Blessed: An Event-Packed Week that Blesses, Unites and Strengthens Destin

"May the Lord bless you, and keep you; the Lord make His face shine upon you and be gracious to you; the Lord lift up His countenance upon you and give you peace." - Numbers 6: 24-26

According to Immanuel Anglican Church's Reverend Caleb A. Miller, Destin's annual Blessing of the Fleet began in May 1958. "Reverend William Erwin stated the intent behind the event was to ask the Lord to bless the labor of those making their living on the Gulf and waters, and that God would keep them in safety," he says.

Rev. Miller has been a part of the Blessing of the Fleet since 2014. He says the Blessing launched with 12 to 15 fishing vehicles and has grown to more than 150 watercrafts. "Now we bless charter fishing, parasailing, law enforcement, Coast Guard, snorkeling, pontoon, sailboats, pirate boats and, it seems like, everything in between.

"The event has always been held 40 days after Easter for a specific reason – to worship Jesus, crucified and risen, on the Day of his Ascension. After Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection, (He) ascended into heaven in victory, to reign and

lie Anderson says patrons can expect new twists for May 13 and 14's ArtsQuest festival at Grand Boulevard Town Center. "Things are different with the layout," she says. "We're expecting around 5,000 people over the weekend." This year's festival includes adult art classes with the likes of Justin Gaffrey, nonstop live entertainment and new sponsors.

"The other events are happening almost every day throughout May," says Ms. Anderson. "We support and promote them all and want people to go to as many as they can."

Ms. Anderson handles all of the huge CAA events, including the 30A Songwriters Festival and the Flutterby Festival. "Anything involving 500 or more people," she says.

She came onboard in September 2022. Prior to that, Ms. Anderson ran her own business designing custom apparel – t-shirts, tote bags and the like – for sororities all over the country. Originally from Panama City, she has also lived in Dallas and California.

Now she's back in Panama City with her two daughters and couldn't be happier. "It's nice to be back with friends and family," says Ms. Anderson. "I appreciate the growth that's going on. There's so much to do here now. I just love the community and how much everyone supports each other."

Her connection to the arts began at a young age. "I was an artist growing up, and my mom is a glass artist," she says. "We used to do paint classes together. We were always around the arts, and I really found an appreciation for it at a young age. My mom is the one who told me about the CAA position."

ArtsQuest officially kicks off Thursday, May 11, at 6 p.m. with the Underwater Museum of Art fundraiser at Grand Boulevard Town Center. The event celebrates the museum's fifth









installation with art, dancing, cocktails, food and more. "We'll have two sculptures by Allison Wickey and Zachary Long – about six feet tall each – at Under the Sea for people to view before they go underwater," says Ms. Anderson.

Dallas Primavera, this year's ArtsQuest featured artist, is a longtime CAA member. His work will be featured on posters and t-shirts. Mr. Primavera is based out of Jacksonville Beach and has been painting for over 20 years. "I'm traveling around the state of Florida to do art shows and trying to get my name out there," he says.

The Florida State alum says he's always been a vivid dreamer. "I have developed a skill that I will try to put into words," the official bio reads. "As I close my eyes, every night I relive the same dream — long halls filled with paintings on both sides, in every color, shape and size.

"At first, I would wake up with a feeling of jealousy, like what I saw was exactly where I was going. A warm wave of understanding washed over me as I realized everything I saw was mine to come. Best part, I remembered everything I dreamt about. To this day, the process is the source of my inspiration, and it keeps getting stronger.

"He does beautiful work," says Ms. Anderson. "The posters are amazing." Discover more at arthydallas.com.

This year's participating churches are Immanuel Anglican Church, Shoreline Church, Destin United Methodist Church, Coastline Calvary Chapel, The Summit Church, Safe Harbor Presbyterian Church, Impulse Church, Village Baptist Church, Impact Life Church and Destin Assembly of God.

Michelle Terry currently serves as president of the Church of Destin, which puts on the Week of Blessings. She describes the collective of local places of worship as "one church, many congregations." Ms. Terry was born and raised here and became a member of the board two years ago.

It's the 20th anniversary of the Week of Blessings, started by Mel Ponder, Captain Mike Parker, Father Mike Hesse and Pastor Paul Kummer. Pastor Kummer will be speaking at this year's Blessing of the Marketplace.

Studio6Twenty5 Brings the Beauty of Ballet to NWFL

If you are a lover of the arts, dance and, more specifically, ballet, and you reside anywhere along Northwest Florida's Gulf Coast, you may already be well aware of Destin's Studio6Twenty5 and this relatively new school's efforts to answer the need for instruction in the growing demand for classical performing arts. If you aren't, that's o.k., too, because we're about to change that.

Studio6Twenty5, located in Destin, is the brainchild of Northwest Florida native and professional dancer, Rachel Prescott, who opened her school last August.

Prescott's personal experience – having moved to New York City and danced professionally for some time – ensures that both classical ballet and contemporary dance are taught at her studio, and presented in a way that inspires and educates both the students and our community as to the strong benefits of ballet and the discipline that comes with mastering it.

Studio6Twenty5 uses the

American Ballet Theatre® National Training Curriculum, consisting of a nine-level program, combining the fundamentals of dancer health, adolescent development and a high degree of artistic training.

The curriculum consists of in-depth, age-appropriate instruction ranging from classes for Pre-Primary Ballet, primary A & B, Intermediate, Tap, Jazz and Pointe to advanced classes. The school has 50 children and 15 adults enrolled, and offers classes

rolled, and offers classes six days a week in various disciplines.

Prescott emphasizes that, "Outcome-based guidelines, such as ours, tend to provide the highest quality ballet training to a variety of students of all ages and skill levels. Our mission is to be a community school, for, and made up of, students and adults here in these coastal communities—the same communities our own family loves and calls home."

As interesting and artistically



inspirational as everything Rachel has conveyed to me about Studio6Twenty5, one of the most intriguing aspects to me is the family and community aspect, and how important that camaraderie and sense of family is to her.

"I'm from Fort Walton, and grew up in Destin, and have been involved in ballet since I was barely old enough to walk. My dad (renowned Destin architect, Jeffrey Prescott) was a dancer all of my life, and was



a driving force in my becoming hooked on ballet at an early age.

"I did The Nutcracker at six years old," she said. "My 7-year-old daughter is involved, and my 77-year-old dad still dances every week. He even drops by often to talk with and encourage the students. He's particularly inspiring to our male students in helping them to overlook and break the stereotype that has often been associated with boys and men taking ballet."

Prescott's students, along with

those of the studio's assistant director, Shaye Smith, are developed as individual artists through well-rounded, classical curriculums and are supported by a nurturing, positive, curated environment that evolves from the instructors' own love and passion for ballet.

As a showcase of this dedication and training, Studio6Twenty5's staff and students will present "Coppelia: A Ballet in Three

Acts," featuring all 50 children and 15 adult students, for two general admission ticketed shows on June 3 and 4 at Destin Community Center. Rachel, her students and staff invite all to attend and see firsthand what their school's innate attention to training, community and the wonderful art of ballet is all about.

This is the second year the festival has been established on its new dates (the weekend after Mother's Day), but Pirate Captain Billy Bowlegs has been setting his sights on our sandy white shores since the 1950s! As all you landlubbers know, it's been Captain Billy's mission to

take control of the fair seas near Fort Walton Beach since then. Will we prevail in keeping the dastardly pirate crew from gaining a foothold along our sands?

Produced in partnership with the William Augustus Bowles Foundation, the Krewe of Bowlegs, the City of Fort Walton Beach, the Fort Walton Beach Chamber of Commerce, and local businesses and community organizations, since 1954, the festival's purpose has been to promote business and tourism, and showcase our beautiful Emerald Coast community.

Each year, a new "Captain Billy" plays the part of the fun and not-so-horrible pirate hoodlum. This year, Fort Walton Beach native James Baughman takes the helm as Captain Billy Bowlegs LXVII. He and his wife, Diane Wyman Baughman, also born and raised in the Fort Walton Beach area, were high school sweethearts. "We always looked forward to the Bowlegs treasure hunt clues that would appear in what was then the Playground Daily News, and to the Torchlight Parade," they recall. "As someone who grew up in Fort Walton Beach with the Billy Bowlegs Festival, I never imagined I would one day be Captain Billy. I am humbled and honored to have this opportunity to serve the Krewe and the

community," James said.

James is joined this year by the 67th Queen of Bowlegs, Amy Wendel and her husband, Bill. Also on board are the 67th First Mate and First Mistress of Bowlegs, Bobby and Amy Mc-Bride. Ten additional couples form Captain Billy's Honor Guard and round out the group known this year as the 'Krewe in Black.'

James, along with his 'Krewe in Black,' was "unveiled" as this year's new Captain Billy back in June '22 at the 67th Krewe of Bowlegs Coronation Pageant held at the Mattie Kelly Arts Center at Northwest Florida State College. He feels being a new "Captain Billy" is an honor and a responsibility to reflect and promote the festival that

draws locals and visitors alike. "We have to look back to the founding of the Billy Bowlegs Pirate Festival and the Krewe of Bowlegs for guidance in preserving its traditions," said the new captain. "In 1953, local business and community leaders hosted a Labor Day weekend water ski show as a way of attracting tourists for one last business push before the long, slow winter season. Building upon the success of the water ski show, the idea of a pirate festival was put forth based on the legend of Captain Billy Bowlegs, a pirate of questionable authenticity who operated in nearby waters, and who was thought to be historical figure William Augustus Bowles. Recognizing that a pirate festival would need pirates, local businessmen stepped up and hired local seamstresses to create pirate costumes, and that is how the Billy Bowlegs Pirate Festival, and shortly thereafter the Krewe of Bowlegs, was born," said James. The festival was then organized by the Jaycees. "We are proud to carry on the tradition and the original purpose of the festival," he said.

New each year, the festival's theme reflects the personality of the new captain. 'Loud & Proud' represents Captain Billy 67's love of loud music and loud motorcycles. But, he said, "It also symbolizes American freedom, independence and the power embodied by the military capabilities in our local area that defend this nation." His 'Krewe in Black' are ready to rumble.





Should investing be about fear or should it be about optimism? And which is the greater motivator of behavior and action? We have often heard that perception without any confirmation indeed becomes reality. Investors are bombarded almost daily with messages of fear. Part 2: Pre Owned Sports Cars Under \$50,000 **That Make Great Daily Drivers**

MX-5 one of the greatest sports

cars money can buy. And a lot

of that is because you can drive

these cars way closer to their

limits, revving to 7,000 RPMs,

taking sharp S turns at 80 mph

If you consider yourself an automobile connoisseur of any depth, it's almost certain you could probably guess the cars that would make up a list of this title, simply based on common knowledge of what is and isn't a real sports car and what does and doesn't make economic sense for the average person to daily drive.

You wouldn't, for example, populate a sports car list such as this with the likes of modern-day Camaros, Mustangs, BMW 4 series coupes or Audi A5 Cabriolets—though all of those are great vehicles in their own right, and some I've even owned and appreciate. However, those all fall into the GT (Grand Touring) category, and even with brute power and only two doors, they aren't really sports cars.

At the other end of the spectrum, as much as I can appreciate the more exotic makes, you can't include anything made by Ferrari, Lamborghini, McLaren, Lotus or a host of other makes on this list. Mostly because even as true sports cars they can't be had for the \$50,000 ceiling here, and even if they could I couldn't-with good conscious— suggest anyone try to daily drive anything that has \$25,000, 15,000- mile service requirements or (insert used \$30,000 Maserati's here) has a high probability of developing a new problem on the roundtrip to Fresh Market or Starbucks.

In Part 2, we take a look at FIVE tried and true sports cars that are both priced accordingly and have a reliability record that leads to the makings of a great daily driver that won't break the bank or live at the shop.



Mazda MX-5

When it comes to true-tothe-definition sports cars there's not much debate among auto aficionados about which one brings the most smiles per miles and dollars: It's almost always hands down Mazda's classic Elan inspired MX-5 roadster. There is a reason more MX-5's are raced on tracks every weekend than any other car in this country. And it's the same reason that the MX-5 is about the only sub-\$40,000 car (new) that the same guy who owns a Porsche 911 GT3, classic Ferrari 328 or Lotus Esprit would still choose to buy for his funto-drive, dependable ride, while he keeps the miles off the more expensive car candy.

Besides being one of the only new(er) cars that still maintains that basic analog, driver-at-onewith-the-road sensation, the two most recent iterations of the MX-5 (internally the NC and the ND cars) provide enough room and comfort (this isn't a Mercedes, however; you're supposed to feel the road under those 45 series tires) to make them great daily drivers - top up or down.

For years, test drivers and auto editors at the likes of Automobile, Road & Track and Car & Driver have called the

daily basis, in most of the much more expensive, and powerful, sports cars available.

I'd suggest an NC, from 2012to 2015, in the highly desirable PRHT (power retractable hardtop) with a 6-speed manual. And if you can find one, a Club edition, with all of the above mentioned, plus the larger wheels, unique front fascia, rear splitter, along with Bilstein shocks and strut tower brace. If you prefer the look of the newer, 2016-present, ND cars, then you can still get in a nicely equipped 1- to 3-year-old version for well under our price point for this article. Either way you go, the cars are ultra-dependable, low cost to maintain, get decent mpg, and will almost certainly be one of

cars to drive... no matter what other cars you may have owned.

BMW Z4 and Toyota Supra

The Toyota Supra doesn't need much of an introduction to the car-obsessed crowd. Even though it resurfaced in 2019, after a 17-year absence, the Supra was an immediate hit, with long waitlists for those sports car fans in line to order one.

Similarly, the BMW Z4 has always been a popular choice for the Euro sports car crowd looking for a sporty, but comfortable, drop top with some pedigree and overall good performance. This is still the case, though the newest generation of the Z4, the G29, shares its platform with

SOF Missons and the Unseen Wounds of War

Almost every hour, one U.S. veteran commits suicide!

SOF Missions is a non-profit organization that assists and supports active duty and veteran Special Operations Forces (SOF) and their families. Dr. Damon Friedman, a former Special Forces operator, founded the organization when he recognized the need for a support system within the SOF community.

Damon served on active duty for twenty years—five in the Marine Corps and 15 in the Air Force's special warfare. Damon tells his story of almost becoming a statistic, but some incredible people stepped in to help him. He believed it was his turn to help others. So, his wife, Dayna, and he started SOF Missions in Bagram, Afghanistan, in 2011. SOF Missions aims to empower America's warriors to find purpose and be resilient.

SOF Missions helps the battle brother, America's true heroes, find freedom through post-traumatic growth. Many veterans feel hopeless and without purpose, with an inability to reconnect. Damon said, "We are trying to help them to not only get to a better state mentality but to be the best version of themselves." The program focuses on a whole health, interdisciplinary model. They treat mild traumatic brain injury, chronic pain, insomnia, post-traumatic stress and chronic stress. He continued, "Helping our war-



riors is a completely systematic approach."

The Resiliency Project is a four-pillar methodology project: psychological, physical, spiritual and social wellness. "We believe that humans are made up of mind, body, and soul, and our Creator is the designer of the universe. One of the biggest challenges in America is that people do not really know their purpose." SOF Missions purposes to help those in the program to find their purpose in life. "Our veterans are the treasure of America called upon to change the world for good, to make this world a better place."

The keynote speaker for this year's banquet was 37-year veteran Marine Corps Major General James S. "Hammer" Hartsell, Executive Director of the Florida Department of Veterans Affairs. General Hartsell pointed out that since 9-11, nearly four million Americans have raised their right hand to

defend our Constitution and country against all enemies, foreign and domestic. Half of those went to war—two million. He stated, "Those who went to war were exposed to moral injury. They were exposed to things they would not have been exposed to in a normal life."

He quoted, "In war, there are no unwounded soldiers," which emphasizes that all soldiers are wounded in some way, whether physically, emotionally, or spiritually. The unseen wounds are the least treated but still have a lasting impact on their lives.

Gen. Hartsell talked passionately about everyone's "life load" and the need to balance military, family and employment life. SOF Missions helps warriors carry the burdens of life load. Everyone has these burdens, and getting out of balance creates trouble. SOF Missions helps veterans balance the psychological, social, physical and spiritual domains.

He learned through experience that psychological trauma is the hardest to keep in balance.

Bob Conrad is a 25-year Army Veteran and a local representative with SOF Missions. Bob says, "Attitude-Behavior-Results! It starts with the choice of commitment to impact the lives of our extended Veteran

Community, to reduce suicide, increase resiliency and guide others to thriving, not just surviving! In a purpose-driven organization, that's called commitment!" Bob has been with SOF for six years in Donor and Strategy Development with a team led by Sherrie Hayes, Kristi Beckman and Annette Beard. The Tampa-based HQ worked hard to increase the passion and participation from 180 in 2022 to 240 supporters in 2023! The Gala is a premier event along the Emerald Coast.

The Gala pays tribute to the brave men and women who fight and sacrifice for the freedoms we enjoy. We must emphasize the importance of acknowledging and honoring our heroes, recognizing the responsibility that comes with freedom, and understanding the true meaning of courage. We must never forget or minimize the sacrifices made by our soldiers in service to this country. Their sacrifices should inspire future generations to strive for greatness. We owe it to our heroes to remember and honor their legacy, to appreciate the liberties they secured for us, and to continue to protect and defend those freedoms for future generations.

While these actions were deemed necessary for the safety of everyone at the schools, by the end of the 2020-2021 school year, the stress was beginning to take its toll on students. They told me, along with Supt. Marcus Chambers, in a town hall-style meeting at Baker School a year after that long spring break, that they were weary of being in and out of school, and that it had affected them mentally. The school district and school board responded by hiring more mental health hind desk shields, and about the pungent scent of hand sanitizer that permeated the school each day," I joked.

As I shook their hands and congratulated these honor students, it hit me that the students in the Class of 2023 do not want to be defined by the pandemic. While they have overcome obstacles no other class has, they not only survived, but they have thrived.

Truly, they seemed to be ready to move on from high school and the pandemic. I did ask them to please take some time, when all the pomp and circumstance has calmed down, to reflect on the last four years, noting their challenges and accomplishments.

Hats off to the approximately 2,200 Okaloosa County students who will graduate in the Class of 2023. What stories



Historical Southern Forts Dedicated to Bravery



By JoDell Haverfield, HAVE TRAVEL MEMORIES Freedom isn't free!

I love the South and I especially love living in the South. This Memorial Day, consider taking your family on a road trip to explore a few of the South's forts and memorials honoring those who saved the South. You hardly even need to go beyond your own backyard.

Southern history is far more than the culture of the antebellum South, (which I love by the way). She served a vital role in the problems and difficulties of becoming the nation the United States is today, from the Native Americans, American Revolution, Civil War and on to current history. We live in the shadow of our nation's oldest settlement, with more than 450 years of history, and Pensacola Bay is just the beginning! After the war of 1812 the United States began constructing coastal forts along its 3,500-mile coastline to protect important waterways and seaports. Pensacola Bay was one such area. Europe had long considered Pensacola Bay one of the most important seaports on the northern Gulf Coast due to its width and deep water providing the deepest anchorage as





well as a large, protected harbor for ships.

Construction on Fort Pickens began in 1829 and was completed five years later after more than 21.5 million bricks had been laid by skilled tradesmen and slave labor. If you look closely, you can often see their fingerprints in the bricks. The massive pentagonal fortress was necessary to protect against attacks on the newly established Pensacola Navy shipyard. At the time, Fort Pickens, named after Brig. Gen. Andrew Pickens, a patriot who fought with distinction in South Carolina during the Revolutionary War, was the largest brick structure on the Gulf of Mexico.

Three months before the start of the Civil War, a high stakes meeting took place outside of Fort Pickens to decide who would control one of the most

powerful forts in the United States. The duty fell to 1st Lt. J. Slemmer to defend the fort whose walls were known as "The Ring of Fire," with as many as 200 cannons raining heavy artillery. On the morning of Nov. 22, 1861, a Union cannon inside Fort Pickens broke the sound of crashing waves in an effort to destroy the Confederates across the bay. Never before had Third System fortifications fired against each other. For 48 hours, about 110 Union and Confederate

seacoast artillery pieces, the most massive cannons used by the armies at the time, shook the earth. The bombardment could be heard as far as 125 miles away. Fort Pickens remained in use until 1947.

Many southern historical forts in the United States were erected to strengthen U.S. defenses due to the losses experienced during the War of 1812. Here are a few more famous Forts of the South.

Fort Morgan, Ala., is a pentagonal Bastian fort at the mouth of Mobile Bay. Completed in 1834, it stood as the guardian of Mobile Bay through four wars - the Civil War, the Spanish American War, and World Wars I and II – but it is most famous for the Civil War "Battle of Mobile Bay" when on Aug. 5,1864, Adm. David Farragut ordered his fleet to charge the heavily

mined bay. He went "full speed ahead" to win the war. This fort claims more than 40 million bricks and pays tribute to the skilled masons, many were enslaved African Americans. The Mobile Civil War Trail spans more than 90 miles along the Gulf of Mexico to North Mobile County. It was reconstructed in 1895 and remained active until 1949.

Fort Smith, Ark., was originally built to maintain peace and harmony between the Osage and a band of Cherokee in the area. Fort Smith is where some of the most famous outlaws of the Wild West were brought to justice.

Fort Marion - Castillo de San Marcos, St. Augustine, is the oldest masonry fort in the United States. Originally it was a Spanish fort in 1821 until it was dedicated as a U.S. Army base and renamed Fort Marion. During the fort's more than 100 years as an Army base, it housed Native American prisoners and was most notably the site of mass Apache incarceration in 1881.

Fort Pulaski, Ga., was built to protect the port of Savannah in 1847 until it was overtaken by Confederate soldiers and seceded from the Union in 1860. It was again overtaken just two years later and began to deteriorate around World War I.

Fort Boonesborough, Ky., a frontier fort founded by none other than Daniel Boone himself in 1775, also played a role in the Civil War. Fort Boonesborough also served as an outpost in the American Revolution and remained active until the early



19th century. It has since been reconstructed as a working fort, complete with cabins and period furnishing.

Fort Jackson, La., was originally constructed to defend New Orleans, however this fort saw battle only from April 16 to April 28, 1862, when it quickly fell to the Union forces.

Fort Massachusetts, Miss., is where the Confederate militia took this partially built fort in the summer of 1861 and then quickly abandoned it. However, it didn't stay abandoned for long as Union forces began using it in early 1862. This fort was last active in 1903.

Fort Macon, N.C., was also established for coastal defense during the war of 1812 and, like many forts erected during this time, it played a significant role in the Civil War. This southern fort was soon captured by Confederate militia just two days into the war. Eventually, Union troops recaptured the fort, which was again abandoned in 1903.

Fort Sumter, S.C., is one of two forts at the entrance of Charleston Harbor and was famously overtaken by the Confederacy at the onset of the Civil War. This fort was a focal

point in Charlston throughout the wars and is a favorite tourist spot today.

Fort Donelson, Tenn., is the only fort that was built by the Confederacy during the Civil War instead of being overtaken. However, after its completion the Battle of Fort Donelson ensued, and a Union victory resulted.

The Alamo, Texas, is one of the most popular forts in the U.S. This fort was occupied by either Spanish or Mexican troops until the beginning of the Texas War for Independence from Mexico.

Fort Ward, Va., was built to protect Washington, D.C. during the Civil War. Today it offers several exhibits on Civil War topics.

Prickett's Fort, W. Va., was constructed by early settlers in 1774 as a refuge from Native American attacks. Eighty local families would gather at this small fortress anytime there was a threat of an uprising.

Vicksburg's Fort Hill sat high on a bluff north of the city commanding the Mississippi River. These key defenses were blown up on June 25, 1863, laying the way for General Grant's victory over Vicksburg.

Healthy Olive Oil Muffins With Coconut Drizzle

2 cups all-purpose flour

3 teaspoons baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

34 cup white sugar

1 egg

1 cup milk

1/4 cup Persian Lime, Lemon, Blood Orange or Unflavored Olive Oil

2-3 tablespoons Coconut Balsamic Vinegar (optional)
1 cup icing sugar

1/4 teaspoon ground ginger

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Spray muffin pans with cooking spray. Mix the dry ingredients in a large bowl. Make a well in the center. In a small bowl, beat the egg with a fork. Add the milk and olive oil.

Pour the wet ingredients all at once into the well in the flour mixture. Mix quickly with a fork until moistened; do not overbeat. The batter will be lumpy. Pour the batter into muffin pans, filling ¾ full. Bake for 20-25 minutes until golden around the edges (about 15 minutes for mini-muffins).

When muffins have cooled, combine vinegar*, icing sugar and ginger in a small bowl and whisk until smooth (make it very thick so add more sugar if you need it). Spoon the glaze into a small zipper plastic bag and cut a very tiny hole in one tip. Squeeze the glaze onto the muffins in small ribbons. Let dry.

*You can use other white vinegars or even water.

World's Largest Lionfish Tournament to be Held in Destin-Fort Walton Beach

Okaloosa County Destin-Fort Walton Beach Tourism and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is celebrating the 5th Annual Lionfish Removal & Awareness Festival on May 20-21 at the Destin Harbor. Lionfish are an invasive species that prey on native fish with no known predators due to their venomous spines. The Emerald Coast Open (ECO) tournament is a key component that helps mitigate the growing lionfish threat in the Gulf of Mexico. "We are fortunate to have a Coastal Resources Division in our community, focused on awareness and reducing the population of this invasive species," said Okaloosa Board of County Commissioners Chairman Mel Ponder. FWB Life is looking forward to an exciting 2023 tournament!

"The success of this annual event is undeniable," said Okaloosa County Board Chairman Trey Goodwin. "It not only helps to remove this invasive species, but it brings so many different local industries together within a family-friendly atmosphere that's accessible to the public. This event grows each year and it could not happen





without the hard work of the Coastal Resource Team within our Tourism Development Department"

The festival includes the Emerald Coast Open Tournament May 19-20. The tournament gives divers the opportunity to

compete for prize money totaling nearly \$100,000 in categories like most lionfish caught and largest and smallest lionfish. In 2019, ECO had 189 participants and removed 19,167 lionfish throughout the tournament 14,119 in three days. ECO gave away \$48,000 in cash prizes and more than \$10,000 in gear prizes. Last year's tournament was a great success and removed 13,835 lionfish from local waters. The record for the smallest lionfish was broken at 39 millimeters during the main tournament by Alabama Jammin. Diver Tim Shivers collected 604 lionfish during the pre-tournament which surpassed the 2019 record. Tournament weigh-ins will be held behind AJ's Seafood & Oyster Bar on May 21.

Leading up to the tournament, Emerald Coast Open Restaurant Week offers the public unique lionfish dishes prepared by chefs at local restaurants. Each evening, a local restaurant serves a unique lionfish dish on their menu. The fish caught pre-tournament are provided to the participating restaurants to serve. Each dish is also judged and the winning chef crowned at the end of the week. Last year, the lionfish dishes were scored by a host of judges including a New Yorker Magazine journalist and Chief Scientist for NOAA National

Marine Sanctuaries. A scoring system was used and Chef Al Massa took the highest marks with Brotula's Seafood House & Steamer creation. They presented a Lionfish Pan-Seared dish with Black Forbidden Rice, Melting Zucchini Ribbons, with a Chardonnay Shellfish butter.

The festivities also include Lionfish & Libations on May 20 at the Harbor Walk Village, where you can try samplings of various local brews paired with food provided by participating vendors and learn more about lionfish.

"Emerald Coast Open and the Lionfish Removal & Awareness Day Festival continues to grow and provide awareness of lionfish removal which lessens the threat to our native wildlife in Destin-Fort Walton Beach. Our community sponsors make it possible for us to host an event that is not only educational but an enjoyable experience for families to attend on the Destin Harbor," said Alex Fogg, Coastal Resource Manager, Destin-Fort Walton Beach.

Off the Hook: Cobia Season is Back

It's Cobia Season on the Emerald Coast, a short window of time each year where the cobia migration rolls through our waters and fishermen ride high in their towers trying to spot them. However, things are looking a bit different around here this

year, with very minimal cobia being spotted anywhere.

Boshamps held its annual Destin Flathead Classic Cobia Tournament April 20-23, with 31 boats participating, but very few fish overall – including only one being weighed in over the 45-lb. limit. That fish was caught by the boat Lucky Dog, and was worth \$108,000 in prizes. One weighed in at 44.8 lbs. with a few others between 25-35 lbs. The consensus from all the boats participating was that almost no cobia were spotted in our local area over that weekend.

The Boathouse Oyster Bar follows the Flathead Classic with its own tournament, the Ding-A-Ling Cobia Tournament, April 28-30. Fish will need to be 45 lbs. to qualify for that tournament as well. It's open to charter boats and private boats, with anglers hoping



to see a larger population of fish before that tournament in hopes of being able to weigh in a fish or two.

The Cobia fishery has slowed over the years, with the FWC now requiring them to be 36-inch fork length to be legal. Anglers can keep one per day or two per vessel, whichever is less.

If you've been on the docks, you've probably heard stories of the massive schools of fish our Emerald Coast used to see during the cobia migration, with the average fish size 30 lbs.-plus. So, what has happened? Some captains will say the water temps have pushed our migration farther up the East Coast so we are seeing less, while others will say that we have overfished the population. Which one is true? That's up to you.

The Ins and Outs of Headaches and Migraines

Most of us have experienced a headache and/or migraine; I have experienced both. There are several types of headaches, classified by the cause:

Primary – caused by chemical, nerve, and blood vessels or muscles around the head and neck. The skull aches with these types.

Cluster – Normally centered in or around one eye and side of head. They are very painful and

extreme sensitivity to light and sound. They can last for hours or days and can interfere with daily activities. An Aura migraine can happen before (acting as a precursor) or during and include visual disturbances such as flashes of light or blindspots, tingling in the extremities and difficulty speaking.

Migraines are usually attributed to genetic or environmental factors. The trigeminal nerve (complex nerve in the cranium) is involved which interacts with the brain stem. Triggers can be hormonal changes or medications (including birth control) stress, sleep changes, foods and drinks (dyes, preservatives, MSG, artificial sweeteners), skipping meals and sensory stimulation such as bright lights, strong smells, loud noises or weather changes. There is also evidence that chemical imbalances play a



occur in cyclical patterns or periods of time. This pattern can last weeks or months with remission following, which can last for months or years before returning. In some instances remission is permanent.

Sinus – Infections or irritations in the sinuses can trigger these and are centered above and below the eyes where the sinuses are located.

Tension – Mild to moderate pain. The pain can feel like a tight band around the forehead and can include the back of the neck. The scalp, neck and shoulders and be tender to the touch.

The last class is Migraines. They create a severe throbbing pain accompanied by a pulsing sensation on one side of the head. These headaches can also trigger nausea, vomiting and

Electrical and magnetic stimulation are approved treatments for migraines. The FDA has approved the Cefaly device (transcutaneous supraorbital neurostimulator) and the Spring TMS (single pulse transcranial magnetic stimulator). So how is the medication available? The two ways branded medication can be manufactured by other companies is if the medication's patent has expired OR if the medication is no longer available from the manufacturer. So as soon as the company ran out, the other companies jumped in and started production of the generic equivalent

semaglutide. It's possible this price break might end once the drug company gets production online but we just don't know.

Adjusting Life Input to Experience Healthier Output

A few months ago, I found my brain scattered, tired, and generally tense. When I slowed to reflect, I realized I was carrying stress outside my awareness. Juggling work, home, parenting, relationships, life transitions, emails, texts, news, professional research, social media, etc. was overwhelming my brain. These activities weren't unhealthy, but the output of my life was out of balance. I took a social media break and noticed quickly I felt better. That break has become a more permanent practice as I've remembered that what we put in, our life input, significantly impacts how we show up daily in life, our life output.

Do you ever find yourself trying to make an external change and it just isn't working? Maybe you're trying to reduce stress, increase joy, improve a relationship, or live less overwhelmed. You may keep trying to make adjustments to the output of your life without slowing down to consider how the input might need to be adjusted. In reality, true change happens from the inside out.

In our fast, achievement-foentertainment-hungry culture, it's easy to become desensitized to anxiety-inducing input available daily. You wake up to news, social media, political commentary. You are inundated with messaging about how you aren't enough, you need to be better, you need to have more. You are told who is right, who you should be against, what you should fear, what you should know, and how the world is going to hell in a handbasket. It's hard to be more patient, kind, and peaceful when the input screams to worry more, do more, and be angrier.

The great news is you have the power to evaluate and adjust your input to create life balance. You get to decide the quantity and sources of information. You get to choose the boundaries regarding your time, activities, and practices you engage to pursue more joy and peace. So, what does it look like to begin adjusting your input to experience a healthier output?

5 Ways to Practice
Adjusting Your Life Input
to Experience Healthier
Life Output

1. Slow down and notice where you are out of balance. Notice body tension, relationship tension, negative thoughts, unhealthy self-talk, road rage, impatience, irritability, sleep problems, anxiety, over/under eating, overspending, drug/alcohol use, feeling victimized by life.

2. Evaluate your input. Take a week to notice and note your input practices. Notice what you're looking at/listening to when you wake, drive, work, in your leisure time, before bed. Check the hour count on your phone use. Notice the hour count on social media, what you follow, and how it makes you feel. Notice the messaging/attitudes of input. Are they fear-based, critical, dehumanizing? Are they encouraging, solution-focused, inspiring?

3. Curate your input life feed. Give yourself radical permission to unfollow, quit the show, change the station, distance from relationships, reduce exposure to input that is not a fit with the world view you desire. You don't have to follow things that make you feel irrational fear, insecurity, and hopelessness. It's okay to unfollow positive things and friends if they are impacting you negatively. Try unfollowing negative inputs for 1-2 weeks and make notes about your feelings,

mindset, clarity of thought, state of overwhelm or calm. Keep in mind this can be challenging as your brain may be addicted to the dopamine hit you've been getting from some of the inputs. Push through the discomfort. It's worth it.

- **4. Create space.** In place of excessive input, try incorporating an activity or two that creates calm and mental space. Take a walk, look at something beautiful, listen to calming music, be quiet, engage a spiritual practice, garden, hike, go for a bike ride, whatever else works for creating space.
- 5. Implement long-term input changes. Use your col-

lected input data to decide which things you will let go of long-term and take action steps. Remove apps, unfollow, find a new station, put limits on your phone, etc. Find consistent time to include your space activities. Determine the balance that works and begin practicing. This doesn't need to be perfect. You can continue observing, learning, and making adjustments over time.

What Teens Want Us to Know: Part 3

In the next installation of What Teens Want Us to Know, our kids were asked, "How do you wish people took care of you on a bad day?"

It can be so easy to think our kids don't want us to be involved in helping them feel better, especially if we're used to being kept at a distance, and sometimes that's true. More than one teen did say, "I just want to be left alone."

Others, however, offered purpose in their time of wanting to be alone, and it often had to do with how busy their schedules are. One teen said it would be helpful just to have time to relax and take a break. When there's no time to slow down, it can compound problems if there isn't time to assess what changes can be made to alleviate stress. Are we allowing students to par-

ticipate in making their schedules? Do we allow them to do less when their mental health is in jeopardy?

When students feel depleted, they also "just need peace and quiet to recuperate." Many students shared that they wanted to talk but when they talked needed to be on their timeline, not ours.

"I don't ever want to talk about it right away. Sit with me, give me some ice cream, and put on a movie. I'll open up eventually. I've just got to process it all first."

Not everyone needs physical touch to be comforted but for some, a simple hug makes a greater impact than talking, especially when it's hard to articulate all the raw emotions clamoring for attention. "Just cuddle me and spend time with me." When parents recognize their teen is going through a tough



time and do something about it, that child knows there's relief in the hard day.

"Be there, hold me, and tell me it's going to be okay."

Of course, sometimes a bad day starts in the home and it's us they need relief from.

"Just please don't yell at me. If you handle the situation calmly and want to talk to me about it, I promise I'll openly communicate with you."

Unfortunately, a lot of kids are feeling isolated from the people they need comfort from the most and don't get the chance to process a hard situation. "I don't usually have people around me any day so I don't really care if nobody is around me on a bad day." Are there opportunities we can be more deliberate about

being present? Maybe a ride in the car, while you're getting ready to start or end the day, or at a coffee shop? We can get so caught up in our schedules that we forget to ask simple, but critical questions. Forgetting to do so can be perceived as indifference.

"I wish they cared and said something like, 'How are you feeling?"

Another agreed: "Check on me every once in a while and then listen."

A lot of kids know what they need on a bad day and it can get pretty specific!

"I just want to watch Friends with my mom and eat Publix sushi and cake."

"A day inside with tea will do the trick. If I'm physically unwell I may need more but it just depends."

"Make some food and let me be alone."

It can also be pretty general and open to lots of options.

"Distract me."

Some of the teens that were getting ready to leave home wanted to feel more equipped to handle hard situations themselves.

"I just want people to take a step back so I can process and not have to be so dependent on others."

One participant said, "Don't sugarcoat it." It's hard for any of us to see someone we love have to suffer through tough times but many situations have to be confronted realistically so these kids have the tools and experience to handle it while they still have the support of our authority, resources and presence.

What your individual teen needs is not always obvious, but the universal theme is they want to be seen in their struggles, known in their process and whatever the age, feel safe.

"Understand me when I have a bad day, comfort me, and support me."

"Just stand by me."

"Some days I just need to be by myself and other days I want to feel protected by being in close proximity to those I love."

Consider the book, The Five Love Languages of Teenagers by Gary Chapman to know how your teen might uniquely feel loved.

It's a difficult time being a teen, especially now, when hard days can come from so many different places: home life, academic demands, extracurricular activities, work, relationships, burgeoning feelings, and social media.

Don't miss those opportunities to offer relief and encouragement to keep going.

"Smile and tell me there's always tomorrow."

Buy mom a power strip and plug energy vampire electronics



Is Your Insurance Ready for Hurricane Season?

June 1st marks the beginning of hurricane season. Researchers at North Carolina State said the 2023 Atlantic hurricane season will see 11 to 15 named storms forming in the Atlantic basin. The basin includes the entire Atlantic Ocean, the Caribbean Sea and the Gulf of Mexico.

So, it is time to make sure you're ready for the next round of tropical depressions, storms and hurricanes that visit the Gulf Coast every year.

Do you have what you need when it comes to homeowner's and flood insurance and hurricanes? There are a few things that should be on your radar. If you have these coverages in place, you'll be better equipped to ride out whatever storm blows through.

First on the list is hurricane/ wind coverage. Most home pol-

icies (HO3, DP3, HO6, HO4) in Florida include either hurricane, named storm, or wind/ hail under a separate deductible. This is preferred since coordination and consistency of coverages is important. Some carriers don't write wind coverage close to the water. So, a stand-alone wind-only policy would be needed. If this is the case, extra care must be taken to avoid any coverage inconsistencies. In a previous article last year, we addressed the differences in hurricane, named storm, and wind/hail coverage. But suffice it to say, when it comes to wind coverage, the best option is hurricane. Under this coverage scenario, the larger deductible in the policy, usually a percentage of the Dwelling Limit, applies to declared hurricane activity, while the smaller deductible in the policy would apply to other



wind losses and all other perils in the policy. There are several deductible options available that can have a large impact on what would be your out-of-pocket responsibility if you file a claim.

Make sure you know you have sufficient Dwelling Limit (Coverage A) coverage to rebuild your home in the event of a loss. Local and national data indicates that nearly two out of three homes and structures are underinsured.

Another important coverage is Loss of Use that pays for you to live somewhere else while repairs are being done to your temporarily unlivable home. This goes for rental properties with Loss of Rents coverage as well. Remember, there needs to be direct physical damage to trigger this coverage. Some rental policies don't include Loss of Rents so you will want to read your policy or call your insurance agent so you know for sure.

Another often misunderstood coverage not offered with each carrier, but always recommended, is Law or Ordinance coverage. Most carriers, if they have it available, offer either 10%, 25% or 50% coverage. This percentage is tied to your Dwelling Limit. If you have extensive hurricane damage, like we saw with Hurricane Michael, there may be new building codes you must adhere to in order to rebuild. The additional Law or Ordinance coverage is crucial to your protection, since your policy is designed to rebuild your home as it was before the damage, with similar materials and quality, and not with more costly materials that could now be required by more stringent construction codes that may have come into play.

Another vital policy to have, especially during hurricane season, is flood insurance. Flood and water damage from a wind event are not necessarily the same thing. This coverage is so vital that we will again devote our next month's article to this topic. Although there are a few carriers who will add flood coverage as an endorsement to a home policy, it is infrequent. For most insureds, your flood policy will be a separate policy written through the NFIP (National Flood Insurance Program), and, unless your lender requires the policy, or you're closing on a new purchase, there is a standard 30day waiting period through the NFIP before your flood policy will become effective. Private flood insurance is an alternative. Many of the private markets in in the country, and especially in Florida, offer broader coverages than the NFIP and these should be considered as an alternative to maximize your protection.

We hope this helps ease your concerns this hurricane season, in terms of coverage.

believe, "Private funds pay for all of the custom-made costumes, the beads, cups and coins that are thrown in parades (16 throughout the year), as well as the locally-chartered landing boats," James said. "The Krewe of Bowlegs receives no direct funding from the City of Fort Walton Beach, the county or the TDD. And while the Krewe of Bowlegs itself is not a charitable organization, our tradition is to support the community and we make several public appearances throughout the year in support of educational and charitable causes." The Krewe of Bowlegs also works with the William Augustus Bowles Museum & Historical Foundation which helps underwrite fireworks, the treasure hunt and other expenses. The City of Fort Walton Beach also underwrites festival expenses and provides critical police, fire, EMS and other support.

The festival kicks off this year with a Pre-Invasion on Thursday evening, May 18th, just off Main St. downtown, where Captain Billy Bowlegs and his 'Krewe in Black' will arrive aboard

their pirate ship parade float, the Blackhawk, to greet area children, take photos and hand out treasure. The Skirmish will be held on Friday evening, May 19th, where Captain Billy and his Krewe will arrive by water at the Fort Walton Landing. The mayor of Fort Walton Beach and his forces are prepared and have threatened to arrest Captain Billy if he tries to land. The city of Fort Walton Beach will also host its Concert in the Park, and the evening will end with a Fireworks show over the sound. On Saturday afternoon, May 20th, Captain Billy will return with the entire Krewe of Bowlegs and his allies from visiting Krewes from across the country, after his defeat the night prior. The mayor will try everything to stop him from landing. Will he be a match for the overwhelming presence of Captain Billy's pirates? Will the Captain prevail in taking over our city?

Finally, on Monday night, May 22nd, the Torchlight Parade will start at 7 p.m. on Eglin Pkwy. from First St. to Hughes Ave. The parade will be anchored by Captain Billy and the entire Krewe of Bowlegs marching down the street to celebrate

I am an imaginary old man. I am every World War II veteran you never knew. I am each faceless GI from the bygone European War. Or any other war for that matter.

I am in my 90s and 100s now. Lots of young folks probably don't even know I exist.

In my war, I was one of the hundreds of thousands of infantrymen, airmen, sailors, marines, mess sergeants, seabees, brass hats, engineers, doctors, medics, buck privates and rear-echelon potato-peelers.

We hopped islands in the Pacific. We served in the African war theater. We beat the devil, then we came home and became the old fart next door.

Wartime was one heck of an era to be young. Let me tell ya. When we went overseas we were still teenagers, smooth skinned, scared spitless, with government haircuts, wearing brand new wedding rings. We hadn't seen action yet, so we were jittery and lots of us smoked through a week's rations of Luckies in one day.

Then it happened. It was different for everyone, but it happened. Shells landed everywhere. People screamed. And in a moment our fear melted away and we had war jobs to do. It didn't matter who we were or which posts were ours. Everyone worked in the grand assembly line of battle.

When the smoke cleared and the action was over, we had new confidence in ourselves and we were no longer boys.

And anyway, we weren't just boys, we were girls, too. There were 350,000 females serving in the U.S. Armed Forces in World War II. People forget that.

Speaking of women. We guys were always talking about our sweethearts, wives, and mothers. If you mentioned someone's girl a man was liable to talk for hours about her. And even if you'd al-

ready seen his wallet photos before, you never interrupted a guy talking about his gal. Because eventually you'd be talking about yours.

There were nights overseas when we would stare at the moon and wonder if our sweethearts were looking at the same moon. There were moments of indescribable loneliness.

Infantrymen had it the hardest. I don't know how our doughboys did it. They lived like pack mules. Their boots got wet, their feet swelled, and their flesh became waterlogged. Chunks of their heels would fall off; the dreaded "trench foot."

The funny thing is, even though their feet were falling off, these men still didn't want to leave their posts. Many had to be dragged away cussing. That's how committed these guys were.

Oh, and the food was god awful. You learned to appreciate the rarity of a creative company cook.

In Italy, sometimes we could buy eggs from local merchants for outrageously inflated prices. One time I knew a guy who ate 32 scrambled eggs in his tent one night. I asked him why he did this and he told me he didn't want to die without tasting eggs one last time.

A lot of guys brought banjos, guitars and fiddles over there. They'd play music at night sometimes in the open Italian air. We'd square dance and laugh. Others would sit on their helmets, smoking, thinking of home, wiping their eyes.

The Germans had a local radio station that broadcast American stuff like Bing and Frank. Then, between songs, a German gal talked propaganda over the airwaves to us American GIs in

a sexy voice, trying to mess with our heads.

She would speak flawless English and say, "Give up, boys, there's no point trying, you can't win. Everyone hates you. Your girls are at home cheating on you. They don't love you anymore. Give up. It's over. You lost."

This was supposed to discourage us, but it usually just made us laugh. Or cry. Sometimes both.

When the war ended, we felt too much joy at once. In fact, most weren't totally sure they could trust good news. A lot of guys got like that.

So when we heard the official papers had been signed and the war was over, it was Christmas morning multiplied times a hundred. No. Times a trillion.

Those of us overseas immediately wrote letters to family and told our wives we were coming home, told our kids to grease up their baseball gloves. Our letters were covered in little wet polka dots, if you get my drift.

Stateside, there were huge celebrations happening. Sailors climbed lampposts to unfurl flags. Infantrymen stood on rooftops, toasting mugs of homebrew. Mothers were frying chickens out the wazoo.

People were partying everywhere from San Bernardino to Flatbush. Big cities, little towns, and the rural parts between. There were ticker tape parades, auto processions and girls would kiss any guy in government clothes.

But on this important day, you know what I think about? I think about all the guys who never got kissed again. Our men in the soil.

They were those who evaporated like the early morning fog

than a three-day weekend of barbecues and Budweiser. These were men who fell up-

Normandy. They died young. And they died for a lot more

These were men who fell upholding the mantle of our unalienable American spirit, the Blessings of our liberty and the pride of their homeland. They were friends. They were the kids next door. They were children of God who once proved, beyond speculation, that even hellfire cannot kill the great idea that is America. I hope we never forget them. I know I never will.

A Pastor's Ponderings: Mothers—Servers or Lovers?

"As Jesus and his disciples were on their way, he came to a village where a woman named Martha opened her home to him. She had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet listening to what he said. But Martha was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made. She came to him and asked, 'Lord, don't you care my sister has left me to do the work by myself? Tell her to help me!"

"'Martha, Martha,' the Lord answered, 'you are worried and upset about many things, but only one thing is needed. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her." (Luke 10:38-42, NIV)

Mothers serve and provide the loving environment that empowers a life worth living. Thank God for the mothers who give themselves faithfully to their families, jobs, homes, and provide stability in a chaotic world.

But moms, when is it time to stop and focus on Christ? Jesus shows us the key to balancing love and service. Most moms swing between serving and nurturing. Jesus speaks to this common human contradiction.

Martha was doing all the work. Yet Mary gets the commendation. It seems so unfair until you look at it more closely. Martha had invited Jesus into her home and was bustling about making the preparations, but inside her head criticism brewed. "Why do I have to do all the work? Why doesn't lazy ol' Mary help around here? Doesn't anybody care about me? After all, I'm doing all the

Martha's critical self-talk prompted her to verbalize her accusation against the Lord. "Do you not care that my sister has left me to serve alone?" Can you imagine accusing Christ of not caring? She goes further by commanding the Lord of the Universe to tell her sister to help her. Do you smell the stink of her self-righteous indignation?

Jesus lovingly responds to her need and not to her critical spirit. He understands Martha's concerns, just as he knows the multitude of needs that press upon mothers. Christ seems to say, "Martha, something more important is happening right now. Mary sits at my feet because she loves me. Why don't you let go of the busy-work and spend time with me?"

There is nothing wrong with serving. We desperately need servant-hearted people in our lives. But the problem was in the ugly conversation going on in Martha's heart. Criticism gave birth to self-righteous indignation, manifesting in rebellion to the person she was trying to

honor with her service. People who work too much get tired, resentful, and critical. At some point, we must stop our labors and sit at Jesus' feet to worship. Make Christ your focus.

The motivation to serve drives many people. According to author Dr. Gary Chapman in The Five Love Languages, many people express their love for others by serving. A high percentage of Americans intuitively migrate directly to their task list. This quality is admirable but unable to produce a happy life. Martha is learning this vital principal.

Chapman's other four "love languages" are also insightful; physical contact, words of affirmation, quality time, and receiving gifts are all employed in Christ's interaction with Mary and Martha. Mary sat at Christ's feet as He gave her quality time. Jesus commended Mary and Martha with words of affirmation during the event. The sisters each gave Jesus a gift – Mary worshiped him, and Martha prepared food. Love

pervades this entire event. But Jesus shows us the supreme expression of love is time spent in worship.

The Westminster Shorter Catechism declares, "The chief end of man is to glorify God and enjoy him forever." No higher love exists than worship. God crafted us with His own hands for this purpose of loving, adoring, and worshipping. We find true fulfillment when we sit at Jesus' feet."

Ultimately, serving God is good, but worship is better. We must allow time, space, and focus for loving worship at the feet of Jesus.





1. "I don't watch the local news. You'll actually find out what is going on locally faster on FB. Also a lot of news never makes it on TV if it's bad for our tourism."

2. "WJHG (Panama City NBC affiliate) has a Firestick app. You can watch all their live newscasts, or recordings of older ones, it's my go-to! They definitely cover Destin, usually showing the harbor live cam during the weathercasts. Also my favorite lo-

cal news crew, so recommended."

3. "I don't waste time on any local network news channels living by the beach. Waaay too many other great things to do. I do however keep up with current happenings through great local fb pages and Newsmax for bigger things going on."

4. LocalNow covers decently.

I did find myself watching the Panama City station, WJHG, the most. They do seem to mention Destin some or, at least more than the other stations. It is not a full Destin-area news source though, by any means. I do agree that Local Now does a pretty good job of local news.

Our Facebook Destinites group is not a news platform,

but since we are a private group for residents/property owners, if something really important is coming up which will affect the community, one of our members will usually post about it for discussion.

Otherwise, **Destin Life** newspaper or any one of Life Media's other local, community newspapers, such as FWB Life and Bay Life, are a great source for community updates, events and a lot of information.

It is also a good idea to follow the Okaloosa county sheriff's Facebook page and the Destin Chamber Facebook page and website.

If locals want to know about local businesses, sales, special

events, services or discounts offered, they can find them in Destin Life. They can also find local business paid sponsors in our Destinites local resident's Facebook group, where they sometimes offer a special discount to Destinites group members. There are a few local magazines that offer advertising, as well and they can be found in stands around town.


