

which sets a new benchmark for marine life experiences. Further, this announcement was accompanied by news of an upcoming renovation to welcome manatee rehabilitation and the launch of "C.A.R.E. on the Coast," an event championing sea turtle conservation. These developments represent significant strides in the park's ongoing commitment to the preservation and education of marine life, promising enriching encounters for all visitors.

#### **Dolphin Oasis**

Gulfarium Marine Adventure Park was excited to inaugurate its highly anticipated Dolphin Oasis during a momentous ribbon-cutting ceremony on March 8, 2024. The event marked a significant milestone for the renowned marine park and the region's attractions, drawing esteemed guests including local dignitaries, politicians and business leaders.

Spanning 2.2 acres of sandy dunes and palms along the picturesque emerald waters of the Florida Gulf Coast, Dolphin Oasis reflects Gulfarium's com-

### Impact100: Aid Multiplied by Collective Giving

When Joni Wallace, the current President of Impact100 of Northwest Florida, thinks about the hope this organization can bring to our community, it comes down to this: Multiply success by collective giving.

The goal in 2024 is for Impact100 NWF to have 500 members by April 30th, all paying a \$1000 membership, to change the trajectory of a non-profit in each of these five key areas:

- Arts and Culture
- Education
- Environment, Recreation, and Preservation
  - · Family
  - Health and Wellness

With 500 members, it means that a \$100,000 grant can be given to five non-profit organizations that will multiply the health of the community it serves in ways that will have generational impact. As Joni points out, "You could certainly write a check for \$1000 and give it to a non-profit who would certainly appreciate it and use it. But when you give \$100,000 as a collective gift, that is what takes a nonprofit to the

next level. It's transformational, no matter how transformational is defined. \$100,000 is a big investment."

The local chapter started in 2012 with 12 women from both Okaloosa and Walton counties. They dreamed about the changes that could happen when this level of generosity is given to local nonprofits and decided they wanted to be part of this international movement. Its mission: To be a collective force for good; uniting and empowering women to give together, creating transformational impact, locally and globally.

One such recipient in 2023 was the EOD Warrior Foundation under the Health and Wellness category. They strive to support the quality of life and reduce the challenges that come from volunteering to take on one of the most dangerous jobs in the military, the safe disarming and disposal of bombs and other explosives. EODWF recognizes that members of the Special Forces have the highest rate of suicide and mental health struggles that can lead to phys-



ical and familial instability. The grant from Impact100 NWF allowed them to expand their care by directly affecting two critical parts: Updating and renovating the EODWF building and expanding existing support as well as creating new programmatic support.

It's not just locally started non-profits who benefit. Even more well-known international organizations who want to serve locally, such as The Salvation Army, applied to Impact100 under the "Family" category. With its grant, The Salvation Army bought a disaster response vehicle and went to Northern Florida

after Hurricane Idalia, serving 500 meals per sitting. The truck was equipped with Starlink, and it gave those who were affected a chance to reach out to family, offering some peace of mind during a devastating time. The truck doesn't just operate during natural disasters. Every week, the truck goes to Crestview on Tuesdays to feed the hungry, a day when meals aren't so readily available.

Both of these programs would have been impossible to grow with a single \$1000 donation, and it would have delayed critical services as funds were gathered. However, with 100

people linking arms in each of these categories, members of our military and those who face food insecurity are already feeling the benefits of these grants.

Impact 100 is also designed to vet those who are seeking a grant to ensure the money is used as outlined in the proposal. "Any organization has to be a 501c3 for at least two years upon application. So, there's some financial history that can be reviewed. We also need them to be registered with the Florida Department of Agriculture which provides the license to solicit contributions.

### "Reel Talk" from the City of Destin

It's time for more "reel" talk from the Mayor and me. This time, the City of Destin's Mayor, Bobby Wagner, and I discussed annexation and shared resources.

TY: Annexation is a popular topic right now, and it's multi-faceted. What's the overarching goal?

### **Annexation:** Added Benefits for All

BW: Our vision with annexation is all about knitting closer bonds between the City and our neighboring communities and unincorporated Destinites. We're not just talking about lines on a map; we're dreaming of a future where we share resources, ideas and a sense of belonging. Together we can enhance public services, infrastructure, and overall quality of life while respecting the unique characteristics and desires of each community.

TY: Given the complexity of the topic, I know you're planning to speak at various HOA meetings and offer presentations to boards and any guests in attendance.

BW: I'm putting the finishing touches on a series of tailor-made presentations, each one crafted with a specific community or HOA in mind.

It's important to me that every presentation feels personal, like a conversation with neighbors, because that's exactly what we are—neighbors.

TY: There's a long list of potential benefits that come with annexation.

BW: Yes, annexation can enhance public services such as better road maintenance and underground utilities, local perks like free parking and boat launches and access to city recreational programs. It also often means inclusion in city planning and development processes, giving residents a voice in future growth and improvements.

TY: The largest area of concern seems to stem from individuals worried their taxes might increase.


**BW:** While it's possible that

property taxes might increase to align with City rates, it's important to consider the broader scope of services and benefits that come with being part of the City. We aim to provide a detailed breakdown of how any potential tax changes can be offset with local perks while those dollars will be used to benefit the community we all live in.

TY: People here take great pride in the uniqueness of their particular housing area. Will they be able to maintain that identity post-annexation?

**BW:** Absolutely. We recognize the importance of preserving the unique character and values of each community. Our approach to annexation involves working closely with residents and local leaders to ensure that growth and integration respect and reflect the community's heritage and vision. I hope people bring their questions and concerns to the HOA meetings or reach out directly to us. We're committed to making this process as inclusive and transparent as possible.





### **Covering Your Assets**

Insurance is everywhere, and there are so many different kinds, it gets confusing. What kind of coverage are you supposed to have to cover your homes, cars, boats and other fun things that you and your family use? Is it Property Insurance or Casualty Insurance?

The minimum underlying liability requirement for home insurance or any property policies the umbrella covers would be 300K.

It is a common misconception that if someone has an

umbrella policy, that its primary function is to pay out what is demanded. That is not how this works. The umbrella policy acts to defend its policyholder and attempt to keep the client from financial ruin. Many standard carriers offer umbrella coverage, and it is even possible to bundle your auto insurance with your umbrella in many cases for an extra multi-policy discount.

The first quarter of 2024 is already behind us, and the markets have had some interesting results. The S&P 500 as of this writing was up over 10%; the Dow is up over 5%. Bonds, based upon the bellwether 10year U.S. Treasury have declined in price (which means they increased in yield) by about 2.5%. The stock market is made up of 11 sectors and every sector was positive except for real estate (which is mainly real estate investment trusts and real estate firms). Communication Services was the leader, with an almost 16% return (examples of stocks in that sector are Google, Facebook, Netflix, Disney, the phone companies such as ATT, Verizon and T Mobile among others). Technology, Industrials, Energy and Financials all had double digit returns for the quarter as well.

Oil prices were up over 13% and gold was up over 5%. The U.S. dollar, to the amazement of many was up over 2% after having a similar return for all of 2023. Japan was the leading international market with a re-

turn of over 11% year to date. A stronger dollar tends to work against international equities, but such was not the case for many international markets, Japan in particular.

Mortgage rates averaged close to 7% which is interesting because despite the perception that mortgage rates are quite high, that is less than the average rate for the past 50 years. Rates did reach an all-time low in the early 2020s. So, many understandably homebuvers have that concern. There has been so much liquidity (money available) for the past few years that it increased demand and thus prices substantially. The demand for housing, particularly first-time homebuyers continue to grow, and an outstanding question is if the current rate of construction is meeting the demand.

What about interest rates, particularly where the Federal Reserve is concerned? The Fed has held its short term (overnight rate) to 5.25-5.50% although pointed out in its March meeting that they foresee up to three rate cuts in 2024. Short term rates (one year or less CDs, money market mutual funds) continue to pay approximately 5%. By contrast the 10-year US Treasury pays approximately 4.25%. The longest-term U.S. Treasury pays approximately the same. The question on many minds is how long will the low to no risk rate be in favor? Enter the Federal Reserve dot plot, or where rates are expected to be and by when. Currently the dot plot puts the overnight rate at 4.5 to 4.75% by year end. It is much harder to ascertain what long term rates will do so watching the 10-year US Treasury (which many banks use to price mortgages and other loans) makes most sense to us. There is a lot in the financial media regarding the longer-term dot plot, perhaps as low as 3.5% by 2025 as noted on Bloomberg Wall Street Week this past week.

When the market has a strong return, particularly over an increasing period, many people begin to think about valuations. In other words, is the market getting more expensive relative to earnings. That seems to be the case as the price of stocks to earnings is near an all-time high. Earnings have been growing year over with the S&P averaging close to 12%. Its 10-year average earnings growth rate has been about 8.4%. Stocks typically follow earnings. What might be fueling that? There are several things: Innovations such as artificial intelligence (AI), the growth in energy demand, productivity gains, efficiency gains, a strong dollar and finally, the rate of inflation continued to

They also have to be registered with the Florida Division of Corporations and file their reports regularly with SunBiz. We also ask that they have directors' and officers' insurance as well as general liability. We don't want to fund someone who could get sued and then lose it. If it's a religious organization, they can't require that recipients of their services prescribe to their particular faith even if they identify to one in particular. Forcing that would disqualify them from applying for our grant. Same with

mandatory political affiliation."

If you are an organization ready to make a massive headway for the people you serve, then note that the Letter of Intent deadline is May 15, 2024, and the application deadline is July 15, 2024. Interested nonprofits must submit the letter of intent and meet those qualifications before being given the grant application.

How does membership work for those who want to be part of Impact100 NWF? "Many of our members will write a check and that is the extent of their involvement. That contribution, however, allows them a vote for

the organization they want to offer a grant to. For those who want to get more involved, there are committees under each category and it's those people who will have a more intimate knowledge of each applicant as they get to know the founders and tour facilities.

"We want members to be able to participate in the nonprofits and activities where they want to see change. Many women join us because they want to make a difference in specific areas like education or environmental preservation. The reason we are promoting membership is each person has one vote for every \$100,000 that's available. This means if we don't have the full amount in each category, members have to vote for the categories they feel most passionate about. With less money available, critical areas will go unserved. Last year we only had four grants to give, so members had to choose the four categories that they wanted to vote in. This is why five grants is so important. We want every category to have a chance to grow."

With all 500 membership slots filled, exponential good could be injected into Okaloosa and Walton County. Join by April 30th and, together, positive change will be inevitable.

### Mixing Metals in Your Space Like a Design Pro

Mixing metals used to be a major faux pas, but not anymore. There are no rules that say every finish has to match. So, here's a suggestion: Don't be overly matchy. For me, the magic happens when you mix metals. It creates visual interest, is more stylish and helps to make your space unique. Below are a few tips to help you pull off a winning combination of metals.

#### **Don't Pick Too Many:**

Select one finish to be the star of the show, while the other finish plays a supporting role. If your space is large enough, you can add a third finish. But, you have to use it sparingly. Start by selecting a metal that reflects the overall aesthetic of the room. A good balance is 70/30, meaning 70% of your pieces should be in your dominant metal and 30% should be a supporting role. If you chose three metals, you should follow a 60/25/15 ratio.

#### **Mixing Warm And Cool:**

Contrast is key! You can mix a brushed brass (warm) with a polished nickel (cool) or matte black (neutral), brass/

gold (warm) and polished nickel (cool). When you mix metals make sure they don't all have the same finish or they'll compete for attention. The mix of warm and cool along with antiqued, matte, satin, brushed or polished (yes, there are that many finishes to select from) keeps it interesting and allows your eye to move around the room with

#### **Be Deliberate:**

When mixing metals, it needs to look intentional. Create harmony by strategically placing vour metals throughout the space. For example, in the kitchen you use large matte black pendant lights with gold accents, your sink faucet is polished nickel and your cabinet hardware is gold. The star of your show is your pendant lights (60%), the supporting actors are the gold hardware (25%) and your polished nickel sink faucet (15%), together creating an intentional, balanced look.

#### **Add Texture To Your Mixed Metal Game:**

Texture can make all the difference in a space with mixed metals. For example: In a bedroom, you have a black (matte) iron bed, a gold (polished) chandelier and brass hammered (textured) lamps. When you combine matte, polished and hammered finishes, it visually creates an inviting space.

#### **Cleaning & Upkeep:**

Some metal finishes require more cleaning and upkeep than others. For example: Black shows water spots more than some of the other finishes. Brass tends to tarnish and copper will develop a patina over time. Make sure you read manufacturers cleaning recommendations to ensure your purchase will fit into your cleaning routine.





Following the service, around 5:15 p.m., local clergy will process to the dock to begin blessing those vessels which have pre-registered followed by Brotula's Fish Feast for all. (Donations requested.) All commercial fishing, safety and recreational vessels that make their living on the sea are invited to participate. Several local area pastors will gather at the dock and the bless the boats one by one as they proceed in a line down the harbor-praying for safe passage and bountiful catches for the 2024 season.

### Lionfish Festival: A Dive into Conservation Efforts

The Emerald Coast of Destin is not just a picturesque backdrop for tourists; it is also a battleground against an invasive species - the lionfish. On May 18-19, 2024, the Lionfish Festival returns to Destin, rallying the community in an ongoing effort to combat this threat to the local marine ecosystem.

First, what is a lionfish? Lionfish, with their striking red and white stripes, are not native to the waters of northwest Florida. Originating from the Indo-Pacific region, they were introduced to the Atlantic Ocean and have since become a formidable invasive species. Their rapid reproduction rate and lack of natural predators have led to a surge in population, wreaking havoc on native fish populations and coral reefs.

The Lionfish Festival is more than just a celebration; it's a call to action. It aims to raise awareness about the detrimental effects of lionfish on the marine environment and promote sustainable solutions. One such solution is lionfish removal through fishing derbies and dives, which are central to the festival's activities.

In 2023, 144 divers in Destin and Fort Walton Beach captured over 24,000 lionfish during the Emerald Coast Open tournament, demonstrating the community's commitment to conservation efforts. This year's pre-tournament is already underway lasting through May 16, and sets the stage for two days of conservation-focused activities—the main tournament May 17-18. Divers have the opportunity to compete for prize money totaling nearly \$100,000 in categories like most lionfish caught and largest and smallest lionfish.

Participants in the Lionfish Festival can expect a diverse range of events, including lionfish hunting tournaments, educational seminars, cooking demonstrations featuring lionfish cuisine, and live music. Local marine biologists and conservationists will lead discussions on the ecological im-



pact of lionfish and strategies for their management. Emerald Coast Open Restaurant Week offers the public unique lionfish dishes prepared by chefs at local restaurants. Each evening, a local restaurant serves a unique lionfish dish on their menu. The fish caught pre-tournament are provided to the participating restaurants to serve. Each dish is also judged and the winning chef crowned at the end of the week.

Moreover, the festival provides an opportunity for the community to come together and support local businesses involved in sustainable fishing practices. By promoting the consumption of lionfish as a delicacy, the festival encourages a market-driven approach to

control their population while providing economic opportunities for fishermen.

As visitors immerse themselves in the festivities, they also contribute to a larger conservation effort. Proceeds from the festival support ongoing research and conservation initiatives aimed at mitigating the impact of lionfish on the delicate balance of marine ecosystems.

The Lionfish Festival in Destin is more than just an event; it's a testament to the power of community-driven conservation. By joining forces to combat the invasive lionfish, residents and visitors alike are making a tangible difference in preserving the natural beauty of the Emerald Coast for generations to come.

Currently, there are more children in Northwest Florida who are waiting for a foster family than the number of available licensed foster homes. There are just under 25,000 children in foster care, and less than 5,000 licensed foster homes. If each foster family in Florida took three children, there would still be 10,000 children in the state without a home. But these num-

bers do not include children who exist in homelessness outside the foster care system – and these numbers grow daily.

going operating expenses associated with the Milton Girls Home and the work Embrace Florida Kids is doing to create a residential home for foster care students attending the University of West Florida or Pensacola State College.

When did you last interact with a difficult person? Maybe the difficult person has anger problems, behaves with superiority, doesn't treat others the way they expect to be treated or is generally unkind, mean or rude. Sometimes you might label people as difficult when they have different values, opinions, religious views, political leanings or personalities than you. When are differences just

different rather than difficult? When do you invest energy in making space for different ways of moving through the world vs. investing energy in addressing boundary crossings by people who seem to disrespect you or others?

While easy to overlook, sometimes you might be the difficult person. Self-awareness is a skill developed through uncomfortable practice. Noticing when you may tend towards being judgmental, short-fused, selfish or unkind can go a long way in helping you sort interactions with others. Noticing your capability of being difficult and your need for grace when you aren't your best self can inspire increased humility when addressing difficulty in others.

A common way to deal with difficult people is to become dif-

ficult yourself. When someone is rude, you may feel the invitation to match the rudeness. When someone is mean, you may spend time brainstorming ways to inflict vengeance. While these approaches can bring short term satisfaction and a false sense of justice, you end up giving up healthy emotional control and compromising your character. Over time, matching others' difficult behavior leads to bitterness, resentment, drama, shame and poor character habits. So, how do you address difficult behavior in healthy

### 7 Ways to Navigate Interactions with Difficult People

- **1. Evaluate.** Determine what is happening in a situation. What is bothering you and why? What is tough or feels like a boundary crossing?
- 2. Sort past emotion from present. Notice if something about this situation is bringing up feelings from past events/relationships that may be intensifying your emotions in the present. If so, take time to process past feelings separately to give you an accurate perspective in the current situation.
  - 3. Sort differences from



**difficulty.** Ask yourself if the other person is showing poor character vs. has different opinions, values, perspective than you. Make space for difference. Address poor character.

4. Set boundaries. Use kind, direct words and tone to clearly state how the other party is crossing a boundary, how it impacts the relationship, what you will do differently and what you would like for them to do differently. "When you belittle me in front of others, I feel disrespected and emotionally unsafe in our relationship. I won't participate in conversations where I am belittled and disrespected. When talking to me, please use respect." If the other party respects your boundary and makes a change, that is an indicator of movement toward health. If the other party continues to cross boundaries or responds poorly to your boundary setting, that is information you need to understand the low value the other party places on the relationship.

5. Speak up for those whose voices are hard to hear. Sometimes difficult people cross boundar-

ies resulting in negativity, abuse, or injustice for those who are vulnerable. Try using your voice and boundary setting for the sake of others.

- 6. Distance. Once a person has established an ongoing pattern of crossing boundaries and poor character they are unwilling to address, it's appropriate to create various forms of distance including limiting conversational topics, time, space, emotional energy/investment, and financial involvement. You have power to give your energy and resources to life-giving relationships and to withhold energy from life-draining relationships.
- 7. Disengage. Try practicing forgiveness toward difficult people for the sake of your own peace and character. Release your right to vengeance and let the relationship go. You have the power to discern when relationships need to end. Disengaging is not defeat. In fact, you win by sustaining good character and recapturing energy to invest in pursuits that bring positive meaning to your life and those around you.

Dr. Hawkins also attributes his calling to the field of orthopaedic surgery to his love for Jesus. "I have a strong faith. The





### **Spring Into a Summer Fit Midsection**

Wanna be PROUD to wear your swimsuit this season? Start now and be well on your way to looking your best at the beach.

**Be Consistent.** First of all, you will never get anywhere if you are sporadically exercising. If a strong and toned midsection is what you're after, then keep your workouts consistent.

Our bodies change when they are forced to adapt. The constant work on a muscle is needed for it to develop the strength and stamina to perform movement. This goes for any physical system in your body, i.e. muscular, neurological or cardiovascular.

Abdominal Anatomy. Abdominals are comprised of the Rectus Abdominis (the "six pack"), internal & external obliques (sides), and transverse abdominis (what pulls your belly button in). Ab muscles are highly striated, meaning they have more muscle fibers than they have nerves sending impulses to move them. Once you work a set of reps and take a break, the neurons move from the worked ab muscles to new ones. This makes them high endurance muscles, a necessity, because our bodies depend on the abs for movement and strength ALL DAY LONG. The abs aide the back erector muscles to protect the spine, especially the lower vertebrae that are not protected by the ribcage or hip girdle. If your abs are deconditioned and weak, your spine is way less protected.

**What To Do.** Incorporate a mixture of different ab exercises, targeting the various ab muscles to be well rounded and develop a strong core.

Plank It. The most common and basic plank is also called a front hold, hover or abdominal bridge. It's an isometric core strength exercise that involves maintaining a position, similar to a push-up, for the maximum possible time. This can be performed on the forearms (low plank) or hands (high plank). If your wrists begin to ache at first, that's common. Most people find as they plank frequently, their wrists strengthen and get much better. There are actually several varieties that make the mighty plank even more challenging. Once you can master a basic plank, with good form, holding between 30 - 60 seconds, then it's a great idea to venture into other varieties. Working on the different plank varieties incorporates the entire body, through body weight, making it ideal for home workouts. Some common varieties are side plank, reverse plank, single leg plank, moving from elbow plank to hand plank for reps, "spider-man's," rocking planks, single knee and double knee taps, plus many more.

Watch your form. Protecting the spine is MOST IM-PORTANT. Shoulders should be aligned directly over your elbows or your wrists. Keep your low back from sagging. If your spine continued to the sky, it would continue from the neck and extend posteriorly from your head. So, to perfect the plank, elongate the spine from that part of your head, to your tailbone, then to your heals. Your body becomes a 2x4, a.k.a. a solid PLANK. Keep your abdominals pulled in (Transverse Abs), and thighs engaged super tight. Don't forget the legs!

Correct The Crunch. The crunch is losing its popularity, but I strongly feel it is an essential movement. The abs are responsible for flexing the spine. We flex every day—the epitome of "functional." The issue is people aren't engaging the TRANSVERSE ABDOM-INIS. This is imperative to perfecting the crunch. Failing to pull your belly button in can result in the belly "pooch." But performed correctly, avoiding

straining, focusing solely on the ab muscles, minimizing back contractions, crunches will increase strength and aesthetics.


Incorporate (Core). Not only should you perform balance work, but create balance within your body by keeping your repetitions EVEN on each side when doing one-sided movements. Practicing balance work is an entirely extra conversation. I'll give you some ideas and more explanation next month. Stay tuned...



Speaking of addictions, James Higham, Shalom Home's house manager, knows a few things about that. He's been 18 months sober. Since James knows firsthand the disastrous effects of addiction, it's his job to review the applications and interview prospective residents. Mike and Marge understand the importance of structure and participation. All residents are required to attend five recovery meetings a week. There's a curfew and plenty of house rules. Each resident participates in household chores, with weekly meetings to cultivate a feeling of family and healing.

Both Mike and Marge are very hands-on. "We're in their lives and we give them counseling if they desire. We talk about life and building family. When they feel a sense of purpose, it helps in their healing." With their extensive ministry background, the Gross' are quite comfortable spending time one-on-one, listening to the residents share about their relationships and marriage and family.

Mike and Marge are constantly amazed at each person's story. "They have every reason to forsake God – like He wasn't there for them. Many have trouble from abuse and neglect in their past. But they're grateful for their sobriety and attribute everything to God."

Shalom Home, if it's allowed to boast just a little, is the first sober living home in Okaloosa County that is FARR Certified (pending). The Florida Association of Recovery Residences certifies houses that are dedicated to compliance with FARR standards for well operated, ethical and supportive recovery housing. Shalom Home is also Level II MAT Housing, which stands for

Medically Assisted Treatment, that allows individuals with prescribed federally approved medication to assist with their substance use disorders and improve outcomes.

Right now, Shalom Home's greatest need is for donations to cover a new resident's initial fee and weekly fee until they obtain employment, which is a requirement of residency. They also need bicycles for the residents to use to get to their jobs, plus food, or grocery gift cards.

Next on Mike and Marge's list is a Shalom Home for women, because many of our mothers and sisters and daughters are in great need as well. "The need is great and there is hope for people to change. Everyone needs to know that these people deserve second and third chances and that they can contribute to society."





What sparked this month's topic? I ran a report for our grocery expenditures for February; what a shock!

As we maneuver through the times we're in, creating new habits around how we shop and consume can improve our health and wallets. Below are nine health tips with thoughts to help reduce spending at checkout:

- Focus on eating more fruits and veggies. A salad with every meal will usually create more leftovers which creates another meal at no added cost. Also, buying fresh vegetables offers multiple lunches and side dishes. Non-processed foods will always offer health benefits. Salads don't always have to be served with lettuce. Consider brown rice, quinoa or gluten free noodles. Change up the veggies for variety. Serve the salad warm vs. cold.
- Who doesn't love a delicious plate of spaghetti or lasagna? Dishes like this are filling and

can be stretched. A big pot of sauce can give you several dishes: spaghetti, lasagna, or dinnerin-a-dish (seashell noodles, veggies, sauce and cheese). Be sure to par-boil (not quite done) noodles. Doing this slows down how quickly the sugar in the noodles is absorbed.

- Scratch baking can also save money. Replace white sugar with Turbinado (cane sugar), honey, date sugar or pure maple syrup. Check the prices on these. Raw honey and pure maple syrup can be pricey, but they also require a much smaller amount due to their sweetness which also makes it last longer. On the health side, the body recognizes these natural sweetners as real food which allows it to be broken down easier.
- Cut your white flour in half with almond flour, oat flour (You can make this by grinding whole rolled oats.) or another less processed flour. This cuts down on the sugar impact on the body.
- If you're a yogurt person, switch up to plain low-fat Greek or regular yogurt. It should have only two-three ingredients. Add your own fruit (frozen fruit works well) and add nuts, seeds, and a touch of honey or maple syrup. This is cost effective and makes a great breakfast or lunch.
- Supplement with a high-quality vitamin. The company should be able to guarantee that the ingredients on

the label are in each and every tablet. Consumer Lab tested 74 products and found defects in 40% of them. Taking control of our health includes becoming more informed with what we are

putting in our bodies.

**Back to Basics** 

- Soup! I love soup. It's filled with all kinds of good stuff, from chili to veggie to chicken tortilla soup. I've found with soup that by cutting the chicken up in smaller bites I can stretch my chicken breasts for more meals. And, soup usually always allows for left overs. Tacos are another way to stretch out ingredients.
- Make your own beans. You can make a big pot and freeze them. Soak them over night. Rinse and fill the pot with fresh water and cook until done. An Insta-Pot cooks them quickly. You can also crockpot them on high for a few hours. This is a great savings and offers us the benefit of less salt in our diet.
- Replace cereal with oatmeal. Soak it in the bowl overnight in milk or water. Serve hot or cold. add nuts, seeds, fruit, nut butters, natural sweeteners, etc. You can also add a few chocolate chips (dark chocolate) for a little treat. The benefits of this one is huge. You're cutting back on starches and a high amount of sugar.
- Lastly, consider a garden. If you're like us, growing a garden has it challenges. To make this less overwhelming, grab some

neighbors and friends. One can grow tomatoes, another peppers, another squash, another lettuce and so on. Then you can share with each other. You can use containers, growing bags, etc. If you have a green thumb the ground works too :-). You can

even grow flowers for sharing.

## **Scary Places**

As children, some of us had places which scared us: the space under the bed, a cracked closet door or shadows in the dark which drove our imaginations wild. As adults, some of us have different scary places: our bank balance, our retirement investments, our children going off to college, a friend or relative's health or not waking up to our alarms. We all have things or places which can trouble us.

One space which causes some of us grief is a crawl space under our homes. Not all of us have these and they're not really scary. Merriam-Webster defines crawl space as: a shallow unfinished space beneath the first floor or under the roof of a building, especially for access to plumbing or wiring. These spaces are typically insulated with rolled insu-

lation with some type of netting to keep the insulation from falling down. Some of us who have this type of insulation have witnessed our wild native friends: beach mice, squirrels, birds, and even geckos. Yes, geckos, the small chiefly tropical and nocturnal insectivorous lizards, also like this space and will rip the netting to gain access to the insulation and become non paying roommates under our homes.

At ECES, fixing crawl spaces was not always a service we provided, because there was not really a great solution other than spray foam or replace the rolled insulation and netting which would once again become a playground for our wild friends and would need replacing in a few years.

# The Courage Cake: A Delicious Concoction for Workplace Harmony

In the bustling workplace, we are constantly shuffling between projects, deadlines, and, yes, people. These interactions often form the crux of our work joys or woes. How do you handle those moments when a mere conversation feels like wading into a battlefield? It could be a dispute with a colleague, a struggle to deliver constructive feedback or the perennial issue of feeling misunderstood.

#### **Imagine this:**

You and a colleague stand at an impasse, ideologies poised like knights on a chessboard, each awaiting the prestigious move that would render them victorious. It's not a question of who is right or wrong, but how game-changing the next interaction could be.

I love a tool I learned from RARE Leadership in the workplace, by Jim Wilder and Marcus Warner. They call it CAKE. I call it the 'Courage Cake'—a blend of personal courage and interpersonal finesse, wrapped in a confection of relationship management.

Picture it — a cake with layers of complexity, where every slice tastes like a new hope for team unity. Each ingredient serves a unique purpose, ensuring that when served, it is

not just the taste but the afterthought that lingers.

#### The Ingredients

To bake the perfect Courage Cake, we need just the right mix of ingredients:

**Curiosity:** The yeast that allows us to rise above our initial presumptions and truly understand the other's perspective. It's not about immediate condemnation but the eagerness to explore deeper. Ask yourself, do you have the humility needed to cultivate genuine curiosity, or are you content to billow in the hot air of your own conclusions?

**Appreciation:** The sweetener that coats even the bitterest morsels of conflict with a glaze of warmth. How hard is it to simply acknowledge that, regardless of the situation, the other person's intentions were partly noble, at least from their own lens? Are your interactions with colleagues seasoned with a pinch of gratitude, or are they simply bland exchanges of utilitarian dialogue?

**Kindness:** The most overlooked element that can make or break a professional relationship. In the quest to prove our point, we often forget the human behind the professional facade. Are you kind in your approach? Do you take care in the way you structure your conversations and your feedback, ensuring that the recipient feels respected and valued?

Eye Contact/Envelope: The oven that bakes the courage elements into the core of our being. Maintaining eye contact can be a simple yet powerful way to anchor respect, especially looking into the left eye, which connects you relationally to the person. Envelope the issue, ensuring that the conversation unfolds within the bounds



of the issue at hand. This is the one time you did this, not every time in the past that this has happened.

Think of these elements not just as the components of a CAKE, but as the ethics of a master chef. They dictate how we put these elements together not just for my good, but for the good of the relationship, team, and company at large.

#### **The Baking Process**

Creating a workplace where 'Courage Cake' is a regular on the menu takes more than a dash of willingness. It requires a culture that actively nurtures the seeds of courageous conversation, one interaction at a time.

Recognize the fear: Before any growth can occur, we must eradicate anxiety's weeds. Fear can be the biggest adversary in interpersonal conflicts, crippling our ability to engage constructively. By recognizing that fear you're preempting that weakness. FEAR is often simply False Evidence that Appears Real. It's a ghost!

**Create a framework:** Every good cake has a recipe to follow, and a courageous conversation is no different. Develop a framework — perhaps CAKE

— as a guide. What goes where, when to bring in the 'icing,' and how to ensure the layers remain distinct yet cohesive.

Cultivate the environment: A workplace that nurtures open dialogue, respectful challenge, and a commitment to growth will always bake the best cakes. Nurture an environment where everyone, regardless of

rank or role, feels their contributions and concerns are worthy of the table.

Encourage indulgence: Courage Cake will not bake itself. Encourage your team to engage in the 'cake-chat'. Indulge in the delightful discomfort that comes with addressing issues head-on, and watch as your team becomes more robust, innovative, and united.

Now there was a man named Joseph, a member of the Council, a good and upright man, who had not consented to their decision and action. He came from the Judean town of Arimathea and he was waiting for the kingdom of God. Going to Pilate, he asked for Jesus' body. Then he took it down, wrapped it in linen cloth and placed it in a tomb cut in the rock, one in which no one had yet been laid. It was Preparation Day, and the Sabbath was about to begin.

The women who had come with Jesus from Galilee followed Joseph and saw the tomb and how his body was laid in it. Then they went home and prepared spices and perfumes. But they rested on the Sabbath in obedience to the commandment. Luke 23:50-56

The tomb breathes cold,

clammy air. The cave shrouds the dead body and cradles Christ's dead body like the swaddling clothes that welcomed Him into the world. His dead body lies still all night.

Imagine he lay asleep resting, it was the Sabbath after all. I have been in that tomb and it is not a place you want to hang around. The cavernous tomb is closed, dirty, and makes you claustrophobic. How would you feel resting in a sealed crypt waiting?

The cross of Calvary had done its cruel work to our Master and Joseph of Arimathea was the one who dealt with the lifeless, bloody body of Christ. Joseph was well-to-do, highly educated and esteemed as a holy man. He was a member of the national religious leadership body called the Sanhedrin. By touching a dead body, he disqualified himself from worship the next day. How did he feel lifting Jesus' body?

Curiously, the scriptures refer to this time as the Preparation for the Sabbath. Surely the Law and the Prophets were prepa-



ration for this moment. Over 1,500 years the Jews had rested on the Sabbath in anticipation of this very day, yet only Joseph and a few women were present. Can you imagine the grief that gripped their hearts as they wrapped clean linen around his body? They worked in haste on Friday as no work could be done from Friday sundown to Sunday morning.

Grief slowed the work of Joseph and the women. Their mindless motion slowed them to a crawl, yet they did as much as they could before sundown. Then they hurried home to weep and wait until Sunday to finish the morbid work of embalming the Resurrection and the Life.

It's hard to summon your faith when it feels lifeless? Jesus is gone. Hope is shattered, your future in shambles, your body aching with despair, those are the times when you decide who or what you really believe in. Those are the times of preparation for something more.

Joseph and the women summoned a lot of faith that day—they handled Christ's dead body and did what needed to be done. All the evidence of defeat was lying on a stone slab in the tomb without the slightest flutter of life.

Quiet, grievous waiting is their groundwork. The Greek word translated "preparation" above is the same word used in Ephesians 6:15 where Paul admonishes Christians to have their feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace. In Christ tomb lay the body and blood that would pay the price for our atonement. The anger of God toward our sin would be appeased and peace with God was purchased for us.

Holy Saturday then acknowledges those of us struggling be-

tween post-traumatic defeat and pre-resurrection hope. This is a day of loss, but also a day of quiet hope. Psalm 15 reminds us, "For you will not leave my soul among the dead, nor let your beloved know decay."

Can you still believe when you are grieving and all is silent? Can you have faith when your body seems to be dead, and you didn't get what you expected out of life? Turn to Jesus like Joseph and the women did.

Say with me, "Rest well today my Savior, for tomorrow there is a stone to be moved, a grave to be conquered and a light to be shone on those who lay in darkness.

towel for your feet continued by long strokes to promote increased circulation to overcome and relax tired muscles.

Deep tissue massage is a specific type of massage that targets deeper structures of muscles and fascia. It is best used on smaller muscle injuries and

chronic problems.

Whiplash, sports injuries, postural alignment, treating spasms as well as tension in the muscles are very good examples. It works layer-by-layer releasing tension in the connective tissue going into the deepest accessible layer to create changes in posture and make room for movements after releasing fascial adhesions and chronic muscle

contractures. This is where I focus on releasing chronic muscle tension as well as knots and adhesions in the muscles.

In summary, Swedish massage is for more relaxation and to create increased circulation of blood and lymph, for relief of pain, improved mood and better sleep. Deeper tissue massage is designed for chronic pains that are more muscular in origin, to help your posture and create more range of motion during the healing process.

I saw grandparents, deceased uncles, departed aunts, and cousins who died before they were old enough to know what life was about.

I saw multitudes of unfamiliar children, dancing while the musicians played "Turkey in the Straw." I asked an old woman nearby who all these children were.

"Those are the babies who died in the womb," the woman said. "Aren't they precious?"

We were interrupted when a large pack of dogs came running through the town, careening up Main Street. They came stampeding like a herd of bison. Among them, I saw six of my own dogs.

I saw Lady, the cocker spaniel who died in my arms when I was a teenager. I saw Joe, who was hit by an SUV in a hit and run. I saw Boone, the collie-mix who died in a veterinary office while gazing into my eyes. I saw Ellie Mae, the bloodhound I'll never get over.
