season, age, size or sexual maturation, Gulf fish are valuable sources of Omega-3 and they have charted the fatty acid, cholesterol and total fat in 44 species. There May Be a Cure for the "Blahs"



By Dr. Richard Chern, M.D. How often does this happen? You wake up but don't feel rested. You won't be productive

so maybe just skip the day. You drag yourself out of bed and go through the motions. The goal is to get back home and end the day. You can watch TV, play on the phone, eat dinner and head



This happens to all of us and occurs more often the older we get. Luckily we can increase the number of those motivated days.

Before I started treating patients with hormone pellets, I first became a patient. I was hesitant initially because my levels were in the normal range and I thought I felt normal. Sometimes I lacked motivation, sometimes I took naps, sometimes I didn't want to go to work, sometimes I fell asleep on the couch. Regardless, I still took care of

my responsibilities, I got the bills paid, I had some fun, and I was pretty comfortable. I did notice over time it was getting harder to have fun, harder to feel rested, and harder to take care of the responsibilities.

After some convincing, I decided to get treated. My levels prior to treatment were in the reference range or "normal range" but they were nowhere near the optimal range. After treatment, I quickly understood I had been missing out on more than I could imagine. It's hard to describe but almost immediately I began to feel healthier, I started getting more energy, I had a de-

Self-Care Corner: Benefits of Massage

I know we've discussed massage before in this column. However, it's just so good for you, it warrants us taking notice again. Massage is much more

than a "feel good" session:

Pain Relief: Soreness and stiffness result when overworked muscles produce waste products like lactic acid. Massage can help by improving the circulation to muscles to flush these out. Tense muscles can also compress blood vessels and nerves and massage leads to a gradual release that eases the pain. Just be sure to let your massage therapist know if your pain is caused by stress, injury or surgery.

Improved lymph movement: Lymph is the milkywhite fluid that drains waste from the cells. The pressure of massage also increases blood flow that can help reduce swelling after surgery.

Increased circulation: The manual pressure of massage increases blood flow to the treated areas. The increased blood flow brings more oxygen and nutrients to the muscles to help repair and revitalize the body.

Better skin: Massage helps the skin by stimulating the sebaceous and sweat glands. Increased blood flow also has a positive effect on the skin by supplying the cell with nutrients and oxygen. More blood at the

skin's surface also leads to a rosy, healthy glow.

Positive attitude: Massage has been shown to increase the body's protection of "feel-good" endorphins and the mood regulating hormone serotonin and decrease levels of the stress hormone cortisol.

Balance the nervous system: Stress revs up the nervous system, leading the restlessness, hyperactivity, anxiety, muscle tension, cardiovascular stress and even abdominal problems. Massage helps reduce stress and the body's reaction to it, bringing your nervous system back into harmony.

More perfect posture: Muscles that are too tight or too slack can throw off your posture. To compensate, your body will utilize other muscles, which can eventually become accepted by your body and lead to permanent imbalance and chronic muscle pain. Massage can loosen those areas and help bring back into more balance.

The same virus that causes chickenpox, shingles or Herpes Zoster (VZ) is a reactivation of the dormant VZ within the nervous system. This virus can live in the nervous system for years before being triggered. So, if you've had chickenpox, you carry the virus.

Shingles begins as a sensitive red patch/rash on the skin which blisters and appears as a

It can also be very painful and itchy. The striping is due to the breakout following the path of the infected nerve under the skin. These nerves can be located on both sides of the torso, neck and face. One can also experience fever, headaches, fatigue or weakness and severe cases can affect the eye and meninges (covering of the brain). Some cases are "uncomplicated" and typically clear up within three weeks, give or take. The virus has been known to last up to eight weeks.

There are risk factors which can aid in VZ being activated:

- Being over 60 years of age
- Stress
- Chronic lack of sleep
- Being nutritionally deficient
- Use of steroids or other

meds that suppress the immune system

• Having a disease that weakens the immune system such as HIV AIDS or cancer

· Having chemo or radiation therapy

There is no cure for shingles. Vaccines should be discussed with your doctor if you have a high risk factor.

The following therapies can help in relieving symptoms: Rest, cold compresses, calamine lotion, colloidal oatmeal baths (ground whole rolled oats to a fine powder. Added to water it should dissolve in with little to no stirring. Be careful as it can make the tub slippery. After soaking, rinse off with lukewarm water and pat dry. If you don't have a tub you can make a poultice using cotton cloths) oral Benadryl as well as lidocaine

patches (helps reduce itching) and non-steroidal anti inflammatory drugs such as ibuprofen. Narcotics may be necessary to ease the pain and anti-viral medication (acyclovir, valacyclovir, famciclovir) can reduce the course of a shingles outbreak.

Using essential oils have also been used with good results. Oils with antiviral properties are Ravensara, tea tree and lavender. Tamanu oil can be used as a carrier oil and can have skin healing properties. Bergamot and helichrysum are also good oils for consideration. Essential oils are very potent and should not be used until you have spoken with a professional.

In closing, I would like to share a quote from a long-time physician. "Over the course of the past 23 years that I have been recommending nutraceuticals, I have found that many people with shingles appear to get relief, and may possibly reduce the course of the outbreak, with the use of quality micronutrient nutritional supplements. They may also help reduce the occurrence of post-herpetic neuralgia, which is a painful condition that remains after shingles is resolved."

When I conduct insulation inspections in attics, I normally come out with sweat on my forehead and, sometimes, depending on the inspection and time of year, I am completely drenched. Sweating is normal to keep our bodies cool. But when our home sweats, that's an indication of a problem. Receiving calls from concerned homeowners about sweating vents and equipment is common at ECES.

There can be many factors which cause condensation in the home; ultimately it is the dew point in our attics. Dew point defines the point at which air will become saturated and condense. Simply, the air can't hold any more moisture and creates dew.

So, why do I have moisture on my vents? Ductwork is a system or network of ducts which bring cool air to the different rooms and living areas of our homes. When heating and cooling companies install the air ducts in a home, the contractors are working with many separate pieces. While the workers strive to connect each piece as tightly and securely as possible, leaks and gaps in the ducts might still occur. This can happen in new and older homes. When these gaps and leaks occur, the conditioned air leaks out into our attics. A typical home can experience close to 20% of conditioned air loss from leaking ducts If the leaks are big enough, even more loss can occur costing you money and comfort.

One common problem when ducts and vents are not sealed properly is condensation or sweating. These tiny drops build up around and on the vents causing issues, like mold.

Another problem we come across is cracked seals and loose boots. Maybe you had a security system installed or needed cable ran into a room which wasn't wired. Most of the time you need a technician to go in the attic and navigate in a hot, hard- to-walk-around, dark area

while performing these services. Ductwork tends to run in the same places these wires need to be run and sometimes ductwork is used as railing or support by the technician so they don't end up putting their foot through your ceiling. Putting pressure on ductwork can cause loose boots around vents and cracked seams. These are less common, but do happen and, unfortunately, are unseen, because they happen in the attic. More common is that over time, our seams, connectors, tape and vent boxes fail over time due to the harsh environment they are in. Failing tape is most common. The duct tape, which was used, becomes brittle and can no longer keep a tight seal.



Good news is that repairing these leaks is a simple one. Foil tape, expandable foam and mastic (which are a type of paste applied to seams when foil tape can't seal) is used to reseal these leaks keeping the conditioned air flowing for years to come. We tend to forget how important these systems really are and how important it is to maintain them. It is always a great idea to schedule an inspection and improve the efficiency of our largest investment, our homes. Insights for Investors

Former U.S. Treasury Sec-

retary James Baker commented some time ago that one of the greatest challenges to the union is that America is seen through our current account deficits and. even more importantly, the debt to GDP ratio. That ratio is at its highest level since the end of World War II. He argued that that is unsustainable. It eventually will significantly erode the standards of living for any country, let alone our own. A country can either significantly cut spending (along with other austerity measures), raise taxes or default on its debt. None of these are in the best interest of the country and none are politically, economically or socially acceptable. The answer, just as it was after WWII, is for the U.S. to inflate its way out of that ratio. In other words, let the dollar continue to inflate. That is not saying, however, that the current levels of inflation are acceptable or the answer.

The Fed's Two-Tiered Mandates

The Federal Reserve is not shy about communicating its double mandate of a target of low inflation – they state 2 percent and full employment. Most consider full employment to be an unemployment rate of 4 percent. We are currently at approximately 3.5 percent unemployment, with a severe labor shortage and two job openings for every one person looking for a job. Inflation, by way of CPI is at 8.3 percent.

The Fed's Target Inflation Rate is with PCEPI not CPI

Most of the media report inflation from the US Labor Department's monthly reading known as the Consumer Price Index or CPI. It is consumer driven, is only from urban areas and gives its largest weighting

to housing (or shelter). Investors should take note that the Fed uses the Personal Consumption Expenditures Price Index or PCEPI as its measure of inflation. This is important for investors because PCEPI is 6.1 percent and CPI is 8.3 percent at this writing. The Fed is somewhat closer to its target by way of PCEPI. The PCEPI gives a lower weighting to housing and is from a broader spectrum including producers and non-profits. The Fed feels it is a better indicator of inflation since it was introduced in 2012 (and is from the US Department of Commerce).

What About the Unemployment Rate

Fidelity Investments recently commented that for inflation to come down, unemployment would have to go up as high as 6.5 percent for the Fed to get to its inflation target. That is because this historically low unemployment is driving wages higher at an accelerating rate, thus driving inflation. The question is whether politicians and society would accept that. The answer is probably not. Add to that you see that higher rates of employment (because of fewer dollars in the economy) might release more stimulus with unemployment assistance. The more things change the more they stay the same.

The Impact This Has on Interest Rates and Yields

So, the Fed has tried to reduce inflation by raising short term rates, known as the Federal Funds rate to a new target of 3-3.25 percent. It has also begun to let those Treasury bonds (and Mortgage-Backed Securities) it bought during the pandemic mature (hence reducing the supply of money or liquidity out there). The immediate impact of this will be 1) U.S. banks increase what they earn on overnight deposits with the Fed or other banks and might therefore lend less (an intended outcome) 2) U.S. banks have an increased source of revenue (making the financial sector more valuable in our opinion) 3) Money Market Mutual Fund yields should continue to climb 4) CD yields, mainly shorter term, should continue to climb 5) the domino effect is felt in the Treasury market and ultimately mortgage rates 6) the economy should continue to slow. Risk averse investors can avoid market volatility by moving in to or accumulating assets in the cash equivalent type investments. One caveat: Take caution as to the real rate of return with inflation currently reading as high as it is. More risky assets such as stocks and real estate continue to be (despite their current volatility and price woes) the leaders in outpacing inflation and with the real rate of return.

Is it Different This Time?

We have quoted before the words of the great investor, Sir John Templeton. He suggested that investors take note of the four most expensive words in investing; "This time it's different." Reading the news and listening to the commentators, most investors are finding themselves tested and somehow believing that this time it is different. Peter Lynch (another great investor) often called that "background noise." We don't think this time is different. We look to history as a greater indicator of where things are and where they are likely to be in the long run. The economy is slowing, earnings are coming down. Stocks follow earnings. There is a winter coming or it has arrived. But spring will come again, and no one knows exactly when that will be, so best to be positioned for recovery vs. trying to time it (which is close to impossible). Some people get frustrated when they constantly hear it best to hold or wait and not give up hope at the worst possible time. We also take note that if you want to build your health you have to be consistent and respect diet and exercise. If you want to build your wealth, you must be consistent with buying and holding and or reallocating when necessary. We remind investors however that not one size fits all: Goals, Risk Tolerance (comfort level) are always the most important.

Our Current Thinking and Suggestions for Investors

The U.S. dollar will start to come down as foreign central banks will begin to sell their holdings of U.S. dollars. Japan has already begun doing this. The U.S. dollar, at this writing is at decades high and is up 16 percent ytd. That hurts other economies and the earnings of many US companies who are multinational (many of America's largest companies get revenues from overseas and their products and services are much more costly with a higher dollar hence hurting their earnings).

A cheaper dollar could mean stronger returns in emerging markets and with other currencies. Investors can buy mutual funds that invest in both and buy the individual securities. This is more speculative however, so caution is urged.

Inflation will continue to moderate. The Fed will coordinate further rate hikes with respect to PCEPI, not CPI.

Unemployment will rise, which will further reduce upward pressure on interest rates.

There is value with municipal bond yields and rates. The swift move in rates is producing yields, and we think values, not seen in more than 10 years. Investors in higher tax brackets could benefit by locking in these higher tax-free yields. Add to that most states are in strong financial shape and running surpluses.

The demand for housing (40 percent of the CPI and close to 20 percent of the PCEPI) will remain resilient but the opportunity to buy a home will remain muted with higher mortgage rates. Many would-be home buyers are forced to rent since they cannot afford to buy at these rates, keeping rents higher. Fewer new housing units are being built keeping some of that pressure on. Commercial real estate (office space) which is overbuilt could see some relief if landlords see opportunity in converting office space into condos and apartments to meet that demand. Real estate income investments or funds could provide attractive opportunities for suitable investors.

War, cyber warfare, cybersecurity and raised uncertainty with China: The Early Warning Report, in its August edition, continues to highlight the large defense and cybersecurity stocks for the foreseeable future.

Demographic trends: Will huge countries such as China reverse their population growth? Author Peter Zeina in his book "The End of The World is Just the Beginning" ponders this. That could have implications in the next few decades for demand, inflation and interest rates.

Health Care – surprisingly, inflation for health care costs has not been at the rate of PCEPI

or CPI. The labor shortage is even more intense in this sector (37,000 fewer nurses than before the pandemic began). We think that economic environments such as this warrant an increased exposure to health care stocks or funds.

Power, or electricity consumption along with shortages, will continue to grow substantially. The world continues to grow its affluence and its standard of living. That means greater demand for power. Data centers (think the cloud), EVs, cleaner water and sanitation for the world, greater indoor climate control et al continue to drive that up. This has implications for continued fossil fuel demand (and hence the energy sector) as well as renewed demand for nuclear energy and companies that operate nuclear facilities. Oil prices will remain at \$80-90 per barrel and hence continued strong earnings for oil companies. We think there will be a renewed emphasis on nuclear technology and construction. Expanded demand is also seen for natural gas and even coal for the foreseeable future. Wind and solar will continue to grow but so will the challenges (and opportunities) for the rare earth materials needed to build them.

Artificial intelligence and robotics technology and production will accelerate. This is one innovation that has accelerated due to labor shortages and higher labor costs. Those are the areas that technology companies can grow and expand and increase their earnings. Self-driving EVs and trucks still need to refine their programming but are coming faster than originally thought.

Lastly, the market is doing a lot of the Fed's work and that is bringing asset prices, earnings, and ultimately inflation down. We are in or entering recession and yields will soon peak and by late 2023 will start to come down. Investors should always be cautious and prudent to not get overly influenced by the media-driven anxiety. Long term, buy and hold and patient investors have typically fared the best.

"But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him; he ran to his son, threw his arms around him and kissed him." Luke 15:19-20 (NIV)

As a little boy, I idolized my father. I looked like him, shared his sober demeanor, and I wanted to grow up like him. Then he disappeared. I cried every day, "Where's Daddy?" Finally, my older brother took me aside to say Daddy's gone.

My parent's divorce robbed me of my hero and left me with a lifetime of suppressed grief. Anger simmered beneath the surface and corrupted many of my relationships. Fortunately, A Pastor's Ponderings: Clippidy-Clop

God doesn't leave us in our pain and dysfunction.

The parable of the Prodigal Son reveals the nature of God through the response of a loving Father. It also shows the folly of humanity's departure from our Father's house. The great love the Son of God has for us is also on full display.

Imagine this story from the father's point of view. He is a well-to-do landowner with a home commensurate with his wealth and prestige. Dressed in a long robe and fine leather sandals, he carries the dignity of a successful man as he manages his estate. He loves his son, but the son leaves him.

Time passes so slowly as months turn into years. Without cell phones or postal service, the father languishes in the void left by the person he loves more than life.

Coming home from the fields, the elderly man glances toward the horizon and sees a haggard figure approaching. Though a poor and ragged young man, there is something about his walk that is oddly familiar. Peering into the setting sun, his eyes coming into focus, "My son!" he cries.

The elderly father casts his dignity aside, hikes up his robe, and runs as fast as his sandals can clippidy-clop down the dusty pathway. Weeping uncontrollably, he cries out, "My son, my son."

Catching the young man in his arms, the father sweeps aside the boy's contrition. barks out orders to his servants, "Quick! Bring the best robe and put it on him. Put my ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the fattened calf and cook it. Let's have a feast and celebrate." The father is the picture of grace as he welcomes his lost son home. His world overflows with joy as love overwhelms past transgressions.

I am that wayward son walking toward Father God. In my life, I have wasted myself on lessor gods and made poor choices. Coming to myself in the pigpen of my own making, the Holy Spirit silently whispered to me, "Come back to the Father." Each time, the Lord welcomed me because Jesus paved that road with His sacrifice.

It is always time to run back to the Father. He never tires of us, never gets disgusted at the depths we fall, nor impatient with our lack of progress. He waits, peering down the road for our return. Clippidy-clop He runs toward us weeping with joy. He longs to dress us in the robe of Christ's righteousness, to place His ring on our finger and declare us His child. Father God will slip the sandals of His peace on our feet.

The JB Phillips translation (1958) translates Romans 8:18-19 "whatever we may have to go through now is less than nothing compared with the magnificent future God has planned for us. The whole creation is on tiptoe to see the wonderful sight of the sons of God coming into their own."

Many of us grew up without a father present. God the Father wants to fill that immense void. I see in this story a father who longs for his son and runs to meet him on the road. Can you see Father God running clippidy-clop toward you? Creation waits for you and me to turn toward the Father and meet Him on the road. Oh, what a party God has planned.

Please pray with me, "Father God, I'm turning to meet You on the road. Thank you for loving me enough to cast aside my sin and love on me. I know I didn't deserve any of this, but I love You more because of Your graciousness. Help me live confident of Your grace, and thankful for Your mercy. Resting in the Father's arms, I pray. Amen."

so it will be a great seasonal concert.

ZW: January 21 we shake off the winter blues with Get Happy and celebrate the centennial of Judy Garland's birth.

DF: Who doesn't love the legend, Judy Garland? This is a great production because it showcases the string section of the orchestra and basically a jazz band along with superstar vocalist Jessica Vosk. She performed Elphaba in Wicked on Broadway. If you've heard her sing, you know she has amazing pipes, and is just a powerhouse. You will feel as though you are seeing Judy Garland singing live with the orchestra. There's a multimedia component that showcases vintage footage of The Judy Garland Show with tons of outtakes with Dean Martin, Sammy Davis Jr. and Frank Sinatra that make an entertaining trip down memory lane. It will be a fun concert to experience because we are creating a clubby, dinner theater atmosphere with café tables. You can do that or opt for regular seating.

ZW: March 11 is the Classical Connections concert featuring violinist Geneva Lewis. Tell us about her.

DF: Classical Connections is the "meat and potatoes" classical portion of what Sinfonia does and Geneva Lewis is an extraordinary young talented violinist. She's the winner of the 2020 Concert Artist Guild annual competition and a recipient of a 2021 Avery Fisher career grant, which is a major award and a big deal in the classical music world. She's a remarkable artist and she's doing Mendelssohn's Concerto for Violin which is one of the staples of the violin repertoire. Her performance is one not to miss. She is going to working with the Sinfonia Youth Orchestra doing outreach in our local schools as well.

ZW: Capping the season (April 29) is Beethoven versus Coldplay. This sounds like another perfect example of how you are redefining the symphony experience. Tell us what people can expect.

DF: Beethoven is immortal. When you pair or mash Beethoven up with something on the pop scene, like Coldplay it's unexpected. For this con-



cert, they're not just playing a piece by Beethoven and a piece by Coldplay side by side. This is a melding, a mashup of the internal, interwoven musical notation with vocalists and it is remarkable. It's an incredible way to listen to and rethink how music is connected. Steve Hackman, the producer, is a brilliant musician, composer, and arranger. It's totally unique, but it's accessible. How many people from the age of 15 don't know Coldplay? So, again, we hope this innovative offering brings in some new faces.

ZW: At the heart of Sinfonia's mission is music education. Tell us why.

DF: Our mission states succinctly that we "entertain, educate, inspire the community" and we aim to do that with everything we do. Education is the centerpiece of Sinfonia. It was founded not only for its entertainment value, but for the fact that Northwest Florida needed an organization that could be the proponent for arts education in schools, specifically music education. We all know arts education is on a continual decline in all public schools. We've been more fortunate here in Northwest Florida, compared to some areas but in many cases our Link Up program, which is a year-long curriculum, is sometimes the only arts education these students receive.

We have a String Quartet, a resident Brass Quintet, and a Woodwind Quintet in residence — all going out to schools and the community and providing outreach and community engagement.

This year, we are reintroducing the Paint the Music project, which is a great cross-genre program that includes both visual arts and the musical arts. Kids receive a recording of what they will ultimately hear live at a Sinfonia concert, and they visually interpret what they hear on to paper. We take their artwork and display it at a concert. (Look for the Paint the Music exhibit at Get Happy in January.) The following Monday, the kids will sit in the convention center to see Beethoven Lives Upstairs, a theatrical mini musical featuring actors and singers sharing the lifetime of Beethoven with more than 30 excerpts of his music. **ZW:** Congratulations, this is indeed a stellar 17th season.

Family Fun, Field Trips, a Fish and a Cat in a Hat

In the late 90s, when I was working as a professional actor, a couple of my gigs were theater for young audiences touring productions. On one tour, I had the privilege of performing Shakespeare all over eastern Tennessee at middle schools, high schools and community colleges. My first ever experience in the Panhandle was on a different tour with Ruth Eckerd Hall out of Clearwater, where we performed a stage version of "One Hundred Dresses" at elementary schools, including Chattahoochee Elementary School

We had finished performing the play and we were given the chance to have lunch with some of the children. Soon I realized that I had a little buddy. This little boy in first grade gravitated toward me so we hung out, talked and ate lunch together with the group and really connected.

While interacting with him, I noticed these bumps and scars on him so I asked the teacher about it. I was told that the boy was in foster care because his parents had extinguished cigarettes on him as a punishment. She offhandedly made the comment that perhaps connecting with the play could inspire him. My heart sank, my eyes welled up and I took a deep breath and cherished those moments with him. The thought that I, as just an actor, could affect someone's life in a positive way like that revealed an even deeper connection to theater for me.

In the summer of 2015, Grand Boulevard launched a partnership with Emerald Coast Theatre Company to produce Theatre Thursdays in the park. We did a 45-minute adaptation of Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream." It was thrilling when Jennifer Steele of the Cultural Arts Alliance of Walton County reached out to provide funding for us to take the show to all the elementary schools in Walton County. While at West DeFuniak Elementary, the vice principal shared with me that a student commented to her after the show that she had never even been to a movie theater and she was so excited to see a "real" theater play!

Another of my favorite memories is when our friends Beth and Rio brought their 6-month-old daughter to see "Rainbow Fish the Musical." Beth came to us after the show and shared that she wasn't sure her 6-month-old would engage, but was blown away at how her baby paid attention to the live action going on right in front of her! We are so thrilled to be the first place some children are experiencing theater and in the process providing a fun and positive family experience as well.

These early experiences are what inspire me to always find ways to serve our community through plays designed to inspire and educate children: Theatre for Young Audiences. One of my favorite moments at ECTC is seeing those children hop off their school bus in matching class T-shirts and enter the theater with wows and oohs and ahhs. They sit and watch the actors wide eyed, fully engaged, following the story that was designed with them in mind. You can see their souls being inspired to view the world through another perspective. And with that, the seed of empathy is planted and perhaps the inspiration to change their world has sprung up in them.

In October, we are already expecting hundreds of school children at the theater for our production of "Cat in the Hat." We couldn't be more excited about these field trips! We also have weekend shows for families to come out and enjoy this wonderful production. Everyone's favorite mischievous cat is featured in this theatrical adapta-



tion by Katie Mitchell of the Dr. Seuss classic. From the moment

his tall, red-and-white-striped hat appears around the door, Sally and her brother know that The Cat in the Hat is the most adventurous cat that they have ever met. With the trickiest of tricks and the craziest of ideas, he is certainly loads of fun... but what will Mom find when she gets home? You'll have to come to the show to find out!

The show runs from Friday, Oct. 14, to Sunday, Oct. 23. Public performances are Oct. 15 and 22 at 6 p.m. and Oct. 16 and 23 at 2:30 p.m. School Field Trips are offered Oct. 14, 19, 20 and 21 at 9:30 a.m. and 11 a.m. Colorful clothing, footie pajamas and striped hats are not required but wholeheartedly acceptable attire!
