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Destin High to Division 1: Two Sharks Make School History

When Destin High School opened its doors in 2021, the school did so with a priority on helping its students to excel in all aspects of life.

So, while the first public high school ever located within Destin city limits quickly gained a reputation for small class sizes and academic excellence, it's no surprise that it has also helped to shape some of the best athletes living in northern Florida.

Destin High recently announced that two of its students signed full Division I athletic scholarships. Sharks' standouts **Kate Corollo** and **Kenzie Prosser** became the first ever Sharks to sign National Letters of Intent, and school leadership was thrilled to see two of its best set a trend that many other DHS students hope to follow. "We are so unbelievably proud of Kate and Kenzie. Just to play a role in helping stellar athletes and students such as these is really gratifying, and we cannot wait to see how they continue to



shine at the next level," said Dr. Willy Williams, executive director of DHS.

Corollo will attend The University of New Hampshire to compete in gymnastics, while Prosser, a rising senior with the Sharks, signed to play volleyball for The Citadel in South Carolina.

The success of the duo is emblematic of Destin High's well-rounded approach to education, one in which extra-curricular aspects support academic achievement and student growth – as well as school pride and community engagement. Destin's approach is reflected in the

school's 22 varsity athletic programs, which compete in one of Florida's most challenging athletic associations. As the 2025-26 school year showed, those programs and athletes are already proving

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A New Front Door to the Gulf

Round one goes to the public! In an ongoing tug of war between private development and open shoreline, Destin just added 340 feet to the win column, and this one is permanent. No appeals, no fine print, no fence going up next year. Tarpon Beach Gulf Front Park is now open, and it belongs to all of us.

Early on July 15, 2026, just after the sun came up, officials from the City of Destin and Okaloosa County, along with members of the public,

gathered to cut the ribbon on the park, marking a new stretch of public beach access along Scenic Highway 98.

Three hundred forty feet. That is what this project comes down to when you strip away the ceremony and the speeches. Picture a football field, end zones included, and you are close to the width. Three hundred forty feet of beach, open now, free of charge, protected in perpetuity.

Tarpon Beach Gulf Front Park sits at 3310 Scenic Highway 98, and it functions exactly like

the name suggests: a front door to the Gulf. There is no gate. There is no admission fee. There is no membership card to show at the entrance. There is only sand, sky, and water, open to whoever wants to walk through.

The view did not exist a few years ago. In August 2022, the City of Destin and the Okaloosa County Commission entered an interlocal agreement to purchase the beachfront property, a deal negotiated by the Trust for Public Land. The land had previously belonged to Dieter Blasbichler, and in February 2023, once the purchase was complete, the buildings that once stood on the

property came down in a matter of fifteen minutes. When the buildings came down, onlookers cheered as the sparkling waters came into view. But government work can be slow, and it took a few more years to bring the rest of the plan to life.

The people who designed this park thought carefully about how visitors would actually arrive and spend their day. Forty nine standard parking spaces sit ready at no cost, alongside three spaces reserved for accessible parking so that visitors of all abilities can reach the shoreline. Twenty nine additional spaces accommodate the low speed vehicles so many



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residents and visitors use to get around town. Public restrooms and four open air pavilions give families a place to gather, cool off, and settle in for the afternoon. The team is also working to get benches installed under each of those pavilions, a small addition that will make it that much easier for visitors to have a place to sit and switch out tennis shoes for flip flops.

This was a partnership for the people. Tarpon Beach Gulf Front Park is the product of work between the City of Destin, the Okaloosa County Board of County Commissioners, and the Trust for Public Land, an organization that served as the lead agency negotiating the purchase of the properties that made the park possible. Their patience and persistence turned what could easily have become another stretch of private waterfront

into land that will belong to the public for generations to come.

The City and County put real money behind that vision, committing \$16.96 million combined. The decision reflected a priority that tourism revenue generated by area beaches should come back to benefit the residents and visitors who make this community what it is.

The door is open. Come on in.

For as long as I can remember, the fishing rodeo has been a part of my life. I was born to Darla Smith and Michael “Mo” Helton and raised in Destin. Long before I could appreciate what the Destin Fishing Rodeo meant for our community, I was already immersed in the world that makes it possible.

Born on the Water

My mother worked at the HarborWalk Charters booking booth, helping visitors connect with the incredible fishing experiences that have made Destin famous, while my father spent his career as a mate aboard many of the boats in our charter fleet, helping anglers create memories on the water. Because of them, my childhood was spent on the docks, around the boats and among the fishermen who built this community. The harbor wasn’t just where my parents worked—it was where I grew up. Fishing isn’t simply a pastime; it is a way of life. The waters that surround our town provide not only livelihoods, but also memories, fellowship and lessons that will stay with me throughout my life. Both of my parents introduced me to the fishing lifestyle that has been such an important part of my life. My mother has shaped the values that have guided me along the way. She has encouraged me to embrace new experiences, travel the world and never miss an opportunity to serve others. Her unwavering support has given me the confidence to pursue opportunities that help me grow, while her example taught me the im-



portance of kindness, gratitude and having a servant’s heart. Those lessons in community involvement and service would eventually lead me to one of the most rewarding experiences of my young adult life—representing the city I love as Miss Destin. There has always been something special about Destin that tugs at my heartstrings; it extends beyond the harbor and

into the community itself. In 2005, I competed in the Miss Destin pageant and was honored to be selected as Miss Congeniality by my fellow contestants. To this day, it remains one of the most meaningful recognitions I have ever received, because it came from the young ladies who shared that experience alongside me. That same evening, I was blessed with the honor of being crowned Miss Destin. Wearing the crown and sash meant far more to me than a title—it was an opportunity to celebrate the people, traditions and hometown that had shaped my life. When the Gut Speaks First: **Understanding the Back-to-School Stomachache**

The first week of school has arrived. The backpacks are packed, the lunches are made, and after one last search for a missing shoe, everyone heads out the door. Then, just as

you're reaching for the car keys, your child quietly says, "My stomach hurts."

For many parents and caregivers, this scene is as much a part of the back-to-school season as shopping for school sup-



plies and navigating busy car lines.

The child who seemed perfectly healthy all summer suddenly doesn't want breakfast, complains of a stomachache before school, or makes repeated trips to the bathroom. Naturally, families wonder: Are they getting sick?

Sometimes they are. But sometimes, the stomach is simply the first place the body speaks.

The brain and digestive system are in constant communication through what scientists call the gut-brain axis. When children experience change, whether it's a new teacher, new classmates, academic expectations, a disrupted routine, or the excitement and uncertainty that naturally come with a new school year, the digestive system may respond before children have the words to describe what they're feeling.

Sometimes, the gut speaks first. That can look like stomachaches, nausea, constipation, diarrhea, changes in appetite, or even changes in bowel habits. The question isn't whether these symptoms are real; it's why they're happening.

One of the most helpful things parents and caregivers can do is look for patterns rather than focusing on a single episode.

Does the stomachache happen only before school? Does it improve later in the day? Does it appear before a test, after a difficult interaction with friends, or on Sunday evenings before the week begins?

Patterns like these may suggest the nervous system is play-

ing a role, but they don't rule out an underlying medical condition. Pain that wakes a child from sleep, is accompanied by fever, persistent vomiting, blood in the stool, unexplained weight loss, poor growth, or continues regardless of the situation deserves prompt medical evaluation.

Rather than asking only, "Where does it hurt?" it can also be helpful to ask: "When does it happen?" "What was happening just beforehand?" "Has anything changed recently?"

Sometimes those questions provide clues that the symptom alone cannot.

Today's children navigate full schedules, academic expectations, extracurricular activities, changing friendships, and a constant stream of information. While these experiences are a normal part of growing up, they can place greater demands on a developing nervous system. For some children, those demands may show up in the digestive tract long before they have the words to explain what they're experiencing.

What Can Parents and Caregivers Do?

If a child says, "My stomach hurts," and otherwise appears well, the first response doesn't always have to be finding the medicine cabinet. Instead, create a few minutes of calm.

Turn off the television or music. Set aside phones and other screens. Sit together quietly. Offer a reassuring hug, hold their hand, or simply be present. Children often take emotional cues

An Unexpected Stage

How Christ the King Episcopal Church is becoming one of the Emerald Coast's newest homes for live music

When most people think of a concert venue, they likely don't picture a quiet church tucked away beneath the pines of Santa Rosa Beach.

Yet, that's exactly what Christ the King Episcopal Church is becoming.

This fall, the church launches Music at Christ the King, a new concert and educational series that's bringing internationally acclaimed musicians, local performers, student artists, and music lovers together in one of the area's most intimate listening spaces. The church itself makes an ideal setting. With its soaring wood ceilings, the sanctuary offers warm, resonant acoustics that reward both performers and audiences alike. Still, the series is an ambitious vision rooted in a simple idea: music has the power to build community.

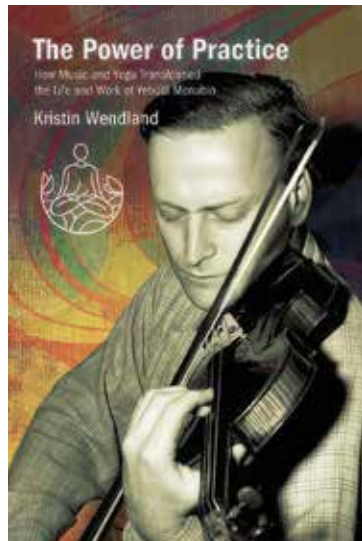
The inaugural season begins Sunday, August 23, with Roman Street, the guitar duo of brothers, Noah and Joshua Thompson. Blending contemporary jazz, Latin, Nuevo Flamenco, classical, and gypsy influences, Roman Street has earned multiple Billboard Top 25 singles, toured internationally, and shared the stage with artists including George Benson, The Gipsy Kings, Dave Koz, Bela Fleck, Ziggy Marley, and Maroon 5.

The music series is the vision of Dr. Kristin Wendland, who joined Christ the King as Director of Music Ministries in February 2025.

For Wendland, this is something of a homecoming.

A Panhandle native, she served as organist at St. Jude's Episcopal Church in Niceville while in high school before earning degrees from Florida State University, the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, and the Graduate Center of the City University of New York. She then spent twenty-five years on the music faculty at Emory University in Atlanta and is the author of three books, including two on Argentine tango and a recent work exploring how yoga shaped the life and artistry of violinist Yehudi Menuhin.

After returning home to Northwest Florida, Wendland



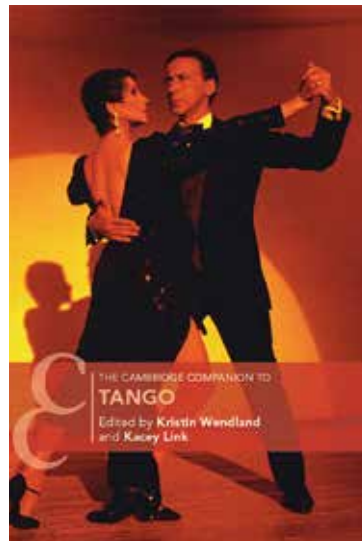
saw an opportunity to help restore Christ the King's role as a musical and cultural resource for the community. "Music has an extraordinary ability to bring people together," she says. "Whether someone comes to hear a concert, joins a community chorus, or simply learns something new, those experiences create connections and moments that last far beyond a performance."

Since arriving, Wendland has strengthened the parish choir, revived the Emerald Coast Community Singers, and begun establishing Christ the King as a place where professional artists, student musicians, and the wider community can share the joy of live music.

Roman Street is only the beginning. While the world-class artists will launch the season, the Emerald Coast Community Singers serve as the heart of the Music at Christ the King series. Recently reinvigorated under Wendland's leadership, the chorus brings together singers from across the community and will present two cornerstone performances this fall: A Celebration of American Music in September and a Christmas concert in December.

Rounding out the season are interactive musical conversations, concerts featuring local artists, and student recitals that reflect Wendland's vision of a music ministry extending well beyond Sunday mornings.

The variety is intentional. Rather than simply presenting concerts, Music at Christ the King invites audiences to experience music from many perspectives—as listeners, learners,



participants, and neighbors.

In a region celebrated for its beaches and outdoor recre-

ation, Christ the King is carving out a unique place within the Emerald Coast's growing arts community by offering a space where people can discover exceptional music together.

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"You Only Get to Be Captain Once." Meet Bowlegs Captain Kent Tinsley

On Saturday, June 13, the closely-guarded identity of the incoming Captain Billy—the 71st—was revealed at the annual Billy Bowlegs Coronation Pageant held at the Mattie Kelly Arts Center in Niceville. The free public event announced Kent Tinsley as Captain Billy 71, along with his Queen, First Mate and Mistress, Honor Guard consisting of 10 couples, and the theme for Bowlegs 2027.

Keeping the new Captain Billy's identity under wraps involves months of planning before the Coronation Pageant. Tinsley was made aware of the honor last November after the seven previous captains came together and narrowed the candidates down to three. The final decision was made by Rique Gwin, Captain Billy 70. "I was honored to pick Kent, knowing him for many years to be a quality, good man," says Gwin. "I also respect his longtime ties to the community and rich heritage in the Krewe."

Tinsley, a lifelong Fort Walton Beach resident, is the son of an Air Force veteran—and past Captain Billy (36). "It's a unique perspective, having had my family involved for so many years," he says. "My dad passed in April, but I was able to share the excitement about being Captain Billy 71." The Fort Walton Beach High School graduate and University of West Florida alum will be using his father's Captain's medallion and sword as a tribute.

Tinsley calls wife Mary his "right hand lady, the driving force behind me and my family." She and Tinsley married 20 years ago and joined the Krewe shortly after. Mary is very involved in the community, notably as president of Impact 100.

The 2027 Billy Bowlegs Festival is set for the weekend after Mother's Day, beginning on Thursday and wrapping up with the Monday evening parade. "It's a busy year, but you plan for it," Tinsley says. Fortunately, his "real" job has afforded him the flexibility to travel

throughout the upcoming year.

The Krewe is a private organization which consists of up to 170 members. In order to join, hopefuls are required to be sponsored by a current member. Tinsley spends a good part of his week managing the inner workings of the organization.

Come October, he and his fellow krewe members will attend various festivals in Panama City, Apalachicola, and beyond. When asked if he ever gets any rest, he says, "Whenever I can find time! What's the old saying? 'I'll sleep when I'm dead.'"

Tinsley says his duties as Captain Billy really began six to seven months before he officially took over. "There's a lot of planning leading up to the official start of the year, and now it's time to execute. I've been looking forward to this for a long time."

Captain Billy's Queen is Tade Wolfe, a local speech pathologist. "She and her husband Scott have been in the Krewe for years. We're great friends and work well together," says Tinsley. Local business owners Jason and Nicole Floyd have been tapped as First Mate and Mistress. "They got into the Krewe five years ago, and our relationship has grown in that

time. It was an easy pick."

The theme for Bowlegs 71 is "Whiskey In, Wisdom Out." Tinsley admits that a good bit of thought went into that. "We all enjoy getting together and enjoying a good glass of bourbon. And just maybe we spread

a little wisdom throughout the year, too."

He adds: "It's really about spreading the good news about Fort Walton Beach to other communities."

The Billy Bowlegs Pirate Festival originated in 1954. Over

the years, the Krewe has swash buckled its way into the hearts of locals and visitors with its devotion to service and civic mindedness. And, of course, fun. Learn more at kreweofbowlegs.com.

City of Destin Recognizes Civil Rights Attorney Charles Morgan Jr.

The Destin City Council posthumously recognized civil rights attorney and former Destin resident Charles Chuck Morgan Jr. as a Legacy Walk of Fame recipient. Representatives Williams and Jennings of the NAACP joined the council for the presentation.

Morgan earned national recognition for his courage during the Civil Rights era. On Sept. 16, 1963, one day after the bombing of Birmingham's 16th Street Baptist Church, he addressed the city's white business leaders and challenged the silence that had allowed racial violence to continue.

He later litigated landmark cases involving voting rights, equal protection and civil liberties across the country. Morgan also chronicled his experiences in his book, *A Time to Speak*.

Morgan lived in Destin until his death in 2009, and his family's contributions remain part of the community. His son, Charles Morgan III, founded Harbor Docks Seafood Restaurant in 1979. Now owned by Eddie Morgan, the longtime harbor restaurant continues its tradition

of supporting local fishermen, serving residents and welcoming visitors.

Morgan's grandson, Destin City Councilman Chatham, continues the family's legacy of public service through his work on the council.

The Legacy Walk of Fame recognition honors Morgan's influence on the national pursuit of justice and celebrates his enduring connection to Destin.

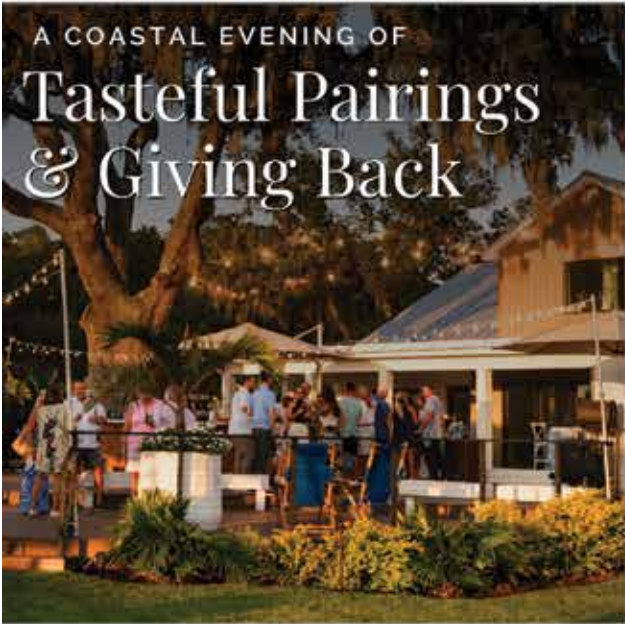

STOP Asking if the Real Estate Market is Good or Bad

The answer is simple—It just is. Instead, ask the question that actually matters:

“What can I do to make this market work for me?” I have your answer.

One of the questions I’m asked most often is, “Is now a good time to buy or sell?”

My answer usually surprises people. The market isn’t good or bad—it simply is. Markets aren’t emotional. People are.

The real estate market moves through cycles, just as it always has. Interest rates change. Inventory rises and falls. Consumer confidence shifts. Employment changes. Migration patterns evolve. These factors influence the market, but they don’t make it “good” or “bad.” They simply create different opportunities for different people.

There are certainly regions of the country experiencing extraordinary demand as people continue relocating from higher-tax states in search of lower taxes, warmer weather, and a different quality of life. Those areas have seen price spikes that don’t necessarily reflect what is happening across most of the country.

Here along the Emerald Coast, our market behaves much like many established markets that aren’t driven by unusual circumstances. It shifts. It adjusts. It rewards those who are prepared rather than those attempting to predict it.

One of the current misconceptions is the belief that waiting will create the perfect opportunity.

Many buyers tell me they’re waiting for interest rates to come down. Many sellers are waiting for prices to climb higher. The reality is that you generally don’t get both advantages at the same time.

Typically, buyers will experience one of two scenarios: lower interest rates paired with higher home prices, or higher interest rates paired with lower home prices.

Could there be a brief moment when both rates and prices are low? Absolutely. Can anyone accurately predict when that moment will occur? Only if they can

also predict the winning Powerball numbers.

The truth is, nobody consistently times the market. Successful buyers and sellers prepare for it instead. The people who consistently make great real estate decisions share five common characteristics.

They are **Patient, Prepared, Prosperous, Positioned,** and ready to **Pounce.**

Patience means understanding that opportunity doesn’t arrive on your timeline. **Preparation** means having your finances, documentation, and current home in order before opportunity knocks. **Prosperity** means having the financial ability to act without unnecessary obstacles or contingencies. **Positioning** means knowing exactly what you’re looking for and recognizing value when it appears. Finally, when the right opportunity presents itself, you **pounce.** Take the kids, the dog, the cat, grandma, and leave the rest.

Hesitation often costs more

What I do know is this: People

are buying homes every single day. The question isn’t whether the market is good or bad. The question is whether you’re ready when your opportunity arrives.

their worth on the playing field. "A school that has successful sports programs sees more engagement from its students and parents, and it's proven that just competing is an invaluable teacher for kids; the things they learn about themselves and life are important in developing success in other aspects – including helping them to be better students," Dr. Williams said. "That's why we want to foster the right athletic atmosphere. And you better believe we're here cheering our kids on."

School leaders say that a close-knit atmosphere at the school only enhances that understanding. In fact, they say, small class sizes even help students to feel more involved in supporting each other's success in all fields – including cheering each other on the field of athletic competition.

Even while Corollo did not compete directly for Destin High – as the school does not currently feature a gymnastics program – her presence at

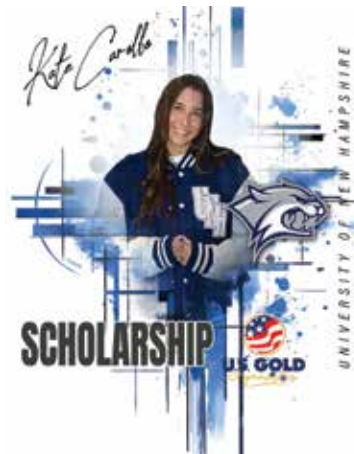

"Kenzie is one of the most impressive athletes and people I've been around, and it's no wonder that The Citadel wanted her to come play for them," Destin High Principal Jill McNamara said. "I know she's going to be a standout at the next level too. The best part is that her teammates look up to her and have something to aim for."

Prosser, who also played for severable notable club teams, noted that earning the scholarship to play at the school, located in Charleston, S.C., was beyond her wildest dreams. "I am so unbelievably excited for what's to come and can't wait for my

New NWFSC–UWF partnership will allow local students to pursue four engineering degrees without leaving Northwest Florida

For many local students, earning an engineering degree has traditionally meant moving away from home—and taking on the added costs that come with it. A newly approved partnership between Northwest Florida State College and the University of West Florida is creating another option.

Students will soon be able to begin their engineering education at NWFSC's Niceville campus and then transition to UWF to complete a bachelor's degree at the schools' joint campus in Fort Walton Beach.

That means Destin-area students can pursue a high-quality engineering degree while remaining close to their families, jobs and community.

engineering courses through UWF in Fort Walton Beach.

The specialized transfer degree—known as a SAAT degree—allows NWFSC to include required courses beyond those typically offered in a traditional 60-credit Associate in Arts program. This helps ensure students have completed the prerequisites they need before beginning their upper-level engineering studies at UWF.

Importantly for families, the additional required credits can qualify for financial aid. The combination of financial-aid eligibility, NWFSC's affordability and the ability to live at home could make an engineering degree more attainable for many local students.

careers—and encourage them to build their futures here. “Students should not have to leave Northwest Florida to pursue an engineering education or prepare for careers in industries that are vital to our region,” said Rhea Goff, chair of the NWFSC District Board of Trustees. “These new pathways give local students an affordable

and accessible starting point while helping employers develop the highly skilled workforce they need.”

For local high school students who are beginning to consider college options—as well as working adults thinking about a new career—these programs could open the door to an engineering education that once

seemed out of reach.

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From Kobe to 30A: Extraordinary Evenings Ahead at Old Florida Fish House

This August and September, Old Florida Fish House is bringing a remarkable collection of culinary and cultural experiences to the shores of 30a's Eastern Lake. The season's highlights include an exceedingly rare Kobe beef presentation featuring a visiting Japanese cattle farmer, followed in September by two distinctive evenings with former police officer and nationally recognized media personality Brandon Tatum.

A Rare Taste of Japan

On **August 27** at 6 p.m., Old Florida Fish House will present an exclusive **Usunaga Kobe Beef Dinner Experience** built around the importation of an entire A5 Kobe beef carcass from Japan.

The whole-animal presentation is believed by the restaurant to be unique in the Southeast and possibly throughout the U.S. Rather than showcasing only a familiar premium cut, the dinner will give chefs the opportunity to explore the animal through a thoughtfully composed, 10-course menu.

The evening will also introduce diners to the people and traditions behind the beef. Special guest Yoshiki Usunaga, owner and farmer of Usunaga Ranch in Japan's Hyogo Prefecture, will travel to Florida to present the beef and tell the story of his farm. Throughout the dinner, he will share insights into the care, lineage and exacting standards involved in producing authentic Kobe beef.

"Having the farmer travel from Japan makes this much more than a dinner," the Old Florida Fish House team says. "It is an opportunity to connect our guests with the origin of the product, the traditions behind it and the person who raised it."

Although "Wagyu" and "Kobe" are sometimes used interchangeably, the terms are not synonymous. Wagyu refers to four native Japanese cattle breeds. Authentic Kobe beef must come from Tajima-line Japanese Black cattle born, raised and processed in Japan's Hyogo Prefecture, and it must satisfy very strict standards for quality, marbling, weight and traceability.

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Don't Be a Hurdle, Save a Turtle

Keep the Beaches Clean, Dark and Flat

Long before the beaches were our escape and playground, before we built homes near the dunes, before we built sandcastles, dug holes and left beach chairs and umbrellas behind overnight, beaches were, and still are, nesting grounds for sea turtles. Not for decades. Not for hundreds of years. Not for thou-

sands of years. Scientists have proven that turtles have been nesting along the Gulf beaches for millions of years.

Sea turtle nesting season on the Emerald Coast is May 1 through October 31. During this time, local wildlife authorities and conservation organizations, like South Walton Turtle Watch and Friends of South

Walton Sea Turtles, urge beachgoers to keep the beaches clean, dark and flat. When we fail to do this, there can be detrimental consequences for nesting sea turtles.

In June, a Kemp's ridley, the rarest sea turtle, washed ashore on Blue Mountain Beach, entangled in a beach chair. Deceased. Sea turtles face a gauntlet of survival challenges: predators, storms, climate change, boats, poaching, fishing gear, coastal development and pollution. Of all these hurdles she had to overcome, her life was ended by a beach chair, which was something that could have been prevented.

This tragic event followed a false crawl made by a disoriented loggerhead earlier in the month. While false crawls happen, South Walton Turtle Watch's observation of the tracks led the group to believe this was due to artificial lighting and obstacles on the beach.



She had been stuck in a hole for some time before returning to the Gulf.

Please remember that it's critical to all marine life that we pick up our trash and any other trash we find, and remove it from the beach. At the end of the day, we need to remove all beach furniture and toys. We also need to remove obstacles by knocking down sandcastles and filling in holes. If you have a property near the beach, please turn off your lights at night or use amber or red lights. If your property is a rental, please educate your renters on these best practices. It's up to us to keep

the beach clean, dark, and flat.

The sea turtles that nest on our beaches are protected under the U.S. Endangered Species Act. The Kemp's ridley is the rarest and most endangered sea turtle species in the world, with only around 2,000 to 3,000 nesting females remaining today.

While we choose to use the beaches for our own recreation and enjoyment, we need to remember that we are guests. We are stewards of a land they've chosen to lay their eggs on, and the sea they call home. It's our duty to protect these vulnerable creatures and ensure their species continues and thrives.

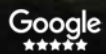


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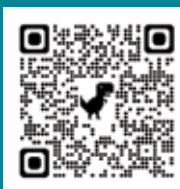

tics, weigh and record catches, maintain tournament standings and ensure every detail was handled from start to finish. I often joked that I was the tournament's biggest cheerleader because I genuinely loved celebrating every boat and angler's success and sharing in their joy. I thrived in every aspect of tournament management: the organization and camaraderie, the relationships built with captains, anglers and sponsors, and the opportunity to create memorable experiences for people who shared a passion for fishing. I am immensely grateful to the Schofields for entrusting that role to me.

Looking back, that position proved to be one of the most influential experiences in preparing me for where I am today. It was a steppingstone that gave me valuable hands-on experience and reinforced my long-held dream of promoting the fishing traditions and culture that have been such an important part of my life.

My connection to the Destin Fishing Rodeo extends far



beyond attending it as a local or growing up around it. Over the years, I have had the privilege of volunteering in nearly every facet of the rodeo, gaining a firsthand appreciation for the tremendous effort required to make this cherished event a success. I've served as a rodeo judge during weigh-ins, written up fish entries and helped sell merchandise alongside Ann White and Becky Mac in the merchandise trailer. One of my most memorable experiences came in 2021 when I was tasked with



taking over the weigh-in scales for the first five days of the rodeo. I have had the privilege of working side by side with Mrs. Helen Donaldson, learning many of the behind-the-scenes operations that most attendees never see. From entering catch data and managing records to

understanding the countless details that keep the rodeo running smoothly, I gained invaluable insight into the dedication and organization required to preserve this longstanding tradition. My involvement with the rodeo continued to grow, and in 2024, I was honored to serve as chairwoman of the rodeo. That leadership role allowed me to work even more closely with volunteers, anglers, sponsors, captains and community partners. I gained a deeper understanding of the planning and coordination required to produce an event of this magnitude. Each role provided a unique perspective and allowed me to work alongside the dedicated people who are the heart and soul of our town's longest-standing tradition.

As I have prepared to step into the position of director, I find myself reflecting on a few remarkable coincidences. This year marks 21 years since I was crowned Miss Destin 2005, a role that first gave me the opportunity to serve as an ambassador for the city I love. I am the same age today as Mrs. Helen was when she became director of the Destin Fishing Rodeo in 1998.

Over the years, Mrs. Helen has generously shared her knowledge, experience and passion for the rodeo with me. She has taken me under her wing, patiently teaching me the countless details that go into producing an event of this scale. From the technical aspects of rodeo operations to the traditions that have made it a beloved institution for generations, she has been a mentor, teacher and friend.

As the Destin Fishing Rodeo enters its 78th year, I am incredibly grateful for the confidence Mrs. Helen has instilled in me and for the time she has invested in preparing me for this opportunity. Her guidance has helped me approach this new chapter with both excitement and respect for the responsibility it carries.

Fishing is more than a tradition in my family—it's part of our legacy.

My late grandpa, Frank, is remembered by many as one of the pioneers of cobia fishing in our area. He created and patented the famous Ding-A-Ling jig, a lure that became well known among generations of anglers.

That passion was carried forward by my father, Michael “Mo” Helton, who continued producing the Ding-A-Ling and spent his life on the water as a respected mate in our charter fleet. His passion for fishing and innovation on the water helped leave a lasting mark on the Destin fishing community.

From both of them, I inherited not only a love of fishing, but also a deep appreciation for the people and traditions that make this community so special.

In February of this year, my Daddy-O passed away. While losing him has been one of the most difficult experiences of my life, it also reminded me just how extraordinary this community truly is. During his burial at sea and celebration of life, nearly 20 boats joined in procession to honor him. As I looked across the water and saw friends, captains and our fishing village coming together to pay their respects, I was overwhelmed with gratitude and pride for the place I call home. In that moment, I felt more connected than ever to the community that raised me.

Destin’s fishing tribe is built on tradition, respect and a shared love of the water. There is competition. There is camaraderie. But at the end of the day, we are a community.

Fishing Life

That day served as a powerful reminder that while fishing may bring us together, it is the celebration of our heritage that keeps us connected.

The fishing lifestyle that defined my childhood continues to shape my life today.

My man friend, Capt. B.J. Teems, and I are raising a blended family of three boys who share the same love for fishing, boating and life on the water that we grew up with. As lifelong Destin locals, we understand how fortunate we are to call this place home, and we have always wanted our children to experience the same connection to our waterways and our outdoor way of life that meant so much to us growing up.

We are, at our core, a fishing family. Over the years, I have been fortunate enough to reel in some memorable catches of my own, but these days, the greatest joy comes from watching our



boys experience those moments for themselves. Seeing the excitement on their faces when they land a fish, hearing them tell the story afterward and watching them create memories on the water remind me why traditions like the Destin Fishing Rodeo matter so much. Those experiences are about far more than the fish. They are about family, friendships and a lifelong appreciation for the place we call home.

As I step into this new role as director, I am especially grateful that my mother continues to be part of the rodeo family. Each October, she can still be found volunteering wherever she is needed—whether judging fish weigh-ins, helping in the merchandise trailer or supporting me and this event behind the scenes. Her servant’s heart and love for this community contin-



ue to inspire me, and I am blessed to have her beside me as I begin this new chapter.

As I step into the role, I think not only about the generations that came before us, but also about the generations that will follow. I never imagined my first year as director would be my first rodeo without the late Bruce Cheves, former Destin Fishing Rodeo weighmaster. He welcomed me as his new “boss.” While October will be slightly different with his absence, the rodeo will continue to honor his legacy.

The Destin Fishing Rodeo has been part of my story for as long as I can remember. When I look at the path that brought me here—from growing up in a fishing family, to serving as Miss Destin, to coordinating fishing tournaments, to volunteering in nearly every capacity the rodeo

has to offer, to serving as chairwoman, and now director—I am filled with gratitude and excitement! It helped shape my childhood, connected me to my community and introduced me to many of the people who have influenced my life. Now, I have the privilege of helping write its next chapter.

For a girl who grew up on the docks of the World’s Luckiest Fishing Village, surrounded by fishermen, boats and the traditions that make Destin so special, serving as director of the Destin Fishing Rodeo feels less like the beginning of a new journey and more like the continuation of one that started many years ago.

I am extremely grateful for the people who are the heartbeat of the rodeo: our members, committees, volunteers, sponsors and everyone who is excited to continue this beloved tradition. As I often say, “It takes a village, and we have the best one!”

I am Amber Helton, your new director of the rodeo.

You could even say I was destined for it.

The Okaloosa County Board of County Commissioners recently approved an agreement between the county and the Panama City Beach Convention & Visitors Bureau (CVB) on June 16, 2026, to expand the Gulf’s artificial reef system with the deployment of the 224-foot Henry Alex vessel to create the Sposit Reef, the newest addition to a growing network of large-vessel artificial reefs in the region.

The partnership builds on a successful history of collaboration between Okaloosa County’s tourism department, Destin-Fort Walton Beach, and the Panama City Beach CVB, including the deployment of the 239-foot Deep Stim III in 2023.

“The marine life that benefits from these artificial reefs does not see borders,” said Okaloosa County Board Chairman Trey Goodwin. “We are pleased to be working again with our neighbors in Panama City Beach on

this effort as a showing of how the power of partnerships can create something worthy for our residents, visitors and the environment.”

The \$450,000 cost to purchase, prepare and transport the vessel will be shared equally between Okaloosa County and the Panama City Beach Convention & Visitors Bureau, with each organization contributing \$225,000.

“This project is another example of how strong partnerships can create lasting benefits for our Gulf,” said Erin Graham, coastal resources manager for the Panama City Beach Convention & Visitors Bureau. “By working alongside Okaloosa County and CCA Florida, we are expanding critical habitat for marine life while creating new opportunities for anglers and divers to experience the incredible resources our waters have to offer.”

The Coastal Conservation Association (CCA) Florida, a longtime partner in marine con-



servation and artificial reef development, will provide an additional \$60,000 to cover towing and deployment expenses. Beyond supporting numerous artificial reef deployments, CCA has partnered with the county on invasive lionfish removal efforts, habitat restoration projects, redfish release initiatives and the ongoing SS United States artificial reef project.

All funding for this project is provided through tourism development tax revenue and partner contributions. The Sposit Reef was named by CCA in memory of the late Rebecca Sposit, human resources director at the

CCA national office.

“Rebecca Sposit did so much for marine conservation through her role at CCA, in ways the public could never see,” said Pat Murray, CCA’s national president and CEO. “She was a beloved part of CCA, and this reef is a lasting testament to her impact on the organization and the marine environment.”

“The Sposit Reef deployment serves as a lasting tribute to Rebecca’s life and legacy while reflecting our ongoing commitment to the conservation and enhancement of Florida’s marine resources and coastal ecosystems. We are grateful for the

opportunity to work alongside our partners on initiatives that strengthen marine biodiversity, expand critical habitat for fish and other marine species, and support economically important local industries, including recreational fishing and diving,” said Brian Gorski, executive director of CCA Florida.

The proposed deployment site is located at 30° 05.831’N, 86° 17.749’W, in approximately 120 feet of water, 22 nautical miles from the Destin East Pass and 28 nautical miles from the Panama City Pass. The official reef name will be the Sposit Reef. Deployment is expected in fall 2026.

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Punching Back Against Parkinson's Disease:

The Dynamic Duo Behind Rock Steady Boxing Therapy

Optimum Hope. That's what Diane Gordon and her son, Christian McCowen, offer their clients with Parkinson's disease and other neurological disorders.

Taking a huge step of faith, Diane and Christian opened Optimum Hope Gym in Niceville with the goal of making the program accessible to everyone with mobility challenges. Di-



ane, a retired physical therapy assistant with 32 years of experience, and Christian, a physical therapy technician with 10 years of experience, got the idea from Diane's former classmate and friend, Beverly Bell, who opened a similar facility in Tennessee. They saw how the therapy dramatically improved people's quality of life and patterned their gym after hers.

Optimum Hope utilizes the Rock Steady Boxing method, a program specifically designed for people with Parkinson's disease. Rock Steady Boxing is a first-of-its-kind Indianapolis-based nonprofit founded in 2006 to provide effective physical exercise for people with Parkinson's. The organization was founded by former Marion County, Indiana, prosecutor Scott C. Newman, who was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease at age 40.

The fitness programs, tailored to each individual client, provide noncontact boxing to improve strength, balance, endurance, gait, flexibility, posture and stress relief.

Diane and Christian became certified in Rock Steady Boxing by completing online classes and spending a weekend training in Indianapolis. Although the program is designed for people with Parkinson's disease, it can benefit anyone with a mobility disorder. In addition to clients with Parkinson's, Diane and Christian serve people with mul-



iple sclerosis, cerebral palsy and other neurological and muscular disorders.

They work with each client three times a week in one-hour sessions. In addition to physical exercises, Diane and Christian incorporate cognition and voice exercises into the program. To maximize benefits, they continually vary the routines.

Clients pay \$120 per month for the program, although no one is turned away because of an inability to pay. Diane opened the gym using personal funds and receives no paycheck. Christian, a single father, receives minimal compensation. Currently, the facility operates at a loss while Diane pursues grant opportunities. They also accept tax-deductible donations.

They spread awareness of their ministry by attending Parkinson's support groups, accepting physician referrals, connecting with physical therapists and giving presentations. Word of mouth also continues to play an important role. Recently, they began renting the facility on days it is closed to help offset operating costs.

Diane and Christian begin each day by praying for their clients and asking God to help them show patience, love and kindness. They demonstrate Christ's love through their actions, creating an upbeat and encouraging atmosphere. Laughter

plays a prominent role in their work. Inspiring messages fill the walls and whiteboards. When clients are hospitalized, Diane and Christian visit and pray with them.

Displaying and living out her servant's heart comes naturally to Diane. Prior to opening

Optimum Hope, she founded and operated Genesis House, a faith-based halfway house for men recovering from alcohol and drug addiction.

Men entering Genesis House were required to obtain employment, attend church and participate in Bible studies. It is impossible to measure the physical, emotional and spiritual impact Genesis House had on the lives of the many men who completed the program during its 15 years of operation.

After retiring from her 32-year career as a physical therapy assistant because of her husband's battle with cancer, Diane still felt called to help people. God impressed upon her heart that her 15-year season of operating Genesis House had run its course and it was time for a new chapter.

While visiting Beverly in Tennessee, Diane saw firsthand how Rock Steady Boxing positively affected the lives of people with mobility disorders, and a new vision was born. The calling became even clearer when Christian became excited about joining the ministry alongside his mother.

Together, Diane and Christian model Christ's example of caring for the sick. They have already witnessed dramatic improvements in the lives of their clients. It is truly heartwarming to see a mother and son working side by side to provide a much-needed service to the community, serving an often-overlooked population and offering renewed hope.

I had heard of microplastics but had not paid much attention to them until recently. However, I think the subject is quite interesting.

A little history: Leo Baeckeland, a Belgian immigrant to the United States, developed Bakelite, considered the first fully synthetic plastic, in 1907. Early uses included electrical components; Bakelite was later used in radios, automobiles, and appliances. In the 1930s and '40s, new synthetic materials included polyester, nylon, polystyrene foam, and plexiglass. In 1955, Life magazine published an article titled "Throwaway Living," focusing on how plastics were helping overburdened housewives. Fast-forward to now, and you will find plastics in modern medicine, food packaging, construction, cosmetics, apparel, paint, cleansers, toothpaste, and the list goes on.

Microplastics are particles smaller than 5 millimeters, and nanoplastics are smaller than 1 micrometer. Some come from larger plastics breaking down, while others are manufactured for use in certain products. Most conventional plastics do not readily biodegrade; instead, they can persist and break into increasingly smaller particles. We find them in the air we breathe, the water we drink, the clothes we wear, and the food we eat. They've been found from the summit of Mount Everest to the ocean depths. To date,

microplastics have been found in more than 1,300 aquatic and terrestrial species and detected in various human tissues and fluids.

Stanford physician Desiree LaBeaud has described this as being "born polluted," after studies reported microplastics in meconium (a newborn's first stool). Researchers have also reported microplastics in breast milk. During preliminary research, Teflon specks were visible under a microscope in one child's tonsil tissue.

Micro- and nanoplastics have been detected in brain and reproductive tissues, among other areas. Researchers are investigating whether smaller particles can cross cell membranes, disrupt signaling processes, or affect other cellular functions. What these findings mean for human health is still being studied.

Researchers struggle to know which substances to study, as more than 10,000 chemicals have been identified as being used in plastics. More than two-thirds have not been fully assessed for safety, and over 2,400 have been identified as potentially hazardous. Heat and sunlight can increase the migration of some substances from plastic bottles, so avoid storing bottled water in hot cars or direct sunlight. Notice how many cases of water are left in the sun at gas stations and other stores.

So, what can we do about it? Ready, set . . .

Children: When practical, choose well-made, age-appropriate metal or wooden toys that meet current safety standards. How many kids put toys in their mouths?!

Here are some more options for reducing plastic use and potential exposure:

- Purchase clothes, towels, bed linens, rugs, and other items made from natural materials

such as cotton, linen, silk, and wool.

- Choose stainless steel, cast iron, glass, or properly made food-safe ceramic or clay cookware.

- Replace single-use plastic water bottles with reusable stainless steel or glass bottles.

- Take a glass container with you when you eat out so you can use it for leftovers. If you receive leftovers in a polystyrene foam container, transfer them to a different container as soon as you get home.

- When microwaving food, use glass, ceramic, or a container specifically labeled microwave-safe. Dispose of plastic items that are damaged or showing wear.

- Plastic wrap and plastic utensils can contribute to plastic waste and may release chemicals or particles, particularly when heated or damaged. Reduce the number of single-use plastic items in your kitchen. When using plastic wrap, follow the label directions and do not allow it to touch food during microwaving. Consider reusable food-grade silicone lids or Bee's Wrap. I have both, and they are great!

- Do not reuse containers designed for single use. Follow the manufacturer's directions for reusable plastic products.

- Look for products sold in glass jars rather than plastic ones, such as peanut butter.

- Once opened, store meat in a leakproof glass or food-grade silicone container.

- Consider using glass food-storage containers.

- Pick up some inexpensive silverware to use at the beach or on picnics, and keep some in the car for those fast-food stops.

As always, don't overwhelm yourself. Start with what you use most often. The next time you're shopping for clothes, check the material label inside



the garment and ask yourself whether the choice supports your health and environmental goals. I recently needed to pick up a few new items and found that some international brands didn't have material labels, so I chose not to buy them.

Look for flatware at thrift stores. Another good place to

start is with bed linens and jammies. We spend up to eight hours in them every day of our lives. IKEA has some good stainless steel cookware at a reasonable price. Lastly, if you're at the farmers market and there is a pottery booth, stop in and look for a new pie pan or other items to replace the not-so-healthy ones at home. Just confirm that the pottery is intended for food use, was made by a reputable potter, and has a food-safe glaze.

As more of us change our buying habits, the market will begin to change as well. This is how we can fight back.

Additionally, focusing on the negative behavior in others can let us off the hook because our behavior isn't as bad.

Generally, when things are going well, it is easy to overlook the good. We get up, get in our cars, go to work, interact with others, come home, all the while forgetting to notice the good warm sun, the good of having money for gas, the good of having meaningful work, the good of relationships that make us smile, and the good of a nice home at the end of the day. And while we are overlooking the good, our brains are scanning for danger and alerting us to bad drivers, a person who looks dangerous, the person yelling out the window in the parking lot, the mean person in the checkout line, the humidity, and people leaving trash on the beach.

Focusing on bad behavior over the good in life can leave us feeling we need to protect ourselves, become cynical, isolated, and embrace a negative mindset. The great news is our brains are trained through patterns of repetition so while brains naturally scan for danger, we can retrain our brains to recognize the patterns of good in the world. People are creating good donating time to pick up trash, sweep boardwalks, and fill in holes on the beach for sea turtles. People are creating good starting meal trains and Go Fund Me pages for those who need support.

from the adults around them,

and a calm presence can be incredibly grounding.

Encourage slow breathing. A simple technique such as box

breathing can help calm the nervous system: inhale through the nose for four seconds, hold for four, exhale gently for four, and pause for four before repeating. Younger children may enjoy imagining they're smelling a flower on the inhale and slowly blowing out birthday candles on the exhale.

Offer a few small sips of water and allow the moment to slow down.

These simple steps aren't meant to replace medical care. They create an opportunity to

observe whether symptoms begin to settle while helping children reconnect with their bodies.

If stomachaches have happened around previous school years, don't wait until the first difficult morning to talk about them. A relaxed conversation a few days before school starts can go a long way.

Ask open-ended questions: "What are you most excited about this year?" "Is there anything you're a little nervous about?" "I remember your tum-

my bothering you before school last year. How are you feeling about going back?"

Sometimes children don't know exactly what's bothering them until they're given a safe space to think about it. If this has been a recurring pattern, consider letting your child's teacher or school staff know ahead of time. A little extra reassurance or simply having another trusted adult aware of the situation can make the transition easier.

Supporting the whole child also means supporting healthy daily habits. Consistent sleep, balanced meals with protein and fiber, regular movement, outdoor play, hydration, and opportunities for meaningful conversation all help children adapt more effectively to change.

Not every stomachache is related to the nervous system, and it's important not to assume it is. If stomachaches become frequent, interfere with school or daily life, or are accompanied by concerning symptoms, reach out to your child's pediatrician. They know your child's medical history and can help determine

Drawn to Destin: How a Local Artist Turned Her Love of Home Into an Emerald Coast Mahjong Masterpiece

Marilu Morgan never planned to launch a Mahjong business.

For the Destin artist known for capturing the beauty of the Emerald Coast, inspiration arrived in an unexpected place: a Mahjong table.

When she couldn't find a set that reflected the beauty of the Emerald Coast, she created her own. Filled with hand-drawn illustrations of native flowers, emerald waters, sugar-white beaches and nods to Destin's fishing heritage, the collection has quickly become a local favorite and is now finding homes on Mahjong tables across the country.

Known for her vibrant, colorful coastal artwork celebrat-



ing the Emerald Coast lifestyle, Morgan has built a following through pieces that capture the beauty and charm of coastal living. Designing a Mahjong collection became a natural extension of the place that has inspired her work for years.

When she searched for a set

that matched her artistic style, Morgan realized something was missing. "There are so many beachy sets out there," Morgan said. "I really wanted one that reflected the place I call home."

So, she picked up her pencil and designed one herself.

Not intending to sell the collection, she shared the finished set with friends before posting a video on Instagram. The response surprised her. "I posted a video on Instagram and it blew up," she said. "I knew I had stumbled on something special at that point."

That personal project has since grown into the Emerald Coast Mahjong Collection, a hand-illustrated tribute to Northwest Florida.

Every tile is illustrated by Morgan without AI-generated artwork or clip art. Native flowers, local wildlife, emerald waters and sugar-white beaches all appear throughout the collection. Even the backs of the tiles feature a photograph Morgan captured while at the beach with her children, transformed into a watercolor-inspired wave pattern.

The local touches continue throughout the set. The Joker tiles depict tourists, her husband's suggestion, with one featuring a fisherman proudly holding a red snapper, a nod to Destin's fishing heritage.

Morgan also credits the local Mahjong community with helping shape the collection.

She learned the game from local instructor Morgan Smith, leaned on Jenn Marvel throughout the design process and relied on her Mahjong group to test sample sets and provide honest feedback. "They've given me so much encouragement, constructive criticism and help," she said. This summer, Morgan celebrated the collection's debut with three launch parties in Destin, two at Bitterroot and one at Camille's at Crystal Beach. Guests enjoyed open play on the new sets, shopped the collection and celebrated almost a year of work coming to life.

During each event, Morgan

asked a simple question: "Who traveled here from out of state?"

More than half the room raised their hands.

Guests had traveled from Texas, Louisiana, Tennessee, Mississippi, Georgia and Alabama to celebrate the launch. "That really blew me away," Morgan said. "That so many folks would plan a trip to Destin to play with the tiles I designed? A pinch me moment, for sure."

The excitement has continued since launch. Morgan said nearly 90% of online orders

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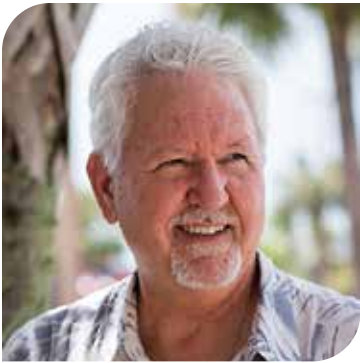

A Pastor's Ponderings: "God, I Hate Paying Taxes."

"So, the spies questioned him: 'Teacher, we know that you speak and teach what is right, and that you do not show partiality but teach the way of God in accordance with the truth. Is it right for us to pay taxes to Caesar or not?'"

"He saw through their duplicity and said to them, 'Show me a denarius. Whose portrait and inscription are on it?'"

"'Caesar's,' they replied."

"He said to them, 'Then give to Caesar what is Caesar's, and to God what is God's.'"

Luke 20:20-25 (NIV)

The religious leaders thought they had finally trapped Jesus.

If He opposed paying taxes, the Romans could arrest Him for rebellion. If He supported paying taxes, the Jewish people would turn against Him. It seemed like the perfect no-win question.

Jesus refused to play their game. Instead, He lifted the conversation from politics to worship.

Like most people, I don't enjoy paying taxes. Every year I search for every possible legal deduction imaginable. Most people do the same.

The Jews of Jesus' day felt even more strongly. Every adult was required to pay a Roman denarius simply for the privilege of living under Caesar's rule. To faithful Jews, the tax was more than a financial burden—it was a painful reminder that they lived under a pagan empire.

Jesus asked for one of those coins.



A denarius was a small silver coin bearing the image of Tiberius Caesar. Around his portrait was an inscription declaring him to be the son of the divine Augustus. To devout Jews, those words bordered on blasphemy.

The irony is striking. The very men trying to trap Jesus immediately produced the coin from their own pockets.

Holding it before them, Jesus asked, "Whose image is on it?"

"Caesar's," they answered.

Then came one of the wisest statements ever spoken: "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's, and to God what is God's."

But Jesus was saying far more than, "Pay your taxes." If the coin bore Caesar's image, where is God's image stamped?

Genesis gives the answer. God created humanity in His own image. The coin belonged to Caesar because it bore Caesar's likeness. You belong to God because you bear His image. That fact changes everything.

God is not merely asking for a portion of your income. He is asking for your whole heart.

Catholic mystic Thomas Merton once wrote, "We are what we love. If we love God, whose image we bear, we discover the very purpose for which He created us."

Our culture constantly asks, "What's in your wallet?" Jesus asks a far more important question: "Who's on the throne of your heart?"

There is only room for one king there.

This discussion reminds me of an elderly couple I once knew in Nebraska. They loving-

ly cared for their five-year-old great-grandson. Every afternoon Gary's deep voice lulled the child gently to sleep as they read him Bible stories and prayed with him before his nap.

Eventually, Great-Grandpa Gary needed open-heart surgery. As Grandma Carolyn explained the operation, the little boy asked, "Gamma...when the doctors look inside Grandpa's heart, will they find Jesus in there?"

The greatest question is not whether Jesus is in our wallet. It is whether He is in our hearts.

That belongs to God.

Emerald Coast Theatre Company (ECTC) is gearing up for another season of exceptional educational theatre programming with its **Fall 2026 Youth and Adult Education Classes, running Aug. 8 through Nov. 22.** This semester's lineup spans nearly every age and interest, from five-year-olds taking their first bow in Mini Players to seasoned performers refining their craft in Teen Company and adults finding (or rediscovering) their love of the stage in Senior Drama Club. With classes at ECTC's Grand Boulevard campus, its second space on Grand Boulevard (formerly Orvis), the Florida Chautauqua Theatre in DeFuniak Springs, and the Riverwalk Community Clubhouse in Freeport, ECTC continues to expand its reach across the Emerald Coast. Payment plans and scholarships are available for families who need them, and registration is open!

This fall also marks an exciting chapter for ECTC's education program, with two new directors stepping into leadership roles: **Adam Day Howard**, MFA, as education director and **Mallory McGill** as education and outreach coordinator. Together, they bring decades of combined experience in professional theatre, music direction and arts education to a program that already reaches hundreds of students each year.

Mallory McGill was raised in Destin and is thrilled to give back to her hometown community as she shares the transformative power of theatre with the next generation. Before joining ECTC, McGill taught theatre at Destin High School, where her students consistently earned Superior ratings and Critics' Choice Awards at the Florida

District and State Thespian Festivals, and where she was honored with the school's prestigious Golden Shark Teacher Award for her dedication to students and the broader school community.

McGill's résumé extends well beyond the Panhandle. She spent more than 15 years teaching and actor coaching in Los Angeles at Lesly Kahn & Co, one of the nation's premier acting studios. She trained hundreds of actors ranging in age from 6 to 65, and many of her students have gone on to appear on HBO, ABC, NBC, Disney, Nickelodeon and in national Broadway tours. As a working actress, director, filmmaker and writer, her own credits include *The Lincoln Lawyer*, *Stupid Questions*, *The Suite Life: On Deck*, *90210*, *General Hospital*, and stage productions of *The Importance of Being Earnest*, *Biloxi Blues* and *Misalliance*. She later discovered a passion for writing original stories, and her most recent screenplay was recognized by the Austin Film Festival and Reboot Studios. McGill holds a Bachelor of Science from Vanderbilt University, where she studied Acting/Directing, Communication Studies and Human & Organizational Development. She believes the best rehearsal rooms are built on curiosity, kindness, collaboration and the courage to take creative risks, a philosophy that shapes everything from ECTC's youngest Mini Players

classes to its competitive troupes.

Adam Day Howard steps into the role of education director following a distinguished career in higher education and professional musical theatre. Most recently, he served as Lecturer of Musical Theatre at Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music and University Theatre, where he taught vocal pedagogy, acting for musical theatre, music direction and playwriting, and directed all mainstage musicals. He also directed the university's Voices of YSU University Chorus from 2022 to 2024 and created YSU's minor in Musical Theatre Music Direction in 2024. Before Youngstown State, Howard held faculty positions at Texas Tech University, Centre College, the Institute of the Arts Barcelona and Kent State University, teaching musical theatre performance, vocal studio, acting and the history and literature of musical theatre.

Howard's creative work spans regional theatre, Off-Broadway and international festivals. He produced and music directed *Here There Be Dragons* at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival in 2024, having previously music directed its Off-Broadway run at Players Theatre in Manhattan in



2022. As a composer and writer, he created several original Texas pantomimes for Stages Repertory Theatre in Houston, including "Hansel and Gretel -or- Out of the Woods and Into the Fire." His original music for Tennessee Williams' *Kirche, Kuche, Kinder* was reviewed in *The New York Times*. Howard holds a Doctor of Education from Ohio University (expected 2026), a Master of Performance with Honors from the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, and a BA in Theatre Studies from Kent State University. He is the only American certified in the Vocal Process Methodology developed by Gillyanne Kayes, and he holds memberships in Actors Equity Association (UK), the National Alliance for Musical Theatre and the Dramatists Guild.

The **ECTC Education fall lineup** begins with Mini Play-

ers for kindergarten through first grade, where students explore songs, dance and basic theatrical vocabulary through a Trolls-themed class, culminating in a showcase on Nov. 4. Young dancers can also join First Steps Ballet/Tap, taught by Emily Bainbridge, or the Ballet/Jazz Combo, taught by Chelsea Rager. Little Players (grades 2-3) step up to a full production class experience with *Trolls JR*, while Big Players in grades 4-5 take on more complex choreography in their own *Trolls JR* production with technique class options like Group Vocal Techniques and Broadway Dance Styles.

Teens have no shortage of options this fall, from *Legally Blonde JR* for grades 6-12, complete with an Aug. 7 audition workshop and November per-

Midnight Mixtape Brings the Soundtrack of a Generation to a Venue Near You

If you've ever found yourself smiling from ear to ear when the opening notes of a favorite anthem blast through the speakers, you're definitely not alone. That feeling of instant nostalgia is exactly what Northwest Florida's hottest new band on the block, Midnight Mixtape, has built its reputation on — delivering energetic performances that transport audiences back to some of music's most memorable eras.

Midnight Mixtape has quickly become one of the area's most entertaining live acts, combining exceptional local musicianship, polished vocals and an electric stage presence that transforms every performance into a sing-along. Rather than simply covering familiar songs, this band recreates the feel, emotion, excitement and energy that made these tracks part of the soundtrack of our youth and young adulthood. These

guys and girls aren't simply performing songs — they're playing memories.

For its most recent experiment in music history, the band has shifted to "Y2K Rewind: The Ultimate Early 2000s Live Experience," featuring an impressive collection of hits spanning rock, pop, alternative and dance music from the late 1990s and early 2000s. Think Avril Lavigne, Blink-182, Concrete Blonde, Britney, Evanescence and many

more artists whose music defined an entire generation. Whether you grew up burning cheap CDs for friends or loading your first iPod with these bangers, Midnight Mixtape delivers the sounds and shows that instantly reconnect us with those unforgettable moments.

As band co-founder Dan Collins told me, "The concept behind our Midnight Mixtape shows is essentially to pick an era and build an entire show around it. A Midnight Mixtape show isn't simply an array of cover songs; it's an event." Collins added, "We play different themes and learn full new sets for each new theme. Keeping the performance more organic and unplugged, with acoustic guitars, simple hand percussion, the addition of violin playing many of the lead guitar parts, along with keys and multi-part harmonies gives the shows a more intimate and up-close vibe."

Collins says he and his fellow band members believe this concept is why, to date, all of their limited-run shows have sold out at every venue where they have performed across Northwest Florida.

Dan Collins, whose lead vocals and guitar anchor each performance with confidence and charisma, has become well known throughout Northwest Florida as the frontman and founder of Black Eyed Blonde, as well as for producing unique live entertainment events that go beyond the typical cover band performance. He also built his reputation during his time playing with Naked Gunmen and Miss Demeanor.

Sharing center stage is Dan's equally talented wife, Becca (also of Black Eyed Blonde), whose dynamic lead vocals add both power and versatility to the band's sound. Her ability to move effortlessly between emotional ballads and high-energy rock anthems gives Midnight Mixtape an impressive vocal range that keeps audiences engaged from the first song to the final encore.

The ensemble also includes Sarah Mangum on vocals and keys, adding rich harmonies and melodic depth. Jess Murphy (formerly of Continuum), with her always impressive violin arrangements, gives familiar favorites an unexpected twist, adding a sound and a brand of showmanship that any band would envy. Stacy Clearman delivers strong vocals and percussion that enhance the band's layered sound and infectious rhythm. Together, Midnight Mixtape creates a polished production that feels much larger than that of just another local band.

Destin Artist Natalie Maxted Selected for New York City Exhibition

Destin contemporary artist Natalie Maxted will represent the Emerald Coast in Summer City Idyll, a group exhibition opening July 23 at Agora Gallery in New York City's Chelsea arts district.

Maxted's painting *Eating* (2020) was selected through an international open call organized by Circle Foundation for the Arts. The recognition marks an important step in the artist's return to her creative practice following a period of profound personal change.

Maxted came to the Emerald Coast through her family's military service and later made Destin her home. After she was widowed in 2022, she stepped away from her art practice to focus on raising the couple's young daughter. In recent years, she has been steadily rebuilding



her career.

Although Maxted's work has previously been exhibited in New York, Madrid, Monaco, London and Miami, she continues to live and work in Destin.

"I am proud to represent our local arts community on an international stage," Maxted said.

Before becoming a full-time artist, Maxted worked at Christie's in London. She earned a bachelor's degree from the

University of St Andrews and a master's degree through the University of Warwick and IESA in Paris and London.

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whether additional evaluation or treatment is needed.

Perhaps the most important takeaway is this: Symptoms are information.

Rather than asking only, "How do we make this go away?" it can be equally valuable to ask, "What might this symptom be trying to tell us?"

Sometimes the answer lies in the digestive system. Sometimes it's the nervous system adapting to change. Often, it's a combination of several factors.

As another school year begins, remember that children don't always have the words to explain what's happening inside. Sometimes the gut speaks first.

When families respond with curiosity instead of assumptions, they become better equipped to recognize when a child simply needs reassurance, when they may need a little extra support, and when it's time to partner with their pediatrician. Because every symptom has a story, and sometimes, listening is the first step toward understanding it.

This past month, a member of our Destinites Facebook group for locals shared a serious concern about her property. Other people have experienced the same issue, and she would like to raise awareness. Here is what she wrote, along with responses from several members.

A Member's Post:

Does anyone have information on how to resolve a property dispute involving an unrecorded utility easement in Destin that has been in place for more than 20 years? Are there ways to ob-

tain financial assistance to bring this matter before a judge?

I own a home on Calhoun Avenue. I'm landlocked and involved in a property dispute with a disgruntled neighbor whose property I must cross to reach my driveway.

I have involved law enforcement five times, and my utilities have been blocked twice. I failed to obtain a protective order and spent almost \$6,000 on an attorney seven months ago to respond to my neighbor's demands, explain my rights to use these utilities in their current location and request that he allow the attorney to draft an easement so it could be recorded. There was no response.

Five months later, he contacted the City Building Division to indirectly continue bullying me — and now the city. That matter

was resolved with a short phone call. Lastly, my title insurance company denied my request for assistance.

Three properties, including his, use these utilities, but the disgruntled neighbor is demanding that I alone relocate mine. He has no dispute with the adjacent property owner about the utilities on his property — just mine.

He wants mine relocated to the recorded easement of egress and ingress, an agreement dated 2002 that does not state that the current utilities must be relocated. Documentation shows that the utilities were in place by at least 1998, before the single parcel was divided into two.

I'm at my wits' end over how to regain my property value. I do not have a marketable title now, because of a nearly five-year property dispute that I would have to disclose if and when I sell my home.

Even with a new law signed by our governor to protect property owners when a single parcel under unified ownership is divided into two, there's been no help. Florida Statute 704.09 was signed into law in June 2024 to protect individuals in my exact situation.

This behavior isn't fair, especially for a single-income homeowner who is simply trying to live peacefully in our beautiful

little city we call home.

Some Member Responses:

Did you purchase title insurance when you bought the property? Any easements should be listed on existing titles or mortgages. You may have to review records from before your property was divided, since you say you are landlocked. Regardless, your best option is to obtain a title examination and consult a real estate attorney.

Reply from the poster: I did that. The survey exception was not deleted from my policy, so they denied the claim. I had three exceptions deleted, but not that one. I had no idea this was necessary when I purchased the property and never dreamed I needed to purchase a better policy.

It sounds like you need to request mediation with a seasoned mediator.

It is sad that some neighbors act this way. I have wondered about these waterfront properties that were divided into two or three parcels back in the day and how it works if the owners don't get along or someone wants to sell. Scary. I'm sorry you have to go through this!

It is time for a quiet title suit.

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formances, to specialized Masterclasses in Acting for Musical Theatre, Playwriting and Acting and Improv, all taught by Howard and McGill. Dancers can pursue Broadway Dance Styles or the monthly Leaps, Turns & Tricks Skills Lab, and competitive performers have two tracks: the JTF Performance Troupe (grades 2-12), which travels to the Junior Theatre Festival in Atlanta in January, and the Junior Thespian Competition Troupe (grades 6-8), which competes regionally in October and at the state level in February. Students in grades 9-12 can also join Teen Company Fall, a semester-long training program that culminates in a One Act performance at the Florida Theatre Conference in November and includes mentorship toward collegiate auditions, scholarship opportunities and portfolio building.

ECTC's reach extends beyond its home campus through satellite classes at the Florida Chautauqua Theatre in DeFuniak Springs and the Riverwalk Community Clubhouse in Freeport, where K-12 students can participate in Trolls JR. The Homeschool program offers Voice and Movement, Acting and Improv, and a hands-on Sewing and Costume Design course for students ages 9 to 18, while adults can join Beginner/Intermediate Tap, Intermediate/Advanced Tap or the Senior Drama Club for performers 55 and up.
