Team Wegner Embarks on Ultra Paddle **Event to Benefit Cystic Fibrosis**

This month, local anesthesiologist and paddleboard enthusiast Ryan Wegner heads to the Bahamas for a massive 80-mile, approximately 16hour paddle event benefiting Piper's Angels Foundation for Cystic Fibrosis. The Palm Beach Gardens-based nonprofit hosts its 10th annual Crossing for Cystic Fibrosis June 21-25.

Wegner, the father of twin Autistic 14-year-old boys, heard about the event from his cousin, who will join him for the Crossing. "I was aware of cystic fibrosis through my education and my involvement with kids with special needs," he says. "I feel like this is something I need to do. It's part of my nature to help other people."

Two hundred paddlers will participate this year. Wegner will be part of a relay team, paddling for three or four hours. He'll bring a 12-foot live watersports board, made by a Clearwater company and

graciously provided by the owners of Santa Rosa Beach's recently opened Gulf Wind Paddle & Surf store.

"I've only been using it for a month," says Wegner. "It's amazing." To prepare for the Crossing, he trains daily "whether it's in the gym or on the water." When we speak at Gulf Wind - "The Coolest Li'l Surf Shop on the Panhandle" – he tells me that each paddler must raise \$2,000 individually. He's been reaching out to locals - mostly through his job – and friends to meet or exceed his goal.

"Ryan came in and introduced himself, and we saw an opportunity for us to do some philanthropy," says Matt Duncan, who co-owns Gulf Wind with Tony Maganzini. "We're helping Ryan with the board and uniforms, and sponsoring his team." In turn, Wegner is raising awareness for the store and its top-of-the-line wares.

You probably know someone who's had a cancer diagnosis, or know someone who knows someone. It's hard to find anyone who hasn't been touched by cancer in some way. Our community is no different. People are affected every day.

Michele Bailey, founder of Bai-

ley Brigade, and her family were affected in a big way when her husband Scott passed away in December 2021 from a rare salivary gland cancer. He was only 54. While there are many organizations offering resources to more common specific types of cancer, we need to remember that there is a wide variety of debilitating cancers. Bailey Brigade was started to honor Scott and support locals battling all types of cancer. It's a non-profit organization that provides copay assistance, backpacks with self care items, and scholarships for those wanting to go into the medical field.

All money donated goes to

help patients from The Emerald Coast. "Your money stays local," stated Michele, who is working with oncologist Dr. Hayes at Ascension Sacred Heart. Part of the donations go towards helping patients with their copay. Qualifying patients are handed a card at checkout letting them know the Brigade covered their copay that day.

Backpacks provided to patients consist of self care items in themed zip lock bags such as "All Wiped Out" with cleaning and sanitizing wipes along with "Take It Easy Queasy" that comes with anti nausea items to help with the side affects of chemotherapy. The backpacks also come with letters of encouragement and support. Local students have supplied them with letters, but anyone wanting to offer letters of encouragement



can send them to Bailey Brigade. Inside the backpacks are cards with a QR code. The code will take the patients directly to a patient-only patience resource page where they can find assistance with services or discount services for them.

Another way to give back to the community for Bailey Brigade is through their scholarship program. Lukas Burgis was just announced as a scholarship winner. Lukas has also been affected by cancer in his family. He is studying medicine at Florida Atlantic University and holds a 4.6 GPA.

The community has been a huge support for Bailey Brigade. South Walton High Lacrosse and Basketball have both held fundraiser nights. The local Young Professional Networks through the Emerald Coast Association of Realtors held a costume party and silent auction with proceeds benefitting the Brigade. Owners of First Watch opened a new location in Tallahassee and donated all the proceeds from its soft opening weekend to Bailey Brigade. As Scott and Michele's oldest son is their Operations Manager, it was personal for them as well.

"We've been here for 30 years," stated Michele, referring to Walton County. "Our roots run so deep in the sand. We've

seen the community grow and change. The heart of the community has only gotten bigger."

If you are interested in making a donation, you can check out their website at www.baileybrigade.com. Monthly subscriptions are encouraged, but one-time donations are always appreciated. It takes approximately \$50 to fill one backpack for a patient. They are always looking for corporate sponsors as well. Businesses can get their name on backpacks they sponsor, links on the patient resource page, or even a scholarship given in their company name.

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Wegner is the only Crossing participant from the area, but he'll be cheered on by Panama City Beach resident Jessica Shuflitowski, the mother of a 5-year-old boy with CF, Stone. Shuflitowski, Stone, and husband Gary Coram will trailer their boat down to South Florida for the event. For the first time in his life, Stone will meet other children with CF – from a distance of at least six feet, due to medical rules.

Stone's mom says treatment for CF patients is nonexistent in the immediate area. She and her son make the trek to Pensacola for treatments – blood work, breathing tests, etc. – every three months "unless something else comes up," she says. She is grateful to Piper's Angels for offering incentives to CF patients. "They offer grants for saltwater equipment. I can get Stone a paddleboard or surfboard, and they'll pay for lessons. He'll be

interested in trying anything."

According to the Piper's Angels Foundation website, Cystic Fibrosis is a chronic disease that affects the lungs and digestive systems of about 30,000 children and adults in the United States. A defective gene and its protein product cause the body to produce unusually thick and sticky mucus that clogs the lungs and leads to life-threatening lung infections. The mucus also obstructs the pancreas and stops natural enzymes from helping the body break down and absorb food.

"It's a progressive disease," says Shuflitowski. "And it's a very invisible illness. My son looks completely normal, but at the turn of a hat, he can be hospitalized for a month."

She adds that there is zero federal funding for CF, and that any grants come from foundations and sponsorships. "A lot of CF patients are living longer now, and more adults are living with it than ever before." This is largely due to the drug Trikafta,



which was approved by the Food and Drug Administration in 2019.

But, "it's one of those things where you can either afford it or not. My son will be eligible to take it when he's 6." Currently, the cost of Trikafta for a single patient runs about \$80,000 a month.

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Prepare Now for Hurricane Season

Hurricane Season started June 1. Not quite five years removed from the devastating impact of Hurricane Michael, our area does not need to be reminded about the importance of being prepared. But, with information available from various sources, it can be hard to discern the best steps to take.

Based on decades of field and lab research, the Insurance Institute for Business & Home Safety (IBHS) has released its 2023 Hurricane Ready guide featuring preparedness tips to help home and business owners strengthen their properties against storms. IBHS research shows resilient construction and re-roofing can significantly reduce the risk of storm damage. The nonprofit research organization has also identified some low-cost DIY projects that can help any building better withstand high winds and heavy

"One of the things we note when investigating storms is that homeowners can do things to reduce the likelihood and severity of storm damage," said Dr. Ian Giammanco, lead research meteorologist at IBHS. "Even with Hurricane Ian, which caused extreme damage due to storm surge, we saw limited wind damage in homes built after 2002 when the Florida Building Code was first adopted. Amid the overall destruction, this positive result helps show that we are

not powerless against Mother Nature."

First Line of Defense: The Roof

IBHS analysis shows that as much as 90% of all disaster-related insurance claims include damage to the roof, and that oftentimes relatively minor roof damage leads to extensive interior repairs. One way to reduce the risk posed by high winds is to identify existing damage or wear on your roof. Most roofing contractors will provide an inspection, sometimes at no cost, and then make necessary repairs. If it is time for roof replacement due to age or existing damage, reroof to the FORTIFIED standard. Based on decades of the nonprofit's research, FORTIFIED is a voluntary construction and reroofing method requiring third-party verification of the key elements that strengthen roofs against severe weather. Lab studies and real-world events show FOR-TIFIED prevents damage from high winds up to 130 mph.

Wind-Rated Garage Doors

Garage doors represent another common source of "cascading damage" during hurricanes or other severe weather events. When the largest opening in most buildings fails, pressure can build inside the garage and push up on the roof and out against surrounding walls. This can lead to major structural damage and even

collapse. In this area, property owners should have wind-resistant garage doors with a rating of at least 130 mph. If a garage door is not labeled as wind resistant, it should be replaced or at least reinforced to provide needed protection.

Cost-Effective Repairs

While a stronger roof and garage door will significantly help to reduce the risk of storm damage, other more budget-friendly steps can be taken, as well. Hurricane Ready suggests sealing gaps and cracks to keep wind-driven rain from intruding into a home or business. Other actions like securing soffits and trimming trees can also help to limit damage caused by wind.

Know Your Codes

Modern and enforced build-

ing codes are critical to reducing the damage and destruction caused by hurricanes each year. Florida ranks atop IBHS's Rating the States which examines building codes in 18 Gulf Coast and Atlantic states and grades them based on adoption, enforcement, and contractor licensing.

While Florida's building codes have been among the nation's strongest for the past 20 years, they have improved over time. Therefore, a home built "to-code" in 2005 does not have the same level of protection as a home built in 2023. One key example is the sealed roof deck, which only became part of Florida's statewide code last year. Homes built or reroofed prior to that are missing this important level of protection that IBHS studies show can stop escalating damage which often leads to ex-



pensive repairs and homeowner displacement.

"If your home wasn't built or re-roofed to the newest code, you can make it stronger," Giammanco added. "If your budget doesn't allow bigger ticket items like a new roof or garage door, something as simple as trimming trees could help to make your home better protected. The most important thing is to take the first step."

TY: On May 18, we had a meeting at City Hall with almost 30 other people who have various interests in the beaches – local beach vendors, Destin lifeguards, code enforcement, county workers and the trash/raking crew. While healthy debate occurred on many topics, the one thing we all agreed on was the importance of support-

ing the sea turtles. Nesting season is May 1st through October 31st, and our favorite "Turtle Girl" Jessica Valek shared that the turtle surveying takes place each day on the beaches 30 minutes before sunrise. The Gulf has four different species of sea turtles: Loggerhead sea turtle (most common), Green sea turtle, Kemp's Ridley sea turtle, and the Leatherback sea turtle. Jessica taught me that the incubation period (when the eggs are in the ground) determines if the turtles become male or female. Warmer temperatures produce more females and cooler temperatures produce more males, and sea turtles can lay over 100 eggs per nest and nest multiple times in the season! We definitely want to do our part to support

BW: Definitely. The biggest issue that locals and I come across that affects our turtles are HOLES on the beach. We must do everything we can to educate our guests and newer locals about the importance of filling in their holes and flattening their sand castles. Local

sand sculpture artist "Dan in the Sand" spends hours every day building one-of-a-kind sand castles and at the end of the day he even flattens his creations. His recommendation is to take a photo and keep the beautiful memory, but don't leave a trace! The other problem is light pollution on the beach at night. So please turn off all lights or use red lights. Turtles cannot see red so whether it be a red porch light or red flashlights while walking the beaches, this is critical to keep the baby sea turtles from becoming disoriented and not making it to the gulf. Do we have any red lights left for those wanting them?

TY: I have at least 100 sea turtle-friendly flashlights left to give out to residents or tourists who want to put them to good use, and I'll order as many more as we need. Just this week, I fulfilled requests from visitors from Oklahoma and Indiana wanting the lights.

BW: We should also remind people that if they come across an injured or trapped sea turtle, to call the Gulfarium C.A.R.E.

Center at 850-243-9046 or the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's Wildlife Control at 1-888-404-3922. People should also know that beach raking immediately follows the turtle surveying and happens every other day so it's helpful to give space to these workers.

TY: And all this happens early in the morning, with the status of our beach flag warning system determined and displayed around 8 a.m., so we need to make room for the turtle surveying, the raking, the trash collections and the emergency lanes.

BW: Yes, we have got keep the fire lanes OPEN. At the meeting, another idea that came up was having the lifeguards fly the flags on ATVs while they patrol the beach.

TY: Also, the City of Destin Code Compliance said they'd follow suit and do the same.


BW: That's the biggest thing. We all want great, safe beaches, so finding ways to collaborate for safety and also finding this line in the sand of pub-

lic and private is important. We also talked about having vendor beach chairs 25 feet from the high crest of the water line, with traverse areas to be open. But we know we need a lot more discussion on this. The new, blue trash cans are another good partnership with the County. There are more trash cans out on the public beaches to make it more convenient for people to dispose of their belongings. The cans also have the flag systems on there for another smart visual of that program.

TY: I also remember them saying to never put seaweed in the trash cans. I could imagine some people doing that in an attempt to be helpful. Maybe we'll be helpful by passing along the message. Glad to support all the County and City workers, and our friends at the Destin-Fort Walton Beach Coastal Resource Team who work hard to protect our local sea turtles through innovative conservation efforts.

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Trees On the Coast Educates Destin Elementary Students On The Importance of Conservation

Destin-based 501 C3, Trees On The Coast, recently helped 200 graduating fourth graders at Destin Elementary plant 15 Live Oaks, while Destin Mayor and Trees On The Coast CEO Bobby Wagner, along with TOC board members Rebekah Manley and Will Estell, gave the students a lesson on the benefits of practicing conservation and what trees mean to humans and our environment.

In the program, which took place May 19, TOC board



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Destin Charity Wine Auction Raises \$3.5 Million for Children in Need

The Destin Charity Wine Auction Foundation (DCWAF) announced that the 18th Annual Destin Charity Wine Auction presented by the Jumonville Family raised \$3.5 million for children in need in Northwest Florida.

Held April 28 and 29 to a sold-out crowd of more than 600, proceeds benefit DCWAF's 16 partner children's charities in Northwest Florida.

"When we come together with a common goal, we become a force multiplier for the children of our community," DCWAF President Karah Fridley-Young said. "I am blown



away by the results of this weekend's auction and am once again humbled by the generosity of our friends in the wine and culinary industry as well as our board of directors, sponsors, and patrons that raised their paddles high and often for those who need us most."

The auction weekend began Friday, April 28, with 11 patron dinners in private homes and restaurants spanning from Gulf Breeze to Rosemary Beach, which collectively raised more than \$560,000. The live auction kicked off on Saturday, April 29, with DCWAF's flagship Magnum Force lot featuring 50 magnums from vintners past and present that raised \$70,000. This year's auction also boasted two lots that sold for more than \$100,000. A five-night trip with



private air passage donated by NetJets sold for \$105,000

Other notable lots included a trip to Paso Robles, which sold three times for a total of \$90,000, an immersive trip to Umbria, which sold four times for a total of \$100,000, and a trip to Portugal, which sold twice for a total of \$90,000. This year's Paddle Raise also raised over \$250,000.

The funds will be distributed to 16 local non-profit organiza-

tions for specific projects and programs that benefit children. DCWAF's charity partners for 2023 are AMIkids Emerald Coast, Ascension Sacred Heart Emerald Coast, Boys and Girls Clubs of the Emerald Coast, Children in Crisis, Children's Vol-

Insights for Investors: Should You Invest in AI?

Innovations and industrial revolutions might bring a lot of opportunity for the economy and the people of the world. Today, investors can't go a day without hearing the latest news on artificial intelligence, or AI. Many might be wondering if they need to incorporate this into their investment plans. We think investors should always consider innovation, invention and productivity, among other things when considering investing for their future. We feel that stocks (along with the risk) provide investors with the greatest opportunity to grow and compound their assets. So, what should investors be thinking about when it comes to AI?

What is AI?

Artificial intelligence, per Microsoft Bing is "the theory and development of computer systems able to perform tasks that normally require human intelligence, such as visual perception, speech recognition, decision-making, and translation between languages."

Who is developing it? While certainly not limited, investors would recognize such firms as Microsoft, Google, IBM, Apple and Google, among others. There is even a firm called OpenAI which has developed an online program called ChatGPT. What do people find when they go there? That tool can answer questions, provide information and generative AI can create songs, contracts, lesson plans, and a host of other things. There are producers of chips that can help make AI work, firms like Nvidia and Advanced Micro Devices as other exam-

AI has been put to the test with college and graduate entrance exams as well as the exam to become licensed and registered in the financial securities industry. The results have reportedly been mixed on those attempts.

Will the innovation of AI bring about another industrial revolution? Should investors be prepared for that?

The Economist magazine, in its May 13 issue, addressed that. It pointed out that while past industrial revolutions brought about change two things also occurred: 1) It took much longer than originally thought (decades for example) and 2) while it boosted productivity, in some cases it was only marginal. One example was the advent of the locomotives to power the movement of freight. It was pointed out that the nation's productivity could have done just as well with the current methods and with additional waterways or canals for the mass movement of goods and services. In other words, the boost in productivity proved to be marginal. Also take note that while many jobs go away, many more jobs are created. The World Economic Forum predicts that 97 million jobs could be created while 85 million might go away. Goldman Sachs reported that generative AI could raise global GDP by 7 percent, a very significant effect for any single technology. Many of today's technology jobs didn't even exist just one or two generations ago. And some jobs may take decades to go away. The Economist takes note that telephone operators continued to grow in number even after the advent of advanced phone technology.

Manufacturing, too, may be transformed by AI. The manufacturing sector is facing many challenges, including sustainability, a shortage of skilled workers, and geopolitical instability. The World Economic Forum notes that AI can help by improving productivity and efficiency, while increasing flexibility and augmenting the workforce. Yet today, only about 9 percent of manufacturing organizations are leveraging AI today. What are the implications for workers, revenues, and the bottom line of profits? Technological advances also bring about an acceleration in output, think gross domestic product or GDP. Many risky jobs might be



able to be done with machine vs man. Lawyers, medical professionals, and accountants - cognitive workers - might see some of their work done by AI. Unlike most advances in automation in the past, AI is a machine of the mind affecting that work. A recent research paper found that the Large Language Models like ChatGPT (LLMs) could affect 80 percent of the U.S. workforce in some form. Less complex work – e.g., case prep, procedures, tax returns - will lower cost for clients and legal cases. Implications for training: Medical procedures can become more precise and hence more effective. That could mean getting more done and becoming more organized, efficient, and profitable. That could boost industries across the entire stock

There are 11 sectors of the market: Consumer staples, consumer discretionary, financials, health care, energy, real estate, materials, industrials, utilities, communication services, and, of course, technology. We can't think of an industry, sector, business or person that would not benefit from the advancement of AI. So, in conclusion, we encourage investors to think about the opportunities across the economy, not just the makers and distributors of AI. We think, over time, companies will see job creation (acknowledging that many will go away), new products and services, greater revenues and, if managed well, greater profits. We think that the world will continue to see affluence build and problems solved and standards of living enhanced. While today's problems seem plentiful, the quality of life (mortality, health, wealth) has continued to grow. For children born today, there is an incredible opportunity that awaits them. Whether still in the workforce, or retired, the quality of life can only continue to grow.

In the end, attaining any goal means building a plan and investing according to that plan and trying to lower personal biases as well as the noise from the media. Someone was heard to comment on Bloomberg TV this past week that if you listen to all the talk about the markets all day, you will believe that the world is coming to an end by sundown. Expect that investing at times like these can be more volatile due to debt ceiling, banking, international and economic issues.

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Honoring the Fallen: The 54th Annual EOD Memorial

Sunday morning, while preparing my sermon, I received a call from Lt. Kearns about a death in Niceville that required my attention as a police chaplain. A retired EOD (Explosive Ordinance Disposal) technician had passed away in his home. After arriving, I comforted the grieving widow and met another retired EOD officer and his wife. He invited me to attend the 54th annual EOD Memorial Ceremony taking place that Saturday.

The EOD community is tight-knit, and the Kauffman EOD Training Complex memorial service was both humbling and emotional. Assembled military personnel, civilians, and Gold Star Families were present, along with distinguished guests like Congressman Matt Gaetz

and Congressman Brian Mast. Capt. Beall, USN, welcomed everyone and expressed gratitude to the Gold Star Families, emphasizing the EOD community's commitment to remembering their fallen heroes.

The memorial walls bear the names of 343 EOD men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice in service of their country. This year, the 344th name was added: Lt. JG Aaron Paul Fowler. Gen. Poole described him as "a man of faith who lived it out and exemplified it every day of his life."

The most moving part of the ceremony was the reading of the 344 names, starting with the Army, followed by the Navy, Marines and Air Force. The atmosphere was solemn as the crowd listened to each name be-



ing read, honoring the memory of those who served, and sacrificed their lives.

I flew to Washington two days later to meet with 20 Congressmen and women, including Congressmen Gaetz and Mast. In addition to other subjects, I wanted to get their impression of the memorial and ceremony. As I stood with Congressman Mast, I asked him about his perception of the memorial and ceremony. The Congressman is a member of the EOD community who lost both legs while serving in Afghanistan.

Congressman Mast stated, "I knew many of the names personally, along with others not mentioned with life-altering injuries. The memorial is a testament to the fact that the job is inherently dangerous and often deadly." It was a surreal experience standing with him in his office, knowing that his name was not on that wall but that he, too, paid dearly for his sacrificial service to our country.

EOD graduation ceremonies traditionally take place at the memorial, a solemn reminder of the sacrifices made. Brig. Gen. Poole addressed the gathering, emphasizing the importance of honoring the fallen. A wreath-laying, three-volley salute, and playing of taps were a moving tribute to those who gave their lives.

Supported by the EOD Warrior Foundation, the ceremony reinforced the bravery and dedication of these heroes. As I left, the profound impact of the event stayed with me. The 54th EOD Memorial Ceremony was a stark reminder of the selfless service and ultimate sacrifice of these brave individuals.

An indoor ceremony will take place inside the Destin-Fort Walton Beach Convention Center followed by a wreath-laying ceremony at the base of the Margaret Corbin statue at Women Veterans Monuments at Veterans' Park. Women Veterans Day was recognized by the State of Florida by proclamation from Gov. Ron DeSantis in 2021.

"Florida has the second largest population of women veterans in the country. With our military presence in Okaloosa County, it is only fitting that we take a moment to recognize the courageous contributions wom-

en have made to this nation," said Okaloosa County Commissioner Carolyn Ketchel. "We are so fortunate to have a one-of-kind park that honors women veterans like Margaret Corbin, who bravely took up arms to protect our freedom in the Revolutionary War."

woman who served as a soldier in the U.S. Army and the only known female to serve with the famed Buffalo Soldiers in the Civil War. Despite the ban allowing women to serve in the war, she nobly posed as a man to enlist.

A Northwest Florida veteran, Jackie Cochran, is also among the eight recognized at the park. Cochran was a pilot from De-Funiak Springs who held more speed, distance, and altitude records than any other flyer during her career. In 1964 she flew an aircraft faster than any woman had before. In 1953, eager to make the transition to jet

aircraft, Cochran became the first woman to break the sound barrier, piloting an F-86.

In honor of Cochran, Northwest Florida State College is holding a production of "Flight of Jackie Cochran," at the Mattie Kelly Arts Center's Sprint Theater on June 4, at 2 p.m. The cost is \$30 and proceeds will benefit the Okaloosa County Women's Veterans Monuments. 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Heroes Among Us: Courage and Resilience

Ted Corcoran and the Fort Walton Beach Chamber hosted the American Veterans Center (AVC) from Washington D.C. (www.americanveteranscenter. org). They interviewed numerous local veterans who have bravely served their country. I was honored to be invited by Ted to share in this incredible experience and interact with the seven men telling their stories.

Col. George Ferkes served in the Air Force during Operation Eagle Claw, the mission to rescue American hostages in Iran in 1980. The operation faced numerous challenges, including harsh weather conditions, malfunctioning equipment and complex logistics. Ultimately, the mission was unsuccessful, resulting in the tragic loss of eight American servicemen. Ferkes shared his experiences and lessons from the operation, empha-

sizing the importance of preparation, teamwork, and resilience.

Retired Cols. Ron Webb, David Gray, Howard Hill and Ed Hubbard were Air Force Vietnam War veteran POWs. Each of them recounted their time in captivity: the brutality, and how they and their fellow POWs supported one another throughout the ordeal. Their powerful stories evoke a sense of awe as they emphasized the importance of camaraderie, perseverance, and the indomitable human spirit in overcoming extreme adversity.

During the interview breaks, I had the opportunity to sit across the table from the POWs as they recalled their experiences. This unforgettable event left a lasting impression on me. I was present for Ron Webb's television interview, where he discussed the midair collision of two F-4s, resulting in his subsequent capture. Two of the pilots in the collision

died. After the crash, he managed to avoid immediate capture but was eventually taken by enemy forces.

Communities in the area were rewarded for turning in soldiers, which contributed to his eventual capture. During his first interrogation, Webb was told, "You and your President L. Johnson are now prisoners of war." Ron thought this was a shrewd comment because the Vietnam War haunted Johnson throughout his presidency.

I never tire of hearing the POW stories, including the Tap Code used to communicate in secret. The military trains servicemen to provide only the basic four pieces of information as required by the Geneva Convention: name, rank, service number, and date of birth. The captors wanted much more.

The POWs were kept alive with the intention of reforming, proselytizing and ultimately turning them against their own country. Webb said there was no chance of this because every service member considered communism and socialism revolting. The captors also demanded tactical intelligence from their prisoners.

Webb's captors wanted to know how he got shot down, which turned into a cat-and-mouse game. He initially told them it was a large gun, but they checked and found no large guns in the area. He then claimed it was a Russian MiG jet, but they checked with their air force and discovered that no MiGs had been in the area.

The next day, Ron Webb and I were together at the Crispy Warriors breakfast, and I jokingly suggested that he could have

simply said, "I was in the backseat, and I couldn't see a thing." We laughed at the thought as he said, "I never thought of that."

Col. Larry Ropka was interviewed next as he retold the Son Tay Raid, the rescue attempt of Vietnam POWs. Although the mission was ultimately unsuccessful, Ropka's story underscores the dedication of those involved in attempting to bring home their fellow servicemen. His account highlighted the desire and dedication to free fellow servicemen held prisoner by the North Vietnamese.

CMSgts. Bill Walter and Bernie Oder were interviewed. Both served in the U.S. military during the 1989 invasion of Panama, known as Operation Just Cause. Walters and Oder shared their experiences during the mission, challenges and lessons learned from the operation. Their stories

provide insights into the complexities of modern warfare and the importance of adaptability and cooperation.

By sharing these stories, the AVC hopes to honor the sacrifices made by these veterans and educate future generations about their contributions to American history. The personal narratives of these brave individuals serve as a poignant reminder of the resilience of the human spirit and the importance of perseverance, hope, and unity in the face of hardship. A heartfelt salute to Ted and the Chamber for organizing yet another remarkable event to celebrate our military heroes. The interviews will be posted on www.americanveteranscenter.org.







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

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




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Destin-Fort Walton Beach Sets New Records at World's Largest Lionfish Tourney

Divers participating in the 5th Annual Emerald Coast Open Lionfish Tournament set a new record with the successful removal of 24,699 lionfish! Last year's total was 13,835. Divers from throughout the country competed for prize money totaling more than \$100,000 in an effort to eradicate this invasive species in the Gulf of Mexico. Lionfish have few known predators due to their venomous spines.

"Okaloosa County continues to be a leader in helping to create sustainable marine ecosystems," said Okaloosa County Board Chairman Trey Goodwin. "We are thankful for all of the divers and sponsors who helped make this event so successful."

The Emerald Coast Open,

hosted by Destin-Fort Walton Beach Tourism and Florida Fish and Wildlife was held May 19-20 with an award ceremony at AJ's Seafood and Oyster Bar on May 21. The tournament had 144 divers participate, competing in a variety of categories. The largest lionfish was caught by a diver from the team Dibs on Bottom and measured 17.95 inches while the diving team Deep Water Mafia caught the most lionfish at 2,898. In addition to the main tournament over the weekend, the event also set a pre-tournament record of 5,139 lionfish caught.

The tournament coincided with the 5th Annual Lionfish Removal & Awareness Festival along the HarborWalk Village in Destin. The festival included Lionfish & Libations, an event where the public tried sam-



plings of various local brews paired with food provided by participating vendors. Various educational booths were also set up for a crowd of about 5,000 to learn about the species.

Leading up to the tournament, Emerald Coast Open

Restaurant Week offered the public unique lionfish dishes prepared by chefs at local restaurants that both satisfied their customers while also informing them of this beautiful, yet invasive species. Judges selected La Paz as this year's winner who

served Filete de Lionfish Empapelado. Ingredients included lionfish, epazote, calabacitas, carrot, potato, and peppers.

"Every year this event gets bigger and bigger and wouldn't be possible without the community's support," said Alex Fogg, Coastal Resource Manager with Destin-Fort Walton Beach Tourism. "We know that lionfish removal events have significant positive impacts on the local ecosystem. Hosting the Emerald Coast Open in Destin – Fort Walton Beach at the beginning of the season really does help our local fishery that is so important to our destination."

If you're fishing from shore, you may have noticed some grass out on the beaches. It is most definitely fishable, and it has likely helped the ecosystem as well. The pompano

are plentiful and reds are still being caught from the shore. We've also seen whiting and a few Spanish mackerel hanging around, too. Looking to catch them? Try small pieces of Fish Bites or FishGum on a pompano rig. Weight size varies depending on the swell, but a typical go-to is a 3-ounce weight.

If you're fishing in the Bay, Spanish have been found the last couple of weeks. We prefer small g-Eye jigs or a gold spoon, but they are not as plentiful as they once were. You can also catch the occasional trout or redfish as they dock hop, if you know where to look. They may not be trophy fish, but they are fun to catch. Live shrimp on a popping cork or Carolina rig is typically the ticket, but that is not to say you cannot catch some good reds on fiddler crabs or even top water lures near the docks.

FISHING REPORT


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Fishing from the pier means you have a chance to catch a variety of species. Cobia fishing hasn't been what it used to be, but we have seen a few caught this year; some on jigs, some on live bait. There have also been jack crevalle and Spanish Mackerel caught in the meantime, also on jigs. We've also seen a few mahi sneaking up close and plenty of hardtail along with a few pompano.

Trying to fill a cooler? Mingo on a two-hook rig bottom fishing have been plentiful. You can find trigger as well, but for them to be legal size has proven to be a bit more of a challenge unless you are out past 125-plus feet. Amberjack are also plentiful, and red snapper are definitely out there and just waiting for their season! Announced this month, there will be 70 days to harvest red snapper, beginning June 16. The season will include every day June 16-July 31, and three-day weekends during October and November. There will be a two per person limit at 16 inches.

Head offshore and you may see some awesome bluefin tuna caught in the last few days as well as wahoo and even swordfish. Grouper have been showing up in great numbers, which definitely makes our taste buds happy!

The temperatures are heating up and so is the fishing. We'd love to know what you're seeing out there! In the meantime, here's to warmer, more consistent weather patterns and tight lines.

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Learning About Asthma

Even if you don't have asthma, having knowledge about it can help someone you know or who you may run into some day.

Did you know that asthma is a disorder of the bronchial airways with no known cure? The airways react to certain types of stimulus by swelling and narrowing along with producing excessive mucus. It is the most chronic disease among children and some of these children experienced improvements as they aged. The highest percentage of deaths occur in adults over 65 years of age. Severe attacks, if left untreated, can also cause death.

There are four classifications for asthma:

- Mild Intermittent (1-2 days/wk)
- Mild Persistent (+2 days a week)
- Moderate Persistent (daily+night)
- Severe Persistent (throughout the day and frequent nights)

Risk factors for developing asthma can be genetics (parent or sibling), allergies or an allergic condition — especially hay fever (allergic rhinitis) — being overweight, smoking or being around second-hand smoke, high levels of air pollution, household chemical irritants, molds or dust mites and occupational chemicals (farming, hairdressers, mfg.).

Triggers:

• Exercise, especially in cold air

- Emotional stress
- Air pollution
- Cigarette smoke
- Seasonal allergies, pollen
- Pet dander
- Exposure to airborne chemcals
- Viruses such as cold and flu
- Sensitivities to food preservatives such as sulfites
 - Acid reflux (GERD)
- Medications such as beta-blockers, non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (aspirin, ibuprofen, naproxen)

There are several treatments that help in controlling or minimizing the attacks through medications and/or high quality nutritional supplements. Supplements should not be removed from their choices as they can improve the quality of the person's life.

Medications:

- Inhaled Corticosteroids

 The inhaled options have a
 much lower risk of side effects
 and are generally safe for long
 time usage vs oral options. Examples: Flonase, Flovent HFA,
 Pulmicort Flexhaler, Rhinocort,
 etc. Leukotriene Modifiers

 These are uncommon and control attacks for about 24 hours.
 Side effects include depression,
 aggression, agitation, anxiety,
 hallucinations and suicide. Examples: Singulair, Accolade,
 Zyflo.
- Long Lasting Beta Agonists

 These can increase the risk
 of a severe attack which is why
 they are used in combination
 with inhaled corticosteroids. Examples: Serevent, Fordil, Perforomist
- Combination Inhalers Mentioned above, examples include Advair Diskus, Symbicort, Dulera.

Nutritional supplements:

- Magnesium and Vitamin D deficiencies are associated with increased incidence in asthma attacks as well as an increase in the severity of attack.
- Omega 3 (DHA & EPA) are associated with reduced inci-

dences (frequency and severity) of attacks. It exerts specific anti-inflammatory effects, including a reduction of eosinophils, specific white blood cells seen in allergies and asthma.

• Antioxidants, besides A, C, & E, such as grape seed extract, resveratrol, curcumin, quercetin, green tea extract and

many others are all associated with improved lung function in human and animal testing. Example: Gamma tocopherol is a sub-type of vitamin E. It has been shown to reduce the inflammatory response and help maintain asthma remission.



Have you ever gone through a day only to realize you interacted with people and don't remember it? Perhaps you were glazed over as you went through the grocery store checkout or you nodded and talked to your kids while looking at your phone not really paying attention. - 2. Ask meaningful questions and listen carefully to the answers. 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Work, Don't Jerk: A Smooth and Efficient Workout

Your "form," the

way you perform each exercise, is very important if you want to stay safe, injury free and improve. Everyone wants to progress in their efforts to be more healthy and fit. That's the whole point, isn't it? Exercise is a challenge, stress and test we put our bodies through, so that our bodies build back stronger, become more agile and run cleaner. Moving with precise technique, not rigid or too loose, will keep you from injury, but also from wasting precious time. The definition of good form changes based on the particular exercise in question, as well as the particular person performing the exercise. What I mean is, good form can look different depending on the individual and the situation; it's dependent upon the individual's needs and limitations. According to GMB Fitness Co., there are two important characteristics of good form that run through all types of movement:

It must minimize the chances of injury for the individual practicing the movement.

It must employ efficient body mechanics, to maximize the available strength and energy of the movement.

Following, I will aim to hit a few indicators of good form for you.

As in our heading, "Work, Don't Jerk," notice your speed, range of motion and control. Proper technique is a combo of body stability and mobility. If you are too loose, your form will fall

apart. If your movement is too rigid, your work will be unnecessarily restricted. Through good control of your momentum, you should have the ability to pause at any point within the performance of the movement. Moving with intention of control funnels the stresses to the appropriate muscles rather than inappropriately hitting an area prone to injury. Slow down. Think of your movements as rhythm and count two to four seconds for both parts of the movement (positive and negative). Hit your range of motion (ROM). ROM is the totality of movement a joint is capable of doing. ROM changes based on our limitations. However, it's important to work through our entire ROM when we can while also being cautious at the beginning and ending of our ROM.

Step back a bit. If the weight you are using keeps you from performing good form, then change to a lighter weight and progressively move up as you get stronger (you get stronger when you are consistent with your routine). Good form does not mean perfection. Everyone is a little different-I can't emphasize this enough. A trained eye can help evaluate your form and help you tweak your movements to fit your specific needs and or limitations. Performing with good technique is important. Keep your focus during your workout.

Have fun, but control your

moves. If you are ever unsure about your form, use a mirror. Bad form just looks bad and you will probably be able to notice for yourself. For instance, when performing arm work, both biceps and triceps, keep your elbows close to you. When doing squats, keep your knees and feet aligned with each other and sit back as far as you can, balancing on your heals. In almost all situations, keep your back straight, shoulders back and down (depressed away from ears) and abs pulled in tight, all to protect the spine.

Just pay attention and do each move with purpose and control. Your body will thank you for it!

UV forecasts include many factors. So, don't assume cloud cover or lower temperatures mean low UV. Anyone who has gotten a sunburn on a cloudy day understands. Checking UV is particularly important if you plan to spend several hours outside and even more so at the beach where UV radiation can be increased by reflecting off our white sands and water.

Wear reef safe sunscreen. The best way to protect yourself from UV radiation is by staying in the shade or wearing protective clothing. Another way is slather on reef safe sunscreen.

I had a dream about him last night. It has been nearly three decades since he died, but there he was. Alive. We met in some kind of diner. A breakfast joint. Maybe this was heaven?

He was running late, I was already sitting in a booth, sipping coffee. When he arrived, his first words were: "Did you miss me?" "No," I said.

He studied my face to see if I was joking. He could tell I wasn't

I couldn't quit staring at him. My God, it really was my father. He looked good, too. Slender, red hair, tucked-in shirt, slacks. I'd gone so long without seeing him that I'd forgotten what he looked like.

But it only takes a moment to bring it all back. I could even smell his trademarked hair oil. The day after he died I confiscated his pillow and it was covered in this same scent. I slept on that pillow for five years.

"You really didn't miss me?" he said. There was that easy smile of his. He wasn't offended. "No, I really didn't miss you."

He ordered a Coke. And I suddenly remembered that he always drank Coca-Cola. He never was a coffee drinker. Hated the stuff. Just one of the many things I'd forgotten.

Then I started thinking about the differences between us. There were hundreds of them.

For example: he was always well-dressed, whereas I always looked like I crawled from beneath a Chevy. He was a hard worker; I sleep in on weekdays. Everyone called him "handsome;" nobody has ever ascribed that word to me. He was a planner; there is nothing I love more than canceled plans.

When he was alive, he expected great things from me, but I failed to deliver. From a young age I knew within my kid brain that I would never accomplish the things he hoped for me.

I'm not saying I disappointed him, but I don't think I ever made him so proud that he wanted to shout publicly, "That's my boy! That's my boy!"

The waitress approached our table. She removed her notepad and said to him, "You want the usual, John?"

I couldn't believe it. They knew him by name in this heav-

was. Maybe this was his perpetual Saturday morning.

He finished his breakfast and said, "I got something I wanna show you." He was already sliding out of our booth. "C'mon, it's in the parking lot."

Parked outside the cafe was a huge flatbed trailer attached to a truck. On the trailer was a disassembled 1957 Cessna 172 ness, no apologetic undertones. Then I realized that here in this holy place there was no sadness or guilt.

Here, he was free. Here, a man was unencumbered by the weight of his crimes. Even the worry lines on his face had disappeared. This truly was heaven. I was sorry I ever hated this beautiful man.

He took one step toward me. He didn't ask permission, he simply enfolded me in his two skinny arms, just like when I was a child. My tear stained face was soon buried in my father's shoulder. There was that smell again.

"I was lying," I said into his shirt. "I do miss you."

"That's my boy," he said.

Sean was born in Missouri. But, after his father's suicide, when he was 12, he moved with his family to our own Walton County at age 14. He dropped out of school and worked construction and other jobs, then became a professional musician. After going back to school, he discovered writing He has published 10 books (some of them self-published), and has written columns for many publications including appearing in Life Media. Since 2014, he has written a daily blog called "Sean of the South."



enly place. They even knew what he ate. He had lived a whole lifetime without me.

After we ordered we didn't speak much. He was in a good mood, but I felt myself clamming up. Maybe I was mad.

Throughout breakfast I kept remembering the day after his suicide, when I was a boy. Back then I had this horrible notion that he wasn't really dead. I don't know why. It was some kind of denial thing. It used to keep me up at night.

To put my mind at ease, my mother finally called the sheriff's department and asked the deputy to assure me that he was indeed dead. The deputy — God bless him — sighed and gave it to me straight.

He said, "We used dental records to identify the body. Your dad's teeth were about all that was left of him. So yeah, he's definitely dead."

My insides turned to water. I hung up the phone and cried. But in the back of my mind I always wondered, what if he'd kept on living? What kinds of things would he be doing? Would he have new hobbies? New friends? Would he still read novels? Would he still go out for breakfast on Saturday mornings?

Maybe that's what this place

Skyhawk airplane. The wings were removed, the fuselage was strapped to the trailer, the propeller was red.

"I'm gonna restore it," he said, slapping the wing. "Gonna take flying lessons." He looked like a little kid.

He always wanted to learn to fly. Flying was his frustrated dream. But the dream never materialized. When he died, his garage workshop was plastered with posters of jets, biplanes, F/A-18 Super Hornets and A-10 Warthogs.

He kicked the landing gears of his new prize. "So do you like the plane?"

I refused to show approval because no matter how old I get, there is still a little piece of me that wants to punish him for what he did. What did he want me to do? Throw a party? Congratulate him? He ruined my life and now he's playing Charles Lindenberg?

He obviously noticed my hardened face.

After a few moments, he said, "You know I don't blame you for not liking me anymore. I get it. But, gosh, it's so nice seeing you again."

I said nothing.

At first I was struck by the tenor of his words. Because, oddly, they contained no sad-



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

One day Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples." He said to them, "When you pray, say: 'Father, hallowed be Your name, Your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread. Forgive us our sins, for we also forgive everyone who sins against us. And lead us not into temptation." (Luke 11:1-4, NIV))

Many Christians feel inadequate in their prayer life. If you asked numerous folks what they could do to enhance their spirituality, most would say, "Pray more." But how much prayer

do you need? How much is required?

Some think that God wants us to pray for at least an hour. If we were devout, we would pray all night like Jesus often did. Elijah withdrew to a desolate cave to pray where the earth shook, whirlwinds roared and God's audible voice spoke to him. We think that if we were worth our salt, we would pray and kick the devil a few times, heal the sick and raise the dead. We feel defeated before we even start because we don't pray like that.

The disciples shared our feelings and asked Jesus to teach them to pray. Similarly, we need to ask God to show us how to pray. His answer may surprise you. The Lord gave us a 34-word model prayer, four brief sentences to live by. A kick start prayer to ignite your day with power, purity, and grace. It's really not difficult.

Our model prayer begins as Jesus points us toward the Father. To "hallow" His name means to set it apart as holy, to humble yourself and revere our Father, the most-high God. The Lord is truly omnipotent in power and loving as a father with a newborn baby. Oh, how many would run to prayer if we grasped the love of our Father!

Second, Jesus invites us to demand that His kingdom come now. Jesus is telling us to establish God's kingship and authority over our lives each day. We can invoke the power of God to rule over the events of our lives. Pray that God's power and authority reign over your family, home, and job. Yield everything to your King.

Third, Jesus calls us to pray, "Give us each day our daily bread." I wish I could have back all the moments I wasted worrying over bills and finances. I would probably live to be 100. Too many people worry about what might happen instead of trusting God's promise of provision. Believe that God will provide for you. Pray this one simple petition to the Lord, give your finances to God and live in peace.

I remember reading one

evening about a poor missionary. He would sit at the dinner table with his family and pray for a blessing over their supper – even when there was none. During his prayer, someone would knock at the door to give them food. I told this story to my wife and as I was speaking, someone knocked. I opened the door and there stood a couple, each carrying two bags of groceries. I stood overwhelmed by the goodness of God. The Lord will provide if you ask.

Fourth, forgive. How we need forgiveness and how we hate to give it. Without forgiveness, no person will see God. It is the crux of Christianity. Everyone must come to the Lord through God's forgiveness. The ultimate test of your faith becomes your ability to forgive others as God forgave you.

Finally, pray that God will lead you away from evil. We will walk thousands of steps today, each with a variety of choices. Ask the Father to guide you to his best and expect his subtle answers. God watches over you - look in his direction.

Jesus made prayer simple. Start with these four statements of 34 words that require less than a minute. Then step back and marvel at what God can do with you.

"Holy Spirit, help me pray according to God's pattern. Empower me to trust God will meet my needs. I confess my doubt and ask you to deliver me from my weakness. Deliver me from temptation as I confess and renounce its hold on me. Enable me to forgive, as God has forgiven me. You are my source of strength and I receive it now. In Christ's name, I pray. Amen."

I've seen everyone from Tim McGraw, Luke Bryan, Old Dominion, Brooks & Dunn, Cadillac Three and Florida Georgia Line to Riley Green, Big & Rich, Lynyrd Skynyrd, LOCASH and Kid Rock, along with many other well-knowns playing to growing crowds of music lovers from every state and those who travel from abroad to attend the festival.



For 2023 Gulf Coast Jam's headliners encompassed some of country's most popular artists, including Kenny Chesney, HARDY, Maranda Lambert and Kane Brown, as well as well-known hitmakers such as Chase Rice, Justin Moore, Gabby Barrett, Breland and Bailey Zim-

merman – with many others rounding out the total 32 artists taking the stage over the four-day event.

K e n n y Chesney's late addition to the bill was secured only four weeks

out from the festival weekend, having been added as the replacement for Morgan Wallen, who was originally on the ticket, but was forced to cancel a chain of concert dates due to a vocal issue.

I've had the pleasure to see Kenny play at both festivals and live at the CMA Awards, as well as, having conducted one-on-one feature magazine cover interviews with him twice in the past seven years (with a third interview set for next year before his 2024 tour) and I can assure anyone who hasn't seen him work a stage and crowd that he knows how to throw a party.

Craig Campbell of Campbell Entertainment Group in Nashville, who has played an instrumental role in orchestrating various behind-the-scenes aspects of Gulf Coast Jam since its first year, says the talent alone runs well into the multi-millions each year.

"It's actually because of our great sponsorships, and the generous support of Panama City Beach that we are able to throw this level of music festival and keep the ticket prices where they are," Campbell said. "That's one of the aspects that Rendy and Mark, (the festival founders and organizers) are most proud of: bringing great music to Panama City Beach and making it attainable to most everyone."

This month in our local Destinites Facebook group, Mayor Bobby Wagner posted about plans for the proposed improvement of the city center area where the new Publix will be located. He presented a drawing of what the complex might look like, including landscaping and the beauty is far beyond what exists there now. You may view the drawing on the mayor's Facebook page. Here is a

list of businesses which could be in the complex surrounding Publix; Example: Retail area, East Parking Deck, West Parking Deck (shared parking with Destin UMC), City Hall, Community Center, Amphitheatre, Residential Over ground Level Retail, Ground Level Retail, Ground Level Retail, Publix Pharmacy Drive-thru ground level, Office Building, and Restaurants. These plans are all proposed, as nothing has yet been decided.

There are 11 bid proposals for the city center complex job. "The winner will work with citizens, the council, and the city staff to create a conceptual site master plan and landscaping." said Mayor, Wagner.

Citizen Replies:

- 1. "All I can say is I'm happy it sold recently & we now hope to have a chance to partner & make something wonderful there."
- 2. "I think the old movie theater would be perfect to place the fishing museum... the schools can take field trips there, watch short films about how Destin evolved, maybe even get some hands-on exhibits. I'm sure there are a dozen captains who would volunteer (off season) to come talk about Destin, fishing, etc."
- 3. "Mayor Wagner, so glad you are thinking of expanding the Destin Fishing Museum they are full to the brim as it is & collection growing please consider that you could bring the Destin Fishing Museum to the town center & house it in a nice new building adjacent to a gorgeous aquarium full of Gulf marine life both would be a nice attraction anytime but es-

pecially on a rainy day giving our residents & visitors a fabulous Destin / Emerald Coast experience....."

- 4. "Looks great! If you are moving the community center and city hall to the new location, what would be done with the current locations?"
- 5. "I'm confused! Is the city of Destin going to develop land? Typically such renderings and concepts are brought forward by a developer right?"

Mayor Wagner's Response: "We selected our top design firm last night to give us a plan of what this area can be. We are open to partnerships to make this dream a reality."

Maya is one of three certified service dogs who will visit the hospital weekly to help relieve stress, anxiety and depression.

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
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
