The All Sports Association (ASA) recently celebrated its 54th Annual All Sports Association Banquet at the Emerald Coast Convention Center. The auction raised a record-setting \$138,500, amassing an impressive \$319,000 for the year. That support concluded on the fourth Friday in February by recognizing a Who's Who of talented, successful, academically-minded, philanthropic athletes ranging from prep to college to amateur and pro. The banquet serves as one of the year's premier social gatherings, with a Who's-Who from the Emerald Coast in attendance.

Since 1970, the ASA has supported and honored the "Best of the Best" High School, Collegiate, Amateur, Professional, and Special Olympic athletes. The organization also recognizes individuals fostering youth activities in Northwest Florida.

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man. Yet He will startle[b] many nations. Kings will stand speechless in his presence. For they will see what they had not been told; they will understand what they had not heard about..."

Seven hundred years later, on a Friday, the Roman soldiers beat Him (the Son of God) with their fists until His face was horribly swollen and His eyes were nearly shut. They stripped Him of His clothes and whipped hIm with a rock-laced leather whip. His back was ripped open, his skin was shredded, exposing his internal organs. They crowned Him with a bed of thorns, put a reed in His hand, and clothed Him in a scarlet robe, spit on Him and mocked Him as the King of the Jews. They led Him in a procession outside of the city gate of Jerusalem to a place called Golgotha (Translation: A Hill Called the Skull).

And there they crucified Him, nailing His hands and



feet to a wooden cross. The soldiers then gambled for His robe. The religious leaders mockingly shouted, "He saved others but can not save himself." At around 3pm on that Friday, Jesus cried out "It is finished!" Finally, they laid Him in a borrowed tomb, and sealed it with the Governor's seal. A group of soldiers were stationed around the tomb to prevent anyone from stealing the body. The events of His death all occurred on Friday-Only Jesus knew Sunday was coming!

"But very early on Sunday morning the women came to the tomb. They found the stone covering the entrance rolled to the side. They went into the tomb but couldn't find the body of the Lord Jesus Christ. Suddenly, two men appeared to them, clothed in dazzling robes. The women were terrified. Then the men said, "why are you looking in a tomb for someone who is alive?, He isn't here. He has risen from the dead. Don't you remember what He told you back in Galilee, that the Son of Man must be betrayed into the hands of sinful men, that He would be crucified, and that He would rise again the third day." (Luke 24:1-7)

Friday has past and Sunday has come, fulfilling the prophecy of Isaiah!

For the past two thousand years, millions of people have believed the accounts of Christ as revealed in the scriptures, and as a result their lives have been changed. The message is simple; "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, (to die on a cross to pay the penalty for our sins against God) so that everyone who believes in Him, will not perish but receive Eternal Life....For if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that Jesus is Lord, you will be saved." (John 3:16, Romans 10:9).

Saved means to be forgiven of our sins; placed into the family of God to receive a new life of peace and purpose and to have the assurance of life after death with God forever!

I encourage you, if you have not received God's gift provided by His Son, that you pray to Christ today! For anyone who calls on the name of the Lord, will be saved (Romans 10:13). That's God's promise; believe and receive.

Finally, these past few weeks we have experienced our own "Friday." All of the things we have relied on have been shaken or removed. I don't know what the future holds but I do know who holds my hand. Regardless of the outcome, because of Christ, Sunday's coming!

The Velcro Pygmies Reach and Teach Impact Our Students From Stages to Schools

If you've experienced The Velcro Pygmies live, then they need no introduction. They've performed for years locally at Tailfins, Mattie Kelly Arts Foundation's Concerts in the Village, Club L.A. and recently at Seaside School's Taste of the Race. If you're a fan of 80s and 90s rock, and moreover, the showmanship that goes along with it, you're probably going to become a Pygmies fan around the third or fourth song of your first show. The world-famous Velcro Pygmies specialize in taking their fans on a journey to a place and space in time when hair was big, pants were tight, screaming was singing, and in the illustrious words of KISS's Gene Simmons, "If it's too loud. You're too old" rang true.

The Pygmies formed in Louisville, Ky., in the 90s, playing night clubs, college campuses and frat parties, primarily across the Southeast. The band whose four members consist of founder and frontman, Cameron Flener, guitarist, Chase West, bassist, Max War, and drummer, Chris Eddins - reside across two states, but tour together for three to five shows each week. They've managed to not only maintain a strong fan base, especially here in Destin, but also to drastically build upon it over the decades.

Whether you go to a Velcro



Pygmies show here in Destin, Auburn or Tuscaloosa, Ala., Atlanta, Houston or Cleveland, you will see a crowd made up of 35 to 50 somethings who became fans in their own college days, as well as 19 and 25 year old fans that have more recently started following the Pygmies and their brand of big hair, glitter bombs and long guitar solos. Somehow, they've managed to capture that almost magical magnetism that entices and entertains beyond any particular barriers. That, in a nutshell, is what makes Reach and Teach work too.

Giving Back Through Reach & Teach

In an effort to follow a passion of positively impacting future generations, five years ago



Cameron Flener (affectionately referred to as Cam by his friends and Pygmie fans) made the leap from the clubs to the classrooms, in a remarkable endeavor called Reach and Teach.

Reach and Teach is a unique program. The free program is facilitated through individual school systems and is built upon a nine-week curriculum, whereby students are given the opportunity to orchestrate, plan and execute a concert that takes place at their school. The Reach and Teach program is the brainchild of April Clark, a high school business teacher in Alabama, who originated the concept. The forward-thinking teacher was in the beginning stages of facilitating her vision of such an opportunity for students, and teamed with Pygmies

founder, Flener, after the singer related to Clark how impressed he was with the program she was working on, and how much he would like to be a part of it full time.

I sat down with Cam, over lunch, to talk a little more about this program firsthand. Though Flener has made a living through rock music, he is as much an entrepreneur and great thinker as a great performer. He's extremely well spoken, intuitive and insightful, and as such was quick to point out that Reach and Teach isn't about rock and roll music as much as it is about truly giving something back, creating a legacy of sorts and being involved in something that is much larger than himself or his band.

"We're not creating rock

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promoters, we are helping to create good, productive human beings," he said. "The vision that April and I have created for Reach and Teach is to take this program all over the entire country. We want to help these students in realizing what the utilization of real-world life skills are about. These are soft skills we are teaching. The things that we all need to know: How to budget, how to present or pitch potential sponsors, how to sell their vision to others. Reach and Teach is about empowering these young people to believe in themselves and their abilities to make things happen."

Clark explained it this way: "A rock concert provides the perfect vehicle for condensing all the aspects of operating a business into a limited time frame. Students learn about budgeting, marketing, public relations, web design, audio visual, logistics, and, most importantly, are able to analyze the results of their event once it's over."

Cam went on to say, "Reach and Teach students are handson in doing everything from deciding on the venue (normally on the school grounds, and during regular school hours) to helping the band set up and tear down the stage. They truly learn what it takes to plan an event from concept to fruition, including how to make money for their school or school related fundraiser along the way. All with something that excites and interests them."

As a magazine editor and writer, I first became familiar with Reach and Teach during

its infancy, around 2018. Since then I have had the opportunity to hear from educators, school administrators, and parents about the merits of this remarkable free program which has now impacted students in over 20 states. And now it's coming to our area. The program will be presented during the 2023 and 2024 school years at a growing number of high schools in Northwest Florida. Because of its popularity, Reach and Teach has quickly become sustained by sponsorship monies from a growing number of companies who want to insure Reach and Teach continues to be free for the schools and students who benefit from it.

Some of the stories are remarkable in their positive impacts and life-changing alterations—students discovered and honed their skills as photographers, sound engineers and sponsorship salespeople. Some even became musicians, writers and singers after taking part in Reach and Teach through their own high school.

Beyond the life skills the students learn from the program, Cam said, "Our program provides institutions a new and exciting opportunity for fundraising, or as we call it 'FUN raising.' Because the program

is provided free of charge to qualifying institutions, it allows many school systems to raise a significantly greater amount of money than your average runof-the-mill, plastic spirit cups, cookie dough or discount cards fundraiser could ever accomplish. As a result, schools are encouraged to sell tickets to the event and even allow outside guests to attend the subsequent performance. We don't ask for money. Reach and Teach simply asks that we are able to present our sponsorship portfolio to the students during the period the program is running.'

This works out well for companies like Rock 'n Roll Sushi, Buc-ee's, Chord Buddy, OWA and other sponsors who feel strongly about using their successes to give back and help make this program possible for the thousands of students that are benefitting from this generosity and remarkable effort. The students win. The schools win. The sponsors win. Even the local community and concert attendees win. Everyone involved leaves every show, at every school just a little better than they were before those nine weeks leading to the culmination of that big show.

The Velcro Pygmies certainly rock. However, Reach and Teach isn't as much about music as it is about preparing the future leaders of our great country for a much larger and more important stage: Adulthood.







Coppélia, A Ballet in Three Acts

"Just as Giselle is ballet's great tragedy, so Coppélia is its great comedy." - George Balanchine on the importance of Coppélia

Our story takes place in a small village of Galicia, a province of Austria-Hungary, with today's map finding Galicia in western Ukraine and southeastern Poland. The "color" of the region can be seen in the brilliant colors, heavy embroidery and elaborate trimmings of the costumes. It can also be heard in the rich nationalistic melodies and complex folk dances of the composer. This was the first use of the Hungarian czardas to be performed in a ballet, which is a very complex national dance; both the czardas and mazurka dances in Coppélia were the culmination of the region's folk dances.

At the age of 33, Delibes was commissioned by the Paris Opera to write his two, large-scale ballets, Coppélia and Sylvia. Coppélia is based on a story by E. T. A. Hoffmann – the same tale that sparked Offenbach's brilliant "Doll Act" in his opera, The Tales of Hoffmann.

Premiering on May 25, 1870, at the Theatre Imperial de l'Opera in Paris, this story is a delightful tale of fantasy with a happily-ever-after ending for Swanhilda, a young village girl who becomes fascinated by the eccentric Dr. Coppelius and his unresponsive "daughter," Coppélia.

The villagers disperse to await the Harvest Festival the following morning, where the Hours of the Day are to be celebrated. Meanwhile, Swanilda and her friends sneak away to investigate the strange house of Dr. Coppélius.

Act II Inside Dr. Coppelius' house and workshop -

that evening The curtain rises on the dimly-lit interior of Dr. Coppélius' shop — a room full of life-like, life-size dolls. One

of Swanilda's Friends pokes her head behind a curtain to discover Coppélia. Another friend finds Japanese Dolls, another finds French Dolls and an Arabian Doll, while other friends find Spanish and Scottish Dolls, all of whom dance until its clockwork runs down. The amazed young intruders then wind up all the dolls again, who dance as the friends watch, enchanted. Suddenly, a furious Dr. Coppélius enters and all of the culprits flee, except for Swanilda and one of her friends, who runs into the alcove where Coppélia is kept. Coppelius is fooled by Swanilda and thinks his mechanical doll has come to life. When Swanhilda reveals she has changed places with the doll, Dr. Coppelius is left broken-hearted.

Act III

Outside the church - the next morning

The day of the celebration has arrived. The gathered villagers begin to celebrate the Harvest Festival. Dr. Coppélius storms in, accusing Swanhilda of destroying his life's work. Realizing the justness of his claim, she offers him money, but instead the Bürgermeister gives Dr. Coppélius a bag of gold and sends him off. The Harvest Festival continues as the villagers celebrate the hours of the day. The townspeople dance into the night.

Q: The Tarpon Beach Park expansion is an incredible collaboration between The Okaloosa Board of County Commissioners, Trust for Public Land and our City. Our goal is to have construction completed by spring 2024 on facilities, but many people are already enjoying the new public beach. Residents have raved about the extra Gulf view and beach space, but they're worried about whether the vendors will take over. Can you address that?

A: Tarpon Beach is a real success story. To me, the biggest win is that this 300-plus-feet of beach is now owned and controlled by the public. If there is one thing I have learned from our Crystal Beach Residents, it is that we need relief from commercial beach chairs blocking the beach. By law, there can be NO commercial activity at this park and that includes beach chair rentals.

Q: The demolition of buildings at Tarpon was amazing to watch, but it's also a reminder that progress isn't always pretty, and it takes time. We've received a number of concerns regarding the fencing that's up right now at places such as Norriego Point Park. Do you feel this progress is counterintuitive to natural beauty?

A: Norriego Point for me, and so many other residents, is a special place to visit by foot and/or by boat. I have watched hundreds of sunrises at this location to start my day as well as used it as part of my running route. As many people have probably noticed by now, the area is taking a new shape. The sad reality is that not all of this area is public land, but some is private property that had plans approved way before my time, and has just sat dormant for decades. It's heartbreaking for me

to see it under construction, and I empathize with others, but the reality is it was never our land and we got used to it until the owners were ready to use it. So, to answer the question, I feel that progress doesn't have to be counterintuitive to natural beauty. Progress can be made by working with nature, which can help preserve and even enhance natural beauty. It's all about balance. Right now, there's construction of a public road that will serve both the City's public park and the future adjacent private development. There are also plans to combat erosion in a natural way by building and utilizing living shorelines. The positive part is that it's going to provide a lot more public parking, easier access to the water without damaging the dunes,

and there will finally be some much-needed restrooms in that area. Moving forward, I'm hoping that we can move toward a future where progress and natural beauty can coexist.

Q: And the Norriego Point Project isn't costing Destin residents money, correct?

A: That's correct. The Norriego Point Project is a Restoration Project funded with Natural Resource Damage Assessment Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill funds provided by BP, so it's little to no cost to the City. There might be some minimal cost of necessary permits, but that would be it. We're keeping a residents-first mentality as much as possible with all projects!




Local Author Bookshelf: Jesus a Prodigal Son?

Destin Rotarians at Work Locally and Abroad

In 2018, Destin Rotarian Zhalman Harris teamed with a local nurse practitioner who shared his passion for helping underprivileged orphans in Liberia. Amazingly, they were introduced by a mutual friend and within four weeks were in Liberia, West Africa, with 250 lbs. of clothing, flip flops, vitamins and toys. At that time, they adopted an orphanage with 60 kids and were determined to change their lives for the better by improving their living conditions and their health.

Many children, ages 4-17, were orphaned in Liberia during the Ebola virus epidemic from 2014-15. One of the results of the 14-year civil war that ravaged the country and the more recent Ebola virus epidemic was that approximately 40% of primary school students ended up being three years older than the appropriate age for their grade. In addition, clean water and lack of functioning bathroom facilities further impacted the quality of early education for children in Liberia.

Eventually Zhalman founded Aletha's Legacy, a 501(c)3 non-profit, to focus on his commitment to meeting the educational needs of Liberia's orphaned children and honor his mother, Aletha, who lost her life and their home during the 14year civil war that ravaged their country in West Africa.

Now ongoing through mission trips, Aletha's Legacy continues to improve these under-privileged children's lives in his home country. Humanitarian and financial support is mostly funded with the support of our communities, area businesses and, of course, the Rotary Club of Destin.

On his most recent trip, Zhalman was able to deliver much-needed medicine to a remote village in western Liberia. The Rotary Club of Destin gave \$500 for this critical care. Destin Rotarian Jim Brechin also donated \$15,000 to purchase a

van for Aletha's legacy.

And more good news—in the past few months, the Abedu-Bentsi School in Logan Town, Monrovia, has been completed! Destin Rotarians sponsored a classroom in the recently completed educational facility. The new school building includes 10 classrooms, a mess hall, a kitchen, boys' and girls' bathrooms, a library, a science lab and a computer lab. A new fence and steel gate were also installed for the children's safety.

Zhalman said the school has grown at a rapid pace with many more students. A new project is now in the works to build a new wing to the school, as students



are overflowing into the current dilapidated, old building. With ongoing support from the Rotary Club of Destin, businesses and our communities, we have no doubt this, too, will be accomplished.

Should investing be about fear or should it be about optimism? And which is the greater motivator of behavior and action? We have often heard that perception without any confirmation indeed becomes reality. Investors are bombarded almost daily with messages of fear. As a result some may give up hope at the worst possible time and change their course of action or their plan. We are reminded of the coach and his or her team sticking to their game plan even if they are down early on in the game. What if however it is not early in the game, rather its midway or towards the end? We think, once an investor reviews objective, risk tolerance and time frame, then they compare that with their current strategy and make changes as needed or wanted.

Investors can become overly worried when one talking head after another speaks about capitulation and that things will go from bad to worse. We think it fair to point out that often the talking head may be the type of professional investor, a hedge fund manager for example, that often can profit in up and down markets and that it is the very volatility they speak to that creates opportunity (with extraordinary risk) for them.

We believe that the individual investor should focus on the greater picture, the entire game, not just a particular slice of it. We look at the long-term returns and see that stocks are one of the higher returning investments, over time. Over time.

Diversification is critical as well. Bonds can play a part in diversifying a portfolio or perhaps generating income. It is challenging for many to find a timing strategy that outperforms a well thought out buy, hold and adjust as needed strategy.

Many in the media speak of anything but optimism. Some

might easily draw the conclusion that it is over and that it is reconciliation time with the financial history of this nation. We don't understand how you can explain away that there is an entire generation (much greater in size) that is following the baby boomers. They are growing their careers, their family, and their lives and consuming. That might help explain why despite 9 straight interest rate hikes that there is still a housing shortage. And there is a worker shortage. Demand is growing or is resilient. Affluence and standard of living have never been greater. Innovation and competitiveness continue to fuel the engine for America and the world.

If a more optimistic, longterm view makes sense, we think investors can build toward and achieve their goals.

PLUS you'll save a bunch of money by not paying that real estate commission, right? What's that they say, "If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is?" Before you step over a dollar to save a dime, consider the statistics:

1) Only 2% of home sales are done without a real es-

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Part 1: Pre Owned Sports Cars Under \$50,000 That Make Great Daily Drivers

If you consider yourself an automobile connoisseur of any depth, it's almost certain you could probably guess the cars that would make up a list of this title, simply based on common knowledge of what is and isn't a real sportscar and what does and doesn't make economic sense for the average person to daily drive.

You wouldn't, for example, populate a sports car list such as this with the likes of modern-day Camaros, Mustangs, BMW 4 series coupes or Audi A5 Cabriolets—though all of those are great vehicles in their own right, and some I've even owned and appreciate. However, those all fall into the GT (Grand Touring) category, and even with brute power and only two doors, they aren't really sports cars.

At the other end of the spectrum, as much as I can appreciate the more exotic makes, you can't include anything made by Ferrari, Lamborghini, McLaren, Lotus or a host of other makes on this list. Mostly because even as true sports cars they can't be had for the \$50,000 ceiling here, and even if they could I couldn't—with good conscious— suggest anyone try to daily drive anything that has \$25,000, 15,000- mile service requirements or (insert used \$30,000 Maserati's here) has a high probability of developing a new problem on the roundtrip to Fresh Market or Starbucks.

In Part 1, we take a look at three tried and true sports cars that are both priced accordingly and have a reliability record that leads to the makings of a great daily driver that won't break the bank or live at the shop.

Chevrolet Corvette

Since its introduction in 1953, the Corvette has been known as America's sequential sportscar. For the purpose of this list we'll talk about the C7 iteration of the Corvette, which ran from 2014 to 2019, first rolling off the Bowling Green assembly line in September of 2013. The C7 (for 7th generation) boasts a sports car chassis, a drivetrain that provides supercar performance, and offers a standard of reliability that allows for it to be driven daily, with very basic routine maintenance.

The C7 came standard with a 6.2-liter V8 and either a 7-speed manual, or 6 (2014) then 8-speed automatic trans-



mission. At just 3,347 lbs., the C7 has a great power to weight ratio that trumps many way more expensive, and less reliable, sports cars, while still being relatively easy to find for under our \$50,000 limit here—usually with relatively low miles too, as many original owners didn't buy them as their only car.

Porsche Boxster and Cayman Those who know sports cars are well aware of what you get with most any of the sportier ventures from Porsche. Sure, they're not a bargain to buy new, and the maintenance cost can be quite extravagant for some of the more problematic years. However, a Boxster or Cayman handles like a dream, drives like a sports car should, and, if you buy the right car, can give years of dependable daily service.

Having owned several vintage Porsches from 70's and 80's Targa's to four 914's, to a 924S and 944S, I'm more of a fan of the classic, air-cooled cars. However, for this list we're going to be going a little newer—and more affordable—than those classic 911's and 914's. I believe

the third generation (981) of the Boxster/Cayman twins (the Boxster a drop top, the Cayman a fixed roof), gives the most bang for the buck for everyday driving in a Porsche that can be had under our \$50,000 price range.

The 981 version was available new from 2012-2016 and features the then newly improved 2.7 liter flat 6, with your choice of the 6-speed manual, or Porsche's 7-speed PDK automatic. The hotter S variant carries a 3.4-liter powerplant. There were other hot editions, too, including a GTS derivative, but those are likely to still be outside our price ceiling given here.

The 981 cars brought new 911 derived styling, a 40% more rigid chassis, and the same great handling and precision that we've all come to expect from mid-engine engineering and weight distribution. These cars are relatively dependable and can rack up past 150,000 miles easily when maintained correctly. There is a downside though, as most any in-depth engine repair (more than oil changes, basically) that any Boxster or Cayman could ever need, requires actually dropping the engine from the bottom side in order to access for repairs. This means you want to buy a really good, mechanically sound car that's been driven and maintained.

Come back next month for Part 2 as we look at five more great sports cars under \$50,000 to drive daily.

Closed Test Areas and Beach Access

Since returning here and taking command of the 96th Test Wing in June, I'm reminded of just how special this area is and how fortunate we are to live and work in such a military-friendly community.

With 464,000 acres of land ranges, Eglin spans three counties and is one of 13 major range and test facility bases in the Department of Defense.

The test areas within our borders provide a center of development, testing and deployment of lethal air power to support essential Department of Defense missions. Many of these areas also provide refuge for a wide range of natural communities and 106 rare and endangered plant and animal species, as well as a wealth of Cultural Resources dating back thousands of years.

We are host to many hazardous activities that include training missions conducted by Air Force Special Operations Command, the U.S. Army's 6th Ranger Training Battalion and 7th Special Forces Group, as well as operators from every branch of service.

These activities are mainly restricted to the Closed Test Areas and occur daily on Eglin's reservation.

Over time, our Closed Test Areas on Santa Rosa Island that stretch west of the El Matador Condominiums all the way to Navarre Beach, have become an easy target for trespassers who want to take advantage of the secluded charm of Eglin's closed heaches

Despite the abundance of warning signs in place instructing beachgoers to stay out of Air Force Closed Areas, we are

seeing an unacceptable level of trespassers ignoring the signage and causing mission impacts and damaging fragile habitat critical to many species.

Due to unauthorized activities, and to preserve and protect this national asset on the Eglin reservation, our team has installed barriers and additional signage on the east and west sides of Eglin's Santa Rosa Island Closed Areas to further discourage trespassing.

Additionally, our security forces will increase patrols in these areas and will begin issuing trespass citations to those who continue to violate

our Closed Test Areas. Further, our security forces, with assistance from local and state law enforcement, will also monitor the Santa Rosa Sound and cite individuals/boaters who are beaching and trespassing on the north side of the island.

As a good neighbor, Eglin maintains four other public beach access points on the island - Eglin Beach Club (for DoD card holders), the Matterhorn, Princess Beach and the old Airman's Beach Club. Each of these areas is available to beachgoers with a free permit - See https://eglin.isportsman.net/ Beaches.aspx.

We will continue to search for appropriate solutions to improve safety and eliminate unauthorized trespassing on federal property. As we determine these solutions, we will communicate them with the community to avoid any confusion in the future.

I appreciate your cooperation ensuring the safety of our community while protecting the vital national security missions we execute on Eglin Air Force Base and the Eglin reservation.

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The Vietnam POWs 50 Years Later Home Sweet Home

The "Welcome Home" ceremony at the Air Force Armament Museum honored those who were captured in the Vietnam War and returned home 50 years ago. The date was March 4, 1973, when the North Vietnamese released nearly 600 U.S. POWs from their prisons.

On Feb. 12, 1973, the first of 591 U.S. prisoners began the trip home, with more flights returning until late March. The festivities hosted a reception and program to honor the POWs now calling Okaloosa County home. The honored include:

Brig. Gen. George "Bud" Day, USAF, Ret.

Col. Keith Hall, USAF, Ret. Col. Howard Hill, USAF, Ret.

"We hope this brings a feeling of strong patriotism and respect for what these men endured in those days," said Tricia Flaherty, Director of Operations at the Air Force Armament Museum. The words "You are not forgotten" are a constant reminder that we should always remember the sacrifices of these veterans who paid so dearly in defense of freedom and our nation.

The United States fought in the Vietnam War for 10 years, from 1965 to the fall of Saigon in 1975. On Jan. 27, 1973, the U.S. signed the withdrawal agreement of American troops from South Vietnam. The agreement included the negotiated release of the nearly 600 prisoners of war held by North Vietnam in various prisons and camps, including the infamous Hoa Lò prison in Hanoi, dubbed by many as the "Hanoi Hilton."

of American Hundreds POWs, primarily Air Force airmen, endured months of isolation and squalid conditions at Hỏa Lò. From the beginning, U.S. POWs at Hoa Lò endured miserable, unsanitary conditions, including meager food rations and the ever-present threat of starvation. The captors subjected American prisoners of war to extreme torture and malnutrition. Although North Vietnam signed the Third Geneva Convention of 1949, which demanded "decent and

humane treatment" of prisoners of war, they employed severe torture methods, including sleep deprivation, malnutrition, beatings, hanging by ropes, locking in irons, and prolonged solitary confinement.

POWs were repeatedly interrogated and tortured at the hands of their captors and suffered enormous levels of physical and mental abuse. The North Vietnamese guards strictly enforced no communication within the prison, but POWs found ways to communicate, including a tap code that could be heard through walls from one cell to another and a "Deaf Mute" code of hand signals, used when guards were not looking. Despite this limited communication, prisoners developed a code within their ranks to look out for and protect each other.

The deal would come to be known as Operation Homecoming and began with three C-141 transports landing in Hanoi on Feb. 12, 1973, to bring the first released prisoners home. From Feb. 12 to April 4, 54 flights took place, returning 591 POWs home.

Many of the flagpoles in America fly the POW/MIA flag with the American flag. The POW/MIA symbol has flown since 1973 to honor those who suffered through years of captivity and torture and those who never came home. Almost every day Okaloosa County residents can find something going on that shows appreciation for the military, and especially our POWs and MIAs.

The U.S. Surgeon General declared youth vaping a national epidemic in 2018. During the 2021-2022 school year, the number of reported vaping incidents in Florida schools nearly doubled from the previous year. In Okaloosa County, where the majority of our students make good choices every day, we are not immune to this crisis, as we have seen a spike in the number of students possessing, distributing and/or using electronic cigarettes on our campuses.

Our students' health and safety are my No. 1 priority. I appreciate your active involvement not only in your student's academic success but also in their health. When a student makes the decision to vape at school, both are affected.

My hope is that through the launch of this district anti-vaping campaign, we can all do a better job identifying the signs of vaping among students, know and share information on the negative health effects with our students, and be very clear about the discipline consequences involved with vaping.

I am very grateful if your child has made the decision to not vape, and we will do everything we can to reinforce that wise choice each and every day. For those who are vaping, we will work with parents to provide educational resources and contacts for community agencies that may be able to provide assistance.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, nearly one out of every 10 middle and high school students uses electronic vaping products. Vaping is the act of inhaling a vapor produced by an electronic vaporizer or electronic cigarette, which heats a liquid to generate an aerosol. The aerosol can contain harmful chemicals and particles that are inhaled deep into

the lungs. Common additives used in these devices, depending on brand and type, may include nicotine, caffeine, cannabinoids (such as marijuana) and potentially other illicit drugs. Nicotine is highly addictive and exposure may harm the parts of the adolescent brain that control attention, learning, mood and impulse control. Research has also shown that electronic cigarettes have resulted in a dramatic increase in marijuana use by students in the form of THC oil, which can be vaped.

School administrators often find that parents may not recognize the signs of vaping or the devices themselves. The liquids that are vaporized come in many different flavors and sometimes smell fruity, which may appeal to children. The devices come in different shapes and sizes. Some common styles we see resemble a thick pen, a stylus for an iPad or a USB flash drive. Some devices are disposable, while others require a refill cartridge. Because of their small size, they can easily be hidden on a person or blend in with a normal backpack or pencil case.

The use and possession of all tobacco and/or intoxicating products is illegal for those under 21. Students are not permitted to use, possess, or distribute tobacco products, electronic smoking devices, or their components (including lighters) while on school property. In an effort to deter students from vaping on campus, vape sensors are being installed in school restrooms. If a student is found to be using, possessing or distributing any tobacco or smoking device, the student will be subject to disciplinary action as outlined in School Board Policy, ranging from the Student Training Program (STP) to expulsion, depending on the content of the smoking device. The goal of this campaign is not to be punitive, but to educate our students on the dangers of vaping and encourage them to make choices that have a positive impact on both their health and education.

Note: Superintendent Marcus Chambers kicked off the Okaloosa County School District's Anti-Vape Campaign alongside

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Sheriff Aden in a video message on the District's Social Media

accounts and Website in February. In the video, Chambers and Aden express their intent with this campaign is to help students make the right choices and deter them from vaping while educating families about the consequences of vaping on school property as outlined in Okaloosa County School Board Policy. 

30AEats.com Recipe of the Month: Red Rice

Cast-iron pots and pans have a long-standing tradition in American cookery, and Lodge Cast Iron has stood the test of time. I completed a project with this great company for The Lodge Cast Iron Cookbook-Cooking form Coast to Coast, that includes two of my recipes.

Chef Steven Satterfield made this recipe for Red Rice using Carolina Gold, an heirloom variety of long-grain rice that is

hand-harvested by its producer Anson Mills. Sautéing the rice in fat for a good five minutes helps to infuse flavor into the individual grains. Lastly, no peeking while the rice is cooking the covered cast-iron pot is key to the development of the crust on the bottom."

You can order Carolina Gold Rice from Anson Mills here, or give this dish a whirl using your favorite paella rice.

Red Rice

featured in The Lodge Cast Iron Cookbook Serves: 6

Ingredients:

- 4 tablespoons bacon drippings
- 5 tablespoons butter
- small yellow onion, diced
 cup diced celery (inner leaves included)
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 tablespoons plus 1 teaspoon kosher salt (or more to taste)
- 2 cups canned organic whole plum tomatoes (undrained and chopped)
- $2\ {\rm cups}\ {\rm chicken}\ {\rm stock}$
- 2 tablespoons pepper vinegar or cider vinegar (if you use cider vinegar, add a pinch of red pepper flakes)
- 1 1/4 teaspoons freshly ground black pepper
- 3/4 teaspoon dried thyme
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 dried chiles de arbol, chopped



 $(or \ a \ pinch \ of \ red \ pepper \\ flakes)$

- 2 cups long-grain rice, such as Carolina Gold
- 3/4 pound andouille or chorizo sausage, grilled and sliced 1/2-inch thick
- 1 1/2 pounds shrimp (peeled, deveined, and cut into bitesized pieces)

Instructions:

In a medium saucepan over medium heat, melt 2 tablespoons bacon drippings and 2 tablespoons butter. Add the onion, celery, garlic, and 1 tablespoon salt. Cook, stirring often, until the onion and garlic are tender. Add the tomatoes, chicken stock, vinegar, 1 tablespoon salt, and 1 teaspoon black pepper, along with the thyme, bay leaves, and chiles. Simmer 15 to 20 minutes, tasting for seasoning.

In a large cast-iron skillet over medium heat, add remaining 2 tablespoons bacon drippings and 2 tablespoons butter and cook until foamy. Add the rice and cook, stirring frequently, until it is opaque (about 5 minutes). This step is very important to the final flavor of the dish, so don't skimp on the time — but also don't let the rice burn.

Add 4 cups of the tomato mixture to the rice. Stir and cover. Set a timer and cook the rice for 25 minutes over very



low heat. Do not lift the lid. After 25 minutes, turn off the heat and let the rice stand for 5 more minutes. Again, do not lift the lid. While the rice cooks, add the sausage to the remaining tomato mixture in the pan. Cover and keep warm over very low heat. While the rice stands, in a medium sauté pan over medium-high heat, melt the remaining 1 tablespoon butter until foamy. Add the shrimp, stirring just until cooked through. Add the remaining 1 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon black pepper. Combine the shrimp to the sausage and tomato mixture. Stir well.

Pour the shrimp and sausage mixture over the rice. Remove and discard bay leaves. Without breaking the grains, gently fluff the rice. Serve immediately.



The toughest part of the fishing class, Otto said, is "tests. Flags and what they mean. CPR. Also, weather and knots."



Turtle Nesting Season Underway Nesting season arrives on our coasts for sea turtles and waterbirds

Nesting season has started for both sea turtles and waterbirds in the Sunshine State. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) reminds people they can help protect vulnerable nesting sea turtles and waterbirds this spring and summer while visiting Florida's coastal habitats.

Because our state's shorelines are critical for sea turtle and waterbird nesting, beachgoers can have a big impact on their nesting success. To help nesting sea turtles and waterbirds, give them space, minimize disturbances, and keep beaches clean and dark.

Obstacles on the beach can prevent sea turtles from nesting as they crawl across the sand to lay their eggs. Trash, holes in the sand and other obstacles can also prevent sea turtle hatchlings from reaching the water once they emerge from their nests. Food scraps attract predators, such as raccoons and crows, that prey on sea turtle hatchlings,

shorebird eggs and chicks. Litter on beaches can entangle sea turtles, birds and other wildlife. Beachgoers can help our native wildlife by stashing all trash, filling in human-made holes in the sand, and removing boats, beach toys and furniture from the beach before sunset. Fishing line can be deadly to sea turtles, waterbirds and other wildlife, so be sure to dispose of it properly. To find a monofilament recycling station near you, visit mrrp.MyFWC.

disturb nesting sea turtles and away from the ocean and toward potential danger. Beach-

goers should use natural starlight to see on the beach at night and avoid using flashlights or cellphones. Anyone living along or visiting Florida beaches can do their part by putting porch, parking or deck lights out and closing curtains after dark to avoid harming nesting and hatchling sea turtles on the beach. If lighting could still be visible from the beach, be sure it is long, low and shielded.

Getting too close (50 feet or less) to nesting sea turtles can cause them to leave the beach before they complete

nesting. Remember – it is illegal to harm or disturb nesting sea

turtles and their nests, eggs and hatchlings. Shorebirds, seabirds and wading birds also need plenty of space to prevent them from flushing from their breeding sites, leaving vulnerable eggs and chicks exposed to the elements and predators. Egg temperatures can increase to lethal levels after just a few minutes of direct sun exposure. Shorebirds and seabirds nest in shallow scrapes in the sand and their eggs and chicks are well-camouflaged, making them vulnerable to being stepped on unless people look out for them and avoid walking though flocks of birds.

In general, it is best to keep at least 300 feet from nesting birds and to avoid walking through flocks of birds or entering posted areas. Pet owners can also help by keeping dogs at home or on a short leash and away from wildlife on pet-friendly beaches.

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The Thyroid Explained

In this article, I want to talk about how The Hormone Restoration

Center looks at the thyroid just a little bit differently than other physicians in the area. The thyroid cycle can be confusing, EVEN FOR DOCTORS! We occasionally get calls from primary care physicians who worry their patient's thyroid level is too high or too low. The problem is they are looking at the wrong lab values. If you ask any of our patients, they will tell you we spend a long time discussing the thyroid with them and they all say, "Wow, I've never had someone explain it to me before." To get the thyroid to work, the brain secretes Thyroid Stimulating Hormone (TSH) to tell the thyroid to produce hormones. This causes TSH to decrease, which then causes T4 to decrease which causes TSH to increase. Sounds much more complicated this way. T3 is the active thyroid hormone that regulates body temperature, heart rate, body weight, muscle strength, cholesterol, menstrual cycles, mental health, concentration, hair growth, energy and much, much more. Most physicians ONLY look at TSH to determine thyroid function which causes confusion as patients will say their thyroid is high when actually their TSH is high and thyroid is low.

At The Hormone Restoration Center, we look at your symptoms and ALL your thyroid levels to determine your need for treatment and optimal dosage. Gout is a painful form of arthritis that occurs when high levels of uric acid in the blood form crystals and accumulate in and around the joint. However, gout can still occur without high UA levels. The onset of gout is sudden with severe joint pain, redness (feels like the joint is on fire) and is tender to the touch. It often occurs at the base of the big toe, but can affect other joints as well. It is a type of arthritis which creates inflammation in the affected area. Men are more prone than women to have gout. The chances for women increase after menopause. Areas affected are the joints, bursae (sac between bones in joints), tendon sheaths and kidneys.

Gout arthritis increases bone fracture risk notably due to low vitamin D levels but also oxidative stress and inflammatory cytokines induced by hyperuricemia. Inflammatory cytokines and oxidative stress can increase bone resorption and decrease bone formation increasing the risk of osteoporosis and bone fractures.

Uric acid is produced when purines (a naturally occurring chemical in the body and some foods) are broken down during digestion. UA normally passes through the kidneys and exits through urine without issue. Higher levels due to excess production of UA or failure to eliminate properly triggers the condition

- · Family history
- Age and sex
- Diet

• Obesity (UA levels higher primarily due to lowered elimination)

• Medical Conditions: HBP, diabetes, metabolic syndrome, heart disease, kidney disease, kidney stones, heart attacks, congestive heart failure, psoriasis

• Any disease that increases UA levels

• Certain medications: Diuretics (helps body to eliminate fluid), low-dose aspirin, Cyclosporine (immunosuppressant), niacin-B vitamin (if taken in large amounts).

A healthy diet (fruit, veggies, whole grains) can help alleviate or prevent this painful disease. Cherries have been shown to reduce symptoms. Foods to avoid due to their sugar content or purine levels are:

• Steak and organ meats

Preventing and Dealing with Gout

• Sweetbreads and other sugary food and sodas

• Seafood such as anchovies, shellfish, sardines and tuna are higher in purine than other types but the health benefits of of fish may outweigh the risks

· Alcohol and beer (avoid during gout attacks), wine doesn't appear to increase risk

High quality supplements can play a positive role in treating gout. They can also improve metabolism, reduce inflammation, improve kidney function and filtration, and may help keep UA levels normal. Certain antioxidants also help to reduce inflammation as well as reduce frequency and severity of attack.

Vitamin D: High levels of UA inhibit vitamin D production. D deficiencies are common with gout.

Grape Seed extract with Vitamin C: Best supplement Dr. Ladd has seen to reduce symptoms of gout. Patients had great success reducing pain and recurrence of gout flare ups. Doses varied with patients.

Joint support with curcumin (turmeric extract) mixed with vitamin C and several other important supporting ingredients creates a synergistic safe anti-inflammatory response that reduces pain effectively, while at the same time helps heal the tissues.

National abuse statistics are alarming. According to the National Children's Alliance, the national association and accrediting body for Children's Advocacy Centers, nearly 700,000 children are abused in the U.S. annually. Neglect is the most common form of maltreatment with 75% suffering from neglect, 17.2% from physical abuse and 8.4% from sexual abuse. Roughly four out of five abusers are the child victim's parents.

With National Child Abuse Prevention Month in April, it brings to light the fact that many do not realize the peril our children can experience and have to deal with right here in Northwest Florida. There are approximately 1,100 cases of child sexual and physical abuse reported annually in Okaloosa and Walton Counties, an average of three per day. Despite those big numbers, nearly 2/3 of the actual needs to help child victims go unmet due to lack of reporting to authorities. It is estimated that for every one child ECCAC helps, there are two children out there who are not helped.

Regret Avoidance vs. Living and Learning

I meticulously weighed the pros and cons and spun up scenarios of different directions my life might take if I didn't choose the exact right university. The back and forth had a deadline and I eventually decided to leave my home town. Five years later, I was 1 year into a job, married, and moving forward in life when it hit me...it didn't really matter which school I chose. Either way, I would have chosen the same career path, likely married the same person (since he was a childhood friend), and my life would have been good. Some things would have been different, but it all would have turned out okav.

immobilized in decision making because you fear regret? Maybe you feel that every decision needs to be made perfectly in order for your life to progress well. Fear of regret can make it hard to choose a school, take a job, commit to a relationship, make a move, or plan a trip. Worrying that every decision might be the wrong decision can keep you from enjoying your life and creates a stuck feeling of anxiety.

What if there was a way to flip the script in your head about every decision being a chance for failure and regret? What if every decision is an opportunity to live and learn, to grow and become wiser?

I talk with hundreds of humans each year about various life decisions. Over time, I have observed and embraced the reality that most decisions don't have one right path. Most decisions have some flexibility and you could choose one of various options and still experience a positive outcome. Of course there are poor, unwise decisions and we all want to avoid those. But outside of that, most decisions aren't permanent, can be adjusted if needed, and produce growth and learning. It's possible to define a life well lived as one characterized by growth and learning rather than by a list of

specific accomplishments. So, how do you shift from a regret avoidance approach to a living and learning approach to life?

5 Ways to Shift from Regret Avoidance to Living and Learning

1. Identify the decision at hand and notice any fear of regret thoughts surfacing in your mind and body. Name the fear of regret to yourself and gently release the thought rather than obsessing about worst case scenarios.

2. Brainstorm decision options. Notice that most of the time, multiple healthy decision options exist. Narrow your brainstorm down to the top 2 or 3 decision options that seem wise and in line with your values.

3. Remember your decision history. Remind yourself of times when decisions have been flexible and could be adjusted over time. Remind yourself of times when decisions have produced growth and learning that resulted in positive change in your life. Remind yourself of times when even decisions you would make differently now taught you something important you might not otherwise have learned. Try journaling using the above reminders as prompts.

4. Watch for life's lessons. As you make decisions, watch for opportunities to learn, to pivot, to embrace a new skill or character quality. 5. Embrace the resulting freedom from letting go of fear of regret. Lean into the joy of knowing the vast majority of your decisions are able to shape you into a more mature and whole person if you don't resist the process. Try creating an internal message like, "I'm going to make a wise decision based on the information I currently have. I will make adjustments as needed. I will embrace all the growth and learning from the decision I'm making and choose not to regret it." It's okay if regret emerges from time to time. Gently dismiss it and move forward with your new approach.

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Stay Cool By Ruling Your Attic

Pop quiz: Which state has the highest summer relative humidity? Was it Hawaii? Florida? Louisiana? The answer: None of those! Alaska ranked No. 1 last year in relative humidity.

Don't be upset. Florida fol-

lowed closely behind and ranked second. I'm proud to be living in a state which always ranks high on rising temperatures and humidity compared to other states, GO FLORIDA! There is great research, data and comparisons generated by NOAA and other agencies illustrating climate change. The fact is, just step outside and you know it's warm. Most describe our weather as hot, balmy, sticky and even unbearable. I like to describe our weather as tropical or sun-filled. With that said, I enjoy the feeling of cool bought air (air conditioning), ice in my drink and the Gulf when it's not the temperature of warm bath water.

So how can we keep more of our bought air in our homes? The majority of wasted conditioned air leaks through our attics. Attics are the No. 1 source of air loss, so what can we do? It's simple – rule your attic. First, check the amount of insulation you have in the attic. If you see joists, wood supports, running down the attic floor, you need insulation. If you measure the thickness of insulation and it is less than 11.5 inches, you need insulation.

Adding insulation not only increases your comfort, it also puts less wear and tear on your HVAC equipment, saving you money. Another way energy is lost through the attic is leaking conditioned air into the attic by unsealed penetrations. These



consist of electrical wiring, ceiling fans, bathroom vents and light switches, just to name a few.

Plumbing located in your attic also requires air sealing around vent pipes. Toilets and drains require proper venting. Vent pipes supply fresh air to each plumbing fixture in the house, which helps the system move water through the drainage pipes each time a toilet is flushed or a sink is drained. Plumbing air vents also prevent sewer gasses from entering the home and allow wastewater gas and odor to escape. These areas normally have the most concerns because the required diameter of these holes varies and they are usually drilled to the



largest size to save time during construction, but cost you money when not sealed.

Air sealing around light fixtures and recessed lights also will have a positive impact on air loss and comfort.

Most attics are engineered to circulate air by soffit vents and ridge vents, not by using improperly sealed electrical and plumbing attic penetrations. Leaking ductwork is also ranked high on the energy list. By the time your cool air reaches vents to cool rooms, cracked or unsealed ductwork will suck in hot attic air and dust to those rooms, wasting your money and causing your HVAC to work harder.

If you experience hard-tocool rooms, high heating and cooling bills or know you have low insulation and opportunities to become more energy efficient, Rule Your Attic. If you decide to do these projects yourself, take precautions; wear safety glasses, proper clothes and gloves, stay hydrated, take breaks and have a buddy to help. If you decide to hire a professional to assess and suggest solutions, get estimates in writing, ask to air seal and what they air seal and how much insulation will be added. And start Ruling Your Attic.

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



With Spring Break and Summer around the corner, a lot of us locals (and our guests) will be out in our golf carts. You might even want to purchase one. Just remember, as there are different kinds of golf carts, which you'll discover when you go to the dealership and start looking at them, there's also different types of insurance coverage depending on your vehicle.

Let's shed some light on the differences, coverages and when you need what.

To begin with, there are two main 'uses' for golf carts/ LSVs. Either personal or business/commercial. When your golf cart or LSV is used by you and your direct family members only, that's considered personal use. If you have a rental condo, for instance, and include a golf cart for your renter's use, that makes it business/commercial.

So, you're wondering, what's the big deal? Let's start with personal use and the two types – golf carts and LSVs. Golf carts are usually electric and have a maximum speed of about 15 mph and are designed to be used on your property or within the community your home is located, and back and forth to the

golf course. They aren't tagged or registered for driving on the street like your car. Some home or condo policies might include minimal golf cart coverage with an endorsement, but this won't give you everything you need and is not recommended. A separate golf cart policy would give you the best coverage.

Next, there are LSVs, or low speed vehicles. These are a type of golf cart with a maximum speed of around 25 mph and are manufactured with safety features such as rear-view mirrors, seat belts, brake lights, and turn signals, among other features. When tagged and registered, they are allowed on public roads with posted speeds of a maximum 35 mph.

There are differences in both coverage and premium. Essential golf cart coverages for any Personal Insurance Program should include: Liability to Others (Bodily Injury and Property Damage), Medical Payments, Guest Limits Liability, Uninsured Motorist Limits, and, if you need coverage to protect for damage to your cart, Comprehensive and Collision. BUT, once it's tagged and registered for street use, you will also need (personal injury protec-PIP tion) coverage Florida requires of every vehicle on the road. This one coverage, in insurance speak, changes the product from golf cart coverage to LSV coverage and must be written on an auto policy platform. LSVs are more expensive to insure (with the mandatory PIP coverage) than golf carts, since LSVs are allowed on the road with cars, trucks and semis which increases the risk/exposure substantially.

As an example, your chances of being involved in a severe accident in your complex is much lower than if you were driving your golf cart on a public road. A Mercedes colliding with a golf cart going 35 mph would probably cause more damage than two golf carts bumping heads.

When you allow your renter to use your golf cart, you now need different coverage. If you have a personal use golf cart policy, it will not protect you or your renters if they cause Liability to Others from their negligence. This is where a policy designed for rental exposure is necessary. Because your renter is using your golf cart, this falls under the purview of a commercial product. So, you need a type of Commercial General Liability insurance. This insurance is designed to give you, typically, \$1 million in liability coverage and some physical damage (Inland Marine) coverage for the golf cart. Keep in mind, this product may not have the same coverages as a properly structured personal use golf cart policy as described above. And this policy does not provide the PIP coverage that would be required if the cart is tagged and registered with the



state. And it is nearly impossible to find an auto carrier that will write a policy with PIP if it falls under a rental situation.

It was our place. That's what it was. I grew up in a little fishing village, nestled in the Florida Panhandle.

This was long before the tattoo parlors, before the T-shirt shops, before Whole Foods and Bass Pro.

Today our little town is not even a shadow of its former glory. On any given month, Destin is inundated with 8 million tourists wearing thong bikinis. And those are just the men.

But once upon a time, we had Pepito's. It was your quintessential Mexican dive restaurant. It was clean. The staff was friendly. They had ugly orange walls. The joint was always packed.

They served good food. The chips were always hot. The salsa was fresh from an actual tin can. They had ice-cold Tecate.

You could order a "King Burrito," and you wouldn't be hungry again for the next three or four presidential administrations.

My first kiss happened outside Pepito's. It was late. Her name was Teresa. She had red hair and she smelled like Head and Shoulders.

Do people name their kids Teresa anymore?

As a young man, all my friends went to Pepito's because it was where you went. We spent entire evenings in those booths, discussing who we were going to grow up to become.

For a few bucks, you could fill your belly on queso dip that would turn your bowels into stone. If you had enough cash left over, you could take in a movie across the street.

Years later, I worked at the restaurant next door to Pepito's. We served cheap sirloins. I was a line cook. I worked in a dank kitchen until 1AM every weeknight, doing dishes.

They were long nights. Pepito's shared our same dumpster. So, whenever I took out the trash, there were always a few Latino guys out there smoking cigarettes, speaking in rapid-fire Español, drinking longneck Pacificos.

I learned to speak Spanish in that alley. I had no idea they were teaching me dirty words.

Before I married, I would take my future-wife to Pepito's. On weekends, they had a mariachi trio. Three portly men played vihuelas, guitaelas and violínos, strolling between tables. If you didn't put money into their guitar soundholes, they would play louder.

One night, I requested the trio play "Besame Mucho" for my fiance. They actually let me sing a song with them. My musical performance was so impressive, all the people in the restaurant sprang to their feet and rushed for the exits.

After we married, my wife and I lived in a cheap apartment behind Waffle House. It was a horrible place. I got fleas. Twice. We were flat broke, so eating out was a luxury. Whenever we treated ourselves, we went to Pepito's.

But then, that was a long time ago. Somehow I grew up. And so did our fishing village.

One by one, the mom-andpop shops disappeared and became real estate offices or vape outlets. The post-war block houses were demolished so that homes shaped like the Sears Towers could be built in their places. They tore down the fishing rodeo docks and built Six Flags over Avarice.



But Pepito's was a mainstay. You could always count on Pepito's. You could walk inside, order an immobilizingly cold beer, eat lukewarm guacamole, and play the memory game with old friends.

"Remember when we used to...?" "Remember when we were kids...?" "Whatever happened to what's-her-name...?"

For a few bucks, you could eat mediocre Mexican that tasted the same as it did a lifetime ago. And you could remember things.

Such as the night, long ago, when you brought your widowed mother here and broke the news that you were getting married. She cried. And so did you. Or the night your best friend brought you here and told you he was leaving for Afghanistan in the morning.

Today, they're vacating Pepito's. The property was owned by investors in Can-

ada. But the good ole days are gone. It's been purchased. The new investors want to build a Publix. Tourists got to have their groceries.

Even so, I'll always remember the balmy evenings from the summers of my Florida youth. I'll remember the dim-lit booths of an average Mexican-American eatery, where the promise of my entire future hung in the air.

I'll forever remember how young we were. How smooth our faces looked. And how good it felt when, in that corner booth, a young woman once took my hand and said, "Yes, I'll be your wife."

You can tear down Pepito's. But keep your hands off my memories.

A Pastor's Ponderings: Easter Brings Hope, Joy

On the first day of the week, very early in the morning, the women took the spices they had prepared and went to the tomb. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus. While they were wondering about this, suddenly two men in clothes that gleamed like lightning stood beside them. In their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen! Remember how he told you, while he was still with you in Galilee: 'The Son of Man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, be crucified and on the third day be raised again." Then they remembered his words.

When they came back from the tomb, they told all these things to the Eleven and to all the others. It was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the others with them who told this to the apostles. But they did not believe the women, because their words seemed to them like nonsense. Peter, however, got up and ran to the tomb. Bending over, he saw the strips of linen lying by themselves, and he went away, wondering to himself what had happened. Luke 24:1-12

Where's Jesus?

Depression hung on them like a bitter aftertaste. Jesus is dead. Their feet dragged with disappointment and disillusionment. Jesus is dead. Duty called for them at the tomb to anoint His body. Jesus is dead.

Luke 24:1-12 unfolds like a short four-act play as the writer unveils the greatest event in history. The first act shows us a group of dejected women dragging themselves dutifully to the rock cave, supposedly housing the dead remains of Christ. Someone had to embalm Him, so these faithful women summoned the courage and ingredients to prepare Him for the grave. I'm guessing they were numb with grief, putting one foot in front of the other to do what had to be done.

The women discovered Christ's body was gone – they surely felt shock and perhaps anger. Imagine going into the mortuary to say goodbye to your dead grandfather before the funeral. You open the casket to look at him one more time, and the casket is empty. I doubt that resurrection would be the first thing coming to mind.

As the scene unfolds, light suddenly erupts in the tomb and two men clothed with lighting flash into the cave. Trust me when I tell you they didn't beam down from a spaceship. God the Holy Spirit raised Jesus from the dead and He left two angelic witnesses to clues these poor humans in. The angels said in Luke 24:5, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen!"

Really? Yes, really. "Just like He said back in Galilee, 'The Son of Man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, be crucified and on the third day be raised again."" {Luke 9:22) All who believe this statement are saved from judgment and destined for heaven, according to I Corinthians 15:1-4. Believe and receive all God has for you.

The angels followed with a question that still haunts us, "Why do you look for the living among the dead?" Except for Peter. He jumped up and ran to the tomb to see for himself. Why Peter? He was feeling the most guilty after denying the Lord three times during His trials.

The empty tomb baffled Peter, who walked away wondering what this could all mean. There are those who ponder the meaning of their lives. Jesus isn't there in the pondering. He is risen.

The Bible says in Romans 10:9-10 (NIV) "If you declare with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you profess your faith and are saved."

Please pray, "Lord Jesus. I believe you died for me. I believe you were buried and rose from the dead. Save me from my sins, though they are blood red. Wash away regret, guilt and

Sinfonia Gulf Coast Link Up Performance Featured 2,000 Local Elementary School Students

On March 8 the Emerald Coast Convention Center in Fort Walton Beach was transformed into an electrifying concert hall when Sinfonia Gulf Coast — the only fully professional non-profit orchestra on the Emerald Coast founded in 2005 by music and artistic director Demetrius Fuller — present-ed its 9th live Link Up concert performance "The Orchestra Moves," a national program it presented in partnership with New York's Carnegie Hall Weill Institute of Music.

This year's Link Up program showcased the talents of more than 2,000 local 3rd-5th grade students from Okaloosa and Walton Counties performing on recorder and singing. The concert was conducted by Sinfonia Gulf Coast Maestro Fuller.



With recorders in hand, the students performed from their seats when given their cue by Maestro Fuller to join the Sinfonia Gulf Coast orchestra for a range of pieces from Danzón No. 2 by Arturo Márquez, The Blue Danube by Johann Strauss

and Toreador from Georges Bizet's Carmen and others. But these inspired kids didn't stay in their seats, at this spirited performance they were up out of their chairs singing, dancing choreographed moves they have been practicing for months.

This curriculum is geared towards 3rd-5th grade students, and in many cases locally, is the only music education that they receive during the school year. The theme of this year's Link Up program was centered around movement. Students learn how we can perceive music as moving through space from high to low, filling the spaces in between with harmonies, timbres, and textures. They learn that when music moves us, it evokes a full range of emotional responses, and compels us to move our bodies and create dance.

Sinfonia's Link Up program is funded in part by the St. Joe Community Foundation, the Dugas Family Foundation, and the Emeril Lagasse Family Foundation. Additional funding from Sinfonia Gulf Coast's Crescendo! annual fundraiser, Treble Makers, an honorary membership committee of Crescendo!, and community donors, have helped Link Up steadily grow to the Sinfonia's largest education initiative.

"We are so honored to sponsor this incredible Sinfonia Link Up initiative for the students in our community," said April Wilkes, executive director of the St. Joe Community Foundation. "For 10 years, the Foundation has made an investment in this program and it has been great to see the growth and impact that it has on all of these students."

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

Ask Destinites: Positive Change Wish List for Destin Part 2

Last month, in our local Destinites Facebook group (www. Facebook.com/Destinites), asked, "What is one positive thing you would like to see implemented in the Destin area for 2023. which you feel would benefit or even partially benefit the community?" I started the thread by saying I would like to see crosswalk bridges placed in certain areas along Hwy. 98 which lead to the beach area(s). And, I would especially like to see one that goes over

to HarborWalk Village. My post received more than 400 responses and I shared some of them with you. Below is a continuation of some of those responses, which were too good not to mention. Our new mayor, Bobby Wagner, has acknowledged many of the suggestions and already started implementing action. What more could you ask? Keep in mind, though, change takes time and manpower. Go to council meetings and get involved!

Continued Wish List:

1. "We really need the Emerald Coast EC Rider to stop at VPS. It drives past the airport four times a day on Hwy. 85. Why can't it stop? Think of all the rental cars that it could take off our roads. There has been talk on this for years but nothing has been done. Maybe our new mayor can find out the reason for community leaders not moving forward with this idea."

2. "Limit airbnb. It has overwhelmed our community. People can't afford rent anymore because at least half the rentals have switched over to short term."

3. "Commercial land owners and businesses should be responsible for picking up trash on and around their property. One example is the open spaces and side areas around the Target and Winn Dixie complexes."

4. "Definitely more bike paths OFF the main highway (like what they have on Scenic (old) 98 from Crystal Beach to the outlets, but rather through Destin and on both sides of 98. This would be fantastic for locals who work along 98. To raise money for it, we can host more 5Ks, bring back the local triathlon, etc."

5. "Dog-friendly beach with a license - that's also revenue for the city."

6. "I would like to see Destin/ Okaloosa County adopt the same dog permit program as Walton County, which allows you to walk your dog on the beach at certain hours of the day."

7. "Roundabouts – keep traffic

flowing all along Commons Drive and Scenic 98. Crepe Myrtles in the medians of Hwy 98."

8. "More beach access! What I'd like to see is condos give access to the beach. It could be just five parking spots, but at least allow some access! It's ridiculous how inaccessible some areas are like Holiday Isle. Before any non true locals attack me, I was born and raised here and remember when this was not a problem!"

9. "Commons drive west at The Home Depot entrance... need something done at that intersection. People think it's a four-way stop and just pull out in front of you onto commons drive. Seen so many near bad accidents. Need a turnabout and four-way stop. At the same time, please repaint the directional on the road at this same area. People sit in the middle of the road instead of to the left if they're turning left or sitting right if going right. It gets so backed up for no reason other than we need it repainted. Such an easy, cheap fix to help the flow

of traffic "

10. "A solid sports complex center for kids from young age to teenage. We love Destin, but this town caters more towards tourists than locals and, more importantly, to our kids, who will be Destin's next generation. Second thought, I believe toll bridges should be exempt for locals who live in Destin and/or the surrounding area. Charge tourists, not locals. Help us, Bobby Wagner!"
