If you're a fan of the artswhether visually, musically or through their power of healing, and if you live anywhere in Okaloosa, Walton or Bay Counties, then you're likely already familiar with Mattie Kelly Arts Foundation (MKAF)-the outreach and events this organization has been bringing to Northwest Florida's Gulf Coast for almost three decades.

MKAF has grown from its humble beginnings to becoming one of the largest champions of the arts in our beautiful communities that dot this piece of paradise. MKAF is a mission-driven, membership based, not-for-profit organization, with all MKAF event proceeds going to support ArtsReach, the organization's outreach mission.

MKAF events do more than entertain the tens of thousands who attend them each year; they elevate the quality of the people, schools, groups and communities they



impact. MKAF events, such as the annual Festival of the Arts, various concerts, wine tastings and culinary gatherings might be thought of simply as entertainment or something fun to do, but the true mission and impact of the organization is about so much more than providing a good time for attendees and members. It's about making a measurable difference—a real and lasting impact for the betterment of our communities and the people MKAF serves.

Since its inception in 1995, MKAF has enlightened, empowered and educated more than 400,000 children in more than 100 schools and partner agencies throughout Northwest Florida's Gulf Coast. These exciting "Arts Empower" programs provide arts in our children's schools where, as you know if you have a student, much of the arts funding had been stopped. MKAF saw the need and is producing dynamic arts learning opportunities through its ArtsReach education initiative serving local K-12 students, at-risk youth and even those with disabilities through "Arts for All Abilities." A newer program, Paint the Music, is a collaboration between MKAF and

Recovery from addiction is hard. Resources are limited and the lure of drugs and alcohol can be overwhelming. But there is a resource in our area that helps women break the cycle of addiction, get and stay sober and create a normal, fulfilling life for those who wish to be free.

Freedom Life Compass is the brainchild of president and founder Stephanie Weidel, our hometown

hero, whose early life was far from a Leave It to Beaver episode.

"I grew up in a drug house," Stephanie says. "I fell into the lifestyle and started using at 11. Eventually, I became a high school dropout. I did a lot of things I'm not proud of."

Her father was a drug dealer who later served time in prison for selling methamphetamine. Her mother was a drug addict, as was her brother. Rex.

At age 23, Stephanie found herself homeless. So she joined the Army, the only service that would accept her without a high school diploma.

"The Army was great," she says. "It taught me discipline."

She spent 15 months in Iraq and when she came home, she learned her mother had become a born-again Christian. "I started attending Crosspoint church with my mom," Stephanie said. It was then that "Jesus transformed my life."

Today, the entire family is sober. Rex is the Executive Director of Project Hope Recovery Center Florida and Stephanie is the recovery minister at Crosspoint, Niceville.

To help her brother in his struggle to remain free of drugs, Stephanie started Freedom Life Compass. The organization, which opened its doors in April, grew into a ministry to help women caught in the same trap of addiction that Stephanie once was.

"Over the last five years, one

of the biggest needs was transitional housing for women," Stephanie says. "We saw a need She expressed that need at a meeting of Parakaleo (Greek for "Come alongside.) Among the listeners was Chris Shinnick, the

> women," Stephanie says. "We're helping anyone to take that first step."

One of the residents has been incarcerated in the past, but now has a length of sobriety under her belt and is looking for an apartment. The other has mental issues. "We got her off the streets," Stephanie said.

Part of the difficulty in setting up such an organization is the need for money. Because part of the requirements for help includes church attendance, no state or federal money is provided.

Crosspoint church had hosted a bazaar for 39 years. "They gave it over to us," Stephanie says. This year's Niceville Bazaar, supporting Freedom Life Compass, will take place Oct. 21 at the Niceville Mullet Fairgrounds between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Booths are \$100 but are free for non-profits. Last year, the first that Freedom Life Compass sponsored the bazaar, more than 5,000 people attended the free event. Because of the City of Niceville's grant of the grounds, Freedom Life Compass donates 5 percent of the proceeds to the city Fireworks Fund. It also donates 10 percent to another non-profit.

Recently, Freedom Life Compass hired Dave Glinka as Freedom House Manager to assist with re-entry programs. David, who spent 22 years in the Air Force as an Explosive Ordinance Disposal (EOD) technician, learned several years ago that C.A.L.M House, an organization for mothers in need, was looking for a director. He interviewed but was not hired, although six months later, the director left and he got the job, which he held for two years. On July 31, he began his duties at Freedom Life Compass.

"I take care of day-to-day operations, resources and case management, Dave says. "I brought a lot of networks. I know a lot of people in Niceville."

Volunteers are, of course, needed to provide transportation, lead devotions and help with events.

"Our vision is to help individuals coming out of life-controlling situations, such as trafficking, incarceration, homelessness, and addiction, find Christ-centered recovery and resources," states Freedom Life Compass material. "We can help begin to break the cycle of addiction and dysfunction in their lives and, in turn, change the course of their families' lives. Our Life Skills Center will provide job training, computer skills, administration training, and basic skills. Partnering with organizations in our community we will offer classes for financial management, business etiquette, dressing for success, and other essential skills needed to become a productive member of society.

Destin Charity Wine Auction Foundation Donates \$3.4 Million to 16 Local Children's Charities

Avenging 9/11: Courage to Accept a One-Way Mission of Unknowns

On September 11, 2001, 2,977 people were killed by Islamic terrorists on our own soil. Thousands more were injured. By the end of the day our government was in motion. The administration, state department, DOD and the intelligence agencies were working to find out who the perpetrators were and to plan a response. Al Qaeda, from their training camps in Afghanistan, were responsible. The Taliban were providing safe haven for their leader, Osama Bin Laden.

Joint Special Forces and CIA teams planned to take tribal leaders, ousted by the Taliban, back into Afghanistan to help start insurgencies against the Taliban. Then Special Forces teams augmented with U.S. Air Force tactical air controllers would work with the Northern Alliance tribes in order to locate and destroy the Taliban. While the Afghan insurgents would directly engage the Taliban, Special Forces and the Air Force tactical controllers would call in air strikes on Taliban targets.

The mission for the CIA and the Special Forces teams was the

same: defeat and destroy the Taliban and Al Qaeda.

Alex Hernandez, a CIA paramilitary and case officer, who was the deputy chief of CIA Team Alpha, describes the operation as a potential one-way mission filled with unknowns. He says the U.S. doesn't send its soldiers or agency officers on suicide missions but this was close. Alex likes to cite a rule of thumb he used during his military and agency careers: don't do anything stupid. He said this mission required an adjustment to that red line: don't do anything incredibly stupid.

Prior to Team Alpha's insertion, there was no ability to verify information from sources in Afghanistan. There would be no safety net, no rescue, and no medivac ability. The eight-man CIA Team Alpha was given the choice to say no. All said yes. They were mentally and emotionally committed to avenging 9/11. Alex told them to get one-million-dollar life insurance policies immediately.

Tribal warlord, General Dostum popped up on the radar through friendly Uzbekistan intelligence, as a leader who was



fighting the Taliban and needed help. The CIA wanted to find Dostum. Uzbek intelligence had his phone number. They talked via satellite used by ship to shore communication.

Team Alpha needed to validate the information they had received. Was Dostum for real? Or was he already captured and the Taliban was using him to lure the CIA in. Alpha needed to validate Dostum welcomed the U.S. Government, he had a viable fighting force, he was willing to fight the Taliban, confirm where he was, and determine his near-term needs. Dostum said he needed horse feed.

Dostum had no vehicles, only horses. Alex turned to his team and asked if anyone knew how to ride a horse. No one did. This would be on-the-job training.

The insertion plan was brief. Team Alpha would arrive on two

Blackhawk helicopters. The pilots were told not to take off right away. They were to remain for 20 to 30 seconds. If no one was shooting at the team when they got off, they would stay.

Team Alpha found themselves in a primitive and high threat environment. They met up with General Dostum who had approximately 300 to 600 fighters. The Taliban had 5000 to 7000 fighters. Team Alpha moved north with Dostum and his men. They were cold, tired, hungry, and didn't know what the outcome would be. The battlefield was perpetually fluid. You only owned the ground you stood on. The team did get uniforms for the fighters, so they could tell the good guys from the bad guys.

Dostum didn't speak any English though he understood some. He always had an "engineer" by his side. Engineers in Afghanistan were men who were better educated and spoke English. Team Alpha relied on Dostum for the next day's plans. He knew the men and the lay of the land.

Dostum talked with the enemy every day on unsecure walkie- talkies. Team Alpha helped Dostum "orchestrate" defections from the Taliban. The Taliban fighters were conscripted and were told their villages would be destroyed if they didn't fight. So, they had no loyalties. Dostum knew the fighters weren't being paid and told them he had friends here who would take care of them. There were 300 to 500 fighters defecting at one time. How did Team Alpha know these defectors wouldn't turn on them? After all, the defectors were a larger force than Dostum's men. Dostum positioned the defectors ahead of his men. When it was time for another attack on a Taliban force, the defectors were the ones leading the attack. Willingness to lead the charge demonstrated their reliability.

ODA 595 was the first Special Forces group inserted into a denied area in Afghanistan to topple the Taliban. The Joint Special Operations Command in northern Afghanistan was called Task Force Dagger. ODA 595 also had to learn to ride horses. The horses were not trained,

On September 1st, 2023, the sunshine on the seas got a little bit dimmer as we said Goodbye to a legend, Jimmy Buffett. According to a press release, the beloved singer-songwriter passed away at his home in Sag Harbor, Long Island, surrounded by family and friends. Of course, there was fun to be had, but the primary saying of each and every encounter was, "Yes, we like to party, BUT with a purpose." Time and again at each meeting, this concept was reinforced by the charitable donations of the fan club. Ranging from children's homes, to shelters for pets or people who are otherwise unable to find help, there is never a party without a close-to-home charity in mind!

In September, shortly after his passing, there was an exceptional party. However, as the purpose was a final send off for Jimmy, including the reading of a poem from one of the club members written to commemorate his passing, top rock tunes and memories of treasured times were passed all around among friends! saddles were made of cows' pelvic bones, and they had to jerry-rig the short stirrups with parachute cords. ODA 595 first headed to Uzbekistan on Oct. 5, 2001, then crossed into Afghanistan on Oct. 19 in an MH-47 Chinook helicopter.

Able to travel day or night, the horses allowed them to get around and behind the enemy, cutting them off from reinforcements or retreat. The horses allowed them to find the enemy's position in the primitive and rugged terrain and call in air strikes on Taliban targets. While occupying higher ground in order to have the best view of the land, trucks, machine guns, trenches, bunkers, and artillery, these Horse Soldiers of Afghanistan were not far from the fluid battlefield or the threat. ODA 595 executed offensive operations using the might of U.S. air power. The CIA was there to support ODA 595 and Dostum, and report back to the U.S.

On Nov. 10, ODA 595 and militia allies liberated the city of Mazar-e-Sharif from the Taliban. Weeks later, the Taliban surrendered in other areas of Afghanistan.

In November, 300 to 400 Taliban had surrendered to Dostum's men. They were taken to a 19th century fortress. Mike Spann and Dave Tyson, members of Team Alpha, began initial interviews. Spann and Tyson suspected there might be foreign fighters in the group who might know of a future attack planned against the U.S. Tragically, this was a "Trojan Horse" plan. The defectors turned out to be Al $Qaeda. \ They attempted to break$ out and killed Mike Spann. Dave Tyson fought his way out. It took three days to suppress the fighters. John Walker Lindh ("The American Taliban") was there, though Team Alpha didn't know this at the time. If the fighters had not been suppressed, they

would have killed everyone and undone the successful mission of defeating the Taliban.

Alex Hernandez says the collaboration between Team Alpha and ODA 595 was wonderful. He also credits the Air force, its B52 Bombers, the Navy and Marine fighter pilots along with the rest of the Special Forces, a British team similar to our Navy Seals, and, of course, General Dostum and his men with the successful mission.

1. Update your home. In this property insurance market, most of the standard carriers are imposing strict age guidelines on Roof, Heating, Wiring, and Plumbing. If you have recently replaced your roof, it is best to order a new mitigation inspection directly afterwards, and submit it to your agent.

Carriers acknowledge new inspections as of the date they are received by the underwriting department, rather than the date they are performed.

3. Check your Total Insurable Replacement Cost. Ask your agent to update your replacement cost estimator. Most standard carriers have some form of inflation guard on their policies, which is designed to keep your dwelling coverage at or above the level required in order to fulfill the Florida Valued Policy Law. Due to the

recent burst of inflation in materials and the costs of hiring a licensed contractor, some policies may experience a bigger jump in dwelling coverage from policy term to policy term. It is best to check with your agent to be sure your home is not over-insured.

4. Smart Water Protection System. Some newer homes have a Smart Water Protection system which automatically shuts off the water in the event of accidental leakage, and many carriers offer a good discount to policyholders for having this device installed in their homes.

5. Increase Deductibles. This is a valid way to reduce your overall property insurance premium. However, there is a downside. For one thing, if raising your deductible significantly increases your potential out of

pocket expenses in the event of a claim, you have to decide if you are prepared for that risk. Secondly, some deductibles can only be changed at renewal. If you change your wind deductible from 2% to 5%, you will have to wait another year before changing it back, so be sure to calculate your potential out of pocket exposure before making this decision.

In this rough market, it is difficult to shop rates between carriers, but the best time to do that is after hurricane season ends, which is in December.

The guidelines are always the toughest in high summer, so that by December, many of the carriers have relaxed their rules enough for people to move from carrier to carrier with much less fuss and expense, and that, dear reader, is what we all wantpeace of mind with less expense.

Cracking the Code: City of Destin Code Compliance

" ... a hometown community approach with the intent of creating strong bonds with residents and visitors" reads part of the mission statement for the City of Destin Code Compliance Department. They do what you'd expect them to do - work on matters of public concern such as monitoring and enforcing a variety of ordinances, codes and regulations related to zoning, land use, building codes, public nuisance, beach vendors, livery vessels and short and long-term rentals. For the latter, Code has experienced an 8% increase in short-term rental registrations and has just this year discovered about a dozen never-before registered shortterm rentals.

But they're striving to do even more.

Most recently, the Code Compliance Department has acquired new equipment to provide expanded services. All Code Compliance Officers are trained in CPR, and they were recently issued a water rescue disc and a portable flotation device (PFD) to respond to and assist with water rescues. The rescue discs are designed similar to a frisbee with a 100-foot cord attached to it, which allows an officer to throw this lifeline to a person in the water.

"We're often on the beach and by other waterways



throughout their day-to-day shifts," said Brian Eagar, Code Compliance Officer. "The rescue disk and inflatable life vest are valuable pieces of life-saving equipment that can assist in saving a distressed swimmer. Having this equipment helps us to be ready if any type of water-related incident occurs around or nearby us."

Code Compliance Officers were also issued first responder trauma kits that include a tourniquet, an emergency trauma dressing, a bleeding control dressing, two chest seals and a pair of rubber gloves.

"It is important to outfit our Code Compliance Officers with this equipment as they are routinely interacting with the public and driving around our community. Should there be an incident like a traffic crash, boat accident or some other emergency that we roll up on, we're now prepared to offer immediate life care measures that we were not able to do before. It's our hope that the community recognizes that we're more than an enforcement arm of the city and that we can also be of assistance in someone's time of critical need," said Troy Williams, Code Compliance Director.

The Code Compliance Officers were also issued the lifesaving opioid overdose reversal drug, Narcan, in the event they're called to a scene where it's needed.

"We began issuing this lifesaving drug to our Code Compliance Officers due to their frequency of contact with the public. It is well known the United States suffers from an opioid epidemic and we would be naïve to think that with as many visitors that frequent our great city that an overdose could not happen here. Narcan works to reverse the effects of a life-threatening opioid overdose or suspected opioid overdose. Again, we want to be able to provide an increased level of service to our community, both residents and visitors," said Williams.

Finally, the Code Compliance Officers were issued professional Big Easy brand "lockout" kits.

"All the officers have these kits in their duty vehicles," said Brian Davis, Deputy Code Director. "These kits are of great importance when considering instances where a pet or, heaven forbid a child, is accidentally locked in a car."

The Code Compliance Department aims to be much more than enforcing ordinances and writing citations. Williams said, "As we see it, part of our job is to avail ourselves of tools and equipment that better serve the whole community and create an atmosphere of public trust, transparency and accountability."

Although there are new faces, new equipment and new services offered, the hometown community approach is at the forefront of all they do. Within a week of acquiring the lockout tool, Code assisted a local resident who had locked her car keys in her vehicle while she was at work.

The City is holding a Code Compliance Workshop Monday, October 23 at 6 p.m. in the Annex. The workshop is open to the public and will offer the opportunity to meet with Code staff and ask any questions.

Inspect What You Expect. Home Inspections—Buyer or a Seller?

Home inspections are one of the privileges that a home buyer has when purchasing a home and are initiated once you have a contract in place. There are two purposes to have them done: one is to let you know what you are buying and the second is to find out if there are any issues that need to be addressed before you close and take possession of the home. There are many types of inspections. The two most common when purchasing a home are a Property Inspection and a WDO inspection:

Property inspection – the inspector conducts a thorough review of the home's most important components i.e., structure, HVAC, plumbing, roof, electrical system. If they find any issues, they will point them out or recommend that a licensed professional do further investigation. They can also do a wind mitigation report which gives more detail about how the roof was installed and constructed; consequently, the wind mitigation report may result in some homeowner's insurance benefits. My recommendation: DO NÓT WAIVE THE PROPERTY INSPECTION, even if the home is newly built. Keep in mind that if you're buying a "used" home, the inspector will most likely find items that are not up to today's building codes. That's normal. Also, know every item on the inspec-

mites. We want your home to be pest free (and if financing, so does your lender!).

Mold inspection – Checks for water intrusion and mold. Particularly important if there's been water intrusion, if mold remediation has taken place, if there are cracks in stucco, if something came up in the property inspection that warrants further investigation, etc.

Septic inspection – Sometimes buyers get a septic system inspection, sometimes not. It's recommended if the property has a system that's older and hasn't been inspected in several years, and/or if there's a problem flushing commodes or running water.

Foundation inspection – definitely recommended if you or the property inspector suspects an issue with the foundation.

Pool inspection – To make sure there's no evidence of leaks, if all the equipment is in working order, etc.

Why should Sellers get an

inspection done? Sellers often lose out, because things could have been prevented that either delayed or jeopardized the sale of their home. So, I recommend that you get a Property Inspection to mitigate what you can as early as you can in the sales process. If you have a home that you are putting on the market for sale, then get an inspection done beforehand. First, it allows you to know up front what needs to be repaired or replaced. Second, if you're handy, you just might be able to fix some of the items yourself which can save you money. Once you go under contract, anything that needs to be repaired/replaced by you now, contractually, has to be completed by a "licensed professional" (electrician, plumber, etc.)

Besides the list above, there are other inspections you can have done and the inspections you should consider having done all depend on the house you're buying or selling. For more information, consult with

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Insights for Investors: The Levers that Drive the Economy, Markets and Rates

This month we will do a review of the various levers – be those government, business or consumer that impact economic activity, the markets – stock, bond and money markets, and the cost of borrowing and the return when lending (bonds, CDs, money markets). A lever in the economy can have an impact on its own; or the collection of levers can have an even more significant impact.

Let's start with the **injection** of money into the economy during the pandemic. There was quite a lot of that. The U.S. government passed record spending bills and the Federal Reserve created massive amounts of money. Just a few short years later, we are still feeling the impact in that there is a significant excess of money out there, wherever that might be. That may have come to an end. Bloomberg notes that other than the wealthiest 20% of Americans, people in this country have run out of excess savings. That lever – stimulus by the Fed - in other words, may have dissipated. On its own that provided for a lot of money that for a while (due to the pandemic) was chasing too few goods and proved to be inflationary. And the government has spent the last year and a half trying to reduce inflation.

Next, energy prices, most notably the cost of crude oil, are a significant lever as well. Crude prices have climbed over 30% since June of this year. That could have an impact on inflation over the next few months, and perhaps the slowing of liquidity (cash) might balance that out. Only time will tell.

Deficit spending. Like it or not, when the U.S. government spends or overspends, that injects a form of stimulus in the economy. That lever has an impact in several areas, however. One, it increases economic activity, but it also drives up the U.S. debt and makes the government compete for borrowing - potentially driving borrowing interest rates up. A potential effect is that this slows economic activity because private borrowing goes down and the economy slows down.

The federal budget. Twothirds of the annual budget is made up of mandatory spending: Social Security and Medicare/ Medicaid and other entitlements. As that is required spending it becomes a lever because it means the government has less flexibility on where it spends money. There is also the interest that the U.S. Treasury must pay on outstanding debt; that number is approaching the same amount that is spent on Defense. Interest paid is a lever because once again the U.S. government must compete for money thus driving rates up, which has the potential impact of driving economic activity down. The rise in longer-term (10-30 years) bonds recently helps explain that.

Social Security is becoming a growing source of income for many retired Americans. The number receiving benefits is now just shy of 70 million people. Social Security gets income from payroll taxes (individuals pay about 6.2% from their paychecks and their employer matches that). SS also gets income from the approximate \$3 trillion in government securities that it owns (as of 2022 and with obligations of \$6 trillion). It also gets income when Social Security benefits become taxable (about 50% of recipients pay taxes on their Social Security income). Whether or not benefits per recipient rise or fall, the sheer number of recipients is growing as the number of Americans over 65 increases. We can consider this another lever and its impact is seen on economic activity as well

Rising long-term rates have an impact as well. For most of the past 18 months, interest rate increases were mainly at the short end of the yield curve (short maturities of 0 to 2 years). We are now seeing an increased supply of U.S. Treasuries and when supply goes up, prices usually go down. When prices for bonds go down, their yields go up. Result: the lever of rising rates impacts stocks – mainly growth-oriented or low-dividend stocks – the Technology Sector as an example – means institutional investors might sell growth stocks and invest in longer-term higher-yielding bonds. That impact was what explained some of the decline in growth and Tech sector stocks in September.

Real estate. We will start with housing. The higher yields have resulted in higher mortgage rates hence the slowdown in buying of new homes (existing or new construction). Many Americans who have locked in a low rate on their mortgages are reluctant to sell (despite their gains on their property) because that will push them into a higher-rate mortgage. Impact of the lever - fewer existing homes for sale. Add to it that the growth of new households continues (the U.S. population is expanding by more than 100k per month) and more people need and want homes. That has increased the demand for rental units for both homes and apartments. The Consumer Price Index includes the cost of shelter as its biggest component so we can see how that lever impacts inflation. There is also the lingering unknown of what the multi-trillion-dollar market of commercial real estate refinancing could have on the economy. This debt, which starts coming due at an accelerated rate over the next few years is mainly held by regional banks (vs. larger national or smaller local community banks). That lever could impact the banking sector and its ability to lend but only time will tell if that lever has a significant impact.

September and October have, over time, proven to be more volatile for investors and the exact reasoning isn't really known. Is it a lever or more part of the reality of long-term investing? Regardless, some investors will chase returns and make shortterm decisions even if they have long-term horizons. Many feel frustrated as perhaps not having owned the so-called super seven stocks which make up most of the market return year to date. We have seen over time that the tortoise tends to outperform the hare but that – FOMO, or fear of missing out, is a lever as well.

We believe that strategy is defined by goal, time frame and most importantly, comfort level (the sleep-at-night factor). And of course, a bit of patience. The ultimate lever for an investor or saver is all these things combined.

The U.S. dollar. Hardly a day goes by when we are not bombarded by ads, politicians or talk show hosts who talk about the decline of the U.S. dollar. There is fear that other countries will unite to bring about a new world currency or that foreign banks and governments will stop buying U.S. Treasuries. The reality, as of this writing, is that the U.S. dollar is up in value by over 2% year to date. 80% of world commerce and 60% of foreign central bank reserves are in the U.S. dollars. The dollar is always being challenged and is no stranger to the consistency of that challenge. The lever of the strength of the dollar can be seen in that it acts as a counterweight to inflation.

The size of the Federal Reserve balance sheet. That is the weekly reported statement of its assets and liabilities. In 2020 the Fed doubled the balance sheet to almost \$9 trillion dollars. It did that by creating money, which it can do, and buying bonds with it. Thus, it injected money into the economy. That lever cannot be understated. The balance sheet has had two growth spurts in the last 20 years, once following the financial crisis circa 2008 and most recently during 2020 as the pandemic took hold. That lever released liquidity and stimulus which many argue staved off an economic depression. The Fed is slowly reducing that balance sheet and is doing so by letting bonds it owns mature and not renewing them. They are not selling bonds as that lever could be dramatic on bond values and borrowing costs. That slow drawdown could take several years, and the impact of the lever is just that: liquidity. Some might argue that has helped with the so-called soft landing in the economy.

Productivity. The U.S. and the world rely upon productivity for increasing revenues, maintaining, or lowering the cost to

produce a unit of a good or a service. Productivity, at least in the U.S., despite inflation and rising rates has been increasing. The impact of that lever is significant in that it could lead to higher earnings and hence more growth for many U.S. companies.

Lastly, artificial intelligence. As we have noted before, AI has the potential to impact productivity and contribute to economic growth across just about every sector of the economv.

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Golf Series: Mattie's Legacy Lives On at Kelly Plantation

There's a street in Kelly Plantation called "Mattie's Way." It was named after the late Mattie Kelly, whose Irish and southern roots strongly influenced a scenic subdivision with a championship golf course, equestrian center, nature-centered walkways and jogging trails that included a 225-acre nature preserve. Mattie Kelly owned the land and didn't sell it until she found developers she trusted to plan the community in her name and with her vision.

Unfortunately, within the first few months of beginning the project, Mattie's life was cut short at only 80 years of age. But her dream continued in 1992 with gracious homes, manicured lawns and community covenants to insure a picture-perfect postcard community. Kelly Plantation Golf Club, the crown jewel in the middle of stunning scenery and designer homes, was fashioned by Fred Couples and Gene Bates. In the early 19th century, the land was part of a large turpentine industry with towering pines along miles of waterfront and intricate bayous. Kelly Plantation Golf Club was built along miles of panoramic views of Choctawhatchee Bay with 7,000 yards of contoured greens, wide manicured fairways, hazards and sand traps.

Beyond the golf course itself, the large clubhouse offers

diverse menu options to be enjoyed in the clubhouse or on the covered veranda overlooking a beautiful lake with views of the 9th and 18th greens. I remember attending the Blount-Bowden Scholarship award event for local college scholarship winners held one evening at Kelly Plantation Golf Club. Our granddaughter was awarded one of the scholarships. The evening was staged beautifully with large tents framing the veranda and a great sound system for Bobby Bowden to speak and present awards after a delicious meal

But, let's talk golf. This semi-private 18-hole golf course, nestled in the heart of Destin, is one of the area's premium golf experiences. The course stretches 7,099 yards which is a serious driving test for long hitters. Novice golfers enjoy the forward tees with easier layout and scenic appeal. Hole number 4 captivates with a panoramic view of Choctawhatchee Bay. Native flora such as magnolias and palmettos add to the beauty. Other lakes and sand traps often await an errant golf shot. So, the golfer should take ample precautions and keep drives safely in the manicured fairways.

Carts are GPS-equipped, so there is no excuse not to know accurate yardage. The challenge is to execute the perfect golf shot to be on a green in regulation. Prior to teeing off on hole number 1, a golfer can practice at the driving range, and chip and putt around practice bunkers and a lush practice green. Large bins of cold apples await golfers, so vitamins as well as liquid refreshment provide extra energy when needed.

In addition to the main clubhouse, there is also an Owners' Club House. It has a large patio deck, grill, pool and kids' playground. The Club House is the heart of Kelly Plantation's an-



nual social events in addition to the Board and Town Hall meetings throughout the year.

Golf course manager John Townsend, who began his career in various golf management positions for courses both in Georgia and in the Jacksonville and Tallahassee areas, considers Kelly Plantation the pinnacle of golf courses. Graduating from Valdosta State in the late 90's with a degree in sports medicine, John accepted a unique golf management position and found that golf management was what he truly enjoyed. Now, assisted by Robert Whitt, head golf professional, John tells us that the positive post-pandemic numbers for golfers playing 18 holes at Kelly Plantation has continued with tee times costing between \$189 and \$129 for an 18-hole round of golf (depending on time of day.) Hole number 7 is John's favorite, because there are two angles or options from the tee box.

Kelly Plantation gives back to the community with at least several charity tournaments. They take pride in hosting two annual tournaments, one for Children in Crisis and one for the Children's Advocacy Center.

So, would Mattie be pleased if she looked down from the

heavens today at her vision for the old turpentine industry? I can imagine her bright, smiling eyes and sense she would be thrilled with the gated community and the clubhouse at the center of her dream. Perhaps she might be singing, "When Irish eyes are smiling, Sure, 'tis like a morn' in spring. In the lilt of golfers' laughter You can hear the songbirds sing. When golf strokes are rewarded With pars and birdies, too. Yes, my course will make you happy, It may steal your heart away."

Alabama will face Ohio State in a semifinal round game at 6 p.m. central time on Friday, Nov. 24, while Oregon will play Santa Clara at 8:30 p.m. The

third-place game will be played at 3 p.m. on Saturday Nov. 25 with the championship game scheduled for a 6 p.m. tip off on that Saturday.

Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the final Associated Press basketball poll, posting a 31-6 record while winning both the SEC regular-season and postseason tournament titles. Under the guidance of coach Nate Oats, Alabama was the top overall seed in the 2023 NCAA Tournament, while advancing to its ninth Sweet 16 Tournament appearance in school history.

Oregon advanced to the



quarterfinal round of the 2023 NIT en route to a 21-16 record. The Ducks have won 20 or more games in each of Dana Altman's 13 seasons as head coach, advancing to the 2017

Ohio State went 16-19 in 2022-23 and was ranked No. 52 in the final NET rankings.

Santa Clara had a 23-10 record last year — the most regular season wins at the school since the 1968-69 season — while advancing to the NIT.

Other games at Northwest Florida State College on Friday Nov. 24 have Mercer playing Tennessee State at 11 a.m., while Southeastern Louisiana meets Western Michigan at 1:30 p.m. These teams will play their second game Nov. 25 with tip offs at 10 a.m. and 12:30 p.m.

"We're excited about the rich tradition of this year's tournament field," said tournament director Maury Hanks, chief executive officer of Global Sports. "We continue to strive to bring the best college basketball teams possible to the Emerald Coast of Florida."

Shayla in Power Rangers: Wild Force. "When I moved from LA, I wondered, what do I do now?" says Ann Marie. "All I'd ever done through life is act. So I started teaching. I like to help the next generation of actors along this great path." Ann Marie liked Kevin's voice, but saw greater things for him. "I said, why don't we put him on camera?"

Six weeks later, Kevin was cast in the movie "Atlantic Rim" as an extra. Ann Marie was the casting director and fellow actor Steve Marlow said he liked Kevin's voice, which earned Kevin an invitation to her open call designed to meet new talent. Local voice actor Johnny Alexander brought his boom box and they played Kevin's demo. She signed him on the spot. So far, Kevin has had roles in about 30 movies, including seven as the lead actor. He has completed more than 150 voice-over projects as well.

One of his proudest voiceover gigs was as a volunteer for WUWF 88.1's Sightline program.

"We read stories – cold, no rehearsal – from the Pensacola News Journal to our blind and visually impaired audience," he says. "I also narrated 55 children's books for WUWF's 'The Children's Hour.' In nine years, I logged a total of 770 volun-



teer hours with WUWF. I admit to being proud of that. Volunteering at WUWF was a way I found to give back to the community for all the good fortune I've had in my life."

Later, he saw an ad on Facebook for automated recording - dubbing - working with award-winning director Benh Zeiten, who won an Oscar for "Beasts of the Southern Wild." "He was the nicest, sweetest guy," Kevin remembers. One of Kevin's favorite roles was that of Mr. X in a short indie film titled "X's and O's." An actress played Mrs. O in the film, which won the audience award at the 2015 Kite Film Festival in Destin. "It was very good exposure," he says.

While acting looks easy, sometimes it's difficult. Kevin's toughest role was in a series out of Milton called "Kookville." "I got two days' notice," Kevin said. "An actor had dropped out and I got his role."

On top of that, he says, "The

script was so wordy, there was so much to say. It was hard for me to retain all the lines."

What does the future look like for Kevin?

"I hope to keep working," he says. "As you get older, parts are few and far between on camera, but voice is alive and well." To that

end, he has acted in several audio drama series, the newest of which is "The East Haven Eight." "All I have to do is get the scripts, do my lines and send it in," Kevin says. The series is about eight teens who, caught in an exploding building, develop superpowers. He plays the hard-boiled news reporter constantly grilling the kids about their powers.

He's also signed for an upcoming local documentary about a man who helps people. He's not well-to-do, but has made helping others his life work.

It's been an interesting trip for Kevin Gaddie, from two decades as a Navy journalist to voice-over actor to the silver screen. But it's not over yet. "I'd like to say I'm thankful and humble for all the good fortune I've had in film and voice-over in these last 10 years," he says. "I wish I had found this years ago, but it's not too late."

Your body may use physical sensations to tell you things like you're overwhelmed, it's time to rest, slow your pace, set a boundary, reduce commitments, tend to your relationships, nourish yourself more intentionally, prioritize sleep, say "no" more often, make a new friend, make a doctor appointment, ask for help, play more, prioritize fun. When you don't make time to listen, you're missing wisdom that can bring more health and balance to your life. So, you want the wisdom your body is trying to share, but how are you supposed to listen?

5 Ways to Listen to Your Body

1. Slow down and breathe. Try stopping 3x per day to do 2 minutes of deep breathing which is about 20 slow breaths. While breathing, intentionally notice where you are holding tension or discomfort in your body. Think about releasing the tension while you breathe and make note of patterns as you breathe over days and weeks. Try adding reminders in your phone for breathing time for the first 4 weeks of practicing deep breathing.

2. Determine your baseline for stress and calm. When you practice deep breathing, notice the difference between how your body feels when you are under stress and when you find a space of calm. Notice how your breathing is different, notice how tension in your body is different, notice how your thoughts are different, notice how your energy level is different, notice how your body temperature is different. Note the differences so you can check in with yourself daily and become more familiar with the physical sensations that occur when you are moving into a stressed state.

3. Study how your body expresses emotion. Notice discomfort in your body such as tension, aches, sweating, change in heart rate, tingling, or itching. Try matching your physical experiences to feeling words. For example, when I feel happy, I smile, have

stomach butterflies, my limbs feel light, I have high energy. When I feel angry, I clench my jaws, feel hot, sweat increases, my tone of voice becomes abrupt. Naming your physical sensations with feeling words guides you to more insight.

4. Match your feeling word to a thought or external circumstance. Explore what thoughts or situations may have preceded the feeling. For example, I felt happy when my husband surprised me with cake for no reason. I felt angry when I was thinking about a past time when a friend talked about me behind my back. Think about how the experiences or thoughts connect with the feelings and what that might mean for you on a deeper level.

5. Determine what wise action might be needed based on insight gathered from listening to your body. Feelings and bodily sensations may indicate it's time for: a conversation, a change of pace, a change in self-care, a different relationship boundary, a different bedtime, a healthier coping tool, facing issues rather than avoiding, more information, increasing support.

Grounding - Why Should You Be Doing It?

Back in the early eighties, there was a really cool eatery/ bar off one of the side streets just outside downtown Denver. They had these thin black cyl-

inders hanging from the ceiling spaced every few feet. I inquired as to what they were and discovered they dispersed negative ions which calms the patrons. My response was hmmm.

Fast forward to our current day and the practice of grounding is becoming more mainstream for the benefits it claims. My search into the why and how of this practice took me down the road of physics, geophysics and quantum physics. These areas are definitely outside my wheelhouse but proved to hold the answers I was looking for.

In physics, grounding is the process of restoring the electrical connection with the earth. The earth can serve as an electron donor as needed because of its ability to disperse charge, positive and negative, and not just as an electron accepter as in a lightning rod. Our air is an insulator and the human body is conductive. That's why we are more susceptible to being shocked if we're in the open during a lightning storm.

When I conduct insulation inspections in attics, I normally come out with sweat on my forehead and sometimes, depending

on the inspection and time of year, I am completely drenched. This is normal and we all sweat to keep our bodies cool. When our home sweats, that's normally an indication of a problem.

Receiving calls from concerned homeowners about sweating vents and equipment is common at ECES. There can be many factors which cause condensation in the home; ultimately it is the dew point in the home and our attics. Dew point defines the point at which air will become saturated and condense. Simply, the air can't hold any more moisture and creates dew. So, why do I have moisture on my vents? Ductwork is a system or network of ducts which bring cool air to the different rooms and living areas of our homes. When heating and cooling companies install the air ducts in a home, the contractors are working with many separate pieces. While the workers strive to connect each piece as tightly and securely as possible, leaks and gaps in the ducts might still occur. This can happen in new and older homes. When these gaps and leaks occur, the conditioned air leaks out into our attics. A typical home can experience close to 20% of conditioned air



loss from leaking ducts. If the leaks are big enough, even more loss can occur costing you money and comfort. One common problem when ducts and vents are not sealed properly is condensation or sweating. These tiny drops build up around and on the vents causing issues, like mold.

Another problem we come across is cracked seals and loose boots. Maybe you had a security system installed or needed cable ran into a room which wasn't wired. Most of the time you need a technician to go in the attic and navigate in a hot, hard to walk around, dark area while performing these services.



Ductwork tends to run in the same places these wires need to be ran and sometimes ductwork is used as railing or support by the technician so they don't end up putting their foot through the ceiling. Putting pressure on ductwork can cause loose boots around vents and cracked seams. These are less common, but do happen and unfortunately are unseen because they happen in the attic. More common is that over time, our seams, connectors, tape and vent boxes fail over time due to the harsh environment they are in. Failing tape is most common. The duct tape, which was used, becomes brittle and can no longer keep a tight seal. Good news is that repairing these leaks is a simple one. Foil tape, expandable foam and mastic (which are a type of paste applied to seams when foil tape can't seal) is used to reseal these leaks keeping the conditioned air flowing for years to come. We tend to forget how important these systems really are and how important it is to maintain them. It is always a great idea to schedule an inspection and improve the efficiency of our largest investment, our homes.

Meet Madame Director Paula Hilton

20 Years Down the Line, This Mystery Train Shows No Signs of Slowing Down

In the interest of full disclosure, I have been involved as an actor, stage manager and errand boy with the local comedy troupe Act4Mystery since 2005. Paula Hilton founded the troupe in 2003 and, upon my joining two years later, they started to get really good.

Ms. Hilton is the group's writer, director and occasional actress. She is referred to affectionately by her actors as "Madam Director." "When I started this, I didn't know how much work would go into it, even just one production – getting everything organized and agreed upon with the venues, as well as dealing with the actors' schedules and personal problems."

For Ms. Hilton, the last two decades have been a learning experience, "but it hasn't taken away my enjoyment and love of this. If I didn't enjoy it, I wouldn't be doing it, because it's so hard.

"And I couldn't do it without help. In the beginning, my mom did all the sewing, my daughter Rochelle acted in the shows, and my dad built props." Rochelle is also the group's choreographer and ran the group when Ms. Hilton lived in Gainesville to undergo cancer treatment in 2006 and 2007. Ms. Hilton's youngest daughter, Jessika, has acted in a handful of shows, too.

Prior to moving to Fort Walton Beach, Ms. Hilton lived in California and acted in murder mystery productions. "I was performing someone else's shows, and then I decided to write one. I presented it to my director, and she made some suggestions – trimming dialogue, that was something I had to learn.

"When I moved here, there wasn't a murder mystery company as far as I knew. I felt like it would be something different and that it could benefit the community."

She talked her sister, Dr. Julie McNabb, into letting her put on her first show for the nonprofit Horizons (now the Arc of the Emerald Coast), where Dr. Mc-Nabb served as CEO. That first show, "Peace, Love and Murder," encouraged the audience to dress up in their best hippie duds and sold out two nights in a row.

"I didn't have any actors, but several people on the Horizons board were actors or knew somebody that acted," says Ms. Hilton. "That first show had seven actors, and I used some of them for other fundraisers." Act4Mystery performed its first public show at the now-defunct Summerhouse restaurant.

Cast members have come and gone, but some have stuck around for as long as Kenan Thompson has been on SNL. "Kay Yarbrough, who was on the Horizons board at the time, acted in the first show and is still with us." Joe Chase, a Stage Crafters veteran, and the multitalented Cynthia Bergquist have been an integral part of the troupe for nearly as long.

When Ms. Hilton first held auditions, she put a notice in the local newspaper. One notable, Michelle Dellafave, called and said she was interested. "I asked if she had any experience, and she said, 'Well, I was on the Dean Martin TV show and toured with Bob Hope...' She was great." Ms. Dellafave currently lives in New York and continues to perform.

The Act4Mystery founder has written 38 shows, the most recent being 2022's "Murder on a Ghost Walk." "I try to write one show a year, but I haven't been able to in 2023," she says. "We've been very busy. We did three performances of three different shows in August and I had to bring in new people. So, we had to have about four rehearsals for each of those."

Ms. Hilton does have several "note files" for new shows kick-

ing around, but hasn't been able to write due to her full-time job and some time-consuming family health issues.

The only thing that almost derailed this mystery train in the last 20 years was – you guessed it – COVID. "We didn't perform for 14 months," she says. "My scripts are licensed all over the world, and none of those groups were performing either. I think I only wrote one show and cleaned up some of the older ones."

But, let's focus on the highlights. "The performances are always wonderful," says Ms. Hilton. "There have been a ton of clients I've enjoyed working for, and I just loved our annual awards parties. Recognizing you guys and your hard work, dressing up, handing out trophies... We did the last one right before

COVID, and I hate to say no to doing another one."

This fall, Act4Mystery has some private parties lined up which, Ms. Hilton says, are always a blast. The troupe has performed in a variety of venues, including intimate living rooms, a backyard tent, a train in Milton and the Air Force Armament Museum.

This month, you can catch "Killer in the Kitchen" – an elaborate cooking show spoof – at 790 in Destin (Thursday, Oct. 19) and the board game-inspired "Murder Without a Clue" at Samuel's Roadhouse in Crestview (Saturday, Oct. 28).

"I love writing the shows and then watching my characters come to life," she says. "And when the audience laughs at something I've written, that's mind-boggling sometimes."

Whereupon she ceremoniously finished the bottle.

I also played piano in church, and at every Baptist function including fifth-Sunday sings, Decoration Day potlucks, and VBS. Most Baptists turned a blind eye to my nocturnal habits.

I attended community college as a 30-year-old man. I rectified my high-school misgivings. And I learned how to spel prety good.

And somehow, here I am.

I have an overbite, red hair. and a list of bad habits which

"There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and lived in luxury every day. At his gate was laid a beggar named Lazarus, covered with sores and longing to eat what fell from the rich man's table. Even the dogs came and licked his sores."

"The time came when the beggar died and the angels carried him to Abraham's side. The rich man also died and was buried. In hell, where he was in torment, he looked up and saw Abraham far away, with Lazarus by his side. So he called to him, 'Father Abraham, have pity on me and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, because I am in agony in this fire.""

"But Abraham replied, 'Son, remember that in your lifetime you received your good things, while Lazarus received bad

things, but now he is comforted here and you are in agony. And besides all this, between us and you a great chasm has been fixed, so that those who want to go from here to you cannot, nor can anyone cross over from there to us."" Luke 16:19-26

Charles Sheldon tells the story in his classic novel, "In His Steps," about a young pastor walking to his church early one cold Sunday morning. As he approaches the white-steepled church in the center of their village, the sight of a homeless man sleeping on the front lawn of the church disturbs him.

The people arrive, and the pastor ascends the pulpit to begin the service. A moment later, the homeless man shuffles in the back door. He plops in the last row, a rumpled mess, as people move away from his smell.

Later, as the pastor closes in prayer, he notices the man slip out the door. The people then greet the pastor at the door and congratulate him on his fine message. Finally, after locking up the church, the reverend turns to walk home and discovers the man asleep again on the lawn.

The pastor can't take it anymore, so he approaches the bedraggled figure and shakes him. "Wake up! You can't sleep here. Move on.'

The man doesn't stir, so he rousts him again in utter frustration, "Get up and go!" It's then he realizes the man is dead.

Stunned, the pastor staggers backward. "Oh no, my message was the last words he heard. Was he ready to meet the Lord?'

"Lord, did we show him your love?" He cries out in his heart. No one had taken the time to talk with the homeless man.

God feels the sorrow of hurt-

ing people, even when we don't. It is the driving passion moving him toward each of us. The Lord feels human pain.

Christ gravitates toward grieving, sick, and poor people. It also moves Him toward us. Compassion is Jesus repeatedly reflected toward the hurting. Written into the DNA of Christians everywhere, this emotion moves us as well. Too often, selfishness is the roadblock that derails kindheartedness.

In Luke 16:19-31, Jesus paints the picture of the rich man and Lazarus. The rich man basks in the sunlight of luxury. Meanwhile, poor Lazarus suffers at the gate with only dogs to lick the pus from his sores. This contrast between the

wealthy and the deprived is glaring. As the story unfolds, both characters die and arrive in vastly different eternal dwellings. The rich man enters hell with all of its torments, not the least of which is the ability to see Lazarus and those who have entered paradise in the "bosom of Abraham."

There are two distinct realms of life after death. Jesus leaves no space for evading the ultimate reality of heaven or hell. Our destiny is determined by our faith and how we act upon that belief.

This parable forces us to look beyond this life to see the inseparable link between life now and how we spend eternity. Death is not an ending, but the transition to eternal life. The story is both a harsh warning and a harbinger of hope as the question lingers, "Where will we spend eternity?"

Lazarus did not go to paradise because he was poor, nor did the rich man go to hell because he was wealthy. What happened to their souls during their lives?

In this passage, there was not a word of anger, resentment, or despair from Lazarus. He found comfort and life eternal in the arms of God.

In contrast, the rich man bathed in contentment, never noticing the starving beggar at his gate. His heart remained untouched by the mercy of God. Callous disregard for Lazarus was the shovel that dug the great chasm. His sin was not noticing the pain of others.

Christ is calling us to give compassion toward the poor. Jesus is always pro-people. We should ache with the hurting and grieve for the less fortunate.

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LOCASH: From the Studio to Your Playlist to the MKAF Stage

One of Country's Hottest Duos Brings Their Party to the Salt Water Music Fest

If you're a fan of high-energy rocking country, combined with catchy songwriting and the remarkable stage presence that goes with great live entertainment, then you're probably already familiar with LOCASH and the success this duo has garnered over the past decade-anda-half in the ever-competitive world of country hitmakers.

LOCASH was originally formed back in 2006 by singer-songwriters Chris Lucas and Preston Brust who had each headed to Nashville to pursue their dreams of making a living writing and performing country music. Jump ahead 17 years and lots of time in the studio, on the road and on the stage, and they're established family men as well. Chris, a native of Baltimore, Md., along with his wife, Kaitlyn, and their three children call Tampa home, while Preston, originally from Kokomo, Ind., and his wife, Kristen, and three children reside in the Nashville area.

The duo has had an impressive share of cuts turned hits, both recorded by LOCASH and those performed by other well-known country artists; like the number one, "You Gonna Fly," written by LOCASH and Cadillac Three's Jaren Johnson, and performed by Keith Urban. The duo, along with close musical friends Chris Janson and Danny Myrick, also wrote Tim McGraw's, "Truck Yeah." But they've charted their own country hits, too, like their Platinum breakout "I Love This Life," and their number one Gold hits, "I Know Somebody" and "One Big Country Song."

As a duo they've earned eight charting singles, cut three studio albums and garnered over 820 million global on-demand streams. LOCASH has also received a healthy dose of acknowledgements and accolades, including a recent Vocal Duo of the Year nomination at the 56th Annual CMA Awards.

As a fan of LOCASH's writing and ability to work the crowd, I've seen the duo perform live, and I can tell you that you don't want to miss their upcoming headlining performance as part of Mattie Kelly Art Foundation's inaugural, threeday Salt Water Music Festival, happening October 12-14. It also includes performances by the talented Macy Gray, as well as top Nashville singer-songwriters, Ben Burgess, Josh Mirenda, Jared Mullins, Jordan Minton and Jordan Reynolds.

I sat down with Chris and Preston to find out a little more about their thoughts on everything from the ever-changing music industry, their patriotism, being named honorary guardians of Space Force, and their love of our beautiful beach towns

Both of you have been very vocal about being strong supporters of our military, showing your patriotism by traveling abroad many times to perform at U.S. bases around the world. What transpired to cause LOCASH to be so passionate about our country and the men and women that defend it?

Chris: Preston has a brother that was in the Air Force, and my dad was in the Army, and my great granddad was in the Army. In fact, he actually rode with Teddy Roosevelt, as one of the Rough Riders, which was awesome. With that background, when me and Preston got together we just said, "We've got to do something to support our men and women in uniform." They mean the world to us, and we couldn't do what we do without the freedoms we have because of our military.

I'm sure seeing what you two have seen in your travels to perform to our troops in other parts of the world really paints a clearer picture of how good we all have it in this great country.

Preston: Yeah, traveling to some of those bases to perform, and seeing other parts of the world, then comparing the freedoms we have, really puts it in perspective. When you get back in the states and think about how different it is at home, it's just an awesome feeling, you know. That's one of the reasons we wrote, "Three Favorite Colors." We wanted to stand proud and say how we feel about our freedoms and those who make them possible.

Speaking of military, you guys were recently named Honorary Guardians of U.S. Space Force. Tell me about that and how that came to be. Were either of you space fanatics?

Chris: Yeah, man, I mean for years, when we were on the road, I used to go on Space.com all the time. I mean, no joke, I was literally into what asteroids were close, what satellites were going up. It just all really intrigued me.

Preston: He was on Space. com, and I was on Playboy.com [laughing, jokingly]. Really, with all the military stuff we were doing, General Whiting just asked us to get involved, after President Trump started Space Force [in 2020], a lot of people joked about it, and no one seemed to know what Space Force was or what they did. So, we got involved and started helping to spread the word, and they made us Honorary Guardians. I mean who else would you want to protect the world, but LOCASH? [laughing]

You guys have had success both as performers of your own songs, and as

songwriters for other hits like Keith Urban's "You Gonna Fly" and Mc-Graw's "Truck Yeah." I've seen you perform live and you really bring it. But, what is your favorite side of it, writing or performing, or do you like both equally?

Preston: I think it's pretty equal for us. Just being on stage and giving those people 45 or 75 or 90 minutes and reaching those people live is just fun. When I see one little kid, just screaming out the song lyrics at the top of his lungs, that's when I know we've done something right.

Chris: Like with the song, "I Love This Life," when we are up there playing that and you see people singing along, and you know they know the words, because that song has impacted them in a positive way, there's no better feeling than that.

What's your favorite LOCASH song you've written?

Chris: It's probably, "I Love This Life," because, you know, it was our first one to go up the charts, and you never forget your first. That song felt like the little train that could. It just kept climbing the charts. It was just cool to watch music do what it's supposed to do. Just for two guys who've worked so hard to get to that moment, and then to watch it happen... I love this life, for sure.

What about a favorite song the two of you have written for another artist?

Preston: You gotta love [Tim] McGraw's "Truck Yeah," and "You Gonna Fly" [performed by Keith Urban]. There's actually some songs

we've written that haven't even gotten picked up yet that I probably love even more than either one of those.

I've asked multiple long-time artists I interview—from the iconic Jimmy Buffett to Kenny Chesney to STYX to Alan Jackson and Sara Evans—this same question: In the time you've been in the industry, how have you seen it change, and what do you see coming for the future of music and how you as artists navigate this everchanging landscape?

Preston: I tell you, Will, there's been a ton of changes, and it's easy sometimes to get discouraged. Because sometimes the music industry changes so quickly that you have to adjust your next move, whether it's methodically, touring, business wise or even social media. I mean, I remember when MySpace was a thing, then sitting down and starting our first Facebook page, and realizing we could have a music Facebook page, too. And just when you have watched all those things evolve, and start to get used to where it's headed, streaming comes along, and it's like, boom! Now it's not just about country radio, it's about all the streamers you have to reach: Spotify, Pandora, Apple-all of these outlets where people are consuming music. So, now even that is beginning to change. One thing I love about Chris and me, is that we've always kinda been able to adjust, and move with the industry. I see really cool things coming. I mean, we just did a show in California a couple weeks ago, for a company called HitKor. It was a really cool thing, because we were able



to do a live show on stage, while also performing globally, online. Fans just pay one ticket price and they can watch from home anywhere in the world! HitKor is making that record live, and then it can be used on radio, on streamers and other places too. So, it's amazing how people are learning to adapt and share music in the industry. Back when we started in '06, people couldn't wait to get an album out, and now you don't even need an album-a lot of times it's just a song. And now sometimes it's not even a whole song. Trending sounds are becoming wildly popular online.

As for projects beyond the music, tell me a little about the new I Love This Life' podcast you guys have launched. You have mentioned it's going to be no-holds-barred conversations, and you promise to keep it raw and real. What does that entail and how did the podcast come to be?

Preston: Man, one of my favorite things about our career is the stories. The places we've been and the things we've done, like "Remember that time we

did this or that?" We'll be sitting on the bus and telling stories and we get to laughing and we always say, "Man, no one would ever believe that if we told that story." So, we just decided to start telling those stories, because that's what life is about. It's about looking forward to things, but also reliving some of those fun moments and stories from the past. [Fans can find LOCASH's I Love This Life podcast on YouTube and Apple.]

I know you guys have played quite often along the beach communities of Northwest Florida's Gulf Coast, including shows in Fort Walton Beach to playing Gulf Coast Jam in PCB. What are your thoughts on the area? Have you also vacationed here over the years?

Chris: We definitely have

vacationed there with our families. Even recently when we played in Fort Walton [The Block], we stayed an extra couple of days. We were staying in Destin last time. I love Destin. The Emerald Coast is just beautiful, and this time, the family is going to be there. We love playing there. It's great to look at the water, and jump in before jumping on stage. And especially with the military bases being there, it's a wonderful place for us to play.

Grits), bloody mary or mimosa, and coffee or tea. A limited kids menu is also available.

The brunch menu (Saturday and Sunday 7 a.m. to 2 p.m.) features many plates from the breakfast menu, plus special brunch items including starters such as the Coconut Chia Seed Parfait; Shrimp Cocktail; Emerald Coast Smoked Fish Dip; and Deviled Eggs.
