### **Gateway to the Harbor Opens**

It was 2006, the year of the Sago Mine disaster, the Enron trial and Italy scored a penalty shot to win the World Cup.

In Destin, the chatter amongst City Council was about a park that would serve as the "Gateway to the Harbor." At an Oct. 16, 2006, council meeting, then City Manager Greg Kisela explained the background behind the acquisition. He said one of the city's constant priorities was to increase and enhance public access to its beaches and waterways; preserving public access to the Harbor was a high priority. The property closing was scheduled within a week's time. Not long after, resolution 07-16 named the park to be located at 206 Harbor Blvd. as "Capt Royal Melvin Heritage Park."

Seventeen years after that resolution was adopted, Melvin's great granddaughter helped cut the ribbon at the park's official opening July 18.

"It has always been great







hearing the stories growing up about my great grandfather," said 14-year-old McKenzie Harris. "I didn't get the chance to meet him, so this park means a lot to me to be able to have that piece of history for my generation to be able to enjoy for a long time to come. It makes me proud to have that heritage in my blood. It was a great honor to be able to cut the ribbon for the park and help introduce the Melvin heritage into a new generation."

"We are the sons of Capt. Royal Melvin," began Bo Melvin, as he and his brother, Scott, took to the podium. "It is an honor to be here today. It has been a long, long jour-

Bo and Scott said it all circled back to their grandparents. "If it wasn't for them settling on this piece of property right here, five generations of Melvins wouldn't have been able to live here or play here," said Bo. "Our father and grandparents would be humbled and honored."

"My brother and I were very fortunate to have grown up on our family property on the Destin Harbor when we were kids," said Scott. "We were on the bridge between old Destin fishing and the beginning of a new era. We knew and fished with most of the old-time legendary captains and then later made our own path to becoming captains. Growing up in Destin was like living in paradise. But the memories of being with our father and the rest of our family are what stands out the most. It was just wonderful."

Mayor Bobby Wagner said, "We could never have done this without the partnership of the private entities,

### Resilience and Courage **Define OHP's Sherry Jones**

This story began four decades ago and details the extraordinary journey of a local girl who, at the tender age of 18 and fresh out of high school, found herself unwittingly intertwined with a drug kingpin. This captivating narrative chronicles a story of redemption and second chances, a tale of reclaiming life from the depth of despair.

In the grand tapestry of human existence, redemption and second chances form the core of our most captivating narratives. They are

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the vital elements that enable countless individuals to resurrect their lives and produce meaningful change in the world. This account serves as a heartfelt testament that everyone, despite their missteps, deserves a chance at redemption.

Sherry Jones grew up in Fort Walton Beach, graduated from Choctaw High School, and entered such a narrative in March 1983. This narrative began when she visited her stepfather at the Eglin AFB Federal Prison, unofficially known as "The Country Club." Her stepfather, incarcerated for suspected tax evasion but later cleared, had been befriended by a charismatic prisoner named Jorge Valdes. This magnetic Cuban man would assert, in no uncertain



terms, that he was destined to marry Sherry.

Jorge, an intelligent, sophisticated and attractive figure, was serving time for conspiracy to import cocaine into the U.S. However, he avowed that he had turned over a new leaf as a born-again Christian and left his criminal past behind. Young

and naïve, Sherry was drawn into Jorge's orbit, her parents' approval strengthening the allure. In October 1983, Sherry and Jorge tied the knot, and Jorge regained his freedom on July 25, 1984.

Unbeknownst to Sherry and her family, Jorge had ascended to U.S. chief of operations for

the infamous Colombian Medellín Drug Cartel, headed by the notorious Pablo Escobar. Jorge's journey into this world began innocuously with a position as an accountant at the Federal Reserve Bank. Soon after, he established his own business, taking on what appeared to be a simple grocery store as his first client. However, this store operated beneath the surface as a front for illicit drug activities. Jorge's adeptness didn't remain hidden for long, eventually drawing the attention of Pablo Escobar and Manny Graces, resulting in their collaboration in the growing drug trade.

While Sherry joined Jorge's affluent lifestyle, complete with housekeepers and nannies, the origin of his wealth remained obscured. Sherry's life had all the trappings of a fairytale: dinner trips from Miami to Los An-

geles on a Lear Jet, an array of luxury cars, a waterfront home in Coconut Grove, Miami, and a 200-acre horse breeding ranch named Santa Barbara in Clewiston, yachts, along with a beach house in Ft. Myers. Sherry remained blissfully ignorant of the real money-making scheme, assuming it to be quarter horse breeding and horse racing. Sherry did not speak Spanish, so the language barrier cloaked his discussions when people came to their home. Before Pablo Escobar became a visibly recognizable figure, he was already a regular visitor to their home.

In 1986, they welcomed their first child into the world. However, the following year, Sherry's life took an unexpected turn. An accidental discovery of a hidden room filled with money from

City Manager Lance Johnson echoed the appreciation to the Melvin family, and thanked the current and past council members "for sticking with this project. I also want to thank all the staff members for pitching in and always keeping the faith. The residents, you guys stayed behind this project and I cannot express my appreciation enough."

With a small playground, restrooms, signage sharing history, water fountain, picnic pavilion, benches and priceless views and access to the water, the park is already living up to its nickname



of Gateway to the Harbor.

While the park and surrounding area is for everyone, it will always hold abundant memories for the Melvins. "As a young child, my morning job was to walk to my grandparents' house, located on the same land, and bring back a cup of hot coffee in an old white Navy mug to my father," reminisced Bo. "It was always a challenge to make the 300 steps back to our house without spilling the majority of it. Around the age of 12, our father bought my brother and me a 14-foot Kennedy Craft fishing

boat that was built in Destin. We were allowed to explore and fish the Harbor from one end to the other. As we got older, my brother and I worked for our father on two of our charter boats, the Venture II and the Venture III, as mates and eventually captains. Growing up in Destin was an exciting time, and we got to watch it turn into the World's Luckiest Fishing Village."

the floor to the ceiling shattered her illusions about Jorge's wealth and his proclaimed innocence. Upon confronting Jorge, she faced a cold reality: exiting the drug trade could have life-threatening consequences.

Sherry felt trapped with only a high school education, lacking job skills and expecting their second child. When she discovered Jorge's infidelity, she opted to leave him, returning to Fort Walton Beach. Subsequent efforts attempted reconciliation

which resulted in the birth of their third child. In 1989, Sherry could not handle the constant fear and insurmountable turmoil, so she filed for divorce. An attorney advised Sherry to copy records for proof of income. Jorge caught her, thinking her intent was dubious, and warned her that she could get everyone killed. She left without the records or proof for future sup-

In 1991, prompted by concerns for Sherry's safety and that of their children, Jorge insisted that they leave Florida. This cautionary move was due to his impending role as a federal witness in the high-profile trial of Sal Magluta and Willy Falcon. His testimony was a means to extricate himself from the charges he faced and a protective measure to prevent Sherry's potential indictment due to the federal law's guilt-by-association outcome. It was Jorge who had originally ushered these two infamous figures into the drug trade. Witness assassinations and alleged juror bribes marred the subsequent trial. Although initially acquitted in 1996, Magluta and Falcon were later convicted of money laundering and

bribery charges. The cult film, "Cocaine Cowboys," and Netflix's six-part documentary, "Cocaine Cowboys-The Kings of Miami," portrayed their infamous stories. Jorge chronicled his own experience in a series of books, including his autobiography, "Coming Clean," where he details Sherry's life with him during that time.

Jorge, who had been re-arrested in 1990, faced eight life sentences for conspiracy to import narcotics. Following a 5-year prison stint, he earned a Ph.D. at Loyola University in Chicago, authored a biography

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and established the Tres Hermanos Foundation for criminal reform. The government estimated that the cartel had brought 75 tons of cocaine into the United States; the cartel estimated it to be 175 tons, valued at almost five billion dollars.

Sherry's journey continued as she remarried in 1992, leading a discreet life in Texas. Later, she returned to Fort Walton Beach after another divorce following 26 years in an increasingly turbulent marriage. Meanwhile, Sherry experienced a drastic



unanimous 7-0 vote by council to acquire 1 Harbor Blvd. I know \$9 million is a lot of money, but my personal viewpoint is the space is worth the view! Or keeping the view unobstructed, at least. Please tell me that's the case.

**BW:** That's definitely the case. With this parcel being one of the best places in Destin due to the 180 degree panoramic waterfront views of both East Pass and Crab Island, I'm going to challenge our designers and engineers to preserve the view whether by foot or driving by.

**TY:** I've read a lot of creative ideas on social media about how the space could be used. One that received a lot of love was the idea of an amphitheater.

What are your thoughts on that, as well as the increased parking challenges that it might bring?

**BW:** The amphitheater could be amazing and provide a one-of-a-kind backdrop for everyone. As for parking, we do know as we bring more reasons for people to visit the Harbor, parking will be even more of a challenge. I do not see 1 Harbor



**BW:** Something I do feel confident that we'll be doing is continuing the Harbor boardwalk underneath the bridge and allowing a place for locals to safely walk and bike to and through when they want to go to the Harbor or take the future bike path that will expand across all of Okaloosa Island. 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

shift from luxury to poverty. She survived on welfare and worked two jobs to provide for her three children. She sought refuge with her parents, allowing herself some respite and time to heal. Sherry pursued higher education, earning a B.A. in Communication and Behavioral Science.

Sherry is presently the Director of Communications and Public Relations at One Hopeful Place (OHP), the sole low-barrier shelter in Northwest Florida. OHP assists the homeless population in the community through its inclusive programs, providing temporary housing and resources for reclaiming independence.

The shelter accommodates even those with felony convictions, barring those related to sexual abuse. Sherry is grateful to Ted Corcoran, president & CEO of the Greater Fort Walton Beach Chamber of Commerce, for allowing her to make a positive difference in the lives of others.

Veterans are accorded top priority, with the Veterans Affairs

Department contacted promptly to activate necessary benefits. Extensive background checks are carried out to validate the narratives of potential residents. OHP also collaborates with the Bridgeway Center in Fort Walton Beach to offer mental health treatment and detox services. Moreover, OHP plans to construct "tiny" homes to provide transitional housing, a venture requiring substantial community support.

OHP also offers a three-day-a-week program (Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.), allowing the homeless to come and eat a hot meal, shower and do laundry. The homeless living in their cars are provided a safe car park area. When winter temperatures fall below 40 degrees, OHP opens a cold night, 48-bed area to house the homeless overnight.

Beyond her commitments at OHP, Sherry also devotes her time to several philanthropic pursuits. She serves as a Guardian Ad Litem for the First Judicial Circuit Court in Florida. She offers her experience and empathy as an instructor for a church-based Divorce Care program. In a leadership capacity, she is the Vice President of Parkinson's Strong, Inc., a nonprofit organization based in Destin. She has also established World Class Scholarship Pageantry, LLC, which cultivates philanthropic values in young women, with OHP benefiting from their charitable efforts.

Despite the turbulence in her personal life, Sherry has successfully fostered academic and professional growth in her children. Each of the children graduated from highly ranked universities. Their first daughter has a Master's degree and is a dedicated educator. Their second daughter serves as a Florida Barred attorney. She serves as a risk analyst for the Department of Education in Washington, D.C. Their son is a CFO of a publicly listed company on NASDAQ. Sherry's youngest daughter is completing a Master's in the Medical Science field. Against all odds, Sherry has been instrumental in shaping her children's successful career paths.

# Insights for Investors:

# Past, Present and Future in Investing

"If you want to know the past, look at your present. If you want to know the future, look at your present" – Marcus Aurelius

Reports came out this past week over the continued resilience of the U.S. economy. GDP growth for the second quarter was 2.4 percent. According to the Associated Press, that was led by a strong increase in business spending and continued strength in consumer spending. This is in the face of 11 federal rate hikes in the past 17 months. Inflation has continued to decline and is now down almost 70 percent in the past 12 months.

We have seen it before in the quote from the great John Templeton: The four most expensive words in investing are: "This time it's different." Indeed, we agree, and this time it is not different. The stock market sank to its lowest level in October 2022. It has since rebounded quite substantially. That is right in line with past slowdowns or declines in earnings brought on by higher interest rates, inflation, and a slowing economy.

It has been interesting and concerning at the same time, the rapid rise in inflation over most of 2022. And what goes up often comes down – we have seen inflation come down 70 percent over the past 12 months. Raymond James, in its most recent edition of "Investment Strategy Quarterly" presents two scenarios which can drive inflation: Supply push inflation or demand push inflation. Inflation pushed by an interruption or decrease in production can raise prices. Stimulated demand brought on by a significant increase in the money supply can drive inflation. We may have just experienced the two simultaneously.

The interesting thing about inflation is that it was mostly nonexistent from 2010 to 2020. That was with an abundant supply of money and a strong economy for the most part. How could inflation have been so tame? Goldman Sachs points out that two key factors were 1) the low cost of energy during that time and 2) the continued advances in automation and other technological innovations that drove the cost of doing business out of the system. It was quite incredible to see the low cost of money and low inflation. The question, as we hear nonstop communication about artificial intelligence, or AI, is that about to happen again and at an even faster rate? The impact of technological advances cannot be overstated in our opinion. They not only drive costs out of the system as Goldman points out, but they also create new opportunities, industries, and jobs. Of course, some jobs go away (think telephone operators or typists) but are typically replaced by more and higher-paying jobs. Is the market seeing that? We think so. Goldman Sachs also shared some numbers to further illustrate these points. In 1850, two thirds of the workforce was devoted to agriculture or food production. The leading cause of death at that time was malnutrition. Today, less than 2 percent of the workforce is dedicated to food production - and productivity, or output, has never been greater. One of the leading causes of death today is a diet that is too rich.

Even though most stocks are up only slightly in 2023, many of these companies are coming out of earnings slumps and, like past growth spurts in stocks, they have recovered after hitting lows. The markets, however, present a different picture. At this writing the S&P 500 index is up almost 19 percent ytd, the Dow, 6.5 percent and the NAS-DAQ, 35 percent. Investors should take note that a small number of stocks, fewer than 10, have driven most of the performance of S&P and the NAS-DAQ. Taking those out leaves those indexes with a much different result.

The same can be said for socalled market valuation: looking at the price to earnings ratio (PE) of the S&P. Historically, that number has been 16 to 1. Most recently it is 26 to 1, indicating a somewhat overvalued market. If you experiment and take out the small number of outperforming stocks, you will find that ratio drops down somewhat, making it slightly undervalued. Throughout most of July, the market seemed to be responding to that and the larger group of stocks performed quite strongly and many of those firms have been reporting their second quarter results, which are proving to be better than expected.

We are also encouraging investors to look more closely at bonds or fixed income investments. If the Fed is close to or at the end of its rate hike efforts and if inflation continues to wane, locking in yields for longer term than short-term CDs and money markets might make a lot of sense. It can diversify or reduce risk to a portfolio, and it can be a source of income as well. Cash rates are at their highest levels in well over a decade; however we remind investors that these rates are intended for a very short-term time hori-

A simple choice: one treat now or two later. Only one in three could wait. The really interesting part came later. Stanford researchers studied these children for 40 years (That's right!) and made an amazing discovery. Higher SAT Scores, graduation rates, income, job performance, net worth, as well as overall life and relationship satisfaction, were the norm in this group. Is there a message here for us?

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### Mitch Malloy:

### Destin's Rock Star Resident Drops Newest Album, "The Last Song"

If you reside in, or have spent much time along, any of the beach communities that make up what I coined "America's Favorite Coastal Playground" some years ago, then it's certainly no secret that not only do celebrities from the film, ty, music and entertainment world vacation in our area, many of them also decide to move here.

Rock musician, vocalist, and record producer Mitch Malloy is one of these, having moved to Destin almost five years ago. Malloy, 61 (Yes, we all know he doesn't look it. It must be the Viking DNA), originally from Dickinson, North Dakota, first



made his mark on the international rock scene back in 1992 when he was signed to RCA, re-

leasing his debut album, "Mitch Malloy," which garnered international attention as it climbed the USA Billboard charts, as well as building a musical following with hard rock fans around the world.

Mitch's voice has been highly sought after as a front man for legendary acts, as well as a guest vocalist on other artists' projects. In the mid-90s Mitch was asked to replace Sammy Hagar as lead singer for Van Halen. However, due to some of the typical things that happen within the day-to-day dynamics of rock bands of that caliber, he declined. At that time Mitch turned his focus more to





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the songwriting and producing side of the industry, making a move to Nashville where he has worked for over two decades writing, producing, and consulting with some of the biggest names in the business – from Kenny Loggins, Craig Morgan, and Victoria Shaw to Boys Like Girls and Taylor Swift, to name a few.

When I first met Mitch, for a feature magazine interview back in 2019, he was engulfed in a four year stint as lead singer for 80's hard rock band, Great White; touring regularly, and having just made a move to our beautiful beaches. Malloy has since left Great White, deciding instead to get back to his roots, resuming his solo career with his first album since "Making Noise" was released almost eight years ago.

Mitch Malloy's new masterpiece, entitled "The Last Song," is like its predecessor, a solo effort in every sense of the term. Malloy plays every instrument, as well as writing every song on the album, and producing and engineering the entirety of "The Last Song."

I recently sat down with Mitch at his Destin home to find out a little more about his newest album, as well as his musical journey, and living his ideal life along the beaches we all love.

You know, I know, but for our readers, tell me a

### little about your musical journey and how it began.

I was born in Dickinson, North Dakota, where I began singing in school plays and church, at about six years old. I was the youngest of six children, and just immediately had a passion for music. I began playing guitar at about twelve, went to music school in Seattle, and then hit the road to Los Angeles and Nashville to chase the dream. I guess I'm still doing it... just in a much prettier place, and on my own terms.

You've had quite the diverse musical career, having done everything from your early solo albums that charted Top 20 Hits, to having the iconic Eddie Van Halen personally offer you the frontman gig with Van Halen when Sammy left. All while building a name in Nashville as a talented writer and producer. What's your favorite part of the business and why?

I really like most aspects equally. I love to perform live. I love to write, and I really like that magic of taking something from raw vocals and music to a completed song and album. That's what producing is really about, and what drew me to working alongside so many talented artists when I was in Nashville at my studio. I get

# **Lighting 101**

Lighting can be intimidating but it's one of the most import-

because it provides your space with overall illumination of the entire room. This allows you to see, perform basic tasks and navigate your space safely. Typically, ceiling mounted fixtures, chandeliers, recessed lighting and sconces are used to accomplish this type of lighting.

Task Lighting is intended to help you perform a specific task such as grooming, prepping a meal, reading, studying and working. This type of lightlighting are used to accomplish this type of lighting.

Accent Lighting is also known as the Decorative Layer of lighting. It can be used to call attention to or create drama in your space by highlighting items such as artwork, architecture elements or any other feature that cannot be made prominent by your ambient lighting. As a rule of thumb, your accent lighting should be at least three times brighter than your general light-

ing. Typically, accent lighting fixtures include track lighting, wall sconces and even tape or rope lighting (used behind mirrors, in coves, tiered ceilings and toe-kicks).

Once placement for all the lighting has been determined, the shopping fun begins! In addition to shopping for your layers of lighting, add dimmers to the list. I like having dimmers installed in every room. Dimmers help you control the lev-

els of lighting for optimal use at different times of the day or evening.

Incorporating all three types of lighting into your light schematic in conjunction with other design elements can help you create a harmonious and well-presented space. I know you've lived in Destin full time for just over a year now. How did that come to be, and what led you to these beautiful beaches?



# What's New for Okaloosa County in 2023-24

"I'm most proud that this school values three things - academics, the arts, and athletics," Okaloosa County School District Superintendent Marcus Chambers says. "We've taken a strong stance to provide students with opportunities to be engaged while they're in the school system.

"The ultimate goal is that when high school seniors walk across the graduation stage, we want them to be prepared for college, the military, or the workforce.'

Mr. Chambers oversees all 38 schools in the district, which include roughly 33,000 students and 3,500 employees. The school district is the second largest employer in the county, right behind the military.

All 67 districts across Florida are assessed in reading, math, social studies and science. "We were fifth in the state for 2022-2023. In the last three years, we've placed in the top ten," he says.

Mr. Chambers was appointed by the governor in January 2019 and elected superintendent in August 2020. Prior to that, he was a classroom teacher, assistant principal, and district office administrator. He served as principal at Longwood Elementary in Shalimar, Pryor Middle School in Fort Walton Beach, and Niceville High School.

Since 1998, he has called Niceville home. His father was in the military, and Mr. Chambers graduated from high school in Hawaii. "I played sports and went to the University of South Florida to play baseball," he says. Later, he played baseball and basketball at what is now Northwest Florida State College in Niceville.

At one point, he realized he

wasn't going to become a pro- in Educational Leadership. fessional athlete, but Mr. Chambers was happy to be getting an education. He graduated with a degree in Elementary Education from the University of West Florida, then earned his Master's

"I'm excited about the upcoming school year," he says. Many construction projects are underway, thanks to the half-cent sales tax. "We're now able to upgrade facilities, add new build-

ings, and plan for new school construction. We're currently building classroom additions and cafetoriums (the new way of saying cafeteria/auditorium).'

Mr. Chambers tells me that once a school gets to around 80 percent capacity, it's time to start thinking about new schools. Most of the schools in Okaloosa County are currently at 95 percent capacity.

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### My Favorite Places to Visit in Montana

I am amazed at all the people I have talked to recently who are heading to Montana, so I thought I would share with my readers a few places to visit and things to do near our favorite part of Montana.

While I have been blessed to have traveled to many distant and beautiful places throughout my life, I feel I have lived in the best of two worlds, the beach and the Rocky Mountains. Even though being raised in the Navy meant we mainly lived near beaches from California to Hawaii to Florida, I have also been blessed to have lived most of my life in Salt Lake City and northwest Montana. Post Navy in 1966 my family settled in Missoula, Montana. I married a local boy in 1971 and except for a brief four-year stint in Boise, Idaho, in the early 70s, we remained in Montana until Dave and I moved to Destin in 2007.

to fly into the areas I will be telling you about are Missoula (MSO) and Kalispell (GPI), which is closer to Glacier Park and the Whitefish Ski Resort. Here are a few of my favorite vacation spots. From Missoula it is a three-hour drive to Glacier National Park where majestic mountains began to form 170 million years ago. Perhaps it's no surprise artifacts have been discovered of the dinosaurs that once roamed there. Soon after the establishment of the park in 1910, a number of hotels and chalets were constructed by the Great Northern Railway and are now listed as National Historic Landmarks. Another historic landmark is the Going to the Sun Road because it is so high it seems as though you are going to reach the sun. After its completion in 1932, it was designated a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark. Glacier Park is well known for its wildlife, including massive Grizzly Bears. You will be greeted by a huge stuffed Grizzly if you land at the Missoula airport.

On highway 93, just nine miles southwest of Missoula, is a bedroom community known as Lolo, first named by a fur trader in 1831 as he camped on a creek that he referred to in his journal as Lou Lou Creek, meaning Wealth but somehow shortened to LoLo which may be an Indian name. It was in this community that we raised our family overlooking the pic-



It is also in Lolo where you will find Travelers Rest State Park, the only archaeologically verified campsite of the Lewis and Clark expedition in the nation. It was on this National Historic Trail that Lewis and Clark camped before they split up on July 3, 1806, with Lewis heading north to explore the Marias River area and Clark following the suggestion of Sacagawea

south to Yellowstone along the

Missouri River to rendezvous in North Dakota.

One more hour down highway 93 past Lolo is Darby, where the famous Yellowstone TV show has been filmed on the very real Dutton Ranch.

One of our favorite vacations is four hours east of Missoula. West Yellowstone National Park and Jackson Hole is a mere 127 miles from West Yellowstone and well worth the trip!

We savored the Montana summers because they didn't last very long. I think our favorite vacations were when we headed 100 miles to Salmon Lake, just one of the many lakes in the Swan Valley, or we would drive 100 miles west toward Glacier Park to Flathead Lake, much like people in the south head

to the beaches for vacation. We loaded up our boat with water toys and food and made our way to a campground or a vacation rental which was my preference, after all, the Montana bears are much bigger than the Florida

Glacier Park is three hours west of Missoula. Flathead Lake is named after the Flathead Indians, who originally dominated the area along with the Blackfeet. We enjoyed many family vacations at Flathead Lake. I used to spend my summers there in high school visiting my grandmother and my aunt, both well-known artists in the area. When you visit, you can stay at the Kwataqnuk Resort in Polson, rent a luxury lake house of your own, park an RV, try the new glamping fad or just go old-fashioned camping with a campfire and smores! You can enjoy hiking and fishing or shop and dine in Bigfork, a quaint and charming little town where you will experience the culture of the old west. Be sure to pick up some huckleberry chocolate before you leave. Another favorite pastime is visiting one of the many haunted old west ghost towns that dot the entire state.

Construction projects include the addition of a fourth and fifth grade wing at Destin Elementary School and a new elementary school in Niceville. The district recently acquired 80 acres in Crestview for a K-8 school. "We're getting to the point where we can lessen the capacity and free up space," says Mr. Cham-

"We've taken a very proactive approach to Career and Technical Education (CTE). In Okaloosa County, we have 19 programs, including carpentry, engineering, AI, culinary, nursing and more. In the nursing program, we've partnered with HCA Hospital in Fort Walton Beach and North Okaloosa Medical Center in Crestview."

In Fort Walton Beach, nursing students have their own campus from which they can walk to the hospital for their clinical hours. The district received a Triumph grant for that program, courtesy of the folks that oversee the BP oil spill settlement funds.

CTE students take a certification test at the end of the course. "They get a certificate that shows employers they have marketable skills and experience," says Mr. Chambers.

"We talk a lot about the next generation of Okaloosa schools and being an A-plus school district. We are rated A, but we gave ourselves the plus because we do well in arts and athletics."

Three years ago, the Okaloosa County School District had the oldest bus fleet in the state of Florida and no bus replacement program. This changed three years ago, and now the fleet boasts 160 buses. "We've purchased 90 new school buses. In the upcoming year, we'll purchase 15 more," says Mr. Chambers. "Every year going forward, we're looking to buy at least 15 new buses a year."




Sharing the excitement and joy of fishing the abundant waters of the Gulf is something everyone can enjoy. Leonard Destin kind of kicked that off when



# Q & A: Alex Fogg of Destin-Fort Walton Beach's Artificial Reef Program

If you are a full-time or parttime resident of any of the beach towns and coastal communities that dot Northwest Florida's Gulf Coast you've likely heard a thing or two about the Artificial Reef Program initiated and managed by Destin-Fort Walton Beach Tourism.

As much as the program has been praised as a haven for the 150-plus species of fish and invertebrates that inhabit the purposely and strategically sunken vessels, the artificial reef program is part of a much larger and more complex five-year objective plan designed to both enhance the area's marine ecosystems and spark additional interest in NW Florida Gulf Coast water adventures.

Since 2019, the project has deployed about 1,500 structures and 10 vessels. Those include limestone reefs that were deployed in partnership with Starborough Wines, Destin High School, Emerald Coast Reef Association and Saltwater Restaurant Group. These vessels include R/V Manta (180-by-38-foot steel hulled research vessel); R/V Dolphin (192-by-39.9 foot steel hulled, bottom cable research vessel); and the RMS Cyclops (105-by-24 foot steel hulled, offshore supply vessel). The RMS Atlantis (a decomsel) and The Deep Stim are also new, soon to be deployed vessels.

The various concrete structures and medium-to-large ship-wrecks used to create the artificial reefs provide remarkable opportunities for diving, fishing and snorkeling. In addition, they reduce the environmental impact to naturally occurring reefs, by spreading out fishing and diving across a larger and more controlled area. The new reefs do a significant part in helping to sustain and control the fishing industry and prevent overfishing along our Gulf Coast.

I sat down with Alex Fogg, Okaloosa County's Coastal Resource Manager, to talk about Destin-Fort Walton Beach Tourism's Artificial Reef Project. We explored the benefits and merits of this remarkable program, as well as his love of the project, and the future of artificial reefs in our area.

#### How did you get involved in this field, and where does your passion for the Artificial Reef Projects come from?

Growing up, my dad was in the Navy, which resulted in a lot of moving around, but it was always to coastal locations. We fished and snorkeled every opportunity we had. We vacationed in Florida often and would fish the reefs in the destinations we traveled.

I realized I needed to pick a career path that kept me near the water and marine science was the obvious choice. I can remember my dad talking about spearfishing and scuba diving. That was what drove me to become scuba certified and really catapulted my desire to continue with my career. I graduated from the University of South Carolina right as the BP oil spill was occurring, which resulted in a number of positions opening up around the Gulf Coast. I made my way to Mississippi, where I began working on oil spill response projects with NOAA. I then moved on to the University of Southern Mississippi and completed my masters, looking at lionfish life history. As I was wrapping that up, I knew I wanted to be in Florida and a position opened managing the largest artificial reef project in Northwest Florida. This was an easy decision but after a few years with Florida Fish and

Wildlife I knew I needed to find something on a more local level, and that's when I made it to Destin-Fort Walton Beach and began working with Marine and Coastal Resources and getting the artificial reef program up and running again.

# What do you consider the most personally rewarding aspect of your job?

The most rewarding part of my job is being able to work on projects that directly benefit the community that I live in. My previous jobs were over a much larger geographic area and I didn't have the same satisfaction. Working with Destin-Fort Walton Beach Tourism, and this project, is just a dream come true for me.

What do you consider to be the biggest challenge to the Gulf waters we, and our tourism community, love?


I think everyone who knows me has heard me say "weather dependent." What I mean is that a number of the projects we work on are so dependent on the weather, which makes scheduling a real pain sometimes.

If budget were not a constraint, and you, in your position and with your passion could do any single or multiple layered project within the scope of these efforts what would it be and why? What's your, "We have to do this one?"

Oh, Will, that's a tough one. I Think on the tourism side, I want to deploy the largest artificial reef in the world! Something like a 1000-foot-plus vessel. This is something that I hope to achieve during my career, but cost is always a big consideration.

Outside of tourism, and thinking more along the lines of conservation, we have made great strides to develop our coastal resource programs, but

We've touched on some of the previous artificial reef projects of Destin-Fort Walton Beach Tourism involvement, but can you shed some light on future projects we can be looking for? You can tell us... We won't tell anyone and ruin

#### the surprise [laughing]?

(Alex provided this list of upcoming deployments):

AJ's Blackbeard/Flying Eagle: A 72-foot sailboat has been donated by AJ's. Deployment location will be near the Cordonazo sailboat that was deployed last year to form the "Yacht Club" reef site

**MV Deep Stim III:** A 270-foot offshore supply vessel. This

is a joint project between Okaloosa, Walton and Bay counties.

**Crimson White:** A 125-foot tugboat that caught fire in dry dock and is currently being cleaned for deployment in state waters less than nine miles from shore. Expected deployment will be this month (August) and

will be part of a TV special highlighting artificial reefs.

**Module Deployment:** A \$1.26 million project to deploy more than 400 modules throughout our coast's permitted areas from three to 30 miles offshore.

# Off the Hook: August Fishing Report

Get ready, anglers! August is here and it's bringing with it a whole bunch of fishing opportunities. First up, we've got the Amberjack. These guys are a hot catch right now as the season opens Aug. 1.

If you're after some serious action, now's the time to go after the White and Blue Marlin. But if you're specifically looking for the White Marlin, August and September will provide the best chances of reeling one in. And keep an eye out for Sailfish, they'll be moving closer to shore in the coming months.

For those of you who prefer near-shore fishing, you can try your luck with the Blackfin Tuna. Just chum over deepwater ledges and wrecks using live bait like cigar minnows, herring, pinfish or chunk baits. Or give butterfly jigging a shot! Trolling



live cigar minnows on fluorocarbon leaders or throwing topwater poppers can also do the trick.

Sailfish enthusiasts, you can find them around beach reefs and wrecks. They're usually a happy surprise while targeting other species, but if you want better results, try using an offshore spread of ballyhoo, squid chains and teasers.

August is also the time when King Mackerel start showing up in abundance. Charter boats and recreational fishermen go nuts for these guys. You can nab them by trolling with dead cigar minnows or using Yo-zuri plugs, Rapala's or spoons. Slow trolling live baits with a stinger or

Carolina rig can be effective too.

Now, let's talk Chicken Dolphin. They like to hang around near shore reefs, wrecks and weed lines. Trolling small spoons and casting jigs or swimbaits can help you reel them in.

If you're on the hunt for Tarpon, they'll be hanging out around 5 to 10 miles from the pass. Live baits like cigar minnows, herring or LY's work like a charm. Or you can try Berkley swim baits in the 6-inch size. Just remember, when approaching Tarpon, stealth and a trolling motor are key.


Now, let's not forget about our dear friends, the sharks. Chumming over natural bottom or large wrecks with bait like bonita or mackerel is your best bet here. You'll need a heavy rod, reel combo, 80-lb. or 100-lb. line, and a 150- to 250-lb. wire leader to reel these bad boys in.

For those of you into bottom fishing, you'll be happy to know that Grouper season is here. Scamp Grouper can be found on natural bottoms and wrecks. Amberjack, on the other hand, love to hang around wrecks. Live cigar minnows, hardtails, pinfish or vermillion snapper are all great bait choices. Speak-

ing of Vermillion Snapper, you can find them on wrecks or reefs using a bottom rig with circle hooks and baits like squid, northern mackerel or bonita cut into 1-inch chunks. And if you're on the hunt for Red Grouper, they prefer trash bait and can be caught in shallower waters.

So there you have it, friends, the August Fishing Forecast. Get your gear ready and head out there for some epic fishing adventures!









### 5 Energy Savings Myths

Saving energy and lowering our utility bills seems to be on everyone's mind lately. We get advice from neighbors, friends, blogs, big box stores and internet searches. Sometimes this

advice can get confusing or contradicting, and we decide to do nothing. Let's face it, saving Savy Leigh PHOTO energy has an important impact which we all have a role in. So, here are five popular energy saving myths.

#### Myth #1: Leaking tubs and faucets are not that big of a deal.

Surprising, one faucet leaking two drops of water per second will waste 200 gallons of water in a month. Two faucets will waste 400 gallons of water. What if the leak came from the hot water side? Leaking faucets on the hot water side puts a continual strain on your water heater and costs you money and energy. In most cases, fixing leaky faucets will only cost a few cents to replace the washer. I recently called the manufacturer of my faucet and they sent replacement parts for free.

Pro Tip: To check if your faucet leaks, put a dry cup under the faucet at night. Check the cup in the morning—no water, no leak.

Myth #2: Leaving ceiling fans on cools down the room when you're not there.

This is a common practice, but don't be fooled. Fans don't cool the room; they only circulate air. We experience a cooling sensation from moisture evaporating from our skin. Leaving fans on all the time wastes energy and money.

Pro Tip: The ceiling fan direction in summer should be counterclockwise to help create a downdraft, which creates that direct, cooling breeze. Your fan direction in winter needs to be clockwise to create an updraft and circulate warm air around the room.

#### Myth #3: Closing off HVAC vents in rooms you aren't using improves your HVAC system's output and efficiency.

Your HVAC system is sized for your entire home or a zone within your house. Closing off vents in certain rooms could actually lower the system's efficiency. Plus, with forced air systems, closing off vents could create a buildup of pressure in ducts which could cause cracks and gaps in ducts leaking conditioned air into your attic.

Pro Tip: Don't forget to replace your HVAC filters regularly. Dirt and debris in your filter can obstruct air flow, increasing the workload of your cooling system. By replacing the filter regularly, you can reduce wear and tear on your air conditioner while allowing the free movement of air for improved indoor comfort.

#### Myth #4: Setting the thermostat lower in the summer cools down a home faster and likewise in the winter.

HVAC systems are designed to operate at maximum power when they are first turned on. They won't produce cooler air just because the setting is set extremely low or hotter air when set high. They will run longer wasting energy and money attempting to achieve arctic temperatures.

Pro Tip: Installing a smart thermostat allows you to control settings remotely using an app from your mobile device saving you energy and increasing com-

#### Myth #5: Appliances like TV's, monitors, computers and chargers, when not in use or turned off, don't use energy. It is not necessary to unplug them.

Anything with a digital display, remote control or turns on instantly are constantly drawing energy. Charges for cell phones, cameras and tablets are known as "energy vampires" for a reason. Even if they are not attached to their device, they continue to draw power from the outlet.

Pro Tip: Pull the plug or flip the switch on your power strip and start saving energy.

# Pickleball Explodes in Destin

"I played tennis up until college and started playing pickleball, because I had some time on my hands during COVID. I loved it. It's a fun game."

Back in 2016, I was editing the late, great Beachcomber magazine in Destin, and my boss suggested that we run some articles on pickleball. I had no idea what a pickleball was, but thankfully, a man named Phil Gardner explained it to me and my readers.

"Pickleball is a cross between tennis, ping-pong and badminton," he wrote. "It's most often played in two teams of doubles, but can be played as singles. The game is played on a badminton-sized court over a net similar to those in tennis. A whiffle ball is propelled by solid paddles over the net."

He added: "Pickleball is an action game that teaches coordination and exercises reaction and mobility. Players learn quickly that positioning on the small court is paramount to mastering the game...and that mastery of the game is an evolving journey."

In 2018, Mike Minich, president of Southern Events Management, Inc., took up the game. "I was originally part of putting on volleyball tournaments," he says. "Karen Parrish was one of the people who started running pickleball tournaments and had people playing at Destin Methodist Church. The recreation center in Fort Walton Beach had two courts also."

In 2020, the Fort Walton Beach Recreation and Cultural Services director converted two unusable tennis courts into six pickleball courts at the recreation center on Jet Drive. "They filled up right away," says Mr. Minich. "Pickleball is a sport that can be played by anyone, any age. You see people in their 50s and 60s playing every morning on Jet."

Ms. Parrish left the area to take a job in Arizona with USA Pickleball, the national governing body for the sport, and left the Emerald Coast Pickleball Facebook group in his hands. "I'm still doing it," he says. "We share interesting things, and there is no advertising for



products or services. We want to let people know about tournaments."

I've never picked up the paddle. So, Mr. Minich recommended that I check out Joe Baker's YouTube videos. "He's the driest human I've ever seen, but his videos are the best to learn from. He teaches paddle control, strategy... that's how I learned."

Jeff Harris, owner of Run With It since 2008, jumped on the pickleball train in October 2020 and immediately loved the sport. "I realized how popular it was," he says. "There would be six courts and 50 to 60 people waiting to play."

"I also saw that nobody was selling pickleball accessories locally," says Mr. Harris. "Walmart had some cheap stuff, but they were always out of stock."

With the new demand for pickleball equipment, Mr. Harris, his wife Donna and his team brought in paddles, balls and many other accessories. Within a few months, it exploded. "We brought in more brands, as well as court shoes, which are different from running shoes. It opened up a whole new world for us. The cool thing is that we already carried running skirts, which can also be used for pickleball."

Due to its popularity and the need for an indoor court, he and his wife Donna launched Pickleball at the Palms in Feb. 2023, a designated indoor pickleball court, one of the very few places to play indoors in our region slated only for Pickleball, as opposed to a regular gym. Mr. Harris says the cool, indoor court is extremely popular and stays booked 70-85% of the time.

Mr. Harris says he also has a competitive streak. "I go to

tournaments and I've even qualified to play in some," he says. "But I just turned 60 and can

play in the 60-plus division. I'm not competing with teenagers

anymore, which makes life a lot easier for me."

Pickleball at the Palms is located at 21 Racetrack Road NE in Fort Walton Beach. Hours of operation are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and noon to 4 p.m. on Sundays. "We use an app called Court-Reserve," says Mr. Harris. "Just sign up there for clinics or to rent the court." Open play is Fridays from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. (beginner level) and 4 to 6 p.m. (intermediate level). Cost is \$5 for two hours of play, and if you want to rent the court for an hour, it's only \$24.

championship. The runner-up also receives an invitation to play in the Masters and the U.S. Open.

The second day, July 18, the field was reduced to 27 players

who scored 75 or less. The winner was Nate Gahman from Albany, Ga., with a score of 139. Runner-up was Matthew Soucinek from Lake City, Fla., with a score of 140. Golfers began the day with tee times from 7:30 a.m. to 8:51 a.m. Conditions on the course were excellent with no high winds or rain to impede scoring.

Both players, when interviewed after their rounds, were

excited to achieve this goal and travel to Colorado for the national championship. Nate, a young businessman with a wife and two young children, is pursuing a dream he's had for many years. Matthew wants to become a professional golfer and sees this as an important step toward realizing that goal. He is in his last year at Southeastern University and was a member of the SEU men's golf team.

From the heat of Florida to the high altitudes of Colorado, these two young men will experience a competition like no other. The last two men standing will play 36 holes of golf at the end of a six-day event. Good luck, Nate and Matthew! He and Donna were in the restaurant business for 21 years in Birmingham, Ala. Things came full circle when Mr. Harris stumbled upon a pickleball/ restaurant franchise called Chicken N Pickle, which is sort of the Top Golf of pickleball. "I was interested in opening one, and Donna said, 'You can do that with your next wife, because you're not doing it with me!"

Mr. Harris is one of over 4.8 million pickleball players, or "picklers," in the U.S., according to a 2022 report from the Sports & Fitness Industry Association. Pickleball grew nearly 40 percent between 2019 and 2021, making it America's fastest-growing sport.

According to USApickleball. org, Pickleball is celebrating its 58th anniversary. Interestingly, the game was actually invented

in 1965 on Bainbridge Island. Three enterprising dads - Joel Pritchard, Bill Bell and Barney McCallum - created the game when their children were bored with their usual summertime activities. They started with original handmade equipment and simple rules.

Although accounts of how the name originated differ (especially since no pickles are used), according to Joel's wife, she started calling the game pickleball, because "the combination of different sports reminded me of the pickle boat in crew where oarsmen were chosen from the leftovers of other boats." However, according to Barney, the game was officially named after the Pritchards' dog Pickles, who would chase and run off with the ball. With really no official name in its first couple of years, as the game progressed over time, an official name was needed and "pickleball" was it!

Cambridge defines "core" simply as "The basic and most important part of something," then going a step further... pertaining to anatomy, "The muscles around your pelvis, hips and abdomen that you use in most body movements." As a Pilates instructor for over 25 years, and fitness training specialist even longer, Abs have always been an important focus. But focusing on "core" takes things a little further. We use our core for everything we do; therefore, we should keep them as forerunners for all movements as we strive to get stronger and more in shape. By understanding their importance, we can maximize our training by staying aware that it's your core that delivers stability and keeps you safe—but only when we consciously engage it.

Our core muscles (specifically abdominals) are high endurance muscles. They are meant to last and last and take longer to fatigue. Our muscles that are meant for long durational use crave movement and become lifeless if we neglect them. So, your core, being the most important part of you, will break down like a chain reaction and become weak from neglect. Today's fast paced electronic world makes us physically lazy. Don't let this be you!

How do you work your core? The answer depends on your goals. Remember, there are core STRENGTHENING movements and core STABILIZING movements. Variety is key to get a well-developed core that

protects your spine and the rest of your body. Examples: Forward flexion, such as crunches or many other ab exercises that curl your spine (think of your lowest ribs going toward your hip bones) will strengthen the primary ab muscles called rectus abdominis. But, if we work the front side, we want to equally work the back side, i.e. the erectors which go along each side of the spine pertinent for spinal alignment, safety and posture. You work these by doing any type of spinal extension or hyper-extension exercises. Think of exercises that bend you backwards. Be careful, hyper-extension exercises should be performed slowly with much control

Some focus on only the erectors along the spine and some incorporate the gluteal group as well. Now our sides. Note: Make sure you're counting and performing equal reps or time for each side so you create balance. Sides exercises bend side to side or hold through planking. A truly great side-to-side exercise is holding an abdominal lift (on floor, knees bent, feet flat on floor, lift shoulders and head only off floor in a curled position). Reach hands along each side of your legs and lean side to



side, reaching each hand farther as you bend keeping your shoulders square to the ceiling and at the same height throughout. An excellent oblique exercise, you have engaged the rectus abdominis by lifting (crunching), then movement comes from the obliques.

Side planks are another excellent side exercise—really any mixture of planking is valuable in working all sides of your core. Planks with or without other movements are at the top for things to do to stabilize and strengthen your core.

Don't forget twisting exercises. As long as you don't have spinal fusions or limitations, you will want to incorporate twisting exercises, again, super controlled, so you can hopefully avoid ever needing spinal fusions or preventing injuries. Life movements will ask you to twist, i.e. playing with your

dog, protecting your child or doing yardwork, and you WILL twist at some point. Exercising in general gives you a platform to strengthen yourself in a controlled environment so that you become stronger for life's surprises. If you are a tennis player, runner, pickleball player, bowler, cyclist or other athlete,

but you don't strength train in between, you definitely need to add core training into your routine. As noted above, if you are doing strength training regularly, then you are training your core without even trying by stabilizing yourself during movements. Add single-sided exercises or an unstable surface such as a BOSU, and you've incorporated even more core work.

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## Don't Let Stress Get The Upper Hand

When did you last experience tense shoulders, sighing breaths, irritability, exhaustion, trying to keep it positive, being overscheduled and overwhelmed? It's back to school transition

time and August tends to sneak up each year with an unending list of buying things and attending events for the new school year. Back to school is only one of many transitional times. Sometimes you experience major transitions such as moving homes, starting college, adding children to the family, changing jobs, divorce or loss. Other times, you experience regular life transitions like starting middle school, changing schedules, school breaks or daylight savings time. 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feel out of your control? Name the transition and remind yourself stress in transition is normal. You may not have control over the circumstances but you do have control over how you care for

Acknowledge mixed feelings that accompany life transitions. Some transitions feel primarily sad.

Most transitions create both excitement for the new future reality and grief to leave the previous way behind. Give yourself space to hold conflicting emotions and remind yourself it's normal and okay to feel confused.

Engage in intentional, more frequent self care. Talk to a trusted person about your feelings, go for a walk, take a nap, create art, go for a run. Engage in activities that feel caring and calming as regularly as possible during transitional times.

Set boundaries where possible. Reduce unnecessary commitments. Say no to new commitments. Lower any excessively high or perfectionistic expectations you have for yourself. Prioritize rest. Less is more during times of stress.

Plan ahead for repetitive transitions. Make lists and use calendars for transitions like school starting to remind yourself not to procrastinate needed tasks.

Mindfully do one thing at a time. As you walk through the necessary tasks during life stress, try not to overthink or get ahead of yourself. Plan far enough to be responsible then focus on what you are doing right now, today. Be present in the moment knowing each moment builds into a history of you moving through and out of your current transitional stress.

Accept and don't judge. Transition is inevitable. Stress happens. Notice the transition and the stress without judging yourself or the circumstance. Engage in healthy self-control and do what you can to practice health. Remember where you have power to act rather than viewing yourself as a victim which creates more stress. 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

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### Intermittent Fasting For Better Health

Intermittent: Coming and going at intervals, not continuous; occasional, limiting food consumption to certain hours each day.

Intermittent fasting (I.F.) is currently one of the world's most popular health and fitness trends. Reasons behind this trend is weight loss, improved health, simplified lifestyle and positive effects on the body and brain.

I.F. focuses on when you eat vs. what you eat. That being said, eating high-calorie junk food, super-sized meals or desserts/treats during eating hours will not produce the benefits most are looking for. Following a mediterranean diet is recommended for best results. If you would like a Mediterranean diet foods list you can email succeed. hdhl@gmail.com with MED-ITERRANEAN DIET in the subject line.

There are several types of I.F.:

- Sixteen hours fasting/eight hours eating (You can also choose 14/10 or 12/12). If starting with 16/8 is too difficult you can choose the lighter one and work up to the max.
- Fast for two consecutive days each week.
- Limit food intake to 500-600 calories on two non-consecutive days each week.
- Eating one meal per day for two days each week (consecutive or nonconsecutive)

The most popular type of I.F. is the 16/8 (I am currently on a 12/12 schedule with my target being 14/10. We eat dinner no later than 6:30 pm (when life runs as planned) and breakfast just after 7 a.m.). It normally takes two to four weeks for the body to become accustomed to the new routine. Those who make it through the transition period tend to stick with it most-

ly because they notice they feel better.

During the fasting period limit your liquids to water and caffeine free herbal teas. If you're just starting out and struggling, chicken, beef or bone broth can be consumed. Things to consider are staying hydrated, avoiding thinking about food (remember, the digestion begins in the brain followed by saliva secretion) and rest and relaxation.

One recommendation I found was to eat high-volume, low-calorie foods, which can include popcorn (plain or added spices), raw veggies and fruits with high water content such as grapes and melons. You can also

improve taste without the added calories using garlic, herbs, spices or vinegar. Flavor can also reduce the feeling of hunger. Focus on nutrient dense foods after fasting that are high in fiber and nutrients.

Studies have shown the main benefits as being weight loss, a reduction in insulin resistance and inflammation, heart health, brain health and anti-aging. Indepth studies are in their early stages. Many were short-term, small or conducted on animals. Even though higher quality human studies are still needed, Mark M., who has studied I.F. for 25 years, said that when the body goes without food, it ex-

hausts the body's sugar stores and starts burning fat (referred to as metabolic switching). One research study that was not designed to look specifically at I.F. found that limiting the daily window of eating does not prevent weight gain over time or yield significant weight loss. Reducing the number of large meals or eating smaller meals may be associated with minimizing weight gain and maintaining weight. What I didn't find in my research were any negative effects of fasting, unless of course it's abused.

ing, Type 1 diabetics or those with a history of eating disorders not fast. You should check with your primary care physician if you need clarification in regards to your current health status.

Fasting has been a part of life for thousands of years for various cultures. It offers the body time to rest and repair and aids in cellular elimination of waste products. A healthy lifestyle is about balance. It's about the choices we make and being honest with ourselves.



### Private Flood Insurance vs. FEMA Flood Insurance

### What's the Difference?

There are two types of personal primary flood insurance in the State of Florida. One is FEMA Flood insurance, in which a standard carrier will offer you up to \$250,000 on the Dwelling and up to \$100,000 in Contents. Those are the maximum flood limits that the Federal Emergency Management Agency will allow on a policy issued under the National Flood Insurance Program.

If you have a FEMA flood policy, you have two deductibles, one on the Dwelling and one on the Contents. FEMA has a standing rule that if you go more than 30 days without flood coverage, and you wish to purchase a new flood policy through NFIP, there will be a 30-day wait after binding until the coverage becomes effective.

What if the total insurable replacement cost of your home is more than \$250,000? What happens if there is a flood and you have only the \$250,000 with which to cover your home in the event of a flood loss, such as happened last year with Hurricane Ian? FEMA also has excess flood insurance available. but it's not easy to get. Several carriers have stopped writing excess flood in certain areas of the state, and those with NFIP policies have a coverage gap that may cost them in the event of a flood.

Private flood insurance offers more comprehensive coverage

and is specifically designed to give you the amount of insurance you need in order to protect your home, which is one of the most important, and expensive assets, you will ever have. Private flood will often offer limits as high as \$4 million on the Dwelling and up to \$500,000 in Contents.

There is one deductible for the loss itself, rather than separate deductibles for Dwelling and for Contents. Private flood also offers an endorsement for Additional Living Expenses, which National Flood Insurance policies do not offer. Private flood coverage may also be more expensive than NFIP flood insurance, but it covers more of your home than NFIP does. Another advantage to Private flood is that if you don't have flood insurance right now, but you need to get insurance quickly, Private flood has only a 10-day wait, rather than the 30-day wait required by FEMA when there is a lapse in coverage.

Which option is the best for



you depends on the size, quality and total insurable replacement cost of your home. Your agent is best suited to help you determine the total insurable replacement cost of your home by performing a Replacement Cost Estimator, using your square footage, year built, roof type, roof shape, number of bedrooms and bathrooms, flooring types, etc. If your replacement cost is more than \$250,000, you may wish to consider Private flood as a viable option in order to avoid a gap in coverage. If your home is smaller, the National Insurance Flood program might be the best option for you.

Whichever option you



choose, it is important to have flood insurance in Florida, as we live on a peninsula surrounded on three sides by the ocean or Gulf of Mexico. If you believe your home is not in a flood zone, I must remind you dear reader, water doesn't know that.

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
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## A Pastor's Ponderings: Who Are You Praying To?

"Jesus told this parable: Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood up and prayed about himself: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other men — robbers, evildoers, adulterers — or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.'"

"But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner."

"I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who

humbles himself will be exalted." (Luke 18:9-14, NIV)

#### **Cry for Mercy**

If you've ever smelled dead, rotting flesh, you will never forget it. The putrid odor fills the inside of your head with its decaying ooze. After a while, you stop noticing the stench as your body acclimates to the offense. Pride is like that. It leaves its owner oblivious. May God deliver us from such gross insensitivity.

Luke recounts a disturbing story in 18:9-14 as Jesus approached Jerusalem, the capital city of the proud. People thought prayers offered at the temple were especially effective. The devoted Jews chant the scriptures there three times a day – 9 a.m., noon, and 3 p.m. Jesus comments on two very different people praying at the Temple during the appointed time

The Lord's parable contrasts two characters. First, a Pharisee, who is so self-satisfied with his religious habits that he looks down his nose at others. And second, a tax collector, typically known for defrauding the people.

The Pharisee boasts of his spirituality in verse Luke 18:12. "I fast twice a week, I give a tenth of all that I get." He did not go to pray but to inform God and others how good he was. The Pharisee did not pray to God, he prayed with himself.

As a minister, I am often called upon to pray in public. I remember once giving the invocation at our city council meeting and, right at the "amen" moment, the Lord whispered to my heart, "Who are you praying to, Me or them?"

Convicted of my worry concerning what people think of me, I asked the Lord to forgive me. Pride often puffs itself up like a peacock because of the insecurity we feel inside. Self-doubt causes us to crave the affirmation of others.

True prayer is offered to God alone. Pray to an audience of

One. Praying to anyone else is idolatry.

In contrast to the Pharisee, Christ shows us a tax collector who enters the temple to pray with an altogether different attitude. Crying out to God, he wept for forgiveness. Jesus conveys not only his raw emotion but his humility. This man was not praying to himself. His was a cry for mercy.

Perceiving the greatness of God, the man was humbled. That man, says Jesus, "went home justified." Theologian Tryon Edwards adds, "True humility is not an abject, groveling, self-despising spirit; it is but a right estimate of ourselves as God sees us."

The Jewish Talmud adds, "He who sacrifices a whole offering shall be rewarded for the whole offering. He who offers a burned-offering shall have the reward of a whole burned offering. But, he who offers humility to God shall be rewarded as if he had offered all the sacrifices in the world."

God is not impressed with people who pray — Buddhists pray, Muslims pray, and Animists pray – all with little result. Baptist preacher Charles Spurgeon said prayer with faith and humility is the slender nerve that moves the mighty hand of God. Prayer calls out to our great God, expecting an answer. Humble prayer moves mountains and cleanses the stench of pride.

I remember as a newly ordained pastor entering my first church assignment. I excelled at the rigors of Bible College and oh my, wasn't the church lucky to have me. Yet, behind closed doors, my wife and I were in a stressful period in our marriage. My mind raced with all the things she did wrong. Angrily, I often reminded her of those things.

Soon, we had a visiting preacher come to the church. While he was speaking, the Lord convicted me of my faults, and

The people I come from are proud and self-sufficient, and they are not above eating ten-week old meatloaf that has turned Sea Foam Green. They cut their own hair. And their own lawns.

When I started travelling a lot for work, I hired a vardman to cut my grass. It only made sense. But it felt wrong. I was so guilty about it that I couldn't sleep. If my father were alive, it would kill him to know I pay a guy to mow my lawn.

I don't know why I just told you that.

Things have changed a lot since the days when I played with GI Joe. Today's radios have replaced Willie's style of music with country singers who have backup dancers.

Over the years, country music kept sinking lower, until it sounded about as interesting as your Uncle Lou using the bathroom in his RV.

Almost every song on modern country stations seems to be about girls in tank tops, or beer, or knocking boots. Much of this music is performed by young men wearing jeans that have been pre-ripped, or young women dressed like centerfolds.

They can have it.

Because I still remember Loretta, and George, and Johnny, and Merle. And I will always remember Willie.

I remember sitting in Chastain Park, in Atlanta. I watched Willie Nelson play to a tame crowd. It was drizzling rain. And Willie invited Jimmy Carter and his wife Rosalynn onto the stage.

People went crazy. It sounded like the crowd was going to tear the place apart. Then a hush fell over the audience.

The rain fell harder.

In this moment, Willie could have played any song and we would have loved him for it. He played "Amazing Grace."

Though, to tell you the truth, I couldn't hear Willie's voice because Jimmy and Rosalynn were singing too loud.

It was a great moment, seeing Jimmy and Rosalynn singing a hymn in inclement weather. It

After Willie sang a few more hymns, Jimmy and the others left the stage. It was still drizzling. And we all knew Willie was going to play it. All seven thousand of us. We just knew.

He started playing the familiar song.

I closed my eyes. All of a sudden, I was in my father's garage. Holding a GI Joe doll. Watching a skinny man. He was alive again, and he was beautiful. Even if only in my memory. He was happy. And so was I.

- 6. "Maybe a farmers market area, local vendors, concerts in the park, food trucks, oh, and some much-needed parking areas."
- 7. "Outdoor sound/sensory garden!!"
- 8. "Wouldn't a sensory park be wonderful?"
- 9. "Splash pads and sprinklers please!"
- 10. "Something like Ferry Park in FWB would be outstanding. But with Destin flair!"

"We will absolutely have a workshop and multiple chances for public input," Bobby said. If you have a suggestion for the parks, reach out to the mayor or city council and let your voice be heard.
